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Big Eyed Stories from Venus Captain Beefheart

Meeting your heroes is often disappointing. I once met the tall one from the Goodies and was mildly upset to find that I towered over him. But one cloudy afternoon on a London street I met Captain Beefheart and he was *never* one to disappoint.

> Born in 1941, Beefheart, real name Don Van Vliet, had a reputation for telling tall stories such as how he

could hold his breath underwater for several days or how he once sold a vacuum cleaner to Aldous Huxley. He reputedly had a gold-plated saxophone which he tossed into a dumpster after a gig with the *Magic Band*. Someone asked him why he was throwing away such a valuable instrument, he replied '*The damn thing ran out of notes!* I've always been attracted to absurdity and Beefheart was always so damn good at it.

For many in the post-punk era, discovering musicians and artists that had a certain credibility. unconnected with the Pre-Lydonite lapse into the depths of prog-rock, was an important part of life. So as a fresh faced 18 year old, just moved London. the Velvet to Underground, Iggy Pop, Johnny Thunders and the New York Dolls were like a clear blast of mountain air blowing from an undiscovered

country. It was around this time that a friend introduced me to Trout Mask Replica. This was the Captain's third album, recorded with the Magic Band and released in 1969. Many who listened to Trout Mask went through the same transformational journey that I did. Upon the first listen I thought it was a god-awful row, replete with intentional disharmony, obviously designed to cause the listener to reach for a (preferably orange) claw hammer with which to smash the offending pair of vinyl disks to smithereens. But, I had a great deal of respect for the friend who had loaned me the record so I resisted the destructive urge and persevered. By the time I had listened to Trout Mask for the third time I was convinced it was the greatest rock and roll album ever recorded. It is difficult to say why. Perhaps it is the blatant disregard for musical convention that sets it

apart, allowing Beefheart's unique tonal vocabulary to emerge. Perhaps it 's the way songs like 'Moonlight on Vermont' or 'The Blimp' tease you into thinking you're sane while the rest of the world is obviously mad. Perhaps it is the poetry of 'Frownland' or the humour of 'The Dust Blows Forward 'n' the Dust Blows Back'. Perhaps it is because, as John Peel said "If there has been anything in the history of popular music which could be described as a work of art in a way that people who are involved in other areas of art would understand, then Trout Mask Replica is probably that work." I think that best sums it up. What Picasso or Dali is to art. Beefheart is to music. Beefheart's other LPs are all worth a listen, from his first 'Safe as Milk' featuring a young Ry Cooder on guitar behind the Captain's Howlin' Wolf-like vocals, to the compelling 'Ice Cream for Crow' where Beefheart says a bleak farewell to the music business. Along the way he gave us the superb 'Shiny Beast', probably his most 'musical' record and the sublime 'Clear Spot' which includes the all-time Beefheart favorite 'Big Eyed Beans from Venus'.

Beefheart was also an accomplished artist, saying 'I paint the stuff I played'. His art adorned several of his album covers and it was because of his art that I was walking down Cork Street one April afternoon in 1986. A couple of musician friends and I had just wandered around the art gallery showing his works, hoping that we might catch sight of the man himself. We had brought along a small parcel stuffed with gifts; a cigar, some photos, some chocolate eags and a cassette of

our latest demo tape, wanting to say (as Howard Devoto had before us) 'We've got all your music, now here's all of ours'. But we were out of luck. He wasn't there. So we bought a few prints and left. Outside on the street, walking toward us, walking stick in hand, was Don Van Vliet, dressed in a large coat, long fuzzy hair and a full moustache (few musicians have been able to wear a moustache and be taken seriously). We stopped him and introduced ourselves, shook hands and presented our gifts and chatted for ten minutes or so. I don't remember much of what we spoke about as the man was truly

awesome and I was most assuredly in a state of awe. Here was someone from that distant land of fame, celebrity and notoriety standing before me on a London street. I wouldn't have been surprised if Charles Dickens and Orson Welles had walked around the corner and joined him. They didn't of course, but a policeman did happen to be passing by. He stopped and retraced his steps, gazing at the Captain with as much awe as I myself was displaying. 'Aren't you Captain Beefheart? he said, 'I saw you at Knebworth in 1975' Beefheart looked the policeman up and down and replied calmly 'Yes, I remember you'.

