





Living Ruins Worcester City Art Gallery & Museum 26 September-30 November 2019

Anyone who enjoys a visit to historic sites, whether intact or in ruins will love the next exhibition opening on 26 September at **Worcester City Art Gallery & Museum**. *Living Ruins* features artworks from the eighteenth century to the present day which explore the lure of the ruin and our fascination with what has passed.

Curated in partnership with **Meadow Arts**, the exhibition draws on work by contemporary artists including **Ged Quinn**, **Alex Hartley** and **Mark Fairnington** alongside important artworks from the museum's collection and includes a series of exciting works on loan from Tate.

Ruins have the power to fascinate like few other subjects. They confront the viewer with essential questions about our time on earth; inviting us to reflect on what has passed and to consider what may follow. As a result, ruins place us firmly in an unavoidable and highly defined present that we must confront, and where crucial questions are raised: What must be preserved? What will be lost? What has value?

Although present in art from the 16th century, the motif of the ruin became increasingly popular from the 18th century onwards, thanks to artists who engaged in the Grand Tour, the formative trip to see Italy's classical monuments and landscape. Painters like Richard Wilson, included in the exhibition, indulged in the genre to respond to an insatiable desire for more ruins. In the 19th century the Romantic movement was a huge consumer of ruins and this influenced artists all over Europe and beyond; a real lust for ruins was born and continued well into the 20th century by artists such as John Piper.

The exhibition also explores ruins that sit outside the mould of the traditional classical aesthetic. Ruins can often be remnants of political and social turmoil, surviving debris of intended destruction. Such ruins act as warnings and symbolise the fact that all societies, even the most self-assured, are constantly in danger of collapse. Ruins as a result of natural disasters act as reminder that at any given time all can be lost. The warning is against complacency, overconfidence and vanity. Today artists take up the baton of the ruin to warn and alert our society of the

new dangers ahead such as climate change. Living with ruins reminds us that nothing is fixed but rather that our man made environment is in a permanent state of collapse, building and shifting.

A programme of family activities begins at the Art Gallery & Museum on Saturday 28 September with a *Recycled Ruins* workshop with artist **Mark Riley** making 3D buildings. On from 11am – 1pm the workshop costs £5 per child, to book call the Gallery on 01905 25371.

The popular Museum after Hours returns on Friday 11 October, $5.30-8 \mathrm{pm}$



On Saturday 9 November families can take a tour of *Urban Ruins* in Worcester and enjoy a fun ruins themed activity at the Art Gallery & Museum with artist **Andrew Howe**. 



Mary Quant evening

The swinging sixties comes to Droitwich in October with an event celebrating the life of miniskirt pioneer **Dame Mary Quant**.

Currently the subject of a major exhibition at London's V & A Museum, Mary Quant is known for her sleek, streamlined and vibrant designs that revolutionised womenswear and defined the look of London in the 1960s. Her garments borrowed from men's clothing, took risks and blurred gender lines to create 'unisex' clothing. She is credited with defining the look for a new generation of women who rebelled against pressure to dress like their mothers.

Upton Jazz Festival is in doubt

Dwindling volunteer numbers and rising costs means the future of the festival, which was first staged in 1986, is uncertain.

For 34 years, international jazz stars have flocked to the riverside town of **Upton-upon-Severn** to entertain tens of thousands of music fans over the last weekend in June. It has appeared on ITV's **Good Morning Britain** and Channel 4's **Sunday Brunch**, and, through its Best of Young Jazz programme has supported thousands of young jazz musicians and helped launch successful careers. But now, following the loss of long-time festival stalwart **Paul Lawrence** and the retirement of some committee members, the Council of Management is considering whether or not this year's four-day jazz festival was the last.

"After 34 great years of the Upton Jazz Festival, questions are being asked about its future," said a spokesman for the Council of Management. They are similar questions to those being asked of other UK jazz events, which have enjoyed mixed fortunes in recent years. We are currently weighing up some very positive feedback from the 2019 festival - attendance was up on 2018 and, musically, it was incredibly successful. The Fringe festival, in particular, attracted significant crowds.

"But costs are rising. Setting up marquees and staging and managing the diverse and quirky venues, for which Upton is justifiably renowned, is expensive. We now have to pay people to carry out vital jobs once done by volunteers. And our reserves will not withstand a drop in audience figures, which could easily result from bad weather in 2020. Our Best of Young Jazz team is standing down after 10 brilliant years. And to continue successfully, we need to recruit both a treasurer and a chairman."



In recent years, a lively **Fringe Festival** has sprung up along the riverside, raising money for Worcestershire mental health charity **The Nathan Tomkins Trust**.

And a New Orleans-style parade through the town, gospel-style church service and riverboat shuffles aboard the MV Conway Castle have drawn the crowds.

The Council now believes the future of the festival hangs on three key elements. They are calling on venues in the town to be willing to contribute to band costs; need additional sources of funding including grants and sponsorship and are asking for new faces to come forward to take on key, voluntary Council roles.

"We would love to hear from anyone who is willing to offer support, but we need to hear from them soon," said the spokesman. A final decision about the future and the shape and size of any subsequent festival will be taken in mid-October. The festival has brought so much to Upton over the past 34 years. We hope we may count on the jazz community's continued support."

Dazzle Ball Event Saturday, November 2nd 2019

During the First World War he was in the Royal Naval Reserve but transferred in 1917 to the new **Dazzle Painting** unit which was transforming naval and merchant ships to make it harder for U boats to torpedo them.

Rock And Roll Night Raises £1,500 In Memory of "Gerry From Worcester"

THERE was a 'lot of love in the room' at a fundraising tribute evening for a man who was at the heart of Worcester's Rock and Roll community. Friends and family of **Gerry Richardson** packed out Gilt Edge Club in Kidderminster to remember the man who was well known to all as "**Gerry from Worcester**". The night raised £1,500 for **Primrose Hospice** which supported Gerry and his partner Eve in the last months of his life.

In April 2017, Gerry was diagnosed with Pulmonary Fibrosis. He died in November 2018, aged 76. His partner Eve, from Wire Hill, Redditch, said: "Primrose supported Gerry and myself so well during the last months of his life, neither of us could imagine how we would have coped without them."

Gerry was well known and well-loved in the rock and roll community, having been on the scene since the 1970s. He ran the very popular Rock and Roll Club at Christopher Whitehead School for 12 years up until 2009.

Eve said: "People talk about him as a lovely man and a true gentleman. The dance was his idea and I promised him that I would make it happen. He wanted all of his friends to come together and remember him, to enjoy a really good evening and to raise money for Primrose." She explained the biggest challenge was to make sure everyone who knew Gerry had heard about the dance.

However, word quickly spread and the next challenge was making sure they all could fit in the room. "People came from all over the Midlands," Eve said. "Extra chairs and tables were brought in from other rooms and there was a brief spell when we worried that we would have to turn people away but, just as we reached capacity, no more arrived. It was a phenomenal evening, with a lot of love in the room and the floor was constantly full."

