showing their fantastic onewoman poetry play to their home audience.

'amuse Δn bouche' of arts events will take place around the town leading up to main the course on the weekend of 11th-



13th November. The weekend will include a range of workshops and performances to satisfy a variety of appetites. The menu will include puppetry and psychodrama workshops, open space theatre events and scratch and spoken word performances.

Fetch Theatre will be bringing Clapper Box, a curious, participative puppet event featuring small-scale theatre booths, a lot of random objects and wonderfully written quirky adaptations of classic movies. They will also perform East Of The Sun, West Of The Moon - An enchanting tale of adventure, mystery and romance featuring a magical white bear, a young girl and an anarchic troll! Based on a traditional Nordic story and choreographed to an original soundtrack, this beautiful, mesmerizing show demonstrates the skill and style of Bunraku puppetry.

Saturday evening will see a performance of the acclaimed sellout production, recently featured in the Sunday Times Culture for London. From Ibiza To The Norfolk Broads written and directed by Adrian Berry telling the tale of a young David Bowie obsessive.



Powerful and touching, music and magic realism collide in this darkly funny and moving production featuring Alex Walton and the voice of comedian Rob Newman. With a blistering soundtrack, the life of the pop fan is dissected in this tale of unnatural teenage wildlife.

Longbridge Light Festival

The culmination of a five-year public art project (LPAP) Longbridge Light Festival is a free evening of installations, workshops, performances and arts, conceived by commissioning organisation WERK and embedded within one of the largest regeneration schemes in the UK; within one of the most historically significant areas relating to British car manufacturing.



The artworks and activities for LLF have been programmed in response to the festival theme of 'Shadow Factory', featuring an ensemble of installations, interactions, fleeting interventions and experiences devised and created by artists drawing from the population, heritage and possible future of the site. The festival features newly commissioned work from international, national and West Midlands-based artists and includes temporary and permanent site-specific work.

The commissions emphasise playfulness and encourage 'drifting' in Longbridge, aiming to take pedestrians off their usual paths to experience something new and curious, and to encourage a different awareness of the urban landscape.

Underpinning the LLF and LPAP legacies are the partnerships between St. Modwen, a private developer and regeneration specialist, and WERK. These two organisations have collaborated over the last five years to create artist in residence opportunities

and permanent light installations and artworks to enhance the experience of the new built environment. Both share the view that light is an important medium of artistic expression with the ability to transform and rehumanise an urban landscape visually. physically and emotionally. It also has the capacity to encourage social gathering, an important factor for a place like Longbridge, which has recently undergone a major redevelopment.

Hundreds Discover Art made in Worcestershire

Hundreds of visitors flocked to see art and craft made in Worcestershire over the August bank holiday weekend.

During four days, from 26 to 29 August, local artists opened their doors to the public for the second Worcestershire Open Studios showcasing the fantastic range of artistic talent that's right here in our county.

In towns and villages across Worcestershire, over 100 artists took part at 45 different venues including studios, homes, shared spaces and established galleries. Visitors discovered a wide range of locally made art and craft including painting, printmaking, glasswork, photography, pottery, jewellery and textiles. They had the opportunity to talk to the artists about the inspiration behind their creations and watch some of them at work.

Painter Valerie Briggs was one of the artists taking part in



Worcester. She and husband lvor opened up their home giving people the opportunity to see Valerie's work depicting the flora and fauna of the British countryside. Valerie "We thoroughly savs enjoyed the four days of

Also in the city, Jain McKay and Paul Johnson came together to show works on paper and canvas, books and prints, Jain's figurative work looks at human behaviour, while Paul investigates the absurd in the every day.

Silver Tree Studio at The Fold in Bransford, showcased a selection of sterling silver, copper and gemstone jewellery.

The open studios weekend was a success for figurative painter Alison Chambers in Malvern too, whose recent work focuses on oil painted cityscapes.

REVIEW Release The 2 Pias. Cheltenham | Sat 3rd September

There's a lot to be said for mixing genres on a bill, even mixing up different styles of Rock on the same bill to create atmosphere, raise energy levels and build a sense of anticipation and tonight. as we await the cultured Americana of Crystal Balloon on their EP launch tour, we're going to get a perfect example.

The band Release from Stoke-on-Trent were unleashed - and I use the word advisedly - on an unsuspecting public at The 2 Pigs in Cheltenham when they opened Crystal Balloon's bill.



They play a particularly abrasive strain of hard rock, with elements of Hardcore and Rap and are fronted by the most hyperactive performer I've seen this year (OK, any year) Caleb Allport, who spends as much time on his knees, on his back and in a foetal position as he does on his feet. He rails against the system, politics, modern life in general and adopts a variety of delivery methods from an out and out scream to a style that's almost performance poetry - but crucially he skilfully maintains the considerable power and quality of his vocals whatever position he contorts himself into.

The energy packed and occasionally atmospheric set - even the quieter numbers like 'Back To The Old Routine' are filled with an air of impending menace - is drawn from their two EPs, handily named No.1 and No.2. A steady and crunching beat is maintained by the admirably calm AZ Roden's bass and, buried almost out of sight, Tom Price's percussion. These two are particularly prominent during the flat out aggression of 'Whatever Will Be Won't Be'. Mayse Nicholson's angular and jagged guitar work spices things up very nicely, chattering under the mix, then breaking out in startling staccato bursts.



So, what does every thunderously heavy band need most? Yes, that's right - a classically trained violinist... Say what? And this really is what sets the band apart from any other of roughly the same type, that I've seen. Jack Mitchell is playing a fibreglass Yamaha five-string through a series of devices and when the instrument is not slicing through the backdrop, or swapping notes with Nicholson's guitar, it's drenching and modifying the overall



heaviness with waves of shimmering sound. The effect, in these surroundings, is simultaneously incongruous and extraordinarily exhilarating. Fine player and a most unusual departure.

I stand, slightly stunned at the end of this extraordinary release of energy and it takes a few minutes to realise I've just watched something pretty special.

Wonderfully deranged.

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Crystal Balloon The 2 Pigs, Cheltenham | Sat 3rd September


Crystal Balloon, from Chepstow are on tour to promote their debut EP "*Hurricane*" (reviewed in SLAP 61). On this leg of the tour, they've landed in Cheltenham at **The 2 Pigs** and proceed to deliver an immaculate set of melodic Alt-Rock and hard-driven Americana.

There's been one or two changes in line up since the EP with **Charlie Molyneux** joining long time members **Jack Stanton** on guitar and vocals and **Eric Karvik** on drums.

But significantly, there's been a switch to a four-piece, with the addition of **Tim Burden's** guitar and strong supporting vocals, which has been critical in the band's development and is clearly paying immediate dividends. The sound is fuller, the interplay between the guitars adds depth and variety to the arrangements, and absolutely crucially Stanton is allowed the freedom to get on with doing what he does best - delivering chiming, fluent solos and firing out really top-class vocals.

The opening track on the EP, '*The Wheel*' kicks us off, and the changes are apparent right from the start, as they are on all the material from the EP tonight. The musical delivery remains effortlessly smooth, but there's a definite edge now, best displayed in the pacey '*Whilst Setting The Alarm*', which flies off stage with some force. I've mentioned before that the spirit of Neil Young is never too far from this band's music, but never do outside influences take over their distinctive sound.

But there's even better to come, though in the unexpected shape of much brand new material. 'Insomnia' is the first one on



show, brooding and atmospheric but that's topped by 'Meeting Gods Across the Bridge' - longer and more complex with fine guitar work. And as if that weren't enough, the final new track 'Signals' is arguably the best of the lot and definitely the highlight of the set for me. The strength of the new stuff is amazing and bodes very well indeed for the future - exciting times.

REVIEW Brooks Williams Ginger Pig, Worcester | 2nd September


Ginger Pig was host to a magical night; filled with a mix of fabulous food that was accompanied by internationally renowned blues. Americana, and acoustic roots musician **Brooks Williams**.

The tables were full as the last of the daylight softened and faded away. Food was finished and to be replaced by wines, ciders and coffee as Brook started to '*Hesitate*'. A lively '*Jokers Wild*' followed and it was something of a *Trump card*, dealt with a flourish and a smile as the winning hand was laid before us.

