### **Woo Fest Woos the Students**

Worcester Music Festival has moved to a later date in a bid to involve more students in the local music scene. This year's event will run from Friday September 18 to Sunday September 20 to coincide with Freshers' Week at the University Of Worcester. Chairman Ant Robbins said "There are many local festivals in August this year which got us thinking about other dates that might work well". WMF was launched in 2008 and raises money for different charities each year - last year benefitting Worcestershire Young Carers to the tune of £4600 - great work guys!

### **II est Tom Forbes**

Inkberrow singer-songwriter **Tom Forbes** was inspired by recent events in France to pen a song **Je Suis Charlie** - about the worldwide wave of solidarity in support of free speech following the Paris attacks. The video has already attracted many Youtube hits and has been well-received in France as well - good work from a fine young talent!

### **Search for a Star**

Worcestershire County Cricket Club are hoping to stage a concert featuring a 'megastar' at New Road in mid-July as part of their 150th anniversary year celebrations. Commercial director Jon Graham said that as they needed to sell 16,000 tickets - they were looking to attract a massive star of the order of Elton John - who sold out the ground with his memorable show in 2006.

### Don't Panic - It's Nozstock

The theme for the 2015 **Nozstock Festival**, now in its 17th year, will be '*Nozstocker*'s *Guide To The Galaxy*' - first artists for the event which runs from July 24 to 26 to be announced shortly! More than 5000 people flocked to Bromyard last year to see **Fun Lovin' Criminals, Roots Manuva** and many other local, national and international acts...

### **Opportunity for Young Acts**

Worcestershire County Council's youth music service in partnership with **Worcester Music Festival** has been looking for a young act to represent the county at OMG Live at the LG Arena on Birmingham on Sunday 19 April. **Brian Hoggard**, head of contemporary music at **Worcestershire Youth Music** said "This was a great chance to showcase our best young acts and give them a chance to play a decent sized gig".

### **UB** at Wychwood

Wychwood Festival have announced that a reunited UB40 will be headliners on the Saturday night of the event at Cheltenham Racecourse from Friday 29 May to Sunday 31 - also on the billing for the 11th year of the event are **The Proclaimers, Dreadzone** and many more...

### Kings & Folk's Angel Gabriel

Worcester family foursome **Kings And Folk** have released their second album *Branching Out* which was recorded at Peter Gabriel's Real World Studio in Wiltshire. Violinist **Claire King** from Claines said "We recorded it live in the Wood Room -a fantastic space with great acoustics and bandmate lan had the chance to use the piano Peter Gabriel used on his European tour which had just finished the day before". K&F were winners of the **Bath Folk Festival New Shoots** Competition in 2013 - and the album features guest vocals from **Colette Todd** who's previously toured the world with **Riverdance and Lord Of The Dance**.

### **Hillbilies Holland Hoedown**

Foot-tapping bluegrass/country outfit **Woo Town Hillbillies** are the latest local act to venture abroad to great acclaim, completing a ten-day tour of the Netherlands at the end of last year. Frontman **Luke Wurmli**, who plays banjo, guitar and harmonica alongside bandmates **Emmy Lou Quan, Simon Othen, Goose Goldberg** and **Paul Smith** said "We played to some packed-out venues but the gig at Den Helder was most memorable". Must ask them why...?

### Do Not Read if Eating!

Otto Schimmelpenninck, bassist for Dutch symphonic metal band has spoken out about a recent incident where he ruptured his left testicle on stage, but continued on to finish the gig. The band were playing in Birmingham when he was hit in the groin by a streamer cannon - he said "In my enthusiasm I did not pay attention, and happened to be VERY close when the streamer fired. During the next song, the pain got worse to the point where I could barely stay conscious anymore, but I did manage to finish the show." Schimmelpenninck then went on to describe how he was taken to hospital following the gig and how his "scrotum was the size of a grapefruit". He's hoping to be well enough to rejoin the band's forthcoming European tour.

#### **New studio in Malvern**

A new rehearsal room and recording studio is opening in West Malvern. **The Funky Bunker** will have a fully equipped rehearsal space with all the mics, amps and drums you might need alongside a bespoke multitrack recording facility with more channels than you could shake a drumstick at! ### **Breaking Bands Festival**

With just nineteen weeks to go until the start of the inaugural 3 day *Breaking Bands Festival* it's all getting very busy behind the scenes with 30% of the tickets already sold. The festival takes place at the centrally located **Stoke Prior Sports and Country Club** in Bromsgrove, on the bank holiday weekend of 22-24th May 2015. The day splits have already been announced with day tickets now on sale, as well as weekend tickets that include the VIP Friday night and camping.

Special guests for Friday night are **Voodoo Vegas**, a rock band from Brighton, who have recently shared the stage with Status Quo on their European tour. The other acts are local punk band **Thirteen Shots**, Midlands based **Martyr De Mona** and sub headliners **The Heretic Order**. Saturday and Sunday sees a whole host of rock, punk and metal acts on The Session Studio's Main Stage as well as the *Get Your Rock Out Acoustic Stage*. NWOBHM act **Monument** will see Saturday night out in style with their warm up act being London based rock band **Death Valley Knights**. On Sunday it gets heavier with **Morgue Orgy** confirmed as the sub-headline band warming up for the final act of the weekend **Breed 77**, who have already announced that this is their only gig of 2015 as they are locked in the studio working on a new album.

We can also announce that there will be comedy from **Badaxe** and **Ross Lee** and the fantastic **Moomin Merchandise** will be supplying us with some very amazing laser artwork for sale over the weekend. On site there are brick toilets and showers, trade stalls and real ales with top quality hot and cold food all weekend including breakfasts!

At one point, even when I got my ticket in hand I was already thinking, how am I going to translate this big chunk of my life into my new project?

**MOVEMENT** are delighted to present *Departures* by **Alicia Framis**, an artwork which allows the gallery visitor to travel from the station to made-up or imaginary cities from the worlds of philosophy, literature, architecture and science fiction.

The departure boards with fanciful journeys to literary and fictional destinations including Neverland and Utopia, evoke the tense, nervous and escapist energy of a busy departure hall; except here all journeys are seen as either boarding or on time. Framis lays bare how everyday practicalities both fuel and inhibit our longing to lose ourselves in alternate worlds.

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Alicia Framis' (1967 Barcelona, ES) multi-disciplinary artwork blends together architecture, design and performance while incorporating different aspects of human existence within contemporary urban society thus provoking the mainstream. Her work has been showed in numerous leading museums and galleries: Centre Contemporary Art Brugge (2014), MUSAC, Castilla y Léon (2014), Museum voor Moderne Kunst Arnhem (2013), MIGROS Museum für Gestaltung Zurich (2013), Royal Academy of the Arts London (2011), Museu Picasso Barcelona (2010), Museum on the Seam, Jerusalem (2010), Institute Cervantes Beijing (2009), Museum of Modern Art Shanghai (2006), Palais de Tokyo, Paris (2002), MACBA, Barcelona (2000), Stedelijk Museum Bureau Amsterdam (1997).



She represented the Netherlands in the Dutch Pavillon at 50th Venice Riennial (2003)

Her work is part of the collection of a.o.: Rabobank (Netherland), Museum Boijmans van Beuningen (Netherland), Migros Museum für Gegenwartskunst (Switzerland), MUSAC Museo de Arte Contemporáneo de Castilla y León (Spain), as well as various private collections.

