

CLIK CLIK COLLECTIVE

Clik Clik Collective is a multi arts facilitator offering creative flair to events, festivals, weddings and more. Providing performance, live music, visual arts and installations, children's workshops/



activities and outreach work, our mission is to encourage people to get creative and be inspired to do so! Bringing arts to the people!

Last November Clik Clik artists Amy Birch, Kate Cox and Sarah Edwards curated the SOUNDABOUT project at the Worcester Arts Workshop. Presenting five nights of sound based experiences and explorations collaborating with Collective Unconscious (see Martin Wilkes review page 8) Spare Room Arts and Nick & Kelly Hersey (visual artists/film makers) from Derbyshire. On entering the Soundabout, through a giant tent structure with speakers positioned to move the sound around you, there were diverse experiences for each night; Clik Clik artists in a typing/drawing/word association frenzy; delving into our personal space and crossing social boundaries with Collective Unconscious: a beautiful and serene film from Derbyshire based on Alice Through the Looking Glass including reflections and sweets; plus nights of sewing umbrellas and music! This was a surreal and challenging installation and we intend to develop more sound based and immersive work this coming year.



In December Clik Clik Collective joined forces with Collective 43 for the Worcester Victorian Fayre bringing the streets to life with fat brass and beats, dancing and light! Our Victoriana/voodoo style may have unsettled some of the onlookers fearful of what was approaching as we marched, like a New Orleans funeral (think 'Live and Let Die' verses Sherlock Holmes) towards them. However once the slow, somber beats got faster, the umbrellas lit up the sky and the dancing erupted, the audience could not help but dance and smile in wonderment. As we weaved our way through the busy crowds, dropping from slow to fast and back again, we gathered followers; reaching the Guildhall for the finale with a good crowd in tow. Clik Clik Collective and Collective 43 would like to thank Mark Hoy

for the photography and Vladamir Toma & Rob Harley for the film making. Look out for our processions at a festival near you soon!

Also, last month I took part as a visiting artist to the Worcester Museum and Art Gallery with my typewriters to create an interactive visual installation, joining other Clik Clik team members who have been working there since October as part of the Joseph Beuys exhibition. I spoke to Amy Birch who had a few words to say about the project:



"Sian (Hughes) and I have been working as visual artists for the Joseph Beuys Artist Rooms exhibition down at the Art Gallery and Museum for the last 4 months. We have been working with groups of young people from Dancefest Worcester (Fusion) and Baxter College, Kidderminster engaging with Joseph Beuys' work and his ideas, being inspired to think about their own approach to their practice in a different way.

At the end of January, the young people showcased their responses from the project through a variety of media. Dancefest 'Fusion' created exciting live pop up dance performances in flash mob styles, while I worked alongside Amy and Sian as а visiting contemporary textile and typewriter artist with Baxter College, curating and staging a playful exhibition using a colourful wool, wire and text.



Working alongside the City Art Gallery and Museum, this project was a response to the Joseph Beuys Artist Rooms exhibition which finished on the 1st February.



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Review - 5am Saint

An exploration of intimacy as part of Clik Clik Collective's interactive installation Soundabout.

Descending December-dark stairs to the cellar, I find two shadows. I feel the silk strip they hand to me. What is this for? Entering a tent scrawled-over with the words of others, I prepare to add my daub. A blindfolded figure expertly glides through the strobe light. My own personal Jesus. Some experiences have the ability to change the nature of every other to come. 5AM Saint is one of them. With it Mark Ellis/Collective Unconscious defies convention, expectation, maybe even gravity. I joined the creator for a beer.

I'm intrigued about the name, **5AM Saint**. Is it a character or simply a title for the performance?

I'd call it a persona, not a character. I think a character (as in a play) is something that might reflect bits of an actor but it's not a real representation of them, whereas a persona is more about focusing and channeling a certain side of yourself as a performer. I'm exploring a side of myself. Not one I necessarily understand or fully know. I'd like to understand it more.

I've heard it described as "taking place in a nightclub at the end of the world". What gave you that idea? It seems like the last place people would want to go!

At 5AM when the nightclub is closing is when vou're verv open to lots of things that could happen. You're starting to sober up slightly and there's less stimulation to crowd vour senses. That's the atmosphere I'm trving to manifest. The idea came after I'd performed it a few times. Every time I perform anything the whole piece gets reexamined both during and after the performance. You can't plan too much. There's always someone ready to come along and throw a spanner in the works, challenging you to rethink it.