'*Nobody Wins*' drew in the dark evening and it was an encapsulation of country and Americana. Brook later performed '*Sitting on Top of the World*' - a classic country blues dating from the 30's,

(Have a listen to the first known recording from the Mississippi Sheiks on YouTube) and it's a beautiful piece of music which was played superbly by Brooks. The mood was soon lifted high again with a fast rolling blues riff played out on a steel resonator and Brook's flair brought the **Ginger Pig** to life.

The tempo quickened as we were taken for a ride along the highway in a '49 'Mercury'. The road takes us towards New Orleans, all the way through to 'Georgia'. Brooks played a three string, cigar box guitar that was box smoked and recycled by Chicken Bone John in the West Midlands. Brooks' signature tone was amplified as he fiddled a fretful slide that explored the depths of his guitar. A Willie Dixon song, 'My Babe', was performed well



and along came a cracker, from his *My Turn Now* album - a slide into the '*Darkness*'.

It drove his audience home with the spirit of a gospel preacher and for me it was the most outstanding song of the evening and the encore was inevitable from this captivated audience of fans. It was an evening of quality music in the serene atmosphere of the **Ginger Pig Cafe**.

The 'Pig' will be shaking to the mad music and vocals of the larger than life **King Size Slim** on Thursday October 6th. Judging by this evening, it will be in demand – so be sure to book your tickets in advance.

The Wap Waps The Price of Wales, Ledbury | 11th Sept

It was Sunday again and it was time for my regular visit to **The Prince of Wales** in Ledbury. Preaching this week were the Learnington based **Wap Waps** - an odd name but a derivation from **The Swaps**.



James took lead vocals and Dave sat in the corner, flat capped and drumming. Adam worked heavy bass strings to build a rhythm and tucked behind a huge speaker, cables and assorted stands, Tomo played his unmistakable harmonica. He may hide in the shadows but his soulful notes blew the audience away. The chatter in the bar had dropped, eyes and ears had turned to the band. They introduced **Beth** with a brooding '*Pocket*', which poured out like thick, dark, drinking chocolate. The band had their

own form of '*Walking Blues*' and the pulse was slow, with understated drums, Beth's dominating voice, James' guitar had begun to kick and Tomo breathed life into his harp.

The band then turned to soul with a breathtaking 'I Never Loved a Man'. A classic that was revived in the confines of the Prince of Wales, by a voice that could have easily originated from the gospel mission halls of the deep South. This is acoustic roots music at its best – it was well balanced, soulful blues with elements of folk. The rhythms ran from slow and moody to a funky paced 'Crow'. Further into the night Tomo blew out the opening of a rock driven blues 'Coming Home' with James and Beth harmonizing to a blasting finish. All around there was a hush, everyone was tuned in to the band. 'Black Betty' filled the air and travelled out into the cobbled street as I opened the door to leave. My train was due.

With 'Walking Blues' in my head and in my steps, I walked back to the station. If you can't see them live, then look for their current EP - THEWapWaps. It's a delight. Graham Munn



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Ghosts and Demons at Ashmolean Museum Broadway

The new exhibition at Broadway's **Ashmolean Museum** is really a treat for the eyes. Such bright colours and ghoulish characters, with a fitting hallowe'en themed children's trail planned for the October half term holidays, and a talk by the exhibition's curator booked in for 19th October, this is the place to be this season.

The exhibition's curator **Clare Pollard** explained that the late nineteenth century Japanese prints displayed draw on many different influences, from Chinese and Japanese traditional tales, contemporary fears of political turmoil and technological change, and even **Japanese Kabuki** theatre.

The items in this exhibition display many themes, but are drawn together by their inclusion of ghastly ghoulies. There are tales of intrigue and murder, slaying of legendary beasts, and warriors haunted by their past.



Favourite pieces include the ghostly garden of a successful military leader, where he hallucinates the trees turned to skeletons, and the piece drawing on kabuki theatre with a crosseyed hero depicting the most dramatic part of the play, where the actors freeze to allow the audience to take it all in. Children are bound to enjoy the spooky characters and especially the animals which represent different demons or characters turned into animals by demons

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REVIEW Stroud Fringe Festival 26th-28th August

There are two major stages this year and I concentrated on the **Bank Stage** at Cornhill for the first day of the **Stroud Fringe Festival**.

We kicked off with a beautiful and delicate set from The Honeyfire, who managed to get an excellent crowd reaction, even at 5.00 in the afternoon. They deal in glorious harmonies, ringing guitar shapes and sparse, ethereal arrangements and create а simply delightful atmosphere. However, their new single 'Replica', getting one of its first live airings here, goes in a new

Eléa Calvet provided a searing set of Blues-based Rock - she has an absolutely wonderful voice, deep and with much soul, and an excellent band with her, allowing her chunky guitar work free rein. I had been tipped off not to miss **Rozelle**, from Bristol

and that was very good advice indeed. They seamlessly blend electronic synth pop and psychedelic rock with tremendous vocal harmonies, chunky guitar lines and a variety of pulsating rhythms.



New single '*Closer*' is just about the pick of the bunch, but the material is very consistent and very strong. I'll be seeing this excellent outfit again as soon as I can manage it. See: www.rozellerozellerozelle.com

And so to headliners **Ardyn**, whose transformation over the last 18 months from the wistful folk-based sounds of **Kitten and Bear**, to their current Power-Pop and Alt-Rock sound is now, with this

display. comprehensively complete. It was a joyous performance of complete authority in front of a packed and ecstatic hometown crowd, with Katy Pearson's marvellous voice arguably providing the highlight of the evening - it is a wonderful instrument. It's a measure of a band's true strength when their carefully crafted studio work is replicated and exceeded by their live performance. The quality of their new material continues to delight, with new tracks from their upcoming EP 'The Valley', some getting their

My day kicked off in the blissful company of Bristolian guitarist and harp player **Jack Cookson** - playing at an eye-wateringly early 11.00am on the **Ecotricity Canalside stage**, the performance deserved a much bigger audience - my highlights of the set drawn in the main from his debut album '*Revolt and Resolve*' which amply showed the full range of his talents, both his dazzling fingerstyle work and vigorous harp playing, were '*What You Sow*, *You Reap*' and '*Old Chapels of Stone*'. This may possibly be Bristolian See: singer songwriter Sarah Proudfoot's last gig for a while as she enters a period of writing and recording while she awaits the arrival of her baby. I have to say that even though I've seen Sarah a dozen times, I've never heard her voice as good as this, even familiar songs from her very fine EP 'Let It Slide', including the wonderfully moving 'Barriers' and 'Mind Games' sound fresh and energised. > Up to the Bankside stage then, to take my first look at **Lady Nade** from Bristol and oh, goodness this was a wonderful set, full of beautiful melodies and rich, soulful vocals with songs drawn largely from her debut album '*Hard to*

The crowd swells for what will prove to be today's showstopper, Hattie Briggs. This was my first live view of this tremendous artist, a multi-instrumentalist with an exquisitely beautiful voice and a sheaf of really outstanding songs, of which 'Old Eyes', about dementia, was probably the pick. Jack Cookson plays again, this



time on lead electric (what looks like a gorgeous Gibson 335) and the cello accompaniment of Jasmine Scott-Neale gives me shivers - the band is complete by Stuart Lawson on a bewildering variety of percussion, both hit and shaken. At the end of the set. it's revealed that at least a thousand people have been watching. Remarkable - which is also a good description of this performance. See this artist, it will be unforgettable. The very youthful Emily Musto has to follow this performance - and it's her first booked gig. And there's still about 600 people here. Does that faze her? Not a bit of it. I watched her debut performance at The Prince Albert a while ago and she was very good indeed, but this performance is just in a different class. She sings and plays piano against a backdrop of self recorded beats and samples and the effect is mesmerising. Sometimes veering close to rap, there's also hip-hop elements then chilling to triphop, you don't know what's coming next - but when it does come, it's uniformly excellent. Phew!