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'The best live act in the two counties' those manic Zebedy Rays from Malvern continue their march to superstardom with a gig at the Electric Ballroom, Camden in March - get the shots ready... Look out also for the follow up to Two pieces of news reach SLAP headquarters as we prepare to go to press... Firstly some good news comes to us from the other side of the hills, regarding the ongoing saga of The Lamb in West Malvern. As most people will be aware this outstanding venue has been threatened with closure and sell-off for some months now. Anybody who has been to The Lamb will know that it is not an easy place to get to, situated halfway up the side of a hill, in a leafy suburban/village with little or no public transport and a good three miles from Malvern Link railway station.

Equally loved and loathed by local residents it has long had its share of complaints regarding noise, traffic problems and drunkenness, which is understandable aiven its residential location. These issues notwithstanding, the current manager has worked hard to provide some quality music nights over the past 12 months, and has liaised with the police and local council to keep disruption to a minimum for the locals. Whilst attracting some well-known DJs and holding three-day live music events over the summer, a soundlimiter was installed and 'music curfew' times have been followed. The recent Pyramid Party events attracted thousands of music lovers over the three days and demonstrate the need for venues such as this which are increasingly few and far between.

Anyway, The Lamb has been given three or four closing dates over the last few months and although having been due to close at the beginning of January has been granted another temporary reprieve. How long this will last is as yet unknown but more gigs are in the pipeline for the early part of this year at least. While this is not an ideal situation because uncertainty makes it more difficult to arrange larger events we should all make the most of this venue before it becomes a restaurant or a halfway-house for young offenders...

The Worcester Arts Workshop is currently experiencing a massive makeover and will become a vibrant, buzzing creative hub. Volunteers from all over have been putting in their own time to re-decorate and give the arts workshop a new energy it has been longing for. Plans for a more engaging, open-armed workshop are in action. Previous courses and



workshops will continue to run with the addition of fresh and exciting courses & events running throughout the week looking to attract a diverse audience of art lovers, makers and creators of all ages.

Extra spice has been brought to the workshop from the incredibly tasty Café Bliss, providing a delicious menu of mexican and world dishes. Bliss serve up locally sourced organic food to die at a very reasonable price!

'Clik-Clik' are a dynamic, driven, ever-growing art collective of like-minded artists, makers, movers and shakers. Bringing together a wide variety of contemporary arts and crafts. The Collective have taken over the exhibition space in the downstairs gallery at the arts workshop and will feature monthly rotating art shows showing off a wide of range of contemporary art.

AIMs has evolved into a notfor-profit organisation largely run by current and ex-mental health service users, volunteers

and led by 'Health Trust funded Artist' Jayne Gaze and 'Senior Occupational Therapist' Velma Johnson.

AIMs members reach out into the Worcestershire community through their artistic expression to build bridges between people with and without mental health issues, encouraging acceptance, tolerance and community cohesion.

AIMs is not a stepping stone for its artists (members) but more of a rock, a consistent connection filled with care and understanding of each other. A group where one feels accepted and supported in developing creative works of art, confidence, professionalism and community.

group of the artists meet weekly at Worcester Arts Workshop to support each other in developing their artistic practice. This is lead by two artists and both are participating members of AIMs. For the



first twelve months this group was funded by the NHS and supported in kind by Worcester Museum and Art Gallery. A further six months of funding, awarded by Capacity Builders, enabled the expanding group to move into larger premises at Worcester Arts Workshop. The group are currently looking at ways of continuing and developing and any financial support would be gratefully welcomed.

Caroline Hartley

Caroline Hartley is a Welsh born artist who has lived in Worcester on and off for nearly ten years. Although Caroline now lives in Wales she continues to exhibit around the UK, in particular the Midlands, including West Bromwich and Stourbridge.

Currently she has some works hanging in The North Star Gallery and the Worcester Arts

Workshop as part the 'Clik Clik' exhibition. Recently she has exhibited in London and Pembrokeshire.