Obviously music plays a huge part in creating that nightclub feeling. In the tent there was a song on loop. What influenced your choice of track?

That particual remix of the song just seems to fit in with the whole thing. If you look at depictions of the saints they always have a halo that's interpreted as a ball of light behind their head rather than a ring. I kind of reinterpreted that as a glitterball and the song has exactly the right aesthetic for that. It's caustic, it's really full-on but there's also a religious element to the song. It gives the participant a way into the piece. It almost describes what's happening in a way.

Do you think this is the kind of thing that anyone can enjoy?

Part of me wants to say "yeah, nothing bad's gonna happen, it's all fine, I'll challenge you but it's fine". While you don't necessarily know this as a participant walking in, I'm really very focused on your experience. I take care of you. I read your body language. I'm totally led by the participant. I hope that they know the offer is there for them to have a sense of freedom in what they explore.

You mentioned challenging people's boundaries. Why do you think it's important to do that?

I'm really concerned about the level of disconnection in society. I'm really aware that that children are granted a lot of opportunity to explore, to play to challenge themselves and then as soon as you get to a particular age you're expected to know all about yourself yet most people I've ever met come out with a lack of experience. They're shy or they're afraid of intimacy or they don't know how to open up to people. Those things hang over their heads for years and sometimes people can get over them and improve their engagement with the world around them. For some people it's about getting so drunk that they loose all inhibitions and they are granted that fleeting opportunity when they're barely conscious. I think that's a problem.

So it's like a social service or a form of therapy?!

The performance space is a safe place. It's sufficiently fictionalised and heightened that when you step out of

that space you can detach the experience form your everyday life. So even though you might have had guite an intimate encounter with somebody, maybe your first experience of samesex intimacy, because it's framed and facilitated by a performer instead of it just being someone at a party, there's a safety to it. There are people who really want to engage but they just don't have the confidence to Disappointment and regret are responses that I've really come to value. Walking away with that kind of disappointment is a really powerful emotion. It creates a huge amount of thinking in somebody. The point is to provoke thought.

I've heard that you have plans for more performances than ever this year. What can we expect locally?

One of my aims is to begin a regular performance art night in Worcester. It seems that there isn't anything like that at the moment apart from one-off things like Soundabout. We're always looking for new places to perform, new venues, new nights, parties. People who are looking for something unique. It gives us an opportunity to try out new ideas and meet new people. It's always great when people contact you and say 'are you up for this...' there's always a way to make our work fit with what people are doing. So yeah... drop us a line.

I'll certainly be doing plugging yourself - and if we've my best to get to as many gigs as possible - and I don't think that I've ever been more confident that at least one session - definitely include that in act (but probably more) from our vibrant area will go cosmological in the coming year!!

One of my happy tasks over the New Year period was to select my favourite ten tunes from all the ones I've heard in 2013 - at the beginning of the year I created a folder and over the months dropped into it ditties that took my fancy - now these weren't necessarily the greatest bands or acts I've seen (there's certainly no shortage of those in the Two Counties at all) but just songs that stuck in my head because of their memorability and hummability - the ones that passed my own Old Grey Whistle Test!!

And what I still find remarkable is that I still find myself (a bit tunelessly maybe) humming or whistling these numbers in my head weeks later! For me that's really what music-making is all about - no matter what genre of music it's all about searching for the 'lost chord' or in other words that killer tune that stands the test of time... And

that's what I think bands should be looking for - but so often I feel that they're not always the best judges themselves of what they produce - so do please keep asking your fans what they think of your songs - you might well be surprised!!

I've got another folder on my desktop of over 50 H&W songs that I've picked since 2005 - the plan (once I get the rest of the desktop cleared) will be to release my personal Top 40 - say one a week... Just wonder if anyone can guess my own #1 from the last nine years - drop me a line, if you get it (and I don't think many will) there's a swift half-ofmild in it for the winner!!

Guess I've always mentioned it at this time of the year but now really is the time to get those festival applications off! If we didn't have any of you wonderful people creating music - well we wouldn't have a show - and it's the same with festivals, please don't underestimate the contribution



and retiring about given you a mention, a play or a your pitch!!