Back down in the rain, which is now occasionally heavy, to the Canalside stage just in time for Rooks, who plays a diverse and technically excellent set, using loops, streamed media, and an ipad as well as guitar and ukulele. And if that sounds a bit like "She Makes War lite", it's not, it's a very distinctive sound indeed. I saw her in Brum three months ago and her progress has been amazing. 'Salvage', a song that was debuted at that gig, is now a fully honed

Forget'. Halfway through the set, she spots Ruth Royall in the and magnificent piece of music, but the highlight of the set is a complete deconstruction of 'Roxanne' by The Police which is absolutely breathtaking. Watch this space, this one may take off at any minute... www.rooksrooksrooks.com

Ruth Royall makes her second appearance of the day, this time

fronting The Bristol Sessions collective, a fluid collection of soul. funk R&B musicians and lawdy, does this one sizzle! The hugely danceable heats produced by a lively rhvthm section and some powerful horns are augmented by one of the best guitarists I've seen in a while and the belting vocals of Royall and her two singing sidekicks. Their version of Chaka Khan's 'Ain't Nobody' even has me up and moving (a most unusual occurrence, to

How do you follow that? Well, with the sort of set that stops people in their tracks, that's how. Lukas Drinkwater and Tobias ben Jacob deliver - and they deliver every single time you see them. The music is carefully crafted alt-folk but there is so much more - an almost telepathic rapport between the artists leading to some wonderfully melodic musical moments. They're funny, too, with a disarmingly self-effacing modesty. They also inspire a

couple into a series of startlingly sensuous dance moves which still astound the healthy crowd, who are keeping one eye on the darkness of the sky. The material is primarily drawn from their astounding debut EP 'Burning Low', with the title track and mv favourite personal 'Autosong' probably being the highlights. For those who haven't heard them. you need to be thinking of the magic combination of John

FEATURE Art Parked on Mealcheapen Street

The new statues have been unveiled at the bottom of Worcester's Mealcheapen Street near the newly refurbished carpark. And these long awaited wonders represent characters from different periods of the city's history. The statues themselves are surprisingly small but beautifully made, you can really see the work that has gone into making each bronze cast and the plinth it stands on to bring each character up to eve level. What an opportunity to take in a little Worcester's history. As the story behind each statue is not obvious at first glance, we share it with vou here.



Shakespeare with his wife Ann Hathaway stand nearest to the church, which now stands on the spot of the original church where they obtained a licence to marry (the paperwork now held in the archives at the hive). King Charles II looks a little sinister in



his long cloak, as he runs from the soldiers during the civil war - which started and ended in Worcester - towards the King Charles where he reputedly hid.

is confusing to many uninitiated onlookers heard to say 'I thought residents of St Paul's Vesta Tilley was meant to be a woman' because she is dressed in a first world war soldier's uniform, in which she famously recruited men to the army. And one of the places she performed was the old Corn Market not far from this spot. And finally



woodbine Willy, also known as Reverend Goffrey Studdert Kennedy who was vicar to nearby St Paul's church and looked after the troops on the front line during the first world war, giving out bibles and cigarettes to them.

The statues were created by artists Julie Edwards & Ron Thompson of midlands based Planet Art who have been working together for the past 20 years. They specialise in the consultation, design production and installation of public art works for various clients including Chesterfield Football club, British Waterways, and councils in Birmingham, Manchester and Auvergne France.

All their public art pieces have involved community engagement, research, design workshops and consultation and this project was no reception, meeting the public in the hive to discuss plans, taking votes from the public which on characters to include and Meanwhile Vesta Tilley working with school children at Stanley Road Primary School and Hostel.

> And despite the lack of information on the finished statues, they are wonderful pieces of public art for Worcester and well worth a visit and even a selfie in Worcester's Cornmarket next to the car park.

REVIEW

The White Feather Collective Jenny Hallam & Lou Clark Live Elmslie House, Malvern | 24th Sept

Elmslie House is an intriguing and welcome addition to the Worcestershire music scene, an elegant, restored Grade II listed building in the heart of Malvern, first built in 1862 its seen many guises but after a great deal of restoration, the building now comes complete with its own public space/venue for music events, art exhibitions and regular craft markets too. I first encountered the house and indeed public space a couple of years back, as we were invited to an exclusive Babajack album launch and even then, I was more than a little impressed with the building and performance area. The venue has since opened a bar and set up their own in house PA and lighting rig, creating a wonderful live music space, perfect for those intimate performances.

Elmslie House has an already impressive music program, with recent performances from the likes of established names Gren Bartley, Steve Tilston and John Denton along with a number of classical recitals, but its the addition of a regular acoustic night that could prove to be the most interesting, if this launch night is anything to judge upon.

Local Malvern heroes **The White Feather Collective** are used to performing fully plugged, impressive sets of energetic '60's styled retro-rock', but the quartet were chosen as the acoustic night's opening headliners and I was more than a little intrigued to see how the bands sound would translate to a stripped back, more sedate setting.

A rich supporting cast included deep voiced singer/song writer **Lou Clark**, who delivered a set lamenting weighty topics with songs such as *I Feel Like Love*. Following on, a recognisable face on the local music scene **Jenny Hallam**, accompanied by double bassist **Hywel Pothecary** and her own expressive keys, Jenny delivered a lovely set of instantly infectious vocal hooks and addictive pop melodies.

The tickets for this one sold out long in advance, perhaps proving The White Feather Collective's pull, having firmly established an impressive arrival on the local music scene with a number of high profile festival appearances over the past couple of years, but perhaps the greater draw is seeing the band in such unusual circumstances. The band took to their seats with an additional percussionist, opening with *LA Pod*; their mix of acoustic strums broken with delicately plucked intro's, deep, steady bass riffs, pattered percussion and drums weaving an intoxicating spell whilst frontman **Josh Lambe** delivers that glorious 60's Morrison like croon. Tinges of surf and rootsy psychedelia seep into the bands set, sounding fresh and inventive as The White Feather





Collective deliver a sensational setlist, stripped back yet still sounding as potent as ever, drawing an already rapt audience in further.

The band finished to rapturous applause and expected demands for more (I suspect like me, the majority of the audience would have gladly seen the band perform long into the night), guitarist **William Turner** strapping on his steel resonator and allowing his strings to sing through the air, the bewitching tone puncturing the acoustic strum as the band finish on a flourish, capping a memorable night that I suspect will be talked of in hushed tones for years to come.

If **Eimslie House** continues to deliver acts like this in such an intimate and stripped back setting, their regular acoustic sessions could become something very special indeed, well worth keeping an eye out to see what's instore at Malvern's finest in the future. As for **The White Feather Collective** they'll be amped up and hitting **The Cube** in December and I assure you, you're not going to want to miss out, so book early.

REVIEW Worcester Music Festival Friday 16th - Sunday 18th September

With a gathering the size and scope of the **Worcester Music Festival**, it's an impossible task to cover even a fraction of the performances, but here's my highlights of a great weekend.

For me, there was only one place to start the Festival, and that was at **The Pheasant** to see the enormously talented and endlessly entertaining **Chevy Chase Stole My Wife**.

They'd be the perfect start to any festival with their trademarks of upbeat, melodic alt-rock. offbeat and slightly wacky **Ivrics** and superb musicianshin Stu Silcock's guitar work sizzled right throughout the set. The whole package is delivered with immense good humour and as well as established favourites like 'Electricity' and the wonderful 'The Girl Who Was Death' there was also an outing for



their brand new song '*This Is Art Calling*', which continues the excellent standard of their material. Non-stop fun.



Vienna Ditto are a mass of paradoxes – singer Hattie Taylor's flawless elegance subverted by a bizarrely placed false eyelash; her seemingly unflappable demeanour contrasting with guitarist Nigel Firth's hyperactive mad professor persona – rather like a musical Magnus Pyke. The precision and complexity of the music, made on synths precariously balanced on a rickety stand and held together by what appears to be an accident in a spaghetti factory.

I was prepared for the wackiness and the inventiveness, what I definitely wasn't prepared for was the power. It comes off the stage in waves - huge beats, crunching guitar riffs and Taylor's voice alternately floating over, then ripping through the backdrop. Her voice is remarkable, crystal clear enunciation like an elocution tutor slips seamlessly into a throaty Garbo-esque growl and then assumes a calm richness to sing, of all things, a spiritual. *Ticks'* is like a medicine ball repeatedly bouncing off your head and miraculously, your feet start to move which is just as well because they hold a dance contest which Firth clambers over his monitor to join in.