Muse

Caroline's paintings are characterized by layering and rubbing away. The natural pigments and materials are built up over time, offering the viewer a depth of colour, not unlike Rothko's canvas's. The finished surfaces are softly penetrable and full of intrigue. Caroline says of her paintings; "They are about the relationship between mankind and the natural world. Through media, application and ambiguous imagery I hope to convey the sublime forces that make up these two divine entities and remind of their symbiosis. "

Caroline's past award winning sculptural works use ordinary objects and raw materials to address environmental issues and her paintings continue to embrace exploration of this.

Where did you study?

Following raising a family I completed a BTEC in Art and Design. I did my BA Hons at Jobswell College of Art at Carmarthen in 2006 as a mature student.

Have you ever had an 'epiphany', a 'Ah Ha' moment about your work, and its meaning?

I have always painted, finding that using art as a media to project thoughts is essential. During my degree years it dawned that whilst my work was concerned with environmental issues I was still using

mass produced synthetic paint to create it. I suppose you could call it an epiphany. I quickly began to research and source natural media.

What media do you use?

I have created site specific works using earth and leaf mold which was dried out and then mixed with egg oil tempera. I also use crushed crystals such as lapiz lazuli and malachite, which is green.

More recently I have been using oxides, ochers and our own bees wax. The images are ambiguous, as I want the viewer to find their own interpretation within them.

How long does it usually take you to complete a painting?

It takes up to 3 months to create a piece but I tend to work on several over this period. Drying is the main issue.

What are the paintings about, for you?

They are about exploration of myself, my place within our world, holistic consciousness and a desire to share this belief with others. To remind that we are a part of this divine life and not apart from it.

If you couldn't paint, what would you do instead?

I would continue to work toward living more selfsufficient and share my belief through another creative way, such as sculpture.

What message or experience do you want the viewer to have with your work?

I hope that you will instinctively be seduced into a reflective consciousness through natural aroma, imagery and transience within the piece.

What sort of things have other people said about your work?

I get mixed reactions, I guess a little like marmite. People either really love it or just don't get it. Tutors,

peers and my local newspaper have likened it to such greats as Turner and Rothko.

Finally, have you sold to anyone famous?

I have recently sold to Johanna Berryman ex wife to Coldplay bassist Guy Berryman. Johanna has also just started an interior design business in Hampstead heath London.

Paving Paradise

What is it with Malvern and its unrelenting love-hate relationship with music?



In this inspirational hillside oasis, you can't walk ten yards down the street without meeting a singer or guitarist or djembe-wielding new-age warrior. Yet for some reason, most people in the town treat their creative co-inhabitants like a slightly mad relative; a bit embarrassing, best kept hidden and certainly not encouraged. However, Malvern has an enviable musical history, and it's not just Elgar and Nigel Kennedy. The



Winter Gardens has hosted bands that read like a Who's Who of rock 'n' roll including The Who, The Velvet Underground, Hawkwind, Stiff Little Fingers, The Jam, Motorhead, Mott the Hoople, T–Rex, Geno Washington, AC/DC, The Undertones, The Specials, Madness, Joy Division, Happy Mondays... etc, etc.



The Gardens were the national on touring circuit from the mid 60s through to the late 90s. A musical legacy spanning nearly forty years, all in a small, sleepy. rural backwater. But like all good things it ended. The capacity limits on the venue

made it less profitable to put on big name acts and the redeveloped Malvern Theatres lost its main ballroom to house a seated only New Space. And where there once was a bar, a nice restaurant appeared to cater for the out of town theatre audiences.