**MOVEMENT** gallery is a departure, a change, a stopover, or an arrival – it's a point along a journey and a geographically democratic site for the production and presentation of contemporary art. Due to our location on a rail transport system we aim to conceptually take the passenger on many different journeys through time and space, commissioning work by international contemporary artists to be shown at the station. Alongside its physical base, MOVEMENT also commissions offsite projects, utilising trains and the rail network as a site for networking art practice across the UK, into Europe and beyond.

MOVEMENT is a not for profit company limited by guarantee, initiated by Nina Coulson and Alexander Johnson from artist-led family Yoke and Zoom. It is a micro-gallery, located in what was once a redundant gentleman's toilet that fronts directly onto Platform 2 of Worcester Foregate Street Railway Station. 

Bunraku (almost life-size) puppets are cast of the company – and not to be missed! (See advert...)




# Saltmine Theatre Company presents John Newton Amazing Grace Swan Theatre, Worcester | Fri 27th Feb

His career collaborations list is an immense one and can boast such luminaries as Richard Thompson, June Tabor, Kelly Joe Phelps, Jackson Browne, Danny Thompson, Danú, Martin Carthy, Cara Dillon, David Lindley, Roy Bailey, Martin Taylor, David Hidalgo, Steve Miller, Dick



Gaughan and many more. Martin has been nominated an astounding 26 times in the twelve years of the **BBC Radio 2 Folk Awards** - more than any other performer - with 9 consecutive years as nominee for **Musician of The Year**, which he has won twice. We shall be out in force to report on proceedings and hope to see you all there also!

### Featured Artist Marcia Pheysey-Wilton

Marcia Pheysey-Wilton is best known for her colourful textiles and felt work seen at craft fairs and in exhibitions across the county. Always drawing as a child, she went on to art college after GCSEs, following it with a BA(Hons) in 3D Design:Metalwork & Jewellery at Sheffield, then a PGCE in Further Education. She wanted to teach; going on to do for around 10 years and finding her calling as a textile artist during this time.

"This is where I started to get into textiles, starting to develop my own work; teaching was brilliant for keeping you inspired, I loved the creative environment & being surrounded by like - minded people. Starting a family slowed things down a bit, as I went part-time but this also gave me an opportunity to develop my work more."



"Inspirations are vast; I love a lot of 1950's print particularly Lucienne Day and I guess some of my work tends to have quite a retro style (50's-70's), if I'm working in print or applique. I take inspiration from nature (I spent quite some time slightly obsessed with trees!) my purses featuring this quite heavily, and I loved to layer fabrics & stitch - I think some of this work had quite a naive feel to it. Contemporary textiles motivate me too- the kind of work that challenges our concept of what textiles is - particularly work featuring text, such as Tilleke Schwarz."

"I work quite differently between textiles and felt-making. I don't work with felt as much these days, as I find the process quite time-consuming. I tend to work in an abstract style - I layer my fibres up like a painter does with paint. That's how it works for me - I add hand or machine stitch on top, or even some small areas of appliqué. A lot of the work is based on image's from under a microscope - often viruses, for example. They're amazing images to look at, with shapes & forms that I can translate using felt."

"My textiles work is very much about items to sell - clasp purses, toiletry bags, clutch bags. I started developing a range back in 2010, working with twead fabrics or other quite heavy fabrics & coloured clasps. I had my work accepted by madebyhandonline.com. I took a break from it all when I had

my second daughter in 2011 and have been slowly getting back in to it again over the past year."

"Colour is massively important in my work - both with felt & my textiles. I love trying out combinations together, and it's part of my work that I feel confident in - I suppose I'd say that I have a good eye for it.



I'm challenging myself by developing work that is more print-based. I've had to find ways & methods that I can do with very little specialist equipment, but which still looks professional. I've pushed this as I think I can produce work that might have a wider appeal, and is quicker to produce. I still love layering appliqué & stitch, but I'm loving the scope for developing the print based work."

"Current projects are a real mixed bag for me at the moment. I've got work in an exhibition at Worcester County Hall, I'm starting some after school craft clubs, there is some adult education teaching work in the pipeline & I'm building up stock/developing work to sell online & at craft fairs. My main struggle is marketing myself, but that's something that I'm hoping I can get better at this year, as I'm able to focus on it more. There are plans to get work online with Folksy & Etsy, and I've recently set up a Facebook page - Made by Marcia so small steps & pushing myself to network more. My motivation these days is to hopefully work towards getting a good balance of teaching work & selling my own work for the future."

### Sons Of The Delta The Marrs Bar | Fri 23 Jan '15

Friday evening and, sadly, only a few people ventured out after a cold day and a post Christmas bank balance. They missed something rather special wrapped within the Marrs Bar.

First up was Gloucester (né New York) blues man **Damon T**. **He** may have been raised in the Big Apple but his music is from the deep south, rooted firmly in the Mississippi Delta. Damon's set is short but very memorable.



Sons Of The Delta are a four-piece band playing blues but melted down and remodelled to their own form. That form brings a bit of sparkle and fun to the set with Mark Cole back on stage accompanied by Rick Edwards on an eclectic selection of guitars, Lyndon Webb playing bass and Martin Fitzgibbons on drums.



Apart from the recycled blues with extra spring in its tail, there is an eclectic mix of stringed implements - a fine bass guitar is partnered with a splendid stick bass, which resembles a folded down parasol; various odd Japanese vintage guitars like the white sensuously curved Supro (sounding glorious with a slide); a neat violin shaped Teiso; and Rick's black and white Silvertone (aside from the generic Fenders and a Mandolin). The resulting tonal variations, whether chords or slide, added a touch of magic to the performance.

For all those snuggled down in front of their fires deriding the miserable TV offering, shame on you - you missed a brilliant evening in the company of a talented **Damon T** and a wonderful, musically entertaining, passionate blues band **Sons Of The Delta**.

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### **Claude Bourbon**

### The Fleece, Bretforton | Sun 30 Nov '14

**Claude Bourbon** is an enigma; he is a classically trained musician, who fuses every conceivable genre of acoustic guitar music into a master-class of a stage performance. There are Latin, Spanish, Gypsy, jazz and delta blues influences throughout and often within one seamless stream of perfection.

He started with a long, distinctly Spanish sound of water babbling over a rocky shallow bed, before opening to lush rolling hills. Somewhere along the way it slipped into 'If You Go Away' from Flemish writer Jaques Brel and lyricist Rod McKuen - an appropriately cross-channel success. Also rather



fitting given the extensive European and US tour of 170 gigs is an exceptional song from his repertoire, 'The Road Is Long'.

What came next I find hard to describe - an almost endless amalgam of different influences melting into each other as we moved from classical openings, across a whole continent of cultural roots, from the Balearics to the Balkans and then across to the Mississippi Delta. Shoe-horned into all that was music that would not have been amiss in the courts of emperors and kings. In all of that I must give mention to a beautiful rendition of Gershwin's 'Summertime' - there are of course many interpretations out there but this is up with there with the best. It's not easy to begin to describe the breadth or mastery of the music you will hear, if fortunate to catch one of Claude's gigs.

This year's celebration was again destined for Tewkesbury, spiritual home of the band, at the **Park Hotel Golf and Country Club**. At the start, the 'murder' of fans gathered for a buffet in one of the restaurants. We were urged to move to the main function room and join guests, who were enjoying a full dinner to be followed by disco dance. Much to their surprise it was now going to become a bit more crowded and the music was to be live!