Talking of which - this is shaping up to be a bumper year for acts that we're going to be able to place at festivals - more details very soon - but please do keep up the contacts with us (without being too spammy please) and be sure that a whole bunch of you will be very much in the mix for some great opportunities this year!!!

The Intro scheme offers some great chances for local talent and there's virtually nothing on the local scene that we haven't checked out (we're very busy bunnies!)

- but if neither Andrew or me 'agree' on an act - and we're poles apart in our musical taste - it's probably fair to say that there's some work still to be done to make it airworthy! A very good start is not to send in sweary/offensive content (currently about a third of what we receive) because that falls at the first hurdle - thank you Auntie Beeb!!

No covers/tributes either please - we're only about live/local and original - but if you've done all that vou've promoted vour music like there's no tomorrow but still the industry aren't raving about your toons then what? Well the chances are that they're not vet impressed enough - and this is where some problems happen...

Quite the worst thing that some outfits do at this point is to throw a hissy fit and complain vehemently that little Jimmy hasn't been selected to play Main Stage at Glastonbury - now this may seem utterly baffling as far as you're concerned - but great and good music is few and far between... From my point of view most of what I also hear on mainstream media is bland commercial pap - and I'm only interested in promoting the kick-ass numbers that I'm lucky enough to hear on a weekly basis round the Two Counties - and there sure are plenty of them!! But sadly the current music industry is happy to play it safe most of the time with alreadyrecognised artists and/or bog-standard R&B/urban/ dubstep/drum-and-bass 'fillers' - no pain but also no gain whatsoever...

So an idea maybe what we all have to do in the coming year - bands and acts keep creating great hummable tunes - then promote them using the vast array of media that's now available - and we'll also do our very best to ensure that the cream of these get to the 'people that matter' - and for sure I'll be very happy to chat more about this at a gig near you very soon!!

Feature - Lock up your Tube Amps... It's PLANE CRASHER!!

Described by Terrorizer Magazine as "a Wild fusion of The Jesus Lizard. The Ramones and Shellac"... Hereford noise merchants Plane Crasher are keeping the spirit of playing REALLY LOUD alive and well. Unsigned and DIY, but with three releases under their belts, if you like your punk super-analogue and super-heavy, then these boys deserve your attention.



Ed Ling caught up with the band to talk about being too loud for Malvern, the abuse of bathroom fittings and big plans for the year ahead.

The Marches are not widely celebrated as a harsh spawning ground for heavy noise-rock... Though maybe with the exception of T'Pau. What's your experience plying your trade round these parts?



We get asked to turn down quite a lot. In a decent sized venue nobody bats an eyelid at a band all using tube amps through half-stacks, but by the reaction we get from some sound guys we meet, you'd think they'd never seen a 4x12 before. We had the power turned off on us half-way through the set at a gig for 'Malvern Rocks' festival last year. Evidently whoever booked us hadn't checked out the band at all, and put us on at 2pm

on a Sunday afternoon, opening for some acoustic jazz folk bands. You get the idea... All that said, the lack of similar bands can often be really rewarding. When you're playing shows with such varied lineups you get to see and dream of checking out.

Speaking of bands, is there anyone that currently really excites you - or that you want to give a shout?

We're really enjoying the current offerings from Red Fang, Lamps and Pissed Jeans right now. Also, the latest Future of the Left album is a welcome return to form. As far as bands that we know/have played with, the following have the Plane Crasher seal of approval: Fetus Christ, New Cowboy Builders, Gag Reflex, Workin' Man Noise Unit, Mangle.

For a garage band you work up a well-produced sound who's the sound geek? You seem to be using the microphone in the lav trick for the demos...

We're all the sound geek! All of us have plenty of sound engineering experience, we know what sounds good and how to get it and we're all massive control freaks, so DIY is for us the way to get the best results. It's much harder to keep your vision pure on a major label. Look at Elvis, he died on his toilet trying to perfect his vocal sound.



Beautiful. New material aside, what's next? Any plans to venture further afield to brutalise the bourgeoisie of the big cities here or abroad?

We've aot an Ireland and Northern Enaland tour booked make friends with great bands you'd never normally for March 2014 and we're also putting together a UK tour with the Evolution of Man. plus we have some dates with US band The Bismarck on their UK tour. We've had various offers of gigs in Europe but they're all way too far apart to really justify a tour at this point. As far as England goes, we'll play anywhere for petrol money and free lasagne.