Gerry's favourite band, Mark Keeley's Good Rockin' Tonight performed during the evening and, along with DJ, JD (Just Dec), kept the floor full all evening. Mark delivered a lovely message



from **Colin Paul**, a good friend of Gerry's, who unfortunately could not be there. Eve added: "There was a real buzz in the room - as if someone had sprinkled magic dust. "There were a few tears at the end of the evening, when we formed a huge circle for Colin Paul's American Trilogy – one of Gerry's favourites. "It was immediately followed by The Ovaltineys, which had the opposite effect."

Sarah Harris, community fundraiser at Primrose Hospice, said: "The rock and roll night sounds like it was a wonderful tribute to Gerry. "It is humbling to hear what a difference Primrose Hospice's support makes to a family going through a difficult time. "This support is only possible thanks to the fundraising efforts of our wonderful community."

Primrose Hospice supports people with life-limiting conditions and their families living in north east Worcestershire and offers a range of free services including clinics, benefits advice, therapies and family support. It costs £1.75million annually to run the hospice, of which 85 per cent has to be raised through the local community, trusts and grants.

New Release

Skewwhiff | Cancelled Rearranged

The elephant's gestation period is nearly two years, yes, that's right: two years! For **Skewwhiff** the period between the first album, *Nice Little Upper* and their new album – *Cancelled Rearranged* – is over five years. With such a prolonged handwringing wait, until the band was happy, you know that the album is going to be worthwhile.

While it is worth pointing out that this is my difficult second paragraph, I have no qualms about reviewing a band that I have never listened to before and although my skin is not as thick as a pachyderm's, I relish the challenge of reviewing an album that for some linked to our little magazine, might be emotionally attached to this particular long player...

The emotional focus of the album is as focused as it is encyclopaedic. The title track - Cancelled Rearranged - tackles the, at times, insufficient help offered by mental health provision. A contentious and political issue that has become more prominent as more

of us become accustomed to opening-up and being prepared to articulate just what the mental health issues are faced by us as individuals. The lyrics are damning and the exasperation at the reality of the situation is - "If you disengage with us, we will disengage with you." – one of a sense of being let down and made to feel as if you are in the way. The very words are the distillation of genuine experience that coruscates like a fuse wire throughout the track. Contemporary politics are never far away from this musical think tank.

In these highly-charged political times and let's be honest the political landscape is somewhat skewed, with more than a whiff of desperation in the air (*I see what you did there - Ed*). Research shows that dance music will always become more popular. It is no coincidence that Disco rose to prominence in England in the turbulent 1970s (just look at the charts!) because people knew

how dire life was with a four day week and electricity strikes: why would we want to listen to protest songs narrating the severity of the situation? Sod that, people want to dance and forget. **Skewwhiff** acknowledge and reflect this need in their very contemporary music. The Ska influed tracks (*Picture Perfect*), the punchy rockabilly-esque drum beats (*Hey Mr*), the choppy guitar chords and the notable solos allow for a chance to bop, pogo and skank on the dance floor, even if the intelligent lyrics are asking you to think about so much more...

The band are keen if not desperate to connect with their listeners. So many lyrics contain the pronoun "you" and "your" – second person narrative – thus engaging the listener in the lyrics and the content. We are questioned, accused, invited and threatened throughout: "your silence"... "your perfect picture ... "do you want to play with me?"...this album is both personable and personal.

The highly personal *Doll Parts* is an invitation for others to think about how they attempt to choreograph their partners, into producing an ideal image and not an invite to manipulate "her" into your latest distraction. The

forthright comedienne Jo Brand used to perform a skit where she stated: "she always felt like her boyfriend was acting out a porn movie he had once seen." Ditto.

You will not need the memory of an elephant to remember this album's qualities – the voice, so reminiscent of Miss Echobelly, Sonya Madan and Chrisse Hynde – is the ideal accompaniment to an intelligent, emotional, political and engaging album that is both danceable and, yes, well worth the wait. But don't take my cheap journalistic word for it - cancel your plans and rearrange your diary - and pell mell along to Marr's Bar on the 18th of October for a night with Attila the Stockbroker and of course *Skewwhiff* who are trumpeting the release of their new album on the night, with I am sure a great sense of achievement: only achieved over three years

Peter Richard AdamsThis Is Halloween


Following recent releases like *Oh No... It's Block*, a new **Evilwitch** EP and **Hey You Guys'** *Difficult Second Album*, you might have thought that the prolific **Pete (Adams)** would be running out of steam, but London life seems to have stirred the creative juices, with Adams writing and recording at a steady rate of knots.

"This Is Halloween" is another of those seasonal jingles that Pete seems so fond of ("Bring Me The Head Of The Man Dressed In Red", and "Christmas In Market Towns" come to mind), this time embracing all things macabre and spooky.

Pete plucks out a somewhat sinister guitar melody, before adding slow, brooding percussion while delivering tales of kids dressing up and laughing as "world's collide and the other side breaks through at Halloween". Adams builds toward a climatic vocal hook, imploring the listener to "scream, scream, scream as tonight is Halloween", complimented by an array of atmospheric screams and half-whispered samples for the duration of the five-minute track.

"This Is Halloween" would have been the perfect soundtrack for a Hammer Horror classic and, much like the films of yesteryear, the song creaks and lurks in the shadows, raising a smile or two when you realise it's only a man with a sheet over his head!


Pablo Alto | Amnesia

With a scream of feedback **Pablo Alto** punch themselves back onto the local scene with a force akin to that created at the 'CERN' hadron collider. Their brand new album Amnesia is a post-punk crusade that explores the human psyche. The Ledbury three piece have been around for a good while now, exploring the filth ridden, dust laden, rear end of Garage Punk.

The opening track 'Breathe' crashes in with a sleazy bass line that propels the song forward and immediately takes a sharp edged blade at the current attitudes towards climate change. The track wills us to breathe and lyrically takes no prisoners, pointing the finger of blame straight at the government.

Throughout the album you can hear influences from the likes of Joy Division and The Stooges. These are cleverly sewn through music like Saville Row suit made of noise to create a perfectly cut punk ensemble. 'Warning Signs' has the sort of driving bass that Peter Hook would be proud to have written and 'Fever' furiously drives us towards the end of the album with urgency of a man waiting to clock off on a Friday afternoon.

Listening to the whole album, as it should be, I couldn't help but feel that this could easily be placed on a 'Peaky Blinders' soundtrack, nestling in amongst the likes of Nick Cave and PJ Harvey, maybe that's just lazy journalism or maybe its just that good. The atmosphere created by the album is both foreboding and engaging with an unmistakable undercurrent of chaotic



drama. As the story unfolds you are drawn in to the melancholy guitar and pulsing rhythm section. This new release is a good find and I encourage you to seek out a Pablo Alto gig and give them the attention they deserve.