I had been fortunate enough to see Cheltenham band **Hawthornes** support 3 Daft Monkeys only a few weeks ago and they left an impression. Here they performed a much more expansive set, with a mix of self penned and 'borrowed' songs. It has to be said **Louisa** is a delightful vocalist and is ably assisted by **Jesse** on cajon and **Gordy** on bass. Their genre is alternative folk/punk, which comfortably sits with the Crows. With songs from Elvis, Marley, The Monkees ('*Im A Believer*'!) and even an enthusiastic take from Outkast ('*Hey Ya*'), it was a great little set.



There was not much delay before **The Roving Crows** kicked the evening up a gear. The floor space soon choked, as any area found between tables became tributaries of bubbling rapids, feeding the wild waters of the dance floor. Trumpeter **Greg**, bassist **Loz** and **Tim** on drums, were very much in the shadows - definitely heard if not seen – as **Paul** and **Caitlin** lead the celebrations.

It is New Year's Eve and the band are in their element as the catalogue of songs pour out to the revellers surrounding them. 'You're a Long-time Dead', so get up and party the band implore us, 'White Petticoats' scorches the ground with its



blistering pace, as feet struggle to keep up. This may be the zenith of the winter but 'Days In The Sun' are not so far away so why not bring in a little sunshine.

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
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# Larry Miller The Iron Road, Evesham | Wed 21 Jan 15

The Iron Road has been very busy lately laving a new track and it's going straight into the heartlands of the blues. The buffers were blown aside by the explosive guitar in the hands of Larry Miller, stalwart electric blues man, with a highly rated new album 'Soldier On The Line'. He finds his inspiration in great rock blues guitarists like Hendrix, Gallagher (that's Rory not Noel!) and Johnny Winter but he stands in his own right as a truly talented writer and guitarist extraordinaire.

I had last seen Larry at Upton Blues Festival but in this atmospheric 'station' he seemed more at home with plenty of cheeky comments and Del Boy attitude. Taken from the 'Soldiers of the Line' album (which is drawn from images of the first world war) 'One Fine Day' is a truly beautiful, soulful ballad - here played in its stripped down form it seemed even more poignant.

This is the first time I've ventured over the threshold of this born-again roadhouse and I have to say, for me, there is a mouth-watering selection on the forthcoming musical menu - the fabulous Davina and The Vagabonds (just go): Mud Morganfield (son of Muddy Waters) and Mike Zito to name but few. What's more, it's one of the few venues where you can actually catch a train to, have time to see the whole set and travel that track along The Iron Road.



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## Allstars Dub Band The Chestnut | Sat 20th Dec '14


Saturday night and I found myself headed off to the Chestnut as I often do to take in some live music. On this particular evening back in late December it was the **Allstars Dub Band** who I'd first seen about nine months previously at the very same venue and really wanted to see again.

As usual for the regular live music slot on Saturday the Chestnut was busy with a mix of regulars and people who'd come along especially to see the band. The set included a mix of roots reggae, dub re-workings of a couple of classic songs and a sound in which the influences cited by the band of Adrian Sherwood and Lee 'Scratch' Perry were evident.

A number of their own compositions were also included and introduced elements of ska which provided a refreshing change of tempo. The band who come from Malvern have been around since 2010 with a number of personnel changes along the way. The current line up is underpinned by the rhythms of **Steve Price** on bass and **Martin Parry** (once of the Fine Young Cannibals) on drums. Over this are the fine keyboards of **Rachel Poloni**, the soaring saxophone and percussion sounds of **Mr Phil 'Aytch' Howard** and the guitar, vocals and mixing skills of **Phil Linell**. Highlights for this punter included covers of *Man Next Door* and *Hard Times* alongside dub re-workings of the Bill Withers classic *Ain't No Sunshine* (Dubshine!) and T Rex's *Children of the Revolution*. Of their own numbers, *I am the Law*, a ska number stood out and got people dancing, while the dub number *Frustration* 



was also excellent. Along with the music the steady supply of the four real ales always available at the Chestnut kept this writer happy and the crowd despite demanding and getting two encores was still left wanting more. Sadly a check of Facebook reveals that 'Aytch's dodgy old gnashers' have suffered from years of playing the sax and he has been told by no less than his dentist to stop playing so there's only a few more encores left for this line up of the band. So catch them while you can.



### The Lion and the Wolf Jimmy Broomfield / Swampeye Heroes, Worcester | Wed 10th Dec

It was argued by some that the mainstream success of Frank Turner and all that would inevitably take the energy out of the alternative singer-songwriter genre, and signal its doom as a vehicle for edgy and original storytelling. As soon as a style gets big, it becomes uncool. So the argument went. As with all simplistic readings of the ways and tides of the artistic underground, this is of course utter bollocks. This intimate little show in the cellar-like back bar at Heroes being a case in point. And here's some words about who played.

**Swampeye** (real name Sandy MacPherson). A loose-stringed, moody set of US country and folk covers and original material. The Neil Young number in particular was sweetly done, but it was this lad's own stuff, obviously coming right from the heart, that projected clear above the bar noise and sucked in the audience to silence. Opening this bill in this venue was a big ask. And a quiet room is the hard-won mark of success in the acoustic game.

Jimmy Broomfield. A clubbable fellow from way away down there in the New Forest. Told his artfully self-deprecating stories of being really crap with girls and generally being really fucking sad with a genuine charisma and a smile. This juxtaposition of positive and easily-projected humanity with deep, deep melancholy was a potent combination.



The Lion and the Wolf. Now. This chap – Thomas George is a grafter. Almost permanently on tour for the last year. And one of the brightest exponents of the modern-day troubadour...thing. This was a stripped down recital of his intricately arranged and multi-instrumental long player (Symptoms) - so stripped down in fact that he didn't even bother to use the microphone for a couple of tracks, singing his intensely human, sometimes warm, sometimes tragedian stories of everyday poetry and joy completely raw. Watch for this fellow on the crest of the second wave of the alternative singer-songwriter. He deserves to be there.

### **Hattie Briggs**

### Gardeners Arms, Droitwich | Thurs 11th dec '14

The last couple of months have been hectic around these parts, obviously I've had to endure another Christmas in the wonderful world of retail and then on top of that I've been (and now completed) moving house, so there has been little time for live music. but the one exception to that has been the Slap nights over at The Gardeners Arms in Droitwich, a once a month session, featuring the best live music has to offer. To date the pub has held host to a number of up and comers as well as a few established names from around the local scene.

December saw the turn of a bona-fide star in the making, sensational singer-songwriter and Radio 2 Young Folk Musician nominee, **Hattie Briggs**, a performer who's already released a couple of critically acclaimed singles, performed across the UK and in recent times has been recording her debut album, which should see the light in the near future.

Gardeners had a smattering of people dotted round the bar, but as soon as Hattie opened her mouth with that stunning, soulful croon, everyone immediately focused their attention. At times during Hattie's set you could hear a pin drop as she captured one and all with her bewitching set.