They have a third member present tonight who is running the streaming media and an amazing full-sized AV back projection, only slightly obscured by a hastily hung festival banner, and this **24 SLAP OCTOBER**

comes into its own on the sprawling and brilliant closer 'Come Back', complete with the noise of a passing train.

There's a lot of talk about bands making 'a unique sound'. Well, as no-one is doing anything remotely like this at the moment, that might just be true for this outfit. Simply sensational.

I've strategically parked the car close to my final destination for the night, which is **The Crown**, to watch Birmingham metallers, **Cancel Tomorrow** about whom I have heard many good things.

The band go on well late, close to midnight and I can tell immediately why they've been recommended to me - what a tight unit this is. **Emma Norman-Webb's** voice is made for rock and

her bass work, along with James Newbury's drums lavs а rock-solid foundation over which the guitarists go happily to work. Becky Davies on rhythm is playing a simply lush black beauty on which she must have the three humbuckers set to 'stun' while Gareth Milward shreds merrily and fluently over the top, assisted by the nearperfect sound (if you can find a place where it's unobstructed). Their alloriginal set in which 'Worlds Collide' and 'End



of Days' are outstanding isn't quite what one punter is after, and unbelievably he asks for some Bon Jovi (yes, really) – words fail me. Tremendous band, well worth waiting for.

For me, Saturday is about seeing two favourite bands of mine the delightfully ethereal **Wednesday's Wolves** and the bluesy, retro crunch of **Pre Sleep Monologue**, but first there's to be one or two surprises at Café Bliss.

Probably my biggest and most pleasant surprise of the weekend are Harlem Dandy, a couple from Worcester -Phil plays guitar, with choppy chord work and economical, crisp soloing and also controls the devices, samples



and other sounds many and various that fill out the backdrop. Violet sings - oh, does she sing. She has a belting voice of real power and is a hugely animated performer striding and stalking round the stage, crouching then springing up like a Jack or perhaps, Jill-in-the-Box, then sidling up to Phil for the vocal harmonies.

The music immediately reminds me of very early work by The Kills, percussive and in places, very sparse with great atmosphere –'*Mind That Man*' is arguably the pick of an excellent bunch.

There's something else that sets this performance apart as well, and that's the very powerful chemistry between the performers that adds an unexpected element to this already fine set. Great performance. The Antipoet are a bit of a shock to the system to put it mildly. curvaceous but unfortunately Performance poetry is a terribly difficult art form to get right, but this duo are absolute masters at it. Caldecott looks as if she's

To call them 'anarchic' is like calling Everest a little on the large side -Paul Eccentric does the bulk of the poetry delivery, rapid-fire and with a rhythm that carries you along like a current - that rhythm is reinforced by the expert double bass playing of Ian Newman, who also supplies perfectly timed vocal interiections. They are hugely entertaining, scandalously rude (although brilliantly improvising parts of their set to take account



of the number of chidren in the audience especially during 'Ere's One For The Kiddies') and immensely skilful observers of the many bizarre quirks and disappointments of modern life.

The track about special interest groups meeting in pubs and becoming their economic saviours, which has Newman putting on a gimp mask, has me laughing so hard, I can scarcely hold my camera. See them as soon as you can, or better still book them for your function but perhaps not for your Vicarage Fete...

Funniest act I've seen all year.

Wednesday's Wolves have just released their third EP, handily titled 'III' and are in really fine form - they seem to have perfected the very difficult art of making beautifully ethereal music without crossing the line into fev blandness, which so many acts do. They're battling against a pretty shocking level of crowd noise, but still the delicacy and nuance of their performance remains strong. The vocal



harmonies are absolutely delightful. **Chrissy Renker's** guitar work is precise and assured and **Ysabelle Durant's** percussion work on the cajon is very crisp, although much of the subtlety of her glockenspiel work is lost in the hubbub. The new EP is strongly represented, with 'Shake' (for which there is a great video) and the lovely 'Bare Bones' outstanding, but it's the exquisite 'Silver For The Boatman' from their last EP that steals the show for me.

So good. I could listen to this all day.

Goodness, **Pre Sleep Monologue** are a wonderful band to watch. I've been anticipating this show since last year's festival and they duly deliver. The music is decidedly retro - raw, abrasive altered blues and muscular, driving Americana, with guitarist **Toby Carter's** exciting, angular, jagged guitar lines providing a sound which makes this band so distinctive. He's also got the most beautiful self-built guitar with him, glearning white and deliciously

Caldecott looks as if she's having a great time, her vocals veering from a subtle whisper to something considerably more particularly substantial. during the alwavs outstanding 'Mud', while her bass lines blend in fluently with Marcus Galley's crisp and economical drumming to provide the perfect backdrop for Carter's fine guitar work. There are simply no flaws in



this performance, nowhere you'd say it could have been improved – this is an absolute quality band, thoroughly appreciated by the now packed audience, which includes a particularly animated dancing fairy!

On Sunday, my main goal is to see Canadian singer Eléa Calvet, who I saw lay down a tremendous set at the recent Stroud Fringe Festival, but the programme at Café Bliss is running a little late and having some time to kill, I wander into town and catch the last two songs of what must have been a very good set of melodic Alt-Rock from local band The Purple Shades, who I'm hoping to see more of as soon as possible.

There's a further wait for **Eléa Calvet** when I get back to the Café but when she does finally get on, the performance is a glorious display of blues-based rock, tight, melodic and with her remarkable soulful voice cutting through the immaculate rhythm backdrop laid down by regular drummer **Ben Molyneux** and depping bass player **The Bass Robot**. Calvet's guitar work is both subtle and chiming in the quieter passages rising to a satisfying crunch of power chords during the more forceful sections. As with her set at Stroud last month, '*The Flood*' provides the highlight of the set, with the more stately and soulful 'Sacrifice' not far behind.

She's got a gig coming up on 6th October in Swindon supporting former **Faith No More** vocalist, **Chuck Mosley** on the evidence of this performance that is going to be some night.

Finally I hare off to see the last artist at this year's Festival – I didn't intend Jess Silk's set at The Firefly to be my last stop, but

after the quality of this performance, I decided to finish the weekend on a high.

She's from The Black Country, strongly evidenced by the coat of arms on her guitar strap. and the possessor of a highly distinctive, gravelly voice of great power. She's an excellent lyricist ('Long March Home' is particularly good) and displays a fine guitar technique - even with an injury that stops her playing



fingerstyle – there's superb loop control as well, as she builds her backing tracks up.

She's got three self produced EPs out and the set is built round these, with '*Is This Poetry*', about the manufactured music industry and the thunderous '*Break The Bottle*' outstanding. But for me, the blissful '*Atlas*' tops the lot.

A very fine artist indeed, and a great way to finish my weekend.

Festival season tends to wind down after August, with a smattering of events taking place in the early weeks of September, but here in Worcester the music scene becomes a hive of activity with gigs galore culminating in the annual three day weekend known to those in the know as **WMF** - an inner city event where the city's streets become alive to the sound of music and merriment, all in the name of charity.

When the dates were announced the committee were inundated with applications from bands from across the country and beyond, all jostling to be part of this, now firmly established, blue ribbon event. Promoters agonised over their line-ups, volunteering their time all in the name of entertainment (and

I can tell you from experience the amount of commitment it takes to bring together such an event!). With the charity decided (the very deserving Acorns) and line-ups complete, the countdown started in earnest - mass social media shout outs, followed by a brilliantly attended piss up in a brewery or as WMF like to call it the 'festival ale launch' coinciding with the unveiling of the printed program.



Knowing the opening Friday night I was out of action (dinosaur duty with my six year old), I spent the evening checking out the on line presence of the featured artists, reposting events and fielding messages from excited friends enjoying the festivities. One such message read simply "Das Sexy Clap, f*** yeah!!!". Another asked "why have you never told me about Vienna Ditto before?"



(actually I had a mere few days before!), whilst a late night ramble informed me **Stolen Chocolates** were "mind blowing". The following day would reveal further eulogies on the likes of **The Stiff Joints, Raptor** and **Desert Boots** among others.

Saturday I was eager to join the party, knowing that whilst I was toiling in the day job the many workshops



were in full affect, offering the chance to join the **Little Monsters That Rock**, learn to play the ukulele and bash the metaphorical pots and pans with **Drum Love**. Clocking out time, the quickest change of clothes in history and into town...