Capitol Slus | Douzy

Septet band **Capitol Slush** are here with their debut EP "Douzy". Comprising of past and present students at Kidderminster College,

they're giving jazz fusion a whole new face. Freshly faced and coated with pure musicianship, this band are one to watch out for because they're doing something different. Not falling into the 'indie rock' category, they're bringing funk back and with the dual female fronted singers, **Capitol Slush** are simply unique and that's exactly what the music scene needs.

Starting off with a James Brown like groove, the fast paced verses in 'Bounce Back' are ones to make you get on your feet from the get go and boogie on down. Boat To Row | Rivers That Flow In Circles

The second album by Brummy-based pastoral folk band **Boat To Row** has had something of a laboured birth. The group originally attempted to self-finance the release of Rivers That Flow In Circles via a Pledge Music campaign but, like many other acts, saw money invested by their fans disappear overnight following the collapse of Pledge. Thankfully, local label Static

Caravan came to the band's aid, helping to fulfil their commitment to pledgers and release the album into the wider world.

Since their debut album I Found You Here, Boat To Row's line-up and sound has morphed and expanded around songwriter and chief frontman Michael King, alongside regular cohorts Benjamin Gilchrist (guitar), Anna Bennett (violin), Dan Cippico (keys) and Lydia Glanville (drums). The band are further augmented by the vocals of acclaimed singer-songwriter Katherine Priddy, as well as additions of flute, trumpet, clarinet and viola to create an expansive, intoxicating sound, melding jazz and 60's inspired prog into an evocative mix.

"Moth To Light" opens the album, a two and a half minute track that twists and turns, driving 60's styled percussion to searching violin and delicate, plucked guitar, bewitching listeners with its multi-faceted textures. "On Your Own" has an almost upbeat,

summery vibe, mixing hazy psychedelic folk, jazzy percussion and bright bursts of horn (French and Trumpet), as Priddy wraps cooed harmonies around King's already welcoming lead.

Flights of vibrant flute infiltrate the progressive folk tones of "Stranger Of Mine", while Bennett's violin soars, weaving between acoustic and electric guitar. King's compelling lyrics pull at the heart strings, as he purrs out such couplets as "I never did

understand just why, you had to leave like a thief in the night."

As the album unfurls, Boat To Row only enchant us further. The five and a half minute "Lift Your Head", with its shuffling, brushed drums and near classical strings, is followed by an equally beguiling "Forest Flaws"; haunting pedal steel, rising strings and inventive stick-work holds the listener within its mesmeric peaks. Then there's "Fledgling", a four-part, ten-minute. psychedelic relationship suite. It's an epic that dazzles with originality; King navigates the highs and lows of a relationship, summiting the stunning heights of instrumentation.

Rivers That Flow In Circles is an

aptly-named, intoxicating disc; it ripples and flows, full of clever, deft textures, subtle meandering hooks and winding instrumental turns, guiding the listener on a beautiful, hazy folk trip, revealing more with every (well-deserved) return.



The Opposite Of Ast

Evilwitch | The Opposite Of Art

Perusing through the many band applications for this year's Worcester Music Festival, I happened upon something of a blast

Evil Witch

from the past. A local name that had seemingly been resigned to the annuals of history; seven passed vears had since melodramatic indie gog purveyors Evilwitch had last shared a stage. But there, down in black and white and leaping from the screen, that once familiar moniker. Scrambling to the band's previously dormant facebook page, it was confirmed Evilwitch were back, and not only for WMF, but armed with a brand-new EP, The Opposite Of Art.

For local music fans, any project involving Pete Adams is worth

celebrating, but one involving former regular right-hand, Chris Wemyss, back behind the kit, and accompanied by Rich Owens on bass and James Perry on keys, now this is a reason to party! You see, back around 2010-12 you'd find me hanging round the likes of The Marrs Bar, scribbling notes (no change there!) or promoting, whilst hollering back the likes of Oh My God! and Stare At The Sun, with scores of like-minded, indie-pop loving weirdos, united by the infectious, punky riffs, adrenaline-fuelled rhythm and massive choral hooks that the band became renowned for.

Opening with a somewhat ominous hum and a rumble of drums. "Not A Plane In The Sky" kicks off proceedings; a subtle vocal and

murmur of bass soon join the mix as the track begins to build. Buzzing guitar and Perry's keys provide the melody, as Wemyss continues to assault his kit, leading to a chanted refrain and a wordless vocal hook as Evilwitch explode back into life with a typically thrilling burst of dramatic indie rock.

> "Ship Went Down" builds in much the same way; a melodic, restrained vocal, crashing drums over rumbling bass and a threat of guitar welling up in a sudden surge of power, propelling the track to high velocity. Urgent call and response vocals and frenzied, instrumental abuse as the 'Witches show they've not lost a step during their absence. "Rose McCain" is akin to aural heroin, with its elastic bass and delicious, mantra-like chorus, it's nigh impossible not to get caught up by the addictive buzz. You might even find yourself chanting the insatiable refrain; "I want you to comprehend that, you are nothing special and you are

> doomed to fail." "Choke" has everything you could possibly

want from an Evilwitch song; a big, brash opening, bubbling bass, inventive and busy stickwork, punchy harmonies, omni-present keyboard melodies and an anxious sounding Adams, delivering another essential lead. Evilwitch prove that even before the final polish, their songs have that edge and thrill factor that we've become accustomed to, as they round off the six-track affair with demo versions of both "Not A Plane" and "Ship Went Down", both of which are more than worthy of inclusion on the EP. After a long hiatus, Evilwitch are back with a bang, a hook, and a damn fine EP. Let's hope we don't have to wait another seven years for the next sighting of the 'Witch! Will Munn

Stiff Joints + Counting Coins Iron Road, Bar 57, Pershore | 7th Sept

Jamaican folk music has changed a great deal over the decades, thanks, in no small part, to the Specials, Madness, Bad Manners and bands of that ilk. Imagine Ska mixed with contemporary issues or upside down R & B infused with modern humour or Punky reggae blended with nonsense and you are somewhere close to the bands filling the stage - and I mean filling the stage! - that evening.

The aged and questioning beer sipper in a trilby next to me exclaimed to no one in particular: "...that the bands hadn't dressed up." For these lads, it was, cliché aside, all about the music...and having a bloody good time, with no time for fashion statements. Far from being fashionable, it would also be easy to dismiss Ska music as just being easy to dance to: simply lift one foot then the other. Unfair.

Fair play to **Counting Coins**, who gamely brought their own energetic brand of Ska from Hull and with a greater emphasis on the 2nd and 4th beat, **T' Coins** set about determining their own currency with a confident swagger and a trumpet that filled the air with a clarion call to the loitering skankers.