Whether Hattie was using a sparse, strummed acoustic or accompanied herself with piano tinkerings, every song was filled with heart and passion. delivered beautifully by Hattie's warm and tender voice. Originals such as Pull Me Down, Tilly's Song and Old Eyes were lapped up with relish, whilst the hand picked renditions of Kathy's Song (Paul Simon) and Fields Of Gold (Sting/Eva Cassidy) mesmerised. bettering the originals (in this scribes humble opinion) as Hattie breathed new life into weathered old material.

Hattie delivered a gorgeous, understated yet throughly engaging set, leaving the Gardeners regulars longing for more and once again proving that the regular Slap nights very much a

monthly must see attracting only the very best in live music.

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Cheltenham's post-punk / progressive alt-rock trio I,The Lion work up some of the most stylish LOUD and towering guitar music you'll experience. They're also searing live and are steadily building a solid following. In an age where a new wave of rock may be back on the ascendant and with an upcoming release (Run) about to drop, SLAP Mag caught up with them to talk influences, perfectionism and future plans.

SLAP - I, The Lion - hello. How's it going?

Elliot: Things are pretty swell in camp Lion. How are you?

We're good gents, thank you. Now. For readers that may be new to you, can you tell us a little more about yourselves?

**Elliot:** I'm Elliot and I play guitar and sometime sing, Chris mainly sings and bongs a bass, and Nath hits things. We're a three piece post-punk band from Cheltenham, been going about 4 years now.

**SLAP** - I see you have a new EP (Run) on the blocks – how would you describe it?

**Chris:** It's heavy and melodic with lots of timing changes throughout.

**Elliot**: It's pretty much a blend of all our influences. We were listening to a lot of Biffy Clyro, Arcane Roots, and Finch at the time.

**Elliot:** And early Twin Atlantic. Big fan of the Vivarium album. Have also been told we're for fans of At The Drive In?

**Nath**: And Three Trapped Tigers, definitely influenced the drums.

**SLAP** - You've paid your DIY dues but recorded the new one with a professional producer **Jason Wilson** (You Me At Six, We Are The Ocean) down in that London. What's the story there?

Elliot: Every release we've done has been self-recorded since we did music at college. But we were offered to work with Jason, and with the representation he has it felt like the right time to do it.

**Nath:** It was good to have that extra perspective on the record to make it the best it can be.

Elliot: Yeah he really worked us the right way, we definitely made the right choice going with him and we'll be back.

**SLAP** -You seem to be perfectionists – is this fair?

Nath: Very much so!

**Elliot:** Tides and Tales [released 2013] took a long time to get out because we spent so much time trying to get it perfect.

**Chris:** And releasing Hold Strong [lead track on the Run EP] took a while to release because we wanted to make sure it was spot on.

**Elliot:** We even went back to record extra bits 6 months after recording. But its probably true of us as song writers as well, recording the same riff over and over until its perfect.

**SLAP** - Some – including the venerable Steve Albini – argue we are living in a golden age of DIY, and the prospects for nonsigned artists have never been better. What's your take on this?

**Chris:** You can self promote yourself pretty easily these days as well as record to a high standard but its not the same as working with people with the experience.

**Elliot:** Its a double edged sword really. Its great being able to do these things, but when anyone with a laptop can do it the competition is fierce between some seriously talented artists.

**Nath:** And because its less exclusive people are less willing to buy the product since there's so much available.

**SLAP** - Yeah. There is that. Are labels in the traditional sense still relevant do you think?

Chris: For me, if I want to hear music that I like, I'll go to labels I know like BSM or Alcopop. So having these labels producing good releases means signing to them opens you up to their fan base and clientele.

**Nath:** Genre-specific labels are more relevant than general labels because they offer that sort of service where you can check out their bands and find something you like straight away. Unless its a huge established label whose contacts are able to help you.

**SLAP** - Like some other local DIY heroes – *Stillbust, Guerilla Monsoon, Fights and Fires* – you tour hard. You seemed to go down pretty well at last year's **2000 Trees Fest** from what I am told. How was all that for you?

**Elliot**: Yeah 2000 Trees was a pretty ace point in recent memory.

Chris: It's a great festival we love, so to play it was really good.

**Elliot:** And to get the response we got as well was incredible. First on and the tent was full which made our whole weekend. We gave away our CD after and all 200 copies were gone in less than a minute!



**SLAP** - There are those that would compare you to Young Guns and that whole Zane Lowe band continuum - which is no bad thing – but while your sound is undeniably ripe for newly rock-friendly commercial radio, there seems to be a lot of layering, depth and reflection in what you do. What do you think?

Elliot: Its nice someone noticed the layering and depth!

**Chris:** People normally don't notice that, they tend to say 'that's heavy', or 'that's aggressive, you're sweaty'.

[SLAP!: Hey. I'm a... professional. It's my job to notice]

**Chris:** Once Run is released hopefully people will be able to hear the smaller details below the loud exterior. And this the also first time we've been called commercial!

**Elliot:** But like you said its not a bad thing, hopefully it means people will like the record. Last year rock album sales were the highest they had been in something like 20 years which is promising!

**Chris:** I think if you listen to any band you'll hear the depth and layers in the record, but we do make an effort to do something different that challenges ourselves as well as challenging the listeners.

Chris: like to make my hands and feet confused.

**SLAP** - There appears to be a lot happening musically – particularly punk in all its varieties - down in Cheltenham (and Gloucester) at the moment: **Stillbust** already mentioned, **Lanterns**, **Oui Legionnaires** and a few more, the **Two Pigs** and the **Guildhall** putting on great shows recently. How does it look from down there?

**Chris:** The Guildhall just got Dan Charles who's booking some really decent bands, and with the commercialising of rock music more people are coming to shows.

**Elliot:** And at the moment in the area there are some really great promoters like Shoot Your Hoops and EPA Promotions who are putting on great shows.

**Chris:** As well as putting on bands people really want to see, they're giving way to new bands as well.

**SLAP** - And is there anyone from your local scene that you want to give a shout out to?

**Chris:** *Empire*, they're going to be big this year with their new album coming out. They also have a new single out the same day as our new EP, so lots of new music for people.

Elliot: Oui Legionnaires, they're always ace at every show.

**Chris:** Solemn Sun too. We just listened to their new vinyl which is good. They took a risk changing their style but its really worked well for them.

**SLAP** - And who are you listening to in the van at the moment?

**Elliot**: Physics House Band is on repeat for me, as well as Three Trapped Tigers.

Chris: We had the new Mastodon CD on the other day.

Elliot: It melted my brain.

**Chris:** Arcane Roots too, they're been on there for about a year. And Reuben, they're always coming back out.

**SLAP** - Beyond the new EP, what's on the agenda for 2015?

Chris: Festivals! Tour!

**Elliot:** We've got our new single 'Icarus' coming very soon, and then a double music video coming near the summer. But we're already writing loads of material for our debut album which we're recording on the back half of the year.

**SLAP** - Busy times in camp Lion then.

### l, The Lion - Run **EP**

It's always kind of life-affirming when something as technically accomplished and vital as this pings into the musical bucket. This four track EP – professionally produced, but wholly creatively owned and released by the band

themselves – takes just about everything that is soaring, shredding and soulful from the past quarter of a century of post-hardcore punk and intelligent guitar music and moulds it into something new and interesting. The twisting time changes and dischords are progressive as hell,



but they serve as a compliment to the millisecond-perfect lyrical hooks and harmonies that cut through all four tracks here. This is quietly but extremely polished stuff. And it could easily slip down on that polished surface into the fey, one-dimensional territory of Twin Atlantic or the "emo" pop-punk of All Time Low and You Me At Six – and lose its guts and soul in the process. The fact it doesn't, and that underneath all the intricate structure and craftsmanship you find a rock solid heart and a keen brain – makes for something exciting and inspirational that you have to basically stand back from and salute. Recommended. And do actually buy this. Because then they will have the cash make more like it. Which would be a very good thing.