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Feature - One of our artworks is missing!

In this period of austerity it is becoming increasingly difficult for all of us to make ends meet but for those trying to brighten our days with their art it is a truly trying time.

This article will take a closer look at how the economy has been affecting artists in Worcester as art shops are closing, and art works are going missing from their exhibition sites either destroyed or stolen.

Graffiti on the gym

Walking along Farrier Street Worcester residents used to pass a building festooned with street art before the building was smartened up to become a gym. These artworks produced in 2012 were in varied street art styles from lettering to cartoon characters. The brightly coloured artworks were full of comedy and contemporary comments; the nautical theme was especially fun, Captain Pugwash keeping an eye on the shark from Finding Nemo while other walls showed flying eyeballs, an unhappy looking manga style character and comic skateboards.

While it's understandable that street art might have a shelf life, art exhibited in the cathedral should surely be safe from disappearing? Unfortunately not, as art works have been disappearing from there too. The "Gift of Colour exhibition" featured in SLAP's August edition, had a couple of paintings stolen. The artworks were by amateur artists attending Origin Arts classes run by Rebecca Newell in Worcestershire. Maureen Wright and Diane Freeman, were very disappointed at the theft after weeks of hard work but on the bright side, Rebecca says, "they are beautiful paintings so whoever has taken them has obviously got

brilliant taste." Although an appeal was printed in local press to raise public awareness the paintings were still not returned. So where are the paintings now? Let's hope they are now adorning the walls of someone who loves them just as much as the artists.

Missing in Action

Oxfordshire artist Peter Logan produced a sculpture called "Nails" situated outside Homebase in St Johns, Worcester in 1987. The clever kinetic sculpture looked like enormous nails balancing on top of each other, and moved with the wind.



Peter Logan's work can be seen at Stansted Airport, Montgomery Castle in Powys, and worldwide so Worcester was lucky to be able to display a piece by such a prestigious international artist. Unfortunately today there is only a plaque to show where the sculpture once stood and the artist says he has no idea where his sculpture is. "I read of a huge Worcester river flood, so maybe it was dismantled during the emergency work." He says, "Nails' was intended to be a gift as a public sculpture for Worcester though I was unable to discover what had happened".

Have they simply been disassembled and disposed of? Or were they stolen for the scrap metal value?

Closed shops

After thirtythree years of trading, popular art gallery Birties of Worcester closed their gallery on Friar



Street this year. David Birtwhistle, popular with locals and tourists, is now exhibiting his paintings and prints in other art shops around the city. David's work has appeared in galleries up and down the land and has undertaken commissions for many distinguished clients.

It is sad when art goes missing, whether it is shops closing, sculptures disappearing, art projects painted over, or paintings stolen. Missing artwork leaves a gap in the lives of the artists and those who might otherwise have enjoyed them. Local blues man Matt was joined by Dave Small on caion to reprise some of his past songs alongside those from his new EP Hook Line & Sinker.

Matt opened with the title track from that EP, a rattling good song well delivered in cut back form by a man renowned for his acoustic sets. Traditional style blues 'Woke Up This Morning' came from On The Wagon, as did the splendidly delivered 'That's My Baby' in typically raw Woosev style. So we bounced between the two discs. hitting the buffers full and hard with 'Cruel Disposition'. a bitingly sharp behemoth of a blues song. Matt says he does not like playing it, misinformation from Matt maybe, it's an absolute cracker as it stalls and soars, brilliant guitar and vocals. We drop away from Matt's recent releases to another favourite 'Walking The Blues', which could just as easily have been penned by the likes of Hooker or Muddy, but it's all Matt's. Not so J. B. Hutto's, 'Too Much Alcohol' a wonderful bit of Chicago Blues, and like all good blues, embellished by Wooz. No stopping him now, Howling Wolf's 'Lil' Red Rooster' was laid on us Matt lays his guitar across his knees, dobro style, and slides his way through that farmyard.

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
REVIEW - Film Premiere - Dec 29th

BB: How are rehearsals going? Good vibes (maan)?

JC: It's brilliant to be in a band again, especially one where everyone is capable of throwing in ideas. We are getting there gradually. I doubt we'll recover the tightness play. "She's a gueeeeean!!!!" and energy we had developed by the mid nineties after years of touring but age has its advantages. It's not as frantic as of yore. There's a lot more breathing space. That's "maturity" for you.