Pauline Black of the Selecter quoted on numerous occasions that the Ska revival bands of Two Tone all had one or two more members than was strictly necessary. As Stiff Joints, a local band with nothing to prove, hijacked the stage, I ran out of fingers as 11 (eleven) disciples crowded around the microphones. The calamitous spectacle was one of a box of frogs being electrocuted. The mayhem and chaos that ensued was irresistible...



Mayhem and chaos on the stage gave way to chaos and mayhem on the dance floor "Hup, hup, hup!" ANY band that can fill a dance floor by their second track has my respect and both bands achieved this Beer was spilt. The air was punched. Unique covers were offered up, and even a tribute to taking a dump as the chaotic mayhem erupted on the dance floor in the form of lager sweat involuntary grins and athletic rhythmic akimbo "Hup, hup, hup!" Lifting one foot then the other with a number of variations on offer as the respective bands pummelled, prodded and provoked the attendant believers who came in their numbers. Naked torsos. Broken glasses. Time and time again the horn section would draw the crowd in to a frenzy of wanton forgetfulness of work responsibility and the boring humdrum of reality "Hup, hup,hup!" With the aid of a sound man who must have had to rely on years of experience and training to channel this chaotic musical mayhem. It would have been bad manners on this special night of madness to not have celebrated two bands that came to party and did just that. What a night, punctuated with Ska, beer, dancing and all out fun -no matter what the cost.

The Len Price 3 + The Humdrum Express Marr's Bar | 6th September

The main act is a garage band. Not a garish plastic fronted garage that sells cheese flavoured corn snacks and microwaveable meals but a garage that with sagging door hinges, displays a very unPC- calendar ("...check out Miss July!"), and employs a mechanic called Len that knows how to strip down a Lambretta engine, in under an hour, and can tell how well a two stroke engine is running just by looking at the spark-plug alone. This garage band is a secret, back-street, kind of a garage band...ladies and gentlemen I present the The Len Price 3!

As far as memorable introductions go, the expletive ridden intro from Weller's Father at every Jam gig must be a contender and Lemmy pointing to a huge model of a Lancaster Bomber hanging over the Motorhead stage, on the first night of their German Bomber tour and proclaiming: "I bet you haven't seen one of those in a few years?" - must be up there? Contemporarily, the lead singer of TLP3, explaining that they were "Not bothering with the safety instructions and were just going to take-off" -must be one for the archive. And take-off they did...

It would be too easy to pepper my review with an army of adjectives, verbs and nouns marching across the page - energy, adrenaline, frantic, blistering, power pop – but the Medway 3 deserve more, so much more. The Catherine wheel of chords, the rampant Merlin engine of drums and the brooding distant thunder of bass notes is a live set that you must witness first hand.

of bass notes is a live set that you must witness first hand.

The proffered songs are witty, personal, caustic – poking insults at other acts and singing about joyous Saturday morning cinema clubs for starters - and catchy like an unexpected, flirtatious, backward glance, but at times this is not enough: as the night proved.

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Adorned in their uniform Paisley shirts, suggesting a collective sense of intention the band worked the room; the passive beer drinkers' sat on the dancefloor edge were content to engage in a voyeuristic trance, the performing band were far from content with this arrangement. With the guitarist, **Glenn Page**, descending on to the floor and prowling defiantly he worked the room like a seasoned street-seller. The pay-off was a buoyant crowd that the trio had earned, deserved and yes, had worked bloody hard for!

It must be a challenge supporting **The Len Price 3** but the faintly oxymoronic **Humdrum Express** made the opening-slot their own and were a genuine support act, even this final paragraph is supporting the review. The Humdrumers have been compared to "Billy Bragg meets Half Man Half Biscuit", lazy journalism I know but I can't do better than that. However, I will allow Ian Passey the final word, or outro if you will, before exiting the stage for the headliners he graciously proclaimed: "The Len Price 3 are the best live band in the country!" - you can't get more supportive than that. And as for his wry observations this must be one of his more illuminating moments; even more illuminating than an SX Lambretta with a 12v conversion.

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Hardwicke Circus The Prince Of Wales, Ledbury

I can't recall ever receiving an email from Russ, at Ledury's POW before, but this gig was a change of program, they conjured up the energetic and rapidly rising **Hardwicke Circus** to play their Sunday evening slot. The band had been touring all over the South, playing anywhere and everywhere, and would eventually head home to Carlisle. There's a buzz about the band, a confidence, a band that was going places, check out their website, its impressive for such a 'young' band. They are guided by **Dave Robinson**, cofounder of **Stiff Records**, and in his day, road manager for Hendrix, it's hard to believe you could have a better man behind you, 'If It Ain't Stiff....It Ain't Worth A F***'



Tihey take a couple of songs to settle into their positions, tight as they were with literally 'Nowhere Left To Run'. Jonny has that warm thick voice, formed in Cumbria, bit like woolly Southerners with a cold! Jack is like a caged tiger, he wants to move with those

guitars, but there's nowhere to go. Andy a statue, breathing into his silver sax while Ben is bolted down. The only activity is Tom bouncing around at his drums and Lewis whose all over those keys, sliders and knobs, the busiest hands in the band? The band are firing on all 6 cylinders, and its sounds pretty bloody good, as they dabble with the devil, 'Way Down In The Hole', Tom Waits, fully wired.

Jonny has the wiry look and swagger of a young Jagger, don't know about the moves with no space, but there's a nice touch of humour in his tales of the road. Most of their songs are theirs, taken from a couple of EP's, with the inevitable 'borrowed' and remoulded worthies to add to the mix. We're all chorusing to, 'Addicted to Your Love', the sound in this tiny pub is amazing.

A lovely funk rhythm fires up for the 'Ballad Of Skinny Hull', a legendary character, you don't want to cross. They close out the first set on a cracking pop'rocking, 'Woman'.

Hardwicke Circus are soon somersaulting through a second set, we all lift a glass for 'In Vino Veritas'. It bubbles like champagne under Lewis's fingers, before pouring into an anthem on the rocks, 'Walda', rocks you like a Glaswegian kiss. They wind the clock back to '78, riding the Jags for 'Back of My Hand', before we're all pulled into chorusing, 'Hands Up', hands up, don't shoot, brilliant.

You can't help but feel the band are standing on the precipice of the big stage, they have real presence, an easy manner, humour, and above all else, some bloody good music. For the first time in my memory, there was a collective decision to 'do' a third set Well it would have been a real challenge to pack everything together and get loaded into thier ex-riot van.

I hope to have the opportunity to see this band again soon. Here is a final thought, they sometimes have a trombonist to add, he's on the EP, a dangerous weapon in such a tight space as tonight, could have had your eye out!













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Review

Sketches from the Worcester Music Festival

As decisions go, heading for Annie's Burger Shack and staving there on the Friday night was probably the best one I made all weekend.

After a faltering start to my Festival, I stopped chasing gigs and settled down at this exciting new venue and purveyor of top nosh. But three two-piece female fronted outfits billed in a row - what could possibly go wrong?