### **Wild Willy Barrett's French Connection** Evesham Arts Centre | Sat 21st Feb '15

Directed by Godfather of Grunge Folk Wild Willy Barrett, this dynamic quartet will be importing a touch of "ooh-la-la" to Evesham Arts Centre this February:- featuring new French singer Aurora Colson, cellist Mary Holland and Irish musician John Devine.

The show will feature selections from their new album 'Cat in a Circus' which is an original melange of French, Irish and English acoustic arrangements, using everything from a guitar pipes, this has been an interesting year, having also played at and cello, to Irish pipes and banjo.

The group was born during a chance encounter in 2002, when Willy approached an enchanting cellist he saw performing with a belly-dancing troupe.

"Willy was living on the Grand Union canal near Tring, Herts. He saw and heard me playing and dancing in the garden of a pub close to where his boat was moored and came rushing over with the immortal words 'would you like to join my band?'

"I knew who he was, but I must confess to being a bit suspicious as to whether it was the cello playing or me he was interested in, so it took several phone calls and lots of persuading for me to audition for the band. Turns out, he was interested in both - we are now married."

### The Albion Christmas Band Huntington Hall | Thurs 18th Dec '14

Ho ho hold on.....weren't this lot here this time last year.... and the year before. Indeed they were. This has been an annual event at the Hall for some years now and manages a good crowd each year. The Christmas Band being 'The Guv'nor', Ashley Hutchings (Fairport Convention, Steeleye Span, Albion Band) on Bass, Simon Nicol (Fairport Convention) on Guitar, Simon Care (Edward II) on Melodeon and Kellie While on Vocals, Guitar and Percussion. It is a simple but effective sound.

Now, as you would imagine, the evening is all things festive from traditional Carols and contemporary seasonal songs through to festive poems, humorous readings and Jigs, Polkas and Hornpipes with something Wintery in the title.

The evening starts with a Sussex Carol, On Christmas Night All Christians Sing, but fear not Atheists and Agnostics, there is plenty for us too, let's face it, you don't have to believe in Wizards to enjoy Prog Rock so you don't have to believe in God to enjoy a few Christmas songs and Carols. Next up is The King, a song in praise of the Wren. This is followed by a set of tunes by Melodeon Maestro Simon Care called Snowchains/The Obvious Jig. Then Kellie While sings a beautiful version of the 1980's Tears For Fears hit Mad World. I think this one sneaks in because it made Christmas number one for Gary Jules in 2003. The Guv'nors turn next with the self penned song Mr Trill which drifts neatly into The Gloucester Hornpipe. A satirical reading of the Nativity from Simon Nicol, another song from Kellie While, December in New York, written by Thea Gilmore and a further reading from Simon Care on why men can't remember followed by a set of



'Box' driven tunes, A Calling on Song/The Hogmanay, takes us to the break.

The second set is much the same and starts with an Edward Thomas poem read by Ashley Hutchings. Numerous other traditional Carols are offered up along the way, with the Band swapping vocals, these include Silent Night, The Holly Bears a Berry, a beautiful version of In the Bleak Midwinter, once again sung by Kellie While. We Three Kings and God Rest Ye Merry Gentlemen. Other festive songs include a James Taylor number with Simon Nicol taking lead vocals, The January Man sung by Kellie While and Christmas 1914, a song written by Mike Harding which is a poignant and moving commemoration of the famous Christmas truce in the Trenches told from the perspective of an ordinary British and ordinary German Soldier. We then get another poetry reading, this time Ashley Hutchings reads John Clare's Snow Storm. There is also time for a humorous reading from Simon Care on the price of the twelve days of Christmas. I think it worked out at £1,891.00. This revelation brings us to the encore, a set of Jigs and a final song, The Seven Joys of Mary.

This is the 16th year the Band have toured to near sell out venues, there is clearly a continuing appetite for festive wit, banter, good music and a touch of eccentricity.

About three years ago, I was in The Barrels in Hereford and my mate handed me a CD. "You'll like that," he said. It didn't leave my stereo for quite some time, despite there only being 3 tracks on it. Truth be told, it was one track in particular, 'Runaway', that ended up being on repeat, and I became a Red Room Therapy fan. I've seen them play many times since and their recent show at The Jailhouse was quite possibly their best yet.



When they heard The Jaily was set to close, their planned gig as part of their début album tour was brought forward by a few months. Bristol/Cardiff trio **Glue Foot's** pop punk set was a perfect opener, followed by a storming set from **Jake of Diamonds**, who have enjoyed airplay from BBC Introducing.

RRT took to the stage; **Osh** (singer, guitars) and **Jordon** (drums) were joined by **Liam Bevan** (Bringing Back Tomorrow) on bass, opening with *All in the Mind*, the title track from the new album, which merged seamlessly into fan favourite Skin & Bone. It's hard to pigeon hole **Red Room Therapy** into a genre, and perhaps we shouldn't; their grungy rock with a heavy flavour of funk makes for intelligent yet catchy music that is incredibly tight when played live. Despite album tracks

such as 'Society Says' and 'Hiros' being heard by much of the audience for the first time, the energy in the room was electric with fans chanting the band's name in between songs. ### Kings & Folk & a festive album launch

The concert for the album launch of Kings & Folk's second album, 'Branching Out', was held at St Stephen's church hall and was a sell out long before the event. Along with a complementary wine (the band - Ian, David and Claire King and Helen Izod - were very hospitable!) the audience settled down to enjoy the show.



**Kings & Folk** set the agenda for a night of excellent music - opening, like the album, with the exquisite 'Country Rounds' followed by 'Winter's Frozen Droplets'. Special guest of the

evening was **Colette Todd** who, as you would imagine from a former singer in world tours of **Riverdance/Lord of the Dance**, had a wonderful voice. With accompaniment she sang 'Some Folks', a tune based on an old Herefordshire folk song, and 'I Count the Days'.

More instrumentals followed, most notably 'Balkan Dance', which evokes Eastern European Romany Gypsy influences with excellently executed time changes. Instruments were put aside as Ian and Claire were joined on stage by Colette again and **Martin Haworth**. This quartet performed a small sear of Carols - 'The Holly and the Ivy', 'A Cornish Carol' and 'Sans Day Carol'. A return to instruments closed the first half of the set with a high tempo jig medley of 'Kate Dalrymple/Bag of Praties'.

After an interval that included more wine (!) **Kings & Folk's** set consisted of more reels and jigs with another a cappella mini-set of 'In the Bleak Midwinter' and 'Past 3 o'Clock'. A highlight on their new album, 'Grace', was sublimely performed as the instruments introduced themselves subtly into the composition as Claire quoted her grandfather, "It brings a tear to a glass eye". The evening was finished off with the audience participating with the performers singing the Christmas carol 'Deck the Halls' and an encore of 'Irish Polka'.

The show was a great success with fantastic performances by those involved - terrific singing, musicianship of the highest quality, performed with a joyful festive feel, lovely warm anecdotal introductions to the tunes and an intimacy between performers and audience.