First stop, **The Pumpkin Sessions** and **Bethan & The Morgans**. The orange vanned sessions is a new addition to the festival that saw a quick artist Q&A before a short acoustic set by said artist, all captured on video and released to the world via their (well worth joining) Facebook group. A highly appreciative small gathering enjoyed a wonderful stripped down set of alternative roots from the West Midlands based quartet, with the likes of *No One Like Me* and *Changing Every Day* leaving a lasting impression as the sessions packed up and moved on (stopping throughout the city to capture further sessions) whilst we headed to **The Marrs Bar** and a night in the hands of **Slap**.

Kidderminster's poetic barbed wired hard Humdrum Express kicked off proceedings with his typically spikey observations on life. Accompanied by his battered acoustic, his combination of biting spoken word and wry alternative anthems raised nodding agreement, a handful of titters and the odd sing-along (Double Edged Sword, Festival At Home) as he raised the curtain to an



ever growing audience in style (returning later for MC duties). By the time punk/new wave/spunky indie combo, Skewwhiff hit the stage reports were coming in that the various venues around the city were heaving as the festival really took hold, this was no more evident than in an absolutely packed Marrs Bar as the likes of It's Obvious, Gizmo and a storming Doll Parts rang from the speakers. Rita Lynch continued the ragged, punk vibes with an attention grabbing performance, attacking her guitar wildly, backed by the thunderous drums of John Langley, to create an almost feral sound yet with a decidedly infectious edge. Talking of primal edge, Worcester's raw and nasty pounding indie/blues/rock band Humm took over for an intense mix of serrated razor like riffs, jerky rhythm bombardments and Andy Teece's edge of your seat drawl. He stalked the stage like a man possessed as his band delivered a captivating display of raw unbridled power, with previous single Savannah causing convulsions on this non-dancing





scribe. A brief spoken word interlude courtesy of Mr Ian 'Humdrum Express' Passey before Rhino And The Ranters teased every last ounce of energy from the floor as they delivered a glorious set of bluesy high octane rock 'n' roll full of clever quirks, contagious hooks, the odd harmonica solo and even a nod to The Doors as they sent the assembled masses home with a huge grin on their collective faces and i'd imagine very tired feet.



I awoke Sunday morning with a self induced cider headache and yet more messages - "Will you should have seen V2A", "I caught Barefoot In Baltimore, amazing" and "you need to checkout the *B-Sydes* at some point" [note to self: next year, perfect time travel

or cloning to catch more of WMF]. Work was a painful blur but the thought of live music saw me through, before once again decamping to town and the sight of numerous couples clutching festival guides rushing to their next port of call. For me, post work, it was St Swithuns Institute Halls and an eclectic mix of folk, roots, rock and beyond that piqued my interest and as I hit the venue Tom Callinswood was unfortunately iust finishing up what sounded like an impressive set of raw





acoustic blues folk - complete with layered and looped guitar and a suitably ravaged lead vocal that cries out for further investigation. Jack Of All delivered their usual impressive blend of rustic acoustic punk and folk anthems as violin weaved around acoustic strums and percussion patters, with The Others, You Ain't One and the hook-laden It's All About The Money all finding favour. If CD sales were anything to go on, it would seem the Malvern based (now) trio won over a number of new friends. Bird Radio followed and delivered one of the most brilliantly inventive sets I've ever seen - one man, his flute and series of pedals produced a genuinely jaw dropping set that had every person in the Institute mesmerised from start to finish. Mikey Kirkpatrick (or Bird Radio if you prefer) opened with The Garden by German clanging industrialists Einsturzende Neubauten using lavers of flute loops and an almost monotone croon, instead of the sheet metal crashes, to create a unique and engaging opening. Minds were blown with the dramatic Black Car where theatrical lead vocals become a feral howl, and intense distorted flute loops and tapped rhythms become harsh, yet intoxicating, slabs of noise competing for attention with Kirkpatrick's pretty melodies and almost psychedelic flights of fancy. Mikey discards his flute for a gorgeous, tender acoustic ballad (apparently the only love song he's ever written) in the shape of Whale Watcher, whilst the flute led Lanterns For Men and his spellbinding reading of Cock Robin topped an unforgettable set that will be talked about for many WMFs to come. MC & The 7 Pedals, or electric harp experimentalist Maria-Christina as she's also known, continued the looped theme as she produced live layers of beautifully plucked harp to create a (mostly) lulling set that ranged somewhere between classical and blues jazz. Clever interpretations of Nina Simone's Feeling Good and an audience participated Seven Nation Army were the obvious highlights of an engaging set of intricate instrumentals. As a festival finale you'd be hard pressed to find a better bet than ten legged groove merchants Arcadia Roots who mix elements from dance, rock, reggae, dub and world music to create a percussion led melting pot of potent rhythms and hook-laden sing-a-longs. Guitars soar and chug magnificently whilst the vocals of Dave Small and Maddie Abbotts encourage us to lose our inhibitions and dance to the likes of **Big Man** or the unusual choice of Marley cover in Fussin' And Fighting or the ever sensational Look The Other Way; leaving St Swithuns awash with dancing revellers (and the odd land girl or two) as the 'Roots brought the festival (or mine at least) to a fitting close.

Three days of live music and workshops, countless memorable performances (every person who attended will probably come up with another highlight), loads of money raised for charity and a very tired (and hopefully very proud) group of volunteers, WMF proves that music really does make the world a better place.

Surprise Attacks Worcester Music Festival Firefly, Worcester | Saturday 17th September

There's plenty of better things to do than read this. And plenty of other writers who warrant the space in this mag more. So I'll be very brief. Here are some pictures from the rammed **Surprise Attacks** night at the **Worcester Music Festival**. And some words to go with.

Openers Navajo Ace do finely-crafted nineties American College rock. Very well indeed. But with a certain grunt in percussion that the marks them clearly out from the competition. Local alt-rockers Institutes stripped things down specially with an acoustic set of originals and a few leftfield covers. Δnd seemed to win a few hearts in the process. Palm Pleasures did early



Seattle scene style neo-grunge with a youthful sparkiness and certain swing. Only Echoes Remain worked up a beardy storm of





swirling. virtuoso instrumental post and space rock, with shades of 65DaysofStatic and the sainted Mogwai. Esuna, tucked in-between these two bands, were a distinctly urbane prospect, all smart jackets and limpet-tight sassy posthardcore. somehow evocative of Roxy Music meets American Football. Black Boxes - or Plane Crasher mark II - were not unlike being dive-bombed by a B-52 piloted by a deranged Mickey Dolenz of fucking out the Monkees. An astoundingly direct combination of exceptional volume and garage rock charismatics that literally sucked the goddam air from your lungs. Soeur wove their trademark honey-sweet harmonies around their sharp sonic teeth, and sparked a queue halfway down Lowesmoor when their crowd threatened to take the Firefly way over capacity and they basically had to stop letting people



in. Then - Soden. Thirty minutes of fuzzed-out instrumental sludge-stoner rock that was stonier than every single member of Kyuss standing on a great big pile of stones in a really stony-looking bit of the stony Mojave Desert. And finally: headliners the Hungry Ghosts. Redditch's finest purveyors of swamp-psych and clattering, screaming garage rock, all done with an artistry, showmanship and lyrical depth that most London outfits would do well to aspire to. And that, as they say, was that.

Blues rinse for Worcester Music Festival

Most of you who read my reports have probably realised that my genre of choice drifts towards the blues world. Well, there's not much of that in the Worcester Music Festival but there were patches. Taking time out from a seriously late running renovation 1 dropped into The Chestnut on Saturday afternoon to find the old man of traditional blues. Perry Foster. stringing his stuff out in the garden with his current favourite girl in arms, a National Resonator complete with pearlescent headstock, being stroked and strummed. It has to be said, it took a while and maybe a beer or two to warm the voice up properly but he eased into it as the afternoon lazily moved on. The 12 string came out for 'Stagger Lee' and again later for the biting song 'Police Dog Blues'. It even found the brass tube, sliding along its long neck for a tingly tale of Got 3 Women. Back with



National, Perry had sorted his voice by the time 'Casey Jones' had

The Elberton Sessions The Elles Bailey Band

The Elberton Sessions is a big, fat 6 track EP. It must have been tempting to add some of Elles' previous recordings to create a

fully loaded album but the songs contained are fresh and, in my view, of a very high standard.

