

"Knights of The Raj" Birmingham Museum & Art Gallery

Birmingham is home to hundreds of so-called Indian restaurants. However, many are unaware that it is the Bangladeshi community that pioneered this industry, laving the foundations for Britain's 'curry culture'.



Soul City Arts, working in partnership with Future Seed CIC, have captured the untold stories of those pioneers, tracing the origins of the Birmingham curry trade back to the 1940s. The exhibition (already running) features rare photographs, unique artefacts, videos, interactive displays and oral histories that tell the fascinating story of the much-loved British curry.



The art project is being led by Birmingham artist Mohammed Ali & historian Izzy Mohammed, & their displays are, not only visually of the highest order, but they also contain audio & concise written narratives to send the visitor away with deep and moving stories about the families who have moved to the Midlands during, at least, the last three generations. One of the unusual aspects of the exhibition is that the stories are not glamourised or sanitised; rather they artistically portray some of the struggles and the conditions which families have faced in search of livelihood since the 1940s. And, no less importantly, the displayed fixtures and local people's memories happily evoke the pleasure of socialising whilst eating curry in the surroundings of the restaurant.

This exhibition runs until 7th January 2018.



The Carpenters Arms is now fully restored after a serious fire earlier in the year and its regular monthly folk/contemporary acoustic sessions, arranged by local music stalwart Paul, alias Folkie Glos, are again in full swing.

'Full' could also describe the pub tonight - it is absolutely packed. This is an enormously popular eatery with excellent food but tonight the numbers are swelled. I'm delighted to say, by eleven members of my music Meetup group. Even the merch is moved off its table to accommodate all those who want to hear.

And nobody leaves disappointed from this one.

This is a big set, both in terms of length (well over 90 minutes) and in the quality of performance and depth of material that makes it up.

We kick off with John Stewart's 'Strange Rivers' and then the artist's own composition 'Write Me A Song' and this sets the pattern for the evening - carefully crafted covers, a nod perhaps to her busking background, intermingled with her own beautifully written and arranged compositions. She is a skilled interpreter of other people's music - she has recorded an album, 'Live at the Roundhouse', entirely composed of covers - and rather than them being fillers, as is so often the case, she infuses them with her own style and delivers them with that glorious, crystal clear voice. She absolutely nails Joan Baez' 'Diamonds and Rust', and even the one table not terribly interested in the music is hushed for this one.

But it's when the material from her new album "Night and Day" starts kicking properly, that her skill as a singer /songwriter is truly revealed - 'Falling' is exquisite, 'Gone' powerfully poignant, 'Joy of Defeat' wistful and with an air of resignation.



There's a brief mid-song hiatus as the pub cat has a mad five minutes and startles her to an abrupt halt, to great general hilarity. Then what I reckon was the song of the night hits us - it's the album's title track and in contrast with the melodic vista of what's gone before, it shouldn't work - a simple and repetitive song. based round a three chord sequence and delivered at an almost dirge-like pace, it drills its way into your head and stays there. A masterful change of tempo and style.

A shimmering version of the traditional song, 'Wild Mountain Thyme', closes the set and the merch begins to disappear from its new home at a rapid rate of knots, quite rightly reflecting what a hugely impressive performance this has been from a very fine www.saskiagm.com/ Geoffrey Head

Maddie Spares Mars Barr | Wednesday 1st November


Sultry, slightly husky, but smooth as dark treacle running off a spoon; Maddie Spares voice is to die for.

So, this thing happened. I got an email inviting entrants for a Battle of the Bands. Seeing as I'm now well into my sixth decade, I figure that the sparkling ship of rock 'n' roll fame and fortune has long since departed and I don't think I was even in the port when it sailed. I forwarded the email to my son Troy who sings and plays guitar with **Nuns of the Tundra**. The Nuns (or Nundra as they are affectionately known) are one of several talented bands from Worcestershire who have made the music scene round these parts vibrant and vital with energetic and exciting performances, and some damn good music.