### **Spirit Kreek** Monshine Man

Spirit Kreek are a Herefordshire based three-piece rock outfit, who formed just over a year ago, since the band's creation they've been hard at work honing their sound, performing live with the likes of Worhol, Hangfire and No Glory among others.

The band have also found time to record a four track EP (not counting brief atmospheric intro track) with producer Josh Watkins in Cobnash Studios in an attempt to harness the band's live sound.

Hitting play the first thing you hear is the aforementioned short and eerie introduction before frontman Scott Morris lets out a mighty bellow signaling the EP's title track, a barrage of hard hitting riffs and a bombardment of beats as the band issue their statement of intent. Frontman, Scott has a powerful holler and he's no slouch on the six-string either. the EP's duration, whilst the rhythm section (Stoo McEwan on bass and Rvan Randolph drums) more than hold their own complimenting Scott's flourishes with relish.

The band obviously take their influences from modern rockers such as Alter Bridge and Black Stone Cherry among others, as like the aforementioned band's Spirit Kreek may hit hard but they also have that melodic bluesy edge, particularly evident on the five-minute plus All Gone Away, where the band build the track up with an acoustic guitar, before



cranking up the electric as the track unravels into a fine churning out a number of addictive riffs and solo's throughout melodic rocker. Whilst Alone In The Dark proves the bands chops as the track breaks down for an impressive instrumental middle section before returning to the hard hitting groove previously laid down.

> Moonshine Man is an impressive opening salvo from Spirit Kreek, it's powerful and ballsy whilst never losing sight of that all important melody, if the band can continue to develop and evolve at the rate they're going, we could be in for something very special indeed, definitely one's to watch in the future.

The album itself is full of wonderful elements of traditional: English, Irish, Scottish and Eastern European folk music with high tempo jigs and reels: Country Rounds, Balkan Dance, Cooley's Reel, Kate Dalrymple/Bag of Praties and

Kerry Polka/Terry Teahan's. More deeply thoughtful melodic tunes: The Dark Island (a former BBC theme tune from the early 60's related to the Isle of South Uist written by Iain MacLachlan), Portencross, Paddy McCarthy and Grace.

Some Folks. Tree of Life and The Dark Traveller included the superb vocal talents of Colette Todd (who toured the world with Riverdance/Lord of the Dance) added a more earth traditional English folk feel to this album.

Portencross (a beach on the coast of Ayrshire Scotland and a favorite place of the Kings), and Grace (a beautifully interwoven piece and a stand out track on the album) were

recorded at Peter Gabriel's Real World Studios. This was a result of Kings & Folk winning the Bath Folk Festival in 2013. With Portencross and Grace there is a more modern feel in the compositional writing of lan King (who writes and arranges the majority of tunes on the album). However these two tracks fit in comfortably with the other compositions and the albums overall feel.

> Branching Out belongs very much to the folk genre and for fans of that genre they will be hard pressed to find a modern folk album as well played and produced and offering an eclectic mix within the folk genre. For the music listener who wants an introduction to folk played of the highest quality, then there's no need to look further than Branching Out by Kings &

### God Damn / Plane Crasher / Weathered Hands / Cassandra / Chew lailhouse | Hereford | Sat 29 Nov '14

This was one of the very last gigs of its kind to be played at Hereford's valiant and quirky **Jailhouse** before the doors closed there for good. Which they did this NYE just passed. And to be fair, if you're going to go out - go out with a fucking great fat bang or two. Like this bill. You might as well, yeah?



Openers Chew were very much on the grunge revival end


of the punk spectrum (somewhere to thrashier-sounding right of Eugenius and Teenage Fanclub), and nonetheless still bright and tight. Local boys Cassandra had small town claustrophobia and mania fizzing out of their pores - and delivered their bushy-tailed garage with both vigour and buckets of spunk. And brought a smile to the face.





Weathered Hands were a surprise package. With more intelligence and depth than your usual alt-rock beat combo this five piece safely emoted and projected their way out of We Are The Ocean territory and into something more interesting - and akin to the livelier offerings of the US second wave of original emo - Tiny Engines label bands like Signals Midwest and Dikembe - and stand comparison to the mighty (and now departed) Plaids. Interesting. And touched with a bit of... yeah. Class.

**Plane Crasher**. Plane. Crasher. Did what they do. Kyuss meets Black Flag meets Chicago noise rock. Only that's a lame description but I've wholly run out of new adjectives and epithets for this band. Whilst there was talk of them double-amping their bass to generate a sound so deep it would blow out a few major retaining walls and make this building unusable for future occupiers, this wasn't to be – although this was still plenty LOUD, and plenty filthy. And the kids loved



them too. There was even a modest but enthusiastic pit. Seemingly comprised mainly of members of the two opening bands. It's always a thing of joy to see the youth violently cavorting. Gives one hope for the human race.

Fresh from their support of the tumescent Slaves on their UK tour, Wolverhampton's two piece stoner-grunge decibel experimentalists **God Damn** are one of the few bands that can live with our Plane Crasher in the sonic assault and battery game. The professional kit these boys brought obviously kind of helped – but it takes some effort and no little skill to create this much shock and awe with just two instruments. Drummer **Ash Weaver** is perhaps the most watchable and brutally effective man with the sticks that you will see anywhere right now, all flailing mane of curls, sweat and Bonham style flourishes. But guitarist **Thomas Edward** is continuing to grow as a frontman, his personality coming out from behind the three foot thick wall of hair, guitar fuzz and reverb and adding an extra dimension to this two piece's arsenal. A band that needs to be heard to be believed.

### **Ben Crosland's Threeway**

### Red Lion, Warstone Lane, Birmingham Friday 16th January '15

This was a very rare opportunity to see this group live in Birmingham. Threeway have been in existence as a Trio for ten years. For this gig, vibraphone player **Lewis Wright** was added to the mix, thus allowing the group to reprise their latest album 'Looking Forward, Looking Back'.

Threeway consist of keyboard player **Steve Lodder**, bass guitarist **Ben Crosland** and **Steve Waterman** on trumpet and flugelhorn. The music for the evening was largely drawn from the band's last album, with a couple of choice classics from the *Great American Songbook* included for good measure. The venue is a comparatively small upstairs pub room and it was pleasing to see an almost full house. For me, it was an added pleasure to see, up close and personal, three musicians whom I had long admired via their recordings.

These are virtuoso musicians who are so comfortable with each other that their gentle music seems to fall naturally upon the ears. Deceptively effortless playing – the keynote here is melody. There is no showboating and the musicians' natural modesty seemed to complement the music perfectly. At the same time the music demanded attention and the attentive audience sat enthralled throughout the evening. Steve Waterman's circular breathing closed one particular tune in a quietly dramatic fashion. Compositions were provided by all three of the core band members and it is testament to their



wonderful melodies that their interpretation of a song always associated with Doris Day, 'Secret Love,' could almost have been one of their own compositions.

All credit to the guys at Birmingham Jazz for bringing Threeway to town.

### Low Derive / Joe McMahon Question the Mark / The Insomniacs Death or Glory Records. Redditch | Tues 2nd Dec 14

Whilst Redditch town centre on a damp Tuesday night may feel like Silent Hill surrounded by a one-way system so impenetrable and incomprehensible it feels surreal and somehow aggressive, it hides a secret. A wholly DIY secret. A live music venue that hosts a record store. Seriously. Just go to this place. **Death or Glory Records**. You can take my car. Your life will be better for it.