Shack backed his judgment, and my goodness, did we all benefit from the chance he took...



Liars at the Witch Trial are from Brum and they're in the very early stages of a career that on this splendid showing should rapidly go from strength to strength. A crisp, modern sound with blues and garage influences, the set was based around their EP, "Stormy Seas" (Bandcamp only, unfortunately or else they'd have cleaned up on the merch front) released earlier this year. I'll be seeing this band again, hopefully often...

Leisure Tank are an Anglo-German outfit now based in London - this is bright, raw, energetic stuff with much skilful use of looping to add to Katarina Cenker's tremendous voice and Budi's complex and inventive drumming. The bulk of the set was taken from their debut album "Wetsuit", which consolidated three previously online only singles with a raft of new material and at a fiver a pop will probably be my bargain of the year. Brilliant.



This was my fourth view of The Other Dramas from Oxford and probably their most complete performance I've seen. They're garage pop writ large, a wonderfully cohesive and thoroughly hard rocking unit, superbly blending Maria Ilett's brisk, choppy guitar style and abrasive vocal attack with Richie Wildsmith's pinpoint



Absolutely nothing, as the booker tonight at Annie's Burger drumming and excellent backing vocals. The evident joy with which they deliver the songs is wonderful to see. Recent single 'The Future is a Holiday' probably shaded it for best track of the set but the consistency and strength of the material is just one of this band's many great assets. Wonderful to see them again!



Now despite headliners, Skewwhiff being my editor at SLAP, Mark Hogan's band, this is the first time I've ever seen a full set by them - dancing broke out right from the first few bars with Connor Turner from Annie's at the head of the melée and the pace was maintained throughout in front of a packed audience.

They play a hugely lively mix of punk and indie, with a side helping of ska and have managed the difficult feat of incorporating political and social themes into the music, without disturbing either the beat or the message. Impressive.

They've got a new album arriving very shortly, a follow up to their debut "Nice Little Upper" and the set was a great balance of the old and the new. My favourites? 'Bittertaste' (and probably always will be...) 'It's Obvious', at its abrasive best and a new song '1942'. Brilliant end to a great night at this excellent venue.

The booker for this great feast of sound turns out to be none other than WMF and SLAP's own Anthony Robbins and as a contributor to SLAP, I can't really describe the feeling of confidence it gives me to be working with a management team so steeped in music.

It's so hot on the Saturday morning that I have to trot back to my B&B to change into my shorts after sitting alfresco at the Worcester Arts Workshop for my first gig of the day. Having missed Hannah Law playing solo on Friday, I'm very happy to catch her with her band, Tree of Wyrd. I'm no stranger to Hannah's music but this is an astonishing departure, about as far away







from her ukulele-playing solo persona as it's possible to get. It's a pulsating set, with a strong alt rock base with distinct psych elements and an opportunity to explore the full power and potential of her wonderful voice. And the guitarist seriously shreds...and plays viola!

A set full of strong original material, but their cover of Alanis Morrissette's 'You Oughta Know' could have stripped paint at a hundred paces. Exhilarating stuff!

We've come to expect the unexpected from Stourport singer/songwriter **Chloe Mogg** but this was pretty special, as she delivers a set of immense power, creativity and beauty on the main outdoor stage. She's the very antithesis of so many talented but 'safe' solo artists – the music veers off at curious angles, her voice leaps and plummets, the lyrics and subject matter are often oblique and other-worldly, the sparing and sudden use of chorus and reverb has the capacity to make you jump – the whole performance leaves you speechless. She closes with a relatively new song, *The Only One'* which brings all these elements together and which may be on her debut album to be released early next year. If there's any justice, this will be the point at which she'll get the wider recognition that her unique approach to music and prodigious talent deserves.

Ajay Srivastav's blues chart topping debut album "Karmic Blues" - reviewed in SLAP 92 - is undoubtedly one of the releases of the year so far. Part Indian folk music, part delta blues woven together to produce a unique sound, beautifully reproduced on the outdoor stage at **The Lamb and Flag** in front of a packed and





attentive audience. The combination of Srivastav's resonator guitar, with it's distinctive hiss and tabla player **Vinod Kerai's** hypnotic beats, thunder from the left hand and a whip crack from the right, produces an intensely calming atmosphere. And with the lyrics' examination of self-awareness and our reaction to the surrounding environment, the whole performance becomes like floating in a spiritual immersion tank. Very special indeed.

This is a festival of contrasts and none could be more startling as I head to **The Firefly** to watch metalcore masters, **Skora**. Since the wonderful **Nycosia** are taking a break, this band represents pretty much the heaviest music I listen to - but through the wave of noise come the subtleties and excellent musicianship that makes this band stand out - the insistent, driving beat counterpointed by complex riffs, lightning

fast soloing and more extended fluent legato passages from the twin guitarists, **Dom Jones** and **Will Broome**. They've completed one EP, "God in Absence", from which tonight's standout track 'Chimaera' comes and there's another nearing completion. If you can stand the aural assault, this band's as good as any I've seen in its field.

There's been a hiatus of several months in the music of Worcester's **Nuns of the Tundra** but my goodness, it was a triumphant return at **St. Swithun's Institute**. The place was packed in anticipation, and the band duly delivered. Oh, this band has riffs, and it has movement, and it has constant audience engagement - and it now has **Harriet Wadeson**, perfectly balancing being a bass Nun with being a bass witch in **Häxan**. **After Jim Smith's** departure for **The Roving Crows** (well done, Jim!) it needed a solid signing to continue the band's forward progress and that's just what they've got. There's not enough space to document the many highlights of this performance, but the mass display of mobile phone torches and dynamic frontman, **Troy Tittley's** vigorous excursion into the audience, costing him a radio jack and a string in the process simply served to ramp up the excitement. Great end to day two.

Sunday was supposed to have been my day of quiet contemplation in the sunshine after a packed Saturday, but The VHT's didn't get the memo... This splendid and jaw-droppingly young band have been one of my discoveries of the year - part rock 'n roll, part garage, part rockabilly and part post punk. They're a thoroughly modern outfit but with one foot firmly and respectfully planted in the past and Jasmine Randall has one of the most distinctive voices I've heard in a long time, a gravelly rasp which both startles and amazes. Wonderful...






I get a text from a friend, John Weller, a great supporter and documenter of live music in Birmingham he'd just seen a set by a brand new band, The Blue Javs and they're playing again shortly he thinks I might like them. He's right. I arrive at St. Swithun's just in time to catch a little gem of a set from Bethany Roberts, who despite being a tad manages nervous, among a string of self-penned songs to pull off the best solo

interpretation of The Cranberries' 'Zombie' that I've ever heard. Keep an eye out for her!