BB: Where are your favourite places to play? I presume well attended & received there.

BB: Any plans for new material with del Amitri or will

JC: It's just the UK. We need a lot of money to get this show on the road so it's tricky. We were never very big in Europe so it's unlikely to happen. We'd formerly have relied heavily on the label to underwrite tours outside the UK.

BB: Finally, as you do used to do a Beatles cover every time you played in Liverpool, any chance of a Slade one for Wolverhampton?!

REVIEW – Babajack Christmas party - Re-Con Malvern - 19th December

Where better to hold the annual party bash than just up the road in this excellent music venue. They could just meander home after the gig, without the trappings of transport. Becky had been suffering a virus for some days before, which would see her voice fail her late in the evening, but not before closing the set in style. The full band were here, giving both Becky and Trevor more freedom of expression, which Becky now uses to the full, moving around the floor, turning, flicking out



those red tresses, before being drawn back to the microphone, cajon and drum. Trevor too is able to add to his playing, plucking, tapping and sliding on his wine box guitars. We are also able to hear more use of his Dannecker harp, no more so than than in the lovely Babajack 'solo' 'Hammer and Tongs', where the band can take a break as Becky and Trevor give, what is for me, one of the finest songs off their Running Man album. It seems a little more extended, Trevor's harmonica more memorable, with every nuance eagerly awaited by a partisan audience. I will mention another particular favourite, and that is Son House's 'Death Letter Blues', I cannot think that anyone presents it with more passion.

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Review – Punk/Ska Showcase at the Roadhouse, Birmingham. January 9th 2014

The showcases at the Roadhouse allow bands to tout their wares through 30 minute sets and tonight it was the punk/ska showcase involving Ocean Avenue, Dolls Eye Weaver, Needle Poppets and Sundown. This wasn't a night for the die-hard punk fan looking for the rawness of the Sex Pistols or the Damned, this was pop punk.

First up was Ocean Avenue, a three-piece outfit from Shropshire. So 30 minutes, 9 songs, three of which

featured on their 2013 EP 'Slack Haddock', two covers and four of the bands' own material. These were all a bit rocky, a bit punky, but all well played songs. The similarity to modern bands like the Subways and vintage bands like the Vibrators is quite clear. Given time and exposure this band could develop into something very good indeed.



Next up was Dolls Eye Weaver a four piece band from influences as Social Distortion and Rancid, amongst others, but I heard a rocked up hybrid reminiscent of the by the man with the beard, James Dalby. Now ska isn't my Poques and the Boomtown Rats with a few bits of Green Day thrown in for good measure. The band played nine



original songs, all pretty lively, bantered with the small audience and showed that they are capable of good things. On the album front the band have been a little quiet since the release of the last of their 3 self-funded EP's in 2011 but hopefully the new material will be put out there soon.

Third band on the agenda was Needle Poppets, a distinctive two-piece band from Shrewsbury edging towards steampunk. and plaintive in parts: never a dull moment indeed. This is multi-faceted music par excellence with their sound seamlessly incorporating elements of jazz, rock, funk, cinematic soundtracks and classical.

Even theatre enters the realm here with the track 'Fair Is Foul' based on the witches from Macbeth, incorporating spoken word and accompanied by an animated film no less.



This really is an endlessly adventurous and original album covering a head-spinning array of styles: serious and accomplished but playful and joyous also, I even hear Dadaesque touches of the The Residents.


Also who wouldn't be intrigued by the splendidly titled 48 Prefabs and Forks No: 60??

And then there was Ash Is A Robot. Looking like a group of unassuming foreign exchange students milling about the place before taking the stage, impressions have never been more deceptive. This lot were a staggering blast of energy and ideas - fronted by one rangy, sexy beast on vocals. Few people can carry off a Three Musketeers mustache and goatee. He



made that shit look cool. Musically, they took every rock, metal, proto-, peri- and post-hardcore trick in the great book of loud music - and made it dance like a bleeding pixie. Sometimes Shellac-esque noise-rock; sometimes proto-punk a la MC5; sometimes ultramodern HardCORE like The Hell or Architects. You got the lot. And more. They were also tight - medically so. You had to see them deploy a false ending. It was physical poetry.