For this was a night of handsomely gruff melodic punk and acoustic. Featuring acts from Italy and the USA. In Redditch. On a schoolnight.

Openers **The Insomniacs** kept things grounded, though. With the shorts, spiked hair and anecdotes about tapping off with drunk girls in the bogs this band largely took their stylistic cues from that bouncy American Pie pop punk thing - Sum 41, New Found Glory, Green Day. And the Macc Lads. But didn't quite have as much penetration or textured emotional depth as those bands. But hey. They had fun.

**Question the Mark** were a step up. Crisply delivered, pacy, hooky - this was a gravelly and quietly vinegary Welsh valleys take on the ever popular and oft-recycled melodic hardcore style. Think HDQ or Leatherface fronted by Chuck Ragan (he of Hot Water Music). The melodies and the vocal harmonics were simply and powerfully done, and if I am not mistaken there may have been the occasional social comment in there too. Naughty.



Speaking of social comment and consciousness, discovery of the evening was **Joe McMahon** - frontman of US East Coast political melodic punkers **Smoke or Fire**, doing a solo short acoustic set. For various reasons the current crop of singer songwriters carefully steer clear of orthodox protest or politics. These, in contrast, were songs that gave a shit about more than just the state of the human heart - much more than just the state of the human heart - much more nequality. Hope not Hate. In all, not unlike an unplugged Propaghandi. This man is also long-time collaborator with the wonderful Billy the Kid (google her. She is ace). And we need more like this to make the protest song credible again.





Proceedings were closed by the Milanese gruff neo-emo whirls **Low Derive**. This lot were good-looking lads, with the devilishly stylish edge common to the current crop of touring European punk and post-hardcore outfits like Astpai and Ash Is A Robot. Having recently played the Fest in Florida (along with our own Guerrilla Monsoon), this was sweetly executed stuff that knew it's hardcore punk history. But that was also not afraid of the odd rock flourish. Sexy and accomplished.

So. New year. New danger. Punk up the Marrs Bar. And why not.

First on - Worcester's own - and brand new - Mistaken Act. A pop-punk quartet so fresh-faced and winsome that you almost want to keep them and take them home as house elves. Only you wouldn't really want to do that. They're noisy little critters. And would likely be cut to shreds on your booze and setting fire to the curtains as soon as your back was turned. But anyway. This was bounce along Southern Californian-style angsty punk with plenty of vim and a spring in its step. And it's hard not to love that.



There's a wave of highend guitar bands coming out of Cheltenham and that Gloucester right now. I, The Lion, Stillbust, Darko - and Warm and emotional modern melodic punk, with a conspicuous and flinty soul, this was a gutsy performance that tugged at the strings with intent. Stand out was definitely the the set closer - "Safe with andhair-standing-up-on



the-back-of-the-neck an affair as you will find. Genuinely impressive.

And then we had Euro road warriors and punk and roll merchants Fights and Fires. This whole show being the (hometown) launch party for their split 7" with deutscher punks Idle Class. This uber-nerd crew are older and wiser, but still chock full of the passionate fullthrottle intensity that has propelled them twenty plus times round the DIY venues of Europe already. And this

these fellows, Lanterns. experience shows: the well-honed geek-arama banter, widgets-tight performance generally and millimetre accurate delivery of more guitar and lyrical hooks than you could easily shake a sweaty little stick at. This is also a band obviously in it for the long haul. With a few new tracks, which take things into more melodic territory but keep the heavy slamming sound unique to this band, and a new bassist (who has an air of an older and physically upscaled Justin Beiber) this outfit's ambition to be the party hardcore band of choice within the me" - which was as sincere DIY punk scene just may not be unfounded.

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

### 3 Daft Monkeys Oobleck, Birmingham | Sat 19 Dec

Birds and Oobleck venue on a cool winter's evening but all was not quite to plan. The venue is moderate in size, with a small stage and some very deep blue lighting, which added to the rather cold air comfortable it wasn't but with a good turn out and plenty of energy it could only improve. The news we had was that 3DM had broken

They entertained us well with their own material that is lively and full of interesting

As The Hawthornes finished **Tim, Athene, Lukas** and **Richie** turned up, looking rather cold but in good spirits. I have never seen a quicker turn round, they could not bring all their gear - it wouldn't fit in to the 2 hired minis! Richie quickly assembled a very reduced, already shrunken drum kit. Lukas sorted connections, Tim and Athene worked on the tuning of the 12 string and violin, both suffering the cold atmosphere along with the band




uninitiated, 3 Daft Monkeys' songs are based heavily on Cornish folk tales (many quite dark) love, death, and tales of the sea - often leading to some fine jigs.

The music is a mix of Gypsy, Latin and Gaelic influences, and is absolutely hypnotic - I defy anyone not to be drawn in to the frenetic urgency of the songs. Tim takes the lead with the vocals; Lukas and Athene explore the extent of the stage, as Richie, hands encased in 'golf' gloves, slapped up a storm on cymbals and toms. Tim, ever the Perfect Stranger, tells me he's been drunk a thousand

times but it does not deter from 'Days of the Dance', as Athene takes us back to the Austrian royal court for a waltz, before exploding into dancing mania. Brilliant! Nobody is still and the Custard is getting nicely warm as the band turn 'The World on its Head'.

I can only implore you all to seek out a gig - 3DM do not disappoint. Albums 'Of Stone and Bone' and 'The Antiquated and Arcane' give a clue to the sinister stories contained. Athene on fiddle is a joy to hear and they all bring that bit of magic to the stage. As we near the close, we wind the clock back to one of their earlier songs 'Hubbadillia', it's a jig but not as you know it - fabulous fun - even the temperature has risen to applaud them. With luck I will not have to wait another year to see them perform again.



I really did not know what to expect when Melvin accepted this gig and I arrived to find he had brought a few close friends... by the name of Gibson. I have seen and heard him perform with both **The Notorious Brothers** and **Vincent Flatts** and always in the company of his Les Pauls - one black, one gold, both immaculate.

Here in Droitwich they were present as was an acoustic Gibson and a magnificent Gretsch 12 string electro-acoustic that sounded wonderful. Melvin's set was truly varied and the musicianship and showmanship was there to enjoy. 'Showbiz Blues' and 'Oh Well' from Peter Green's Fleetwood Mac days through to Dylan and Hendrix via the deep delta 'Preachin Blues' of Son House were made to measure for a guitarist of Melvin's quality.

The Gardeners had never shaken like this before - an absolutely fabulous 'Sabre Dance' and a wild foot stomping 'Cherokee Dance' (dragged up from the mid 50s), Melvin is a joy to behold and the whole house is mesmerised enjoying every chord, every bend and strike.



It had been an absorbing evening. **Melvin Hancox** had pretty well ticked every box - there were a lot of smiles on faces and calls for a return visit. For those who have yet to see him perform in one of his guises, I suggest you seek that opportunity - you will be seeing a master craftsman working with cherished 'tools' of his trade.