The Blue Jays are simply wonderful. This turns out to be only their second performance, the first having been in the morning! Simple, uncluttered arrangements and glorious harmonies, which recall early material by Lily and Madeleine and latterly, Wednesday's Wolves are both easy on the ear, while avoiding drifting into dullness - not an easy balance to achieve. I'll be seeing more of them. Both these acts have a connection with Brian Hoggard of the Bromsgrove Rock School, whose students have performed with such distinction before at WMF.



Stopping for a pint and a sit down in The Alma (nice pub...) I realise I'm really flagging after three days as I walk just over the eagerly anticipated events of the weekend. Since the wonderful



Chambers called it a day (drummer Eleanor Cara Churchill's new band, China Moon played WMF on the Friday) former guitarist Aeris Houlihan has continued to explore the more Gothic and dark side of life with her new project. There is a brief acoustic prelude, the calm before the storm, then she and her tremendously hard working drummer launch themselves into what proves to be a most intense and visceral set, an unholy amalgam of industrial rock, grunge and doom. The material is drawn primarily from her album "Queen of Insecurity", but to my great delight there's a couple of old Chambers numbers thrown into the mix. The song that defines the set for me though is the new single 'When You Fuck Me', a profoundly dystopian view of the destructive power of sex that sits right up there with Marianne Faithfull's, 'Why D'Ya Do It?' A scarily brilliant performance and everything I'd hoped for.

Clashes. clashes everywhere... I've already missed performances by the excellent Ecco Gecco, nth cave, Abi K. White Noise Cinema and Ria Plays and goodness knows how many others this weekend and I end up missing almost all of Tyler Massey's set of muscular Americana at St. Swithun's - he's put a marvellous band together and the two songs I do get to hear leave me wanting to see him play again at the earliest opportunity.

Just one more to see.

There was a spectacular finale to my weekend with a truly breathtaking performance by **Will Lawton** on piano and vocals. Weasel Howlett on percussion and Benny Fonzarelli on a very hi-tech double bass.

Drawn from their debut album "Fossils of the Mind", the set was melodic, inventive and satisfyingly lengthy - based loosely around a jazz framework with Lawton's sparkling piano work to the fore but incorporating ambient, psych and spoken word elements, it was one of those magical performances that you never wanted to end - we did our best, but after two encores, time finally ran out on us.

Hipflask Virgins @ Paradiddles, Friday

Following up their recent release of killer single "Unintentional", local duo Hipflask Virgins headlined the same venue in which they filmed the video to the aforementioned track. Filling the Paradiddles gig room until there was no space to move - let alone headbang - the duo tore through a spectacular set of what was described by the band themselves as "approximately rock". Comprised of guitarist/vocalist Jay Kimber Lawson-Pearce and drummer Will Diment, the pair balanced louche desert-rock grooves with raw, grungy chaos, performed with all the style and presence necessary to end the first night of Worcester Music Festival with a bans.



Raptor @ Annie's Burger Shack, Saturday

Made up of brothers **Kurt** and **Adam Fletcher** and bassist **Nick Osborne**, Bristolian trio **Raptor** appeared onstage looking like a rock 'n' roll version of the Three Musketeers. Their sound was similarly skilful and flamboyant, evoking the off-kilter, classic-rock-meets-psychedelic heavy riffage of bands like Pond and King Gizzard and the Lizard Wizard. With effortless charm, Raptor packed out Annies' gig room and got the crowd moving on the second day of Worcester Music Festival. With groovy-yet-anthenic garage-rock tracks like "Dynamite (is Freedom!)" and "Escapism", these guys displayed impressive musical chops, infectious energy, and a knack for a good hook. Based on this performance, the future looks bright for **Raptor**.



The Jericho Racks @ Paradiddles, Saturday

Headlining the Saturday at **Paradiddles** were Worcester's own The Jericho Racks, made up of vocalist/guitarist **Jack Monopoli**, drummer Rich **Chaudhury**, and bassist **Jack Biltcliffe**. **The Jericho Racks'** brand of fuzzed-up, speedy blues riffs got the room moshing and the sweat dripping down the walls as all

scuzzy rock bands should. Tight as a top E string and unrestrained as a tiger off the leash, the boys smashed their way through songs like "Ten Tentacles", "Easy to Be Afraid", and "Kill Billy Elliot", before ending in a now-traditional crowd-surf. If you like your blues heavy, this is the band for you.

Tyler Massey Quartet @ St Swithin's Institute, Sunday

The **Tyler Massey Trio** are true Worcester Music Festival veterans, building up a loyal local fanbase over the last couple of years with their smart, anthemic folk-rock. Performing in the hallowed hall of **St Swithin's Institute**, and joined this time by violinist **Tilly Chester** to make up a quartet, the band played a blinding set of old favourites from well-known singalongs "Whipping Boy" and "The Devil You Know" to newer, more orchestrally-inspired compositions like "I Was Wrong" and "Waltz for Lily". As ever, Tyler's voice and guitar were clear and strong, he rhythm section of **Alex Knight** and **Eric Hej** was tight and accomplished, and Tilly's violin added an incredible new dimension to the band's established sound.



HEY YOU GUYS! @ The Marr's Bar. Sunday

By the end of the Sunday, many of us were starting to flag after three days of dancing and headbanging in sweaty rooms with beer-sticky floors. Worcester four-piece "popular beat combo" **HEY YOU GUYS!** showed no signs of tiring, and brought a shot of energy back to the room in **The Marrs Bar**. Hot off the heels of the release of their *Difficult Second Album* (which is actually the name of the album), the band brought charismatic stage presence, crowd interaction (tracks like "Record Deal" had the room chanting the chorus), and a bunch of well-written, melodic rock songs with personality and humour.

Ruf Records Blues Caravan The Iron Road, Pershore | Friday 13th Sept

Another year, another summer, and another caravan on the road. tThis touring caravan is one that's welcomed with open arms. Three artists each with their own album to present, backed up by a great rhythm section have toured Europe before a series of dates around the UK. If ever there was a good example of cross European collaboration, this is it. The cast is of course international: From the US, Texas 'gunslinger', Ally Venable,; from Helsinki, feisty Finn Ina Forsman; and from Serbia, purring pianist Katarina Pejak. The rhythm boys are Elijah Owings, another Texan, and our own Roger Innis on bass, a man needing little introduction on these shores.



All three Ruf starlets have released albums this year, Ina released Been Meaning To Tell You, Katarina, Roads That Cross and Ally tempted us with Texas Honey. So no shortage of material for the show. Ally joined Elijah and Roger as guitarist for the evening, and Katarina dipped in to all the sets with her keyboards. Ina's instrument is her voice, a weapon of mass destruction. Ally's guitar dances over the pulsating rhythm to get the caravan rolling. Ina leads the way with 'They Say I'm Different', a guarantee to sign up for the caravan club. It pops and fizzles as the girls take turns to slot in their blues influences, from Elmore James all the way through to Betty Davis, totally riveting attention.