People – including myself – have raved about Baby Godzilla. These hot Iberians have all the feted intensity and projection of that band. I'm serious. But, unlike Baby Godzilla, they also play great tunes while swinging off the light fittings. Which really is quite something.

The good news is they will be back in town in April. I strongly advise you catch them. Raging.

Review - Steve Ajao And The Blues Giants - Marrs Bar, Worcester - 18th January

A first visit to play in Worcester, Blues and Jazz artist Steve arrived with Mike Hatton on his custom built 6 string bass battle axe and Pete Hammond, drummer and percussionist. Giants by name and by nature, they launch into 'Hot Little Momma', signalling the bands intent for the evening. A bit of Hendrix, with 'Red House', is an



opening for Mike to demonstrate his talent on his beautifully veneered but still brutish looking bass, taking over the lead from Steve. Steve's deep, gruff, vocals work well with John Lee Hooker's 'Dimples', before going for his 'walkabout' around the Marrs Bar, whilst throwing us some Elmore James with 'It Hurts Me Too'. An opportunity in

the dimmed lighting to see Steve work his Fender guitar, as we ease our way to a beer break, but not before Pete strikes up his drums to take the lead-in to the Surfaris

'Wipe out', a thunderous piece of music to put us on hold as we await a second session.

The Giants return to the stage with 'Money's Getting Cheaper', a Jimmy Witherspoon song, which features on the bands album 'Pure Evil'. 'Evil', is what we get soon enough, but its not all bad, as it precedes a virtuoso performance on the washboard by nimble thimble ace, Pete Hammond. This time it's Pete and Steve doing the rounds, but its the ripping riposte of Pete's galvanised grid that puts a smile on everyone's face. Back to Steve and a bit of hard core rock with Hendrix's 'Stonefree', and a step towards a guitar change for the grand finale. A Delta blues opening and a fabulous finish with the great John Lee Hooker's 'Boogie Chill'. A superb demonstration of Steve's guitar and slide skills, the

Giants version is stretched out to fit in some lovely base notes off Mike before Steve brings the evening to a close. It was an absolute pleasure to hear real blues, played with skill and passion, overlaid with the gritty vocals that are so perfect for such music. The band's first visit, but let's hope there is more to come, they are certainly not given the recognition they deserve.

Meanwhile, they are regular visitors to the Hare & Hounds in Birmingham, and the Hop Pole Inn in Bromsgrove, also look out for

them through the summer. They said they are playing a gig at Upton during the blues festival in July.

Sculptures at Ragley Hall

While doing a sponsored walk around the grounds of **Ragley Hall** in nearby Warwickshire our intrepid reporter Sarah Ganderton had the opportunity to follow a littleused path passing some unusual sculptures. The walk in aid of MacMillian Cancer Trust raised money for the appeal and in addition to the important fund raising and the healthy countryside air, it provided some artistic stimulation. The sculptures on the 3 mile walking route included **Brian Kneale's** 1965 sculpture entitled 'Q + A' and **Peter Hayes'** simply named 'Bench' from 2002.



'Q + A' by Brian Kneale stands out quite jarringly from its natural woodland surroundings. The vivid red painted metal in odd shapes raises more 'Qs' than 'As' so to speak, but Peter Hayes ' Bench' was far more accessible. Affectionately referred to by fellow teenaged walkers as 'the booby bench' (for fairly obvious reasons) it is carved



from wood and at this time of year has collected fallen leaves in its woodland setting, which further enhance its natural feel as it emerges much more subtly from between the trees than ' Q+A'. Yet in its own way it is quite different from anything a walker would expect to find in the forest. The faces and (a-hem) other parts of the characters on the bench are smooth and simply cut yet in its plainness and perhaps in its revealing vulnerability the bench is quite inviting. Although it sits at the top of a fairly steep hill, it's still difficult for walkers to decide whether it is right to sit on this 'Bench' or whether it is best treated as a work of art.

Ragley Hall, the family home of the 9th Marquess and Marchioness of Hertford and their children is open from 22nd March when visitors can pay to walk round just the gardens and youngsters can enjoy the brilliant adventure playground or the whole family can also enjoy the house and café. And until March there are regular art classes running at Ragley Hall, details of which can be found on their website: www.ragley.co.uk

CD Review - Nepenthine

2013 saw a new beginning for three local musicians. They changed their band's name, but more importantly late last year saw the release of their first CD.