Elles is making quite an impact within the blues scene this year with a fine band featuring guitarist Jo Wilkins, Zac Ranyard on bass and Ed Gallimore on percussion together with guest musicians adding an extra element to some tracks. All 6 tracks have that stripped, live acoustic feel and indeed were recorded 'live' in the living room of Elberton Manor under the guidance of producer Brian Banks and engineer Steve Evans resulting in superb quality throughout.



'Wildfires' is a cracking opening track with throbbing bass and rippling slide work to accompany the smoky, distinctive vocals. The twin guitars on 'Waiting Game' work well together and the whole track ticks over quickly. Whilst the instruments are distinctive, the vocals are in the lead before Will Edmunds' guitar closes it off neatly. thundered down the track and forgotten to stop but it was back to the 12 for closing off with Mississippi Fred McDowell and 'Write Me A Few Lines' which, of course, he did. All this was at the culmination of 'Mad Pierre's' birthday week of celebrations and music.

It was back to the toil, until the evening when I fancied a **Marrs Bar** to close the day. Hosted by our illustrious editor, it was moving towards its zenith. I arrived just in time to catch a 'Humm' drum noise machine where Zeppelin meets The Sex Pistols - I'm claiming that as blues influenced, what the hell! I feel confident you will have the opportunity of reading a more fulsome report, but suffice to say the air was buzzing.

What happened next was full on blues with **Rhino And The Ranters**. Now, how many of those trying to lift their feet from the beer pickled sticky floor recognised this truism is debatable but everyone was moving and it was a bloody good evening.

That Nashville feel is retained for the '*Girl That Owned The Blues*' but the lyrics and vocals are soulful, dripping with empathy and never quite breaking away from her own fears.

We turn away from that Nashville vibe with the urging throb that

underpins '*Barrel Of A Gun*'. Threatening vengeful lyrics ride that rhythm whilst acoustic play adds an Hispanic touch. Betrayal and revenge are a prerequisite for the blues genre and this ticks the box nicely.

Elles closes in a more soulful mood, accompanied by **George Montague** on piano, asking herself the question '*What If 1*'. Which road does she travel down, which way to turn? Well, we are fortunate that **Elles Bailey** found a road that is leading her to Worcester and a gig at **The Chestnut** - a rare chance to come and listen to a her powerful, insistent voice that you simply cannot ignore. Her songs tend toward country roots but there's impassioned soul and full on blues. The 6 track EP is outstanding, the band build the platform on which Elles

can perform and it fizzles with pent up energy. On stage, like the Beth Hart's and Jo Harman's of this world, she prowls her kingdom. In the confines of a recording session, that energy smoulders, burning through expressively and memorably. See her live at The Chestnut Inn on October 23rd, and take home a copy. Unmissable.

FEATURE **The Good Water** If you've got a thirst for a modernised 60's sound. The Good

If you've got a thirst for a modernised 60's sound, **The Good Water** are a duo who are beginning to rival the likes of even The Kinks. Their latest single 'See Your Light', released early in September, unleashes the brazen rhythm and blues that make way for a dreamy psychedelic trip. With a sound so full of groovey twists and turns, we had to find out more about the Brummie lads:

As a duo, you two must be pretty close - how and when did you both meet?

We met at music college some 10 years ago now. I remember we were asked to compose a piece for a hypothetical Wagon Wheel advert. We clicked over Wagon Wheels and have been writing music together ever since.

Did you immediately feel that musical chemistry or was it a while until you decided to come together to make your statement 60's sounds?

Yeah it was fairly immediate, when you know, you know, right?

Where was it that the name 'The Good Water' stemmed from?

Tom watched 'Water the Great Mystery documentary', which explained the properties of water molecules and the suggestion that water has the ability to absorb memories and emotions. We were blown away, it really connected with both of us and **The Good Water** was born!

You've been likened to some 60's greats such as The Zombies and even early Floyd, is this the sort of music you grew up listening to? Has the era influenced your music?

Rob - For me, most definitely. My parents are both big 60's music fans so I guess it stems from there. We never really set out to sound like that though, it was a very organic process, but yeah it's really great when people make those kind of comparisons.

Tom - I grew up in a house listening to my dad's 60's and 70s rhythm and blues, we didn't have a lot of money but a house full of second hand instruments, Dad could pick anything up and play it. Later I started listening to bands like CAN and Neu (German Psyche Rock). Jackie Liebzeit (CAN drummer) changed my life and has been a huge influence. It helped me to think about how the beat is played and not what beat is being played.





Since your last single 'Apples', you've definitely moved towards more raw, bluesy roots in new single 'See Your Light', has this been influenced by what you've been listening to more recently? Have you got any recommendations for us?

The track Apples derived from our love of Kraut rock/German psych bands such as Neu! and Can. I think See Your Light is the result of listening to a lot of northern soul style hits. You should check out gems like Los Roberts' 'El Saltamontes', The Exciters' 'Blowing Up My Mind' and Sue Lynne's 'Don't Pity Me'.

What was the inspiration behind the music video for 'See Your Light' - it's looks like a psyched-up Bond film!

Ha ha yes we agree! Tom and I put our heads together with Craig Bush (video producer/director) for this one. The girl in the video is Craig's friend Danny Demilo, Craig told us that Danny could dance and breathe fire so she was hired instantly!

If and when we're in the mood for some psych garage rock, where can we find you live next?

We put on our own nights '**The Good Water Presents**' with some great visual and sound artists from Birmingham. Our next event is at **Centrala Art Gallery** in Digbeth on the 7th October with #FoxNewsDisco by artist Cathy Wade, Juneau Brothers, Health & Efficiency and Joe Potts; the line up is stellar!

We hope you've got an album on the way soon - is there a date we can put in our diaries yet?

No specific date as of yet but we are working towards an EP release very soon. With Emily Branson



From Grade 1 to Number 1, music students from Hagley need your help to aim even higher...

At the start of the autumn term 2015, a group of students from **Hagley High School**, Stourbridge, created the humble beginnings of a band which has now attracted the type of attention most teenagers would only dream of. The group, **H90** which consists of 16 students aged 12 to 19, enjoyed working hard in their spare time to put a special 90's tribute act together. The line-up consisted of drums, electronic percussion, bass, 3 guitars, keyboard, 2 trumpets, 2 saxophones, 3 clarinets and 2 vocalists. The original aim was to produce an hour long show to take on tour to primary schools for a week in July.

By June, they were almost ready, but their teacher, **Fred Mallinson**, wanted them to experience more. As a part time music promoter for the local town, Fred arranged opportunities for **H90** to perform outside of the school environment, but it was only when they closed a charity concert at Sunfield Children's Home in Clent, to a rapturous applause, that he considered they might deserve an even greater opportunity.

Whilst arranging a Glastonbury warm up gig for Carlisle band Hardwicke Circus, Fred decided to give H90 the opportunity to be the main support act at the local music venue Scary Canary in Stourbridge. The gig was a success - their lively, exciting, young energy worked well and, to the surprise of all involved, Hardwicke Circus' manager Milo Robinson's father, Dave "Stiff" Robinson loved it!

Just days later, as **H90** were half way through their primary school tour; Fred received an interesting phone call... Dave wanted to know if it was possible to record their version of "I'll Be There For You" as he thought it would make a great charity single. With only four days of the school term left, Fred didn't think it would be possible. With a heavy heart, he parked the school minibus on a McDonald's carpark and told them that everyone was proud of them and that it was an honour just to be asked. On

Frantically, Fred contacted school to get permission and set about phoning a few friends. After some swift talking, he managed to organise just two days of studio time with a sound engineer at the **Base Studios** Stourbridge.

Most of the band had never been in a studio before and time was running out. Having just got back from a camping trip, the older band members ignored their sunburn and lack of sleep and went for it alongside the younger students who worked just as hard. With some things still needing to be tweaked, Fred begged for a final 2 hours of studio time before sending everything to Dave. When the gates at Hagley High finally closed and the students left for the summer, the stems of the track arrived with Dave's sound engineer **Pat Collier** at **Perry Vale Studios** in London and the track was born.