But the Malvern music scene wasn't just centred around the Winter Gardens. In 1979, the orangery, upstairs at the Mount Pleasant Hotel became the Phoenix Club, an exclusive venue packed with punk rockers and new romantics. Bristol punks Vice Squad played there led by the fabulous Beki Bondage. As did the Dancing Did, the Dangerous Girls and Subject Pigfish. And of course there was a host of groups from Malvern and Worcester ready to take to the stage to amaze audiences with their mendacious style and



avant-garde feats. Witness the celebrated Asterix and the Gauls strumming a single chord for ten minutes sitting on an Afghan coat. Or yet the bizarro Experiments on Steel who ripped the heads off bloodfilled dolls in a half-naked frenzy. Even my first band, fresh-faced punks Troy played the Phoenix, spitting and spluttering our way through Teenage Boredom and Shit Out! Ah, happy days! The venue was legendary of which it has been said that if you can remember it you weren't there.

There were few other places around the town where the seeming endless supply of local talent could perform; The Nags Tail and the Herefordshire House being the main contenders, providing a stage for the likes of **Bandito**

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Bandecko, Virgin Star, Cynic and The Great Ethnics. Unfortunately, the constant struggle against small town nimby-ism inevitably took its toll. The Nags Tail, where once The Tights thrashed and Dance Naked in the Sun threshed has become a restaurant. The short-lived Don Pedros mysteriously burned down *then* became a restaurant. The amusingly named Fringe Theatre (aka the Youth Centre) was fine with the right acts such as the fabulous Blessed Ethel, but was like playing in a cavern with fewer than two hundred people in the crowd. At least there are no plans to turn it into a restaurant. Ironically, it was the venue of choice before it changed hands and ... became a restaurant.



Fortunately, late last millennium, some members of Easy Tiger approached the landlord at Malvern's Conservative Club to ask for a gig and a new era was born. The Con Club was the perfect venue for Malvern. Big enough for a raging party, small enough for a local band, and fortunate enough to be sited next to a graveyard. Despite many attempts there, no one ever managed to actually wake the dead. The irony of having to join a Tory club, with pictures of Thatcher and the queen on the wall, was lost on most but not all of the punters as the Con Club became Malvern's supremo venue. Some people are still getting unsolicited blue propaganda through the post as a result of that membership. Bad Habits, Nigel Kennedy, Slack Granny, Mr Hedge, Dubmerge and the Funky Junky Monkeys played to packed houses. But once again, the sight of young (and now not so young) people enjoying themselves proved too much for some and the venue closed six years ago.

That was a bad time for Malvern. A musical tumbleweed period. But there was hope.

For more than thirty years, one Malvern pub had been quietly (and not so quietly) giving a stage to performers and musicians from around the region. The Lamb Inn sits on the Northern slopes of those poetic Hills and with the closure of the Con Club soon took on the mantle of Malvern's most popular music venue. The smoking ban in 2007 had a big impact on audiences and while few would like to return to the smoke filled haze that came before, it's obvious that pubs are less full than before the ban. And that includes the Lamb. Also, the music loving audience became spread thin. Lots of pubs began to realise that having live music actually brought in the punters. All around Malvern unlikely music venues sprung up. Places like the impossibly small Retired Soldier booked acoustic trios while the Express, the Wyche Inn, the Mount Pleasant and the Swan all started having regular music nights. After the loss of the Con Club it was a bit of a musical renaissance for the town.

Everyone has played at the Lamb. From the Pewke Band to the Zebedy Rays, Strange Machine to Rhondda, the Black Acid Band to Mike Mann, Skewwhiff to Mouse Police. Open Mic nights made Thursdays as busy as the weekend and two three-day Pyramid Weekends filled the pub to bursting point with more than forty-five bands and performers playing on the two Pyramid stages or in the DJ room.

Yet it wasn't enough. The traditional Malvern disparagement of people having fun combined with dwindling audiences has claimed its latest victim. The Lamb ceased to be a music venue in the New Year; the latest in a long line of renowned Malvern venues to close its doors.

It's difficult to know if this malaise is widespread or if it just affects us who live in the Hills. Shrill nimbys will always have their say. Maybe they have a point. Maybe it is too much to expect an artistic and musical scene in a small town like Malvern. But I don't think it is. In fact I believe it's integral to a healthy, outgoing, all-inclusive community

So what's next for the town? Malvern's musicians will find an outlet for their muse. The Wyche Inn or the Mount Pleasant or the Great Malvern Hotel or some as vet undiscovered gem. Something will come up. It always does. Mavbe we'll come around to your house, you know, before they turn it into a restaurant.