Nepenthine is the new band name, an intriguing name it shares with its debut CD. It's a self produced set of songs written by the band as a unit. They claim that all the music is played by humans, so no machines were harmed in its creation.

All three played in The Failed and The Dudes of Neptune before that, so these guys will be known to many local music lovers.

Most tracks clock in at a respectable four to five minutes although "'I Look Away''' is over nine minutes, and doesn't ever feel as if it's over staying its welcome. Next up is a lovely tune that starts with acoustic guitars to the fore,



but halfway through its keyboards that dominate. "The Whole World Changed" has the most up front rock sound to it. The last but one track is a thing of beauty – it's an instrumental coda to the earlier track "Found". After these two tracks the final title track had a difficult act to follow, but it's one of the best, and sounds like it would work well live.

Carl Neale's drumming drives the songs along; bass and some of the guitars are added by Steve Sanchez, while Andy Lee puts his slinky, swirling guitar and keyboards into the mix. The guitar playing is almost worth the price of admission on its own. Their website says that they are technically not great musicians, but I think I think they might be being a bit modest. While the overall sound is a whirlpool of instruments layered on top of each other, it hardly ever sounds cluttered, and the lyrics (written and sung by Carl) come through well.

It's not always easy to spot influences in a band, and I'm sure they wouldn't want to be pigeonholed. But I did find out that all have a liking for the Australian psychedelic band The Church, and cite Nick Drake as an influence. I can hear early 1970s English band (i.e. Traffic) and the Mellotron sound of King Crimson in there.

Radio Hereford and Worcester have been playing tracks from this album, and live work is in the pipeline as well. I found their website quite helpful, indeed its where I got to hear them and bought the CD.

By the way the name Nepenthine doesn't appear to mean anything. The closest the web came up with was nepenthe which was a potion designed to induce selective amnesia or to drown your sorrows. Whichever meaning takes your fancy, this CD won't send you to sleep and it might just drown your sorrows.

Where do I start with this talent from Texas, a sort of one man band only better. Rod has an exceptional, seemingly easy and relaxed style to his excellent acoustic guitar play. Added to that he 'fingers' a Conga snare drum, occasionally adding a uke slung over his back, for a bit of infill, underneath his right boot is a tambourine. An interesting timbre is added to the little drum, by the addition of two small mint tins, suitably loaded with mints, and perhaps a few nuts? Now you would think that would all come at the expense of his guitar fingering, but no, busy hands indeed, because he plays beautifully, everything from some superb blues to guitar solos with more 'Hispanic' roots. Though Rod plays a fair slice of his gig acoustically, he does switch on the vocals, no problem there, delivering some very good strong lyrics. He sort of reminds me of Wille Edwards from Wille And The Bandits, a similar expressive voice, giving us songs guestioning our modern world.

I picked up 2 albums, a 2012 'Sketches' and 2013 release 'Nothing Better To Do'. Both turn out to be fine albums, 'Sketches' is dipped into extensively for his gig, and is a broad range of music that is hard to fault. The later 2013 album is decidedly more blues in its content, though Rod seemed slightly apologetic about this, I found it very easy to play through and like. where Rod takes up two guitars, for his 'flip trick', and plays them simultaneously. At first stood up with the two acoustics almost double decked, and then the flip to a seated position with one slung across his knee and the other sat vertically to his left; working the fret on the left side as he fingered the guitar across his knee. An amazing sight and sound as 'Slot Machine' merged into 'The Clean Up', both from 'Sketches'. A brilliant acoustic finish to an extraordinary evening of exceptional musicianship. Scottish 80's legends **Deacon Blue** return for a sellout night on their Christmas Tour. Deacon Blue had a busy 2013 as in addition to this tour they played T In The Park and released a EP with the new festive offering "You'll Know It's Christmas".

Formed in 1985 Deacon Blue alongside fellow Glasgow bands Wet Wet Wet and Hue and Cry, went on to become Top Ten multi million single & album selling artists. In 1987 they released the criticality acclaimed album, "Rain Town", but it was the release of their second album, "When the World Knows Your Name", that saw them gain real commercial success, with a number one album and five hit singles from it – "Real Gone Kid" being the most notable one.