Ally is staying on stage throughout, scything her way through on guitar. KKatarina takes vocal lead and introduces Roger to a loud cheer, she climbs aboard with her lovely piano for 'She's Coming After You' - a sultry song that has a delicious tango rhythm, reminiscent of some of Caro Emrald's sweepings from the cutting floor, purred out by Pejak. She delivers the sassy Joplin 'Turtle Blues', and gives it a hip swaying swagger, caressing her keys with slender fingers. Ally adds sweet honeyed guitar, a tasty combination. Katarina has the style of the soulful blues singers, the likes of Billie, Dinah and Nina. Her voice closes around you like a warm fleece. A rocking 'Chasing Summer' changes the tempo, time to dance before the floor is ceded to Ally.

Ally I'd seen a year back at 19 years old, joining Mike Zito and Bernard Allison on stage in the 'Big Apple'. I have to say, I'm blown away by how far she has come in that time. For me, her voice has found a rounder, richer, timbre, maybe more confidence, and her guitar seems to have extra bite, maybe its just me? She fires off with a fiery 'Texas Honey', a hard rockin' blues, Texas style.

Ally moves deeper into her set and changes to her Telecaster, and a fat slide sits across the neck, ready to get down and dirty for



the 'Devils Daughter', she's ready to "pack her things and go". But before she surrenders the vox to Ina, Ally produces a mesmerising Stevie Ray, 'Lenny', just pure guitar heaven.

Ina has terrific stage presence, tightly swept back hair, smart jacket, culottes and wild spangly boots giving her the appearance of a pretty but severe business secretary. She delivers a jazz edged 'Why You Gotta Be That Way' in an Winehouse like style with Roger adding funked out bass with Katarina on piano. 'All Good' follows with laid back, sumptuous, jazzy blues. A frothy 'Genius' fills the floor with avant garde dancing as Ally bubbles up through the surface.




The Blues Caravan chicks take over with Bonnie Raitts 'Love Me Like A Man', as they swap vocal leads about, harmonising the chorus lines. A harmonic acapella opens into 'Sixteen Tons' bbefore they up the tempo. The girls finally sign out on a stonking 'The House Is A Rockin', and truly it was, before putting the cork back on the triple barrelled 2019 vintage Blues Caravan, and a dazzling evening at The Iron Road.

The Caravan has now departed back into Europe with dates in many countries, we are left with pondering on who will be aboard for 2020.

Glovebox Presents... **Over The Hill** Cogges Farm, Witney | 26th Sept

As ever, the summer months bring the nation alive to the sound of music, with the ever-growing popularity of festivals, it seems like every field is given over to merry makers for the long weekend of May – August. We may have seen a number of events sadly drop off the yearly line-up, but you don't have to look far to find a replacement.

Of course, with such a deluge of festivals it becomes a little harder to choose which to attend. When Oxford based promoters **Glovebox** announced **Over The Hill**, my attention immediately piqued, having been regularly seduced by their curated stages at the likes of Wychwood, as well as nights over in Witney and Oxford. By August Bank Holiday, Over The Hill had sold out, following their announcement of a who's who of UK Americana, topped by personal favourites, **Danny & The Champions Of The World** for their only UK gig of the year. 400 likeminded souls descended on the beautiful **Cogges Farm**, its Tithe Barn stages set for a sun-drenched day of music.

Continuing the Americana theme, the two stages (only metres apart) were aptly named Austin Nashville, and it was the former that saw local country hero Ags Connolly kick off proceedings with a set of honky-tonk ballads that could have been beamed directly from a Texan bar. Plucking out a mix of old favourites, and taking the opportunity to road test his soon-to-bereleased third album, Ags' warm baritone and acoustic strum held the early birds,



enrapt by the likes of "The Meaning Of The Word", "Wrong Again" and "Haunts Like This". Connolly finished off with a knowing grin and the infectious, "I Hope You're Unhappy", to the audience's delight.

After a quick detour to the bar, it was time to head next door for the inaugural act of the larger **Nashville stage** for **The Niall Kelly Band**. After the stripped back, purist set by Ags, it was exhilarating to watch as Niall and his cohorts mixed and matched blues, rock 'n' roll, folk and of course Americana. Lashings of funky Nord keys, a driving rhythm section, twin electrics and roving violin united for a rollicking "Burned By A Little Love", whilst the proceeding title track of Kelly's latest album, *Promenade*, proved the band equally adept at the stripped-back, gorgeous, rootsy slice of contagious, Celtic-tinged Americana. Kelly and his band continued to engage throughout their well-received and diverse set, filled with instant hooks, searching solo spots and well-mannered, tongue in cheek banter.

A hushed barn welcomed **Sian Chandler** and **Ray Hughes**, otherwise known as **The Black Feathers**, to the Austin Stage. Sharing one mic, the duo proceeded to deliver a mesmeric set of intimate folk laments and acoustic, bluesy southern rock. The attentive audience gathered in close, as delicate strums and intertwining vocals swooped and soared between husband and wife, delivering a beautiful "Down By The River", followed by the equally beguiling "Holy Water" and "Ghosts Have Eaten Well". An

unexpected and stirring rendition of Portishead's "Glory Box" comes before the hook-laden twang of the newly released "3 Stars (And A Country Song)", bringing the curtain down on yet another memorable performance by the ever impressive 'Black Feathers.

Within the opening bars of William The Conqueror's set, it became apparent why the trio have become firm Glovebox favourites. Fronted by acclaimed singer-songwriter Ruarri Joseph, the trio use blues and Americana as their base point, stirring in a hefty dollop of indie and even grunge, to create a compelling sound that hints at such unlikely bedfellows as The Lemonheads. Springsteen and The Doors. Cranking up the guitar, the opening "Madness On The Line" delivers a bolt of electricity



through the audience, inspiring the collective to kick out any lingering inhibitions. Joseph pawed at his guitar knowingly, dispatching gravelly words of wisdom as the rhythm section of Naomi Holmes and Harry Harding (bass and drums) pound and coo in unison. The likes of the addictive indie rock of "Path Of The Crow", the half spoken, half drawled "Bleeding On The Soundtrack" and the stripped back roots of "The Burden" further seduced the audience, so much so that the band were encouraged to deliver the first encore of the day!

Rutland troubadour **Paul McClure** was next to tread Austin's boards, with Clubhouse Records alumni the **Tipping brothers** (**Danny and Tristan**) for company. Opening with "Market Town", Mclure settled into a stripped back set of folky laments that once again left the barn hushed and attentive, lapping up Paul's typically witty onstage patter between songs. McClure left a little "Ray Of Sunshine", encouraging an infectious sing-a-long before exiting with an equally enticing, "This Must Be What They Mean (When They Sing About The Blues)".