Now they want this massive achievement to benefit others and raise money to create similar opportunities for children less fortunate than themselves while inspiring other young musicians to think beyond the classroom.

Back To The Planet Skewwhiff, Doozer McDooze The Marrs Bar, Worcester | 27th Oct

There was a time, bookended by the **Battle of the Beanfield** in 1985 and 1994's Criminal Justice Act, when the 'enemy within' was a bunch of 'medieval brigands', (not so?) affectionately known as Crusties. With the unions crushed the government turned their opprobrium on the alternative lifestyle of the travelling free festival movement, in an attempt to kill the spirit engendered from dancing 'til the early hours under the stars.

Squatting was another important spanner in the works - while the middle classes mortgaged their lives and the aspiring working class bought their council houses, an underclass emerged. Disenfranchised from the socio-political system. Crusties took a direct action approach to housing policy by reclaiming empty properties and turning them into homes and social spaces.

It was out of this milieu that Back to the Planet was born. Taking their cues from the DIY ethos of Crass, Culture Shock and Radical Dance Faction and firmly based at the squatted Dole House in Peckham, S.E. London - the irony of an abandoned dole house being squatted was not lost on the revellers - the band released two classic cassettes (remember them?), Earzone Friendly and Warning the Public in 90/91 on their own label, Arthur Mix(!). These homegrown releases propelled the band on to the national stage playing huge festivals - Glastonbury four years running, Phoenix and Deptford Urban Free Festival (and even finding time to play Worcester Arts Workshop).

It was at one of these spur of the moment free festivals that sprang up at Castlemorton Common, on the edge of the Malvern Hills, where Crusties met ravers en masse and **BTTP** were right in the thick of it along with AOS3 and the infamous Spiral Tribe. For the best part of a week, the travelling convoy pitched up, partied and awed the natives. The fact that the event in our very own environs still gets an occasional mention in our local rag is testament to how profound this happening was.

In 1993 BTTP signed to Parallel Records (also home to Evesham's Bang Bang Machine) to release a string of singles, remixes by the likes of Adrian Sherwood and Orbital, and an album, Mind and Soul Collaborators. which charted at number 32. The partnership, however, did not last long and they returned to Arthur Mix to release the follow up LP, Messages After the Bleep but split shortly after to pursue solo projects D.A.V.E. the Drummer. the Geezer, Monkeyrush,



Dogshite and The Skraelings. A reunion in 2006 led to cameo appearances on the summer circuit at Glastonbury, Endorse-it in Dorset (we miss you), Beautiful Days, Bearded Theory, the wonderful Something Else festivals and a major tour with the Levellers and Dreadzone. It is only now that a new EP is being released, Kick Out, and we have great pleasure welcoming the band back to Worcester to grace the stage at the Marr's Bar.

Support on the night comes from Worcester's indie misfits Skewwhiff and foot stomping acoustic punk singer songwriter from Essex, Doozer McDooze.

We are the Underground Revolution, a group of volunteers aiming to enhance the music scene in Herefordshire - mainly, but not exclusively, the alternative side of music, hence our name, formed by LA transplant Minky Cuadra and ex-Hereford Live chairman and punk from Terminal Rage, Rich Lovell, We also run Hereford's Culture and Retail online blog Herefordcitycentric.com.

We started at the beginning of 2016 with the legend that is Attila The Stockbroker and soon moved on to showcasing local bands, such as Pablo Alto, A Hundred Suns, Teddy's Leg, Black Boxes, Hate System, Freeborn Rising, Cherryshoes...the list goes on. Our members include Matt Broom & Thor from Freeborn Rising and John Rose who designs most of our posters.

We have brought in some outside acts such as the Ramonas and more recently for a fundraiser for the homeless. TV Smith of working class citizens -The Adverts and On Trial UK. This was a big occasion for us, free entry, donations of celebrating 40 years of punk with one of the originals, whilst cash or items for the local contributing to the Big Issue and Musicians Against Homelessness (a nationwide chain of events set up by Alan McGee (Oasis' manager). The gig was called A Crisis of Conscience, co-hosted by the Linerunners - Hereford's postpunk band (somewhere between Tom Waites and Joy Division). They set the standard before The Youth Within and then Terminal Rage with their politically charged, angry punk sent us all back to Punk's origins. On Trial UK brought their own brand of punk along before TV Smith topped the night off in splendid style.



So, what next? In October Underground Revolution will be hosting a special folk rock night with headliners Under a Banner, following the release of their latest album "The Wild Places" supported by Freeborn Rising which is taking place October 7th at The Booth Hall. October 15th we are holding a 'We Shall Overcome' anti-austerity fundraiser featuring Alvin & the Angry Barrels, Terminal Rage and Nick Davies. A heartfelt cause that expresses the genuine state of discontent of our country's

We then round the year off with those Punk masters the Subhumans on 2nd November and then (drum roll....) Steve Ignorant (ex-Crass and Conflict vocalist) with his Slice of Life project, supported by Headsticks a fine folk-punk band who have been making waves all over the UK including support slots with



Ferocious Dog. It's going to be an amazing first weekend in November for the tribe of punk connoisseurs. Revolt!

White Feather Collective Universal Harmony

White Feather Collective are a four-piece Malvern based band that have made waves on the local scene since their formation back in 2014, with their blend of retro 60s rock and psychedelic surf influences, regularly packing out local (and beyond) venues

as well as performing at the likes of this year's BBC Hereford And Worcester's Introducing stage at Lakefest.

Universal Harmony is the band's debut EP - a five-track affair that unites aforementioned those influences along with a garage rock like sensibility to create an instantly infectious taster of what The White Feather Collective are all about. The EP kicks off with the striking. chiming riff



(courtesy of **William Turner**) of *Because You're Mine* before the tapped out drums of **Christopher Reynolds** and **Roo Macphees's** driving bass join the mix and **Josh Lambe** unveils a glorious Jim Morrison like croon. Throw in a blast of harmonica, a handful of harmonies and a hook-laden chorus and we could have been transported back to the late 60's, when the voice of rock in America was arguably at its most potent.

You Know The Drill | Losing Streak

Last year I was honoured to be asked to put together a bill for Worcester Music Festival and, from the off, I wanted to do something fun, bouncy and celebrate my love of all things poppunk. Having recruited local legends [Spunge] as headliners, I set about trying to find the perfect supporting crew and whilst trawling through the many applications I stumbled upon You Know The Drill - an energetic, West Midlands based five-piece collective, who originally formed all in the name of fun, bashing out three-minute pogo inducing, sing-a-long pop punk. It took me all of thirty seconds of hearing them to be convinced of their place on the Rhythm & Booze bill. Unsurprisingly with a clatter of drums, a long slung guitar and those hook-laden bounce-a-longs, the boys did me and themselves proud with a suitably infectious and energetic turn.

Since then I've kept an eye on the band and watched them announce numerous shows in and around the Midlands, bringing their contagious wares to the masses and winning over scores of pop punk fans along the way. This year has seen them continue their rise through the Midlands' pop punk ranks, signing a deal with **Inception Press & Management**, an endorsement with **Vocalzone**, supporting the likes of established favourites **Wait For The Fall** and a forthcoming slot back at The Marrs Bar with the legendary **Sonic Boom Six** fast approaching.

Somehow the hard working quintet have also found the time to write and record their debut EP, *Losing Streak*, which is set to be unveiled on the 28th October via Scylla Records and, if the current single is anything to judge by, it could well be set to become one the must have releases of the year. The track is introduced with a

Louise follows and is perhaps even better - a sub three minute surf inspired garage rocker that combines those twanging guitars, a rumbling bass riff, a brief Link Wray like middle section, whilst Lambe delivers an addictive sing-a-long hook, hand built for audience participation and a good saunter round a hot and sticky dancefloor. The Inside is a psyche-tinged ballad that once again brings to mind Morrison, only with added choral harmonies and stabbing shards of guitar breaking through, lifting the already impressive ever higher. You Got The Time is a blustery harmonica

fuelled (roadhouse) blues number that opens with an impressive Reynolds drum salvo before settling into a glorious hand-clapped swagger, full of foot stomping 60's attitude. The EP's closing title track, *Universal Harmony*, showcases that blissed out psychedelic influence in full effect. Led by a slow pulsating bass lick and a tapped out rhythm, Lambe delivers an almost spoken word drawl, whilst a tinkered piano adds a bluesy jazz feel, before the band rally for a rousing fuzzy chorus, name checking the likes of Ian Dury and The Blockheads and Iggy Pop along the way.