In 1994 drummer Dougie Vipond decided to leave and pursue a career in television and the band split up. But in 1999 they got back together and made the album, "Walking Back Home". The line up has since then been pretty constant, with Ricky Ross and wife Lorraine McIntosh on vocals, Dougie Vipond on drums, James Prime on keyboards, Lewis Gordon on bass who replaced Ewen Vernal and Gregor Philp who replaced Graeme Kelling who sadly died of pancreatic cancer in 2004.

Their ever loyal following thoroughly enjoyed the 2 hour set of material from their 27 years of working together. With old favourites "Dignity", "Real Gone Kid", and "Fergus Sings the Blues", "When Jackie Jumped Jail" and "The Hipsters" all getting an airing, this confirmed that The Deacons can still really put on a show for their fans.

I had seen them before a couple of years ago at the

Cornbury Festival, playing to a general audience and they still gave a great performance that was well received. They finished their Brum set off with a rendition of Bobby Dylan's *"Forever Young"* with **Ricky Ross** telling one of his legendary stories talking us through the no expense spared Christmas stage set of two inflatable reindeers, a Christmas tree and fairy lights that cost the princely sum of £35 Scottish pounds!

Starting the New Year in style Deacon Blue put in a appearance on Johnny Walker's Radio 2 show chatting and playing "*Rain Town*" and *"When the World Knows Your Name"*. Long may they continue.

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Review- The Stiff Joints - 'Circus On Repeat' EP

On Christmas Eve there drops another parcel of chequered super charged two tone fun from the distant lights of Kiddy carpet land; indeed here they are the chirpy chappies of the hour dressed in assorted regalia like muppets on a gatefold sleeve. Just what we need when the only grim gifts this year seem perpetual pestilence, bleak austerity, ludicrous legislation, ecentric energy prices and a lingering sense of Severn Valley Inertia .. Ahem.

Title track '*Circus On Repeat*' opens with a melody that later evolves from simple horn motif to a rousing chorus, taking a surprise detour with a ratty ragtime knees up break down!

In its two & half minutes The Stiff Joints seamlessly reinvent their own refined sound, streamlining their lenghthy live work outs to concise songcraft.

'Pineapple Sundae' meanwhile, is a jauntier skank with a pungent air of Blur meets The Specials. What is striking here is the use of pollychords; affording every instrument the space it desires in conjunction with the slick production, they are onto a winner! Indeed two tracks in and this devilishly dynamic dittie unfolds from Hawaiian infused guitar opening, to a horn speckled concoction celebrating life's bitter roots with a twangy zest!

The Stiff Joints sound is always one of groove leaden bass dub, choppy guitars, leslie soaked keyboards & eclectic celebratory horns, all of which are happily intact here!


'Dubshire' (the longest track here) is full of tenacious tempo changes and cheeky quasi court jester refrains. I'm not sure which principality (shire) the cheeky muppets are referring to here, but I'm sure anywhere in the three counties we can relate to the inner city lining of ambiguity interwoven in the hustle and bustle

of urban life!

'CAM' is more like third wave skacore of Mighty Boss Tones or Goldfinger but retains their melodious magpie eye!

Closer 'Wish You Were Mine' is so jaunty it reminds me of the seaside for some reason! Maybe that's the point? I would say it's like chirpy Chas & Dave ska but who the hell would believe me?

Elsewhere there's comedic breathers 'Swinging Yer Sack' and the driven unhinged 'Bosh Bosh' offering a bit of a laugh after a sneaky biff!



So in conclusion; bands of this caliber are deserving of laudation, adoration and support: Buy this! Allow these lads a chance of slapping a fair few people out of their collective Severn Valley Inertia!!

The message of The Stiff Joints is one of living in the moment and enjoying what we have in the now, this ethos is serving them well as on 15th March the Stiffies support Bad Manners at The Robin 2!

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
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Review - Mike Sanchez & The Potions at Robin 2 - Dec 18th

Mike Sanchez is an R&B institution, he has been everywhere, and played with numerous top bands, in addition to his own line up. He was also responsible for introducing the wonderful Imelda May, who sand with Mike Sanchez's band for many years. Now here at The Robin, Bilston, playing in his personable style, bringing us the the boogie woogie sounds he has championed. He tells us about his forthcoming biography, Mike Sanchez' Big Town Playboy, to be published soon, and being written by Mike Madden. 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