#### **West Mercia Rape & Sexual Abuse Support Centre Christmas Special Charity Show**

Comedy: Roger Swift | Mike Crump | Kris Hall | loe Thomlinson Music: Arbor Lights | Holy | Transmissions | Rusty Knives Firefly, Worcester, Friday 12th Dec '14

The late great Bill Hicks, when US audiences would drift off during the long parts of his set dedicated to Republicans or zen philosophy, would reassure the punters that it was OK. There were dick jokes coming. And that after the editorial shit, they would skip off, hand in hand, to a place of timeless humour called Dick Joke Island. The headliner to this bill of stand up comedy at the Firefly - Roger Swift - was an addled shitstorm of homemade prop-driven visual puns so offensive and crass, and delivered with such force and unhinged intent that it was - and I use this term carefully - bordering on genius.

The extreme vulgarity and profanity of many of these puns can't be easily described in a mainstream (ish) publication. But suffice to say, if ever Bill Hicks' audiences wondered what Dick Joke Island looked like, then this wet, ten minute fart of violated stuffed toys and dildos sellotaped to household objects, screamed at by a bald middle aged man in a slithery full-length raincoat, probably comes very close.

The other acts on this bill each we're more... cerebral, but each nonetheless had their own voice. Mike Crump - a Dudley Alan Carr with a dirty mind and a touch of the wistful that you wanted to hug. Kris Hall a teller of laconic stories of incompetent parenting and pedagogic dysfunction. Slacker misanthropy raised to a bargain bin art form; and opener and local hero Joe Thomlinson, whose dark Emo Phillips style knowing meander of jagged visual gags and observational vignettes of small town knuckleheadishness and the surreal sparked matters off to a suitably leftfield start.

This was a hybrid show of spoken word and live music something rarely done, but really should be done more often. There were four bands on top of the gag-throwers so I'll be brief

The Rusty Knives: scratchy and sincere neo-garage punk, with far more ideas than they give themselves credit for, and who are way better than they think they are. **Transmissions**: still new boys as a unit (this only being their second ever show) but no strangers as practitioners to high-end guitar music - grooved and twisted with a sonic complexity and emotional intensity reminiscent of a ballsier The National; Holy: handsome boys, alright. All brass neck, poses,



psychedelic pop hooks, scarves and fur coats... but could maybe benefit from a little more edge; and closing proceedings, Arbor Lights: Symphonic heavy guitar wonder children. Think Mogwai doing the soundtrack to an enlightened and arty remake of the 70s sci-fi classic Silent Running. Or the score to a Hollywood update of War of the Worlds that actually worked. And you'd be about there. The



spontaneous donation of proceeds from the online sales of their album Hatherton Lake to the night's charitable beneficiary - West Mercia Rape and Sexual Assault Support Centre - was also a nice gesture.

For let it be known this was a charity benefit show. And if you missed the raffle with its unusual haul of quality prizes then... you missed out.

### King Pleasure & the Biscuit Boys Artrix, Bromsgrove | Sat 3rd Jan '15

For many of you out there is no need for me to introduce this remarkable band. They've been delivering their signature swing to audiences all over the UK & Europe for nearly 30 years. They are an institution forged in and around Birmingham, when 'Made in Birmingham' still meant something.

King Pleasure himself, along with 'Big John', are the powerhouse horn blowers of the outfit. John Battrum is the uncrowned king on sax. KP adds to the 'hot' air but his 'lounge lizard' crooning, energy, and enthusiasm are the driving forces behind their unique style. Add Bullmoose 'K' Shirley on his lovely country style Gibson, Matt Foundling on the ivories, Gary Barber tucked behind on skins, and the unmissable clown prince of Bass Shark Van Schtoop and you have swing with touches of jazz, blues and rock & roll, for good measure.

'This Is It' leads to abandoned seats and the undeniable urge to get up and move - we just 'Can't Get Enough Of Your Stuff'. Artrix has the ability to 'flatten' half the floor precisely for times like this. For 'Shake Rattle & Roll' KP is down in the audience weaving through the movers and groovers, the band 'jams' on and Matt strikes up some serious boogie-woogie on the keys. The King is back up for 'I Got A Gal That Lives Upon The Hill' and old favourite 'Barracuda', vocalised in his own lounge style. Jackie Wilson is shaken out, a bit more rock & roll. 'I Ain't Mad At You, Don't You Be Mad At Me' because it's blues time with BB King's 'You Upsets Me baby'. Slip in a bit



of Ray Charles (why not?) before getting back to full on swing.

The Shark is hiding behind his double bass, fingers still bending those heavy strings, deep in the shadows. Gary may not be seen too well but he is certainly heard and the two push along that rhythm. Another boogie solo off Matt keeps the momentum going. KP has disappeared for a breather so the band play an extended '*Tequila*' all taking a turn to lead and the audience is provoked into responding to the calls – it's Tequila all round (doubles probably, with ice!) as the King returns to close it off.

'Bona Serra', gives hint to nearing the close - a relaxed swing with the pendulum easing down but the fans are having none of that and demand more.

Dean Martin would be hard pressed to 'Sway' better than this, 'Party Time' is over but not before a boastful 'I'm the King Of The Swingers' - who are we to argue. King Pleasure And The Biscuit Boys have royally entertained us at what is becoming an annual date at Artrix. Roll on next year.

First on stage came **Babal**. These Malvern based psychedelic rockers are more than just a band, they are theatre. With a set list that showcased their forthcoming new album, **Karen Langley** drew us in with her rich vocals, while **Alice the Worker** kept us all transfixed with her engaging mime. Cleverly sculpted guitar and rhythm had the entire band playing different times but in time, building up tension, before morphing together for a unified crescendo.



If you put rock, dub, jazz and funk in a blender you would come out with the smoothie that is **Glowpeople**. **Nick Raybould** on percussion and **Robot** on bass provide the heartbeat with their loops and curves; **Chris Hill** on guitar and trumpet, and **Chris Cordwell** on keyboard provide the soul with their grooves and their swerves. It's not hard to see why Glowpeople are becoming so popular on the festival circuit.



Last but not least came Kidderminster's **Socio Suki** psychedelic techno-rock with a seasonal twist, played out under a kaleidoscope of projected patterns. **Natalie** charmed us all with her enthusiasm; **Jim** and **Rob**, on guitar and bass respectively, strutted their stuff along with **Gary** on drums and



**Slippers** on synth. Christmas numbers twisted in their own unique style, brought reality back to us all and sent us home with a smile on our faces.

Disillusioned, he departs for the safe waters of a private school and leaves behind his students whose youthful irreverence gives way to despair.

Blackeyed Theatre Company were established in 2004 to create exciting opportunities for artists and audiences alike. Their first new writing project resulted in a three week London run of The Beekeeper in 2012, which was nominated for three Off West End Theatre awards including Best New Play. They have embarked on 12 national UK tours and in 2009 became an associate company of South Hill Park Arts Centre.

## Steve Tilston RosesTheatre, Tewkesbury | Tue 24th Feb



Another old time fave of mine and a man who is sometimes overlooked and underrated by the uninitiated, **Steve Tilston** is nevertheless one of the most celebrated songsmiths in the English acoustic scene. Perhaps best known for his song-writing prowess, Steve is also a blinding, dazzling guitarist with a style echoing the elaborate rhythmic folk baroque of Bert Jansch and Davy Graham, but also drawing from classical, roots and the tradition to create a sound that has been called quintessentially Tilston. Steve's career was marked by the release of *Reaching Back*, a 5-CD boxed-set retrospective, but as he's not one to stand still Steve has a new album *The Reckoning* out now, and he's also published a novel. 