9th Dylan Night Marrs Bar 16th Jan 2011

I was fortunate enough to witness the mighty Bob Dylan at the NEC a few years ago. The legend reduced to a tiny, glowing white speck on stage in that vast, soulless venue. Despite the fact that even in his 70's he still performs a three hour set, divided evenly between acoustic and electric, despite the fact that he plays from across his whole back-catalogue, his appeal transcends generations and his nasal whining is recognised around the globe and despite the fact that I was a privilege to see him, I still feel slightly cheated that I never had an opportunity to see him perform in a more intimate venue.

With this in mind I was pleased to see that the Dylan night at the Marrs Bar was back for a ninth year! Although the great man himself is yet to put in an appearance this is always a great night, with a varied bunch of local bands and musicians performing their own versions of classic Dylan tunes.

There is a certain amount of musical snobbery regarding tribute/covers bands and as a musician I include myself in that but I also think that while it is fantastic to see your musical heroes in the flesh, this pleasure can be diminished by the prohibitive cost, travel hassle and enormous size of the venue. So I'm prepared to make exceptions, particularly when musicians add their own, individual elements to the covers they play, rather than slavishly copying the music note by note.

Dylan himself played his tunes in varying styles depending on his mood or the audience he was playing to, or just to wind people up. So the wide range of performers at Dylan night goes some way to recreating that vibe, from the more rocky style of The Royal Alberts to the more leftfield take of The Players.


SLAP spoke to Paul Jeffery who has 42 years of guitar playing experience and currently works with The Players but also gets psychedelic with Gandhi's Walrus. As a multi-instrumentalist who also plays bass, mandolin, tin whistle and 'a smidgin' of keyboards, Paul was looking forward to returning to Dylan night with a full band as he had previously only played there as a solo performer. He has been with The Players for four years and despite not liking to pigeonhole their style describes it vaguely, when pressed for an answer, as Donovan meets 20's/30's ragtime/blues, which is good enough for me (I invented the genre 'agricultural cider-core' to avoid answering such restrictive questions).

Asked for his views on the local music scene Paul said, 'There are a lot of very fine musicians in this area from every genre, but we need more venues that will give artists who play their own material a chance. One of my favourite venues is the Red Lion at Cradley, the landlady and landlord love live music and are very appreciative. I also like the regular 'acoustic lunches' at The Old Rectifying House!

Paul also had some advice for young musicians, 'Be yourself, practice hard and have fun. Also don't get hung up on technique, emotion and sincerity are far finer than huge egos and posturing, but what do I know?'

Well, quite. A musician is always learning but advice from someone with 42 years experience, who witnessed The Doors and Jefferson Airplane at the Roundhouse back when he was just a 'pipsqueak hippie' is always worth heeding...

The Westway to Pierpoint Street DIREADZONE



The Westway is a 2.5 mile long elevated dual carriageway section of the A40 route in west London running from Paddington to North Kensington and the breeding ground of an alternative style of music. Lemmy lived there. The Clash were born there and out of the demise of The Clash, guitarist, Mick Jones, formed Big Audio Dynamite.

A young rhythm section of Greg Roberts (drums) and Leo Williams (bass) provided the driving beats to the vision of MIck and Don Letts (the Cinematographer of London's punky reggae party) producing classic hits such as "Medicine Show", "Bottom Line" and "E=MC²" on their debut album.

The former Clash man went his own way - eventually ending up as part of Gorillaz - but Greg and Leo were a nailed on drum and bass partnership now and after a brief flirtation and one album, "Hometown Hi Fi", with the band they formed called Screaming Target, Dreadzone was the new Soundsystem inna London Town.

Tim Bran – sound engineer for Julian Cope – joined along with another BAD refugee, Dan Donovan (yes, Daisy's brother!), and a deal was struck with Alan McGee's Creation Records for debut "360°" (giving first dibs on recordings to the likes of Alison Goldfrapp and Melanie Blatt). The follow up, Second Light, is a timeless classic - featuring singles "Life, Love and Unity", "Captain Dread" and "Little Britain", all coupled with the sweet Jamaican vocal style of Earl 16 - and cemented Dreadzone as firm festival and, more importantly, Peelie favourites.