The White Feather Collective aren't interested in modern trends. They take their cues from the best of yesteryear to create a wonderfully warm and welcoming, retro rock sound, full of knowing hooks and contagious melodies, all topped with

that delightful Lambe lead. Put simply, if you crave that late sixties sound but weren't around at the time to enjoy it (like me) or indeed enjoyed it first time around and long for more, seek out the sensational sounds of **The White Feather Collective** - you won't be disappointed.

Having done all that, I demand you to hit the band's next gig, throw caution to the wind and dance like nobody's watching, simply because YOU KNOW THE DRILL!

The Sentence Everyman Studio Theatre, Cheltenham Friday 7th October and Saturday 8th October

Following its highly successful staging earlier this year in Stroud (review in SLAP 58), Cheltonian author Martin Lytton's play "The Sentence" moves to the Everyman Studio Theatre in Cheltenham for two performances.

It's the story of John Scrivener who, in the 16th century was sentenced to death for heresy by being burned at the stake.

His 'crime' was to translate the Bible from Latin into English to make it more accessible to the common people. His daughter was sentenced to light the fire.

The two actors who so brilliantly portrayed the main characters in Stroud, Paul Southcott as Scrivener and Katie McLeod as his daughter Joan, reprise their roles in this tense and atmospheric



piece. It's a play that, although it has its roots firmly in the past, frequently resonates with modern life – particularly concerning religious intolerance and the widespread suppression of women.

The strength of the central performances and the power of the subject matter make watching this play a deeply satisfying and thought-provoking experience. Don't miss it.

Weirdshire Presents Emily Jones, Elspeth Anne, Alula Down De Koffie Pot, Hereford | Wed 24th of August

I'm glad I managed to get out of the house to hear the three superb acts that kept us enthralled at De Koffie Pot Wednesday night. It was a mesmerising assortment of innovative sets who all expressed a unique slant on the folk genre. **Alula Down** played a pleasant and intriguing mix of traditional music and original songs. They began with some technical problems with the mic fading in and out but it was fortunately smoothed out to allow elegant music to impress itself upon the receptive ears of the audience.

The management had open mindedly allowed dogs into the venue, one of whom was singing along on a song about a shepherd that mentioned his black dog. This was commented on by **Mark Waters**, one half of the duo, who with **Kate Gathercole** played intricately woven tapestries of finger-picked guitar and guitarlele - a cross between a ukulele and a classical guitar that is played a fifth up. Kate also played a squeeze box, an air driven keyboard instrument that creates a textural drone that complimented Mark's guitar harmoniously.

Further ambience was added by a sampler which filled out the spaces between cantering notes. The music was delicate and sophisticated with beautiful harmonies and some more inventive combinations that at times approached discord. The pair have clearly been playing together for some time and it all felt quite effortless. Their music features on the excellent *Beating the Bounds* – a **Weirdshire** compilation.

Also on last year's **Weirdshire** recording was **Elspeth Anne**, whose self-styled ghost punk music is hard to conventionally categorise. She played a cover of a traditional song called '*Hanging Johnny*' that draws on the distorted version by Thirty Pounds of Bone. **Elspeth** fits in alongside folk acts by the haunting, cavernous quality that has a primal eerie terror that evokes spacious night forests – her album *Thieves Again* is on Woodland Recordings, the artists on which seem to share largely a sparsity, and an individual, unconventional approach to songwriting.

Elspeth's songs are enigmatic and at once disquieting and empowering. Even when they express emotions like doubt or anger they come from a place of strength. She performed better last night than I've ever seen her with an unparalleled force of feeling and her voice was in great form, reaching high notes without compromising volume and impact. I recommend that if you haven't already, you go and see her live. She continued the folk performance tradition of explaining the songs before they start but with a wry sense of humour. "This song's called Hand. It's about a hand. Disembodied. Severed if you like". As you will have picked up there is a lot of darkness in her songs, something of the Gothic tradition, more in a literary sense than musically, which is celebratory and unapologetic.

Last to the stage was **Emily Jones**, a Falmouth singer I had not heard of before. She also brought a mixture of humour and darkness of a different sort and explained immediately that all her songs were about Bees and Dust and gave the audience the option to decide which they would like to hear first, which nearly lead to a hung parliament and suggestions of dusty bees. Perhaps because she was new to my ears I admit I took a moment to warm to her music but pretty soon I was struck. Sometimes it takes a moment to hear something new but persistence pays off. Listening to the paradoxically fragile and incisive sounds I was reminded of post-Floyd Syd Barrett with a better grip on time



signatures. This comparison came to mind before an excellent Syd Barrett cover later confirmed the influence.

I am also reminded of Vashti Bunyan through the evocation of melancholy pastoral psychedelic folk in the English tradition. After playing a couple of notably doleful songs she asked "do you want to hear a sad one now?" And then as a party piece incredibly wrung a good drop of beauty out of a Status Quo song which is recontexualized as a folk ballad and barely recognisable until the chorus. An enticing mix of humour and profundity.

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Setting up your studio

When setting up a home studio, one of the most important things is having a set of monitor speakers that tell you the truth rather than flattering your music. Something with a main speaker diameter of between six and eight inches is about right for most home studios where the speakers should be positioned so that the tweeters are aimed at a point just behind your head. However, just buying a pair of studio monitors is no guarantee of an accurate sound as the room you use as your studio will also affect the sound, often in a rather more dramatic way than is ideal. The problem is that sound bounces off hard surfaces so what you hear from your comfy chair is a mixture of the direct sound from the speakers and their sound reflecting from the walls and ceiling. At mid and high frequencies, this has the effect of blurring the sound and making it difficult to locate sounds in the stereo image, but at lower frequencies you can end up with some notes sounding really loud as they hit the room resonances and others almost disappearing.

Being realistic, it is unlikely that you'll get an entirely flat response at the bass end in a domestic room or garage but you can make the best of things by ensuring the speakers always fire down the longest length of the room, not across it. Put them on firm stands or, if mounted on a desk, use speaker platforms to prevent the speakers from vibrating the desk surface. You can make your own speaker platforms using a slab of furniture foam between 50 and 80mm thick with a heavy floor tile resting on top of it. Changing the position of the speakers relative to the wall behind them can also alter the bass performance so some experimentation is required. Do this while listening to music with complex bass lines for the best results. Also avoid placing speakers too close to the room corners as that also upsets the bass performance.

Having done what you can with the bass end, those splashy mids and highs are much easier to deal with. The walls act almost as mirrors to mid and high frequency sounds so if you sit in your mixing chair and get a friend to move a mirror around the walls to either side of the you, you'll be able to find where the reflections are coming from. If you can see an image of either speaker in the mirror, that's the main culprit for reflections. There are more 'mirror' points behind the speakers too and, in rooms with low ceilings, one on the ceiling somewhere above your knees. The usual solution is to use acoustic foam, putting maybe a square metre at each side mirror point and maybe the same again behind the speakers. Rather than glue it to the wall, you can glue an old CD to the back of the panel near the top and just hang it on a nail or screw. However, acoustic foam can be expensive so if you are on a tight budget, there's a much cheaper alternative.

From a builders' supplier or from Wickes, buy a couple of packs of cavity wall insulation Rockwool, which comes in 1200 x 600mm sheets and can either be 30mm or 50mm thick. The thick stuff is more effective but either will do do a decent job. This type of Rockwool is pressed into a fairly rigid sheet so all you have to do is cover it with a breathable fabric and hang it on the wall. If you are handy at DIY you can make a wooden frame and then cover it in bed sheet material (or even that cheap, black weed stop fabric from the garden centre) but if not, just stuff it into a long pillow case and then hang it from a hook. A couple of sheets on each of the side walls and one or two sheets behind each speaker will make a dramatic difference. If the wall behind you is bare, hang a couple of panels there too. You'll notice that the room now sounds a lot 'drier' and you'll have a much more precise stereo image. Next month I'll look at how to record pro standard vocals without the need for a vocal booth.