From Rutland, we head to the Appalachian Mountains for **Naomi Bedford**, **Paul Simmonds** and **The Ramshackle Band**, who deliver an inspired set of country and folk ballads. Opening with "Hangman" (or "Gallows Pole", in the hands of Led Zeppelin), husband and wife duo Bedford and Simmonds traded vocals across a fascinating set of ballads, such as the traditional "Rich

Irish Lady", "In Pines" and "Hands On The Plough", with their own "Ramshackle House" sitting comfortably between tales of yesteryear.

Whether a full on electric band (Niall Kelly, William The Conqueror), or the stripped-back acoustic of The Black Feathers,



the audience remained enamoured, responding accordingly and filling out the twin stages. The final Austin band, duo **Trevor Moss** and Hannah Lou, shared a mic to trade lines, delivering a gorgeous set of lowkey laments. Both "We Should Have Gone Dancing" and "Fair Lady London" proved early highlights as the duo exchange words, wrapped in a bed of delicately plucked guitar.

After a short delay, Danny & The Champions Of The World

took the Nashville stage, rounding off proceedings. An extended run through "The Colonel And The King", the band quickly shook off any thoughts of ring rust, as lap steel, saxophone, keys and guitar helped lav foundations. The Champs wowed the crowd with something of a favourites set, from "This Is Not A Love Story" to "Stay True, Leave It All Behind", the band stretched out. taking their cues to deliver impassioned solos, led by a smiling Wilson. appearance of compare Glovebox cohort



Adrian Phillips signalled the audience to lift their voices to the heavens, as the Champs returned for a run at "Over The Hill", before sending us out into the night.

The first (and hopefully now annual) **Over The Hill Festival** was a resounding success on every level, meticulously organised so you could see every minute of every band, if you should choose (and I did), the sell-out audience were all there for the music, helping to enhance the experience. The idyllic setting couldn't have been better and as for the programming, well with **Glovebox** it's satisfaction guaranteed.

Review

Press Club Annie's Burger Shack | Sept 3rd

Strewth! Bloody oath! Ripper! What a night! This Aussie quartet who play a mixture of punk/post-punk with a slight metal/rock tinge at times hail from Melbourne and formed in 2016, although all had performed in various local bands previously.

Holed up for 10 hours a day for weeks on end, their first release "Late Teens" is a delight and did not go unnoticed locally and on the back of their small European tour earlier this year, a return to these shores was always on the cards. Selling out on a Tuesday night at Annie's Burger Shack is no mean feat but with performances at both Reading and Leeds festivals under their belt this may have generated some welcome interest. Way to go Worcester! Great support from Watch Commander and The Earnest Spears, both impressive and very entertaining and they more than turned it on. The crowd were eager with anticipation for the star attraction and you could literally feel it. From the Mohican haired punk, Goth girls, young lads, all wearing Press Club T's with excitement etched on their youthful faces and a varied mixed-age audience we waited with bated breath.

Let the onslaught begin. Natalie Foster, the powerhouse vocalist moves slowly towards the front of the stage and gingerly almost seductively removes the band from her ponytail, a blonde mass cascades down her shoulders and then steely-eyed, focused and looking into the faces before her, some just inches away, she's transformed into some sort of punk goddess when the first bars of Separate Houses kick-off. This first track from their recent release "Wasted Energy" does not disappoint. The band are so tight it's simply joyous. The amazing talents of guitarist Greg Rietwyk who plays effortlessly, bassist Iain Macrae so in synch, and drummer extraordinaire Frank Lees just blend beautifully



together that you feel it's just one glorious instrument. You could instantly feel that this was going to be special and something you don't get to be part of every day.

The set was fast and furious at times, excuse the pun, but also slowed down for tracks Suburbia, a personal favourite from "Late Teens" and "Thinking About You" from "Wasted Energy". Playing a blistering set covering 8 tracks from the new release and 6 from their debut, the 90 minutes or so flew by. Highlights were the aforementioned young lads who went crazy, jumping around, slam dancing and creating their own little mosh pit and Natalie's stage presence was something extra special. She had everyone eating out of the palm of her hand right from the start. When she said jump, we jumped in unison and it instantly took me back to my youth of the 70's. Punk ruled. The little pocket rocket, writhed on the floor, still singing perfectly in tune, every word crystal clear, hair everywhere, sang to individuals close up and breathed heavily into the mic between songs which was sexy in a good way.

As Melbourne music icon Molly Meldrum often says, "Do yourself a favour" so please do check out the Press Club. You will be far beyond happy. It's on repeat in my household and my favourite track changes daily as the quality and calibre of every track is just phenomenal. - Reliving my youth and it feels good.

Wayne Hussey+Evi Fine The Marrs Bar, Worcester | 27th Aug

The Mission have always been one of those band's I've been aware of, listened to a few tracks, but never fully committed to, despite spending more time with contemporaries, Sisters Of Mercy and Bauhaus. So, when Wayne Hussey announced a longawaited return to The Marrs Bar, I thought it must be time to Delight", the audience mouthing words back in delirious delve a little deeper.

A packed-out venue of mostly unfamiliar faces greet regular Hussey supporter and collaborator Evi Vine, alongside guitarist Steven Hill, for a short opening set. Lifting from her most recently released album Black//Light//White//Dark, Vine and Hill set about creating shimmering effects-driven soundscapes, whilst Evi

emotes with a voice that, at times, conjures memories of both Beth Gibbons (Portishead) and Julianne Regan (All About Eve). One minute she's haunting, the next she's soaring majestically over the wall of glacial guitars. By the end of Vine's thirty-or-so minute turn, Evi has managed to seduce a good portion of the partisan Hussey faithfuls, with her bewitching tones, leaving the stage to a greatlydeserved show of appreciation (though it's a shame this level of respect wasn't given throughout her set).



A polite surge towards the front signals Hussey to the stage, accompanied only by guitar, keys, a bank of pedals and backing triggers, and opening with Bowie's "After All" before delving into his solo back-catalogue. Early call-outs for Mission favourites are brushed away with the respect they deserve, as Hussey reaches for his recently released autobiography, Salad Daze, for a reading involving Madonna, Joey Ramone and a brush with customs. Guitar back in hand, Hussey masters a delicious run through "Love Me Two Times" (The Doors), followed by The Mission's "Garden Of appreciation of their hero.

Whether exploring his own catalogue or paying tribute to other musicians, Hussey can do no wrong. A stark piano rendition of "Hurt" (Nine Inch Nails, or Cash, if you prefer) proves that Wayne is equally at home behind the keys as he is with six string in hand. A stirring "Like A Hurricane" (Neil Young), The Mission's "Belief"

> and "Wasteland" are all met with rapturous applause, before a further reading from Salad Daze is delivered to the transfixed room. "Severina" sees Hussey bring Evi back out to float over his own weathered lead, before bringing the curtain down on a captivating evening with "Tower Of Strength".

> As I head out to leave, I notice the number of old Mission shirts queuing at the merch table for a replacement or first copy of Salad Daze, while I make a mental note to check out Wayne Hussey/The Mission's back-catalogue, leaving as enamoured as an old faithful.