The addition of MC Spee (who has become a focal point for the energetic live show despite having to use a crutch!) has further blended the original yet traditional reggae rhythms, Earl 16's toasting and the input of 'new boys' Chris Compton (guitar) and Chris Oldfield (DJ/Producer) to create current album, "Eye on the Horizon".

Whatever you've heard on record or youtube, this is a heavyweight, must see live band – expect warmth in Dreadzone's professional delivery of feel good, rhythm heavy dance tunes designed to brighten up any party!



How it all began...

It all started about six years ago ... we'd been to see a legend of the 70's and early 80's (who out of respect shall remain nameless) play with his new band. After a frankly disappointing gig – which didn't include any of his big hits - my mate Nick announced that 'he'd never go and see an old band again'. I didn't blame him! But I did mention that I'd heard of a young band from Monmouth making waves on the Hereford scene. Grudgingly Nick agreed to give local music one last chance - and a week or so later we caught an evening saver over to the Black Lion in Hereford to see **Bitchpups**. We only caught about three or four



numbers from them before we had to dash for the last train back – but we were gobsmacked by their energy, their sense of fun and the sheer quality of their sparkly indie music.

About the same time two reporters on **BBC Radio Hereford and Worcester** had the idea to trial a programme focusing on original new music in the two counties – with the likes of **Tastyhead**, **Dandelion Killers** and **Toasted Egg Sandwich** (for Hereford) and And What Will Be Left Of Them? and **Meg** (for Worcestershire) some of the acts emerging blinking into the sunlight at the time. I listened to the show a few times and then started texting and

emailing in my comments about gigs I'd gone to. It wasn't long before **Dan** and **Andrew** got in touch with me saying 'You go to loads of gigs Andy, fancy being our roving reporter?' Not half lads!



A fair bit of water under the bridge since then – I've been to more gigs in the two counties than I can count, seen bands come and go (including **Bitchpups** unfortunately!) and the **Friday Session** (now rebranded as BBC Introducing in Hereford and Worcester) is now the station's flagship programme. We're proud that we were one of the pioneers of the BBC Introducing scheme to feed local music up to Radio 1 and BBC 6 Music, and also put forward acts for the Introducing stages at **Glastonbury, Reading** and **Leeds** festivals. There have been Battles of the Bands with uplifting successes and wails of anguish in equal measures, we've managed to get artists like **Sam Isaac** and **The Anomalies** national airplay - but for me the most noticeable reflection of the vibrant H+W music scene is the rise of festivals like **Wyeside**, **Nozstock** and of course the phenomenally successful first two **Worcester Music Festivals**!



I hope **Pete Adams** (of **AWWBLOT, Evilwitch, Girls On Film, Lost Boy Scout** and new supergroup **God Save The King** – phew!) won't mind me quoting him – but he swears that if Worcester was say only 25 miles or so from London, then all the music industry hacks would be raving about our scene – couldn't agree more! When I listen to some of the dross that hits the national airwaves and compare it to the sparkling new local ditties I hear on a weekly basis it makes me want to spit – but to all those talents out there (and you know who you are) please keep playing and plugging yourself – and we'll try and give you a helping hand...



I'm absolutely sure at least one act from Worcestershire is going to go massive in the next year - but I'm not going to jinx them by listing any names (yet!) For 2011 we're abandoning the weekly studio live sessions for a 4-weekly 'roadshow' featuring more of the cracking musos from the two counties. We'll be continuing our festival coverages from the local 'big ones' - **Nozstock, Big Chill** and **Worcester** - but I'll also be doing some more outside broadcasts from the likes of **Bridgebash, Upton, Linton** and the **Pyramid Party** - plus some extra gigs thrown in when I can. So if you see an old git in the corner with a netbook and mixer, talking into a mike to himself - don't just point or shake your head, come over and introduce yourself or even better - buy him a pint!!