The competition is run by Firestone (yes, the tyre people) in collaboration with Orange Amplification and PMT. Firestone have a long history of promoting popular music. In 1928, they sponsored the radio show, Voice of Firestone which gave a platform to new and emerging talent and became the most successful entertainment broadcast of its time.



From over 300 entrants, the Nuns were chosen as one of six finalists who were entered in a public voting stage. The vote closed with Nundra in second place meaning they're through to the final on December 14th. They will be up against hip-hop artist El-Emcee and Welsh rockers Fire Fences in a play-off at BIMM in Birmingham. Nundra recently released their fourth single, *Float Away*, with a video that won Gold for Best Animation in the New York City Indie film awards while *Mind's Eye* has over 51,000 listens on Spotify. With four tracks ready for release, the Nuns plan to record more. So, winning the competition could be just what they need as the prize includes equipment from Orange and some studio time.

Orange, said: "It is so hard to make it in the music industry, so any competition that helps artists to break through is invaluable. Battle of the Bands offers a real opportunity for them, which is a brilliant."

Simon McBride Band Huntingdon Hall. Worcester | Thur 2nd Nov

Huntingdon Hall, or to give its correct title The Countess of Huntingdon's Chapel, is a truly lovely listed building that now passes as a rather conservative entertainment venue with charity status. In amongst all the show music, poetry, comedians and cover bands, you find the odd maverick - and this particular maverick, The Simon McBride Band, was working its way home to Belfast after their European tour, presenting a rare opportunity to find a cracking rock blues band in my home city.

The hall runs to the clock and the band stepped up to blow away any doubts to their status - a thumping great 'Heartbreaker' rattled the ancient Georgian windows, with Simon straight in his groove supported by Dave Marks on bass and Marty McCloskey on drums. I say support but, in reality, they are very much on the front foot alongside Simon as we would find over the whole evening.

The rhythm dropped into a Texas shuffling rock blues of 'You Got A Problem' as Simon's fingers explored his PRS guitar. They slipped in a couple of new songs - 'Don't Dare' proved to be a bone crunching rocker, with heavy bass and drums punching through. Naturally Hendrix featured: a superlative Simon McBride styled 'Little Wing' soared high into the clear, cool skies and Marty kicked up a great rhythm as they searched for the butterfly. The magic of Spanish Castle flowed straight on but it was Stevie Ray who gave the opportunity for Dave to showboat his bass credentials. 'Change' brought chopping, slapping offbeat lines, burbled and popped out, leading to a full on dual - the broadsword four string heavy versus the 'lightweight' six pack sabre of Simon's guitar - all done with humour and an enraptured audience. Brilliant. Bassists are so often ever present but sat back so it's always good when they seize the initiative and really make their presence felt.



Simon painted a seascape of calling sirens as the boys conjured up the rolling waves to find their way to 'So Much Love'. The new, anthemic, 'Show Me How To Love' was given a big airing.

The drums beat up the stage for Simon to blast the opening bars of 'Iron Man' but what really comes across from this band is the camaraderie, humour and rapport with the audience. This is how live music should always be but sometimes it gets overlooked, often by big names who have been put on their pedestals by that audience.

A bit of audience participation was called for with 'Don't Be A Fool' before a stunning finale. 'Power Of Soul' has it all passionate lyrics, fabulous guitar licks (pushing the PRS strings and fret to the limits), thunderous bass and thumping drums - and drew a long standing ovation from a moderate but satiated audience. We had all seen something rather special from the boys from Belfast; a beautifully well-balanced band of brothers as they shook the very foundations of this aged church.

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Lycio

The Victoria, Birmingham | Thursday 16th Nov

Having missed Birmingham outfit Lycio's recent appearance at Bottles Wine bar in Worcester, I got an opportunity to see them a week later at this venerable, Grade II listed pub just behind the Alexandra Theatre in Brum.

The trio, who also appeared at the Worcester Music Festival earlier on this year, are building up a solid performance reputation, and the size of the crowd here certainly bears that out.

First and foremost, they're a band with a base in electronic music, but while paying a respectful nod to the origins of the music, their updated version breaks through any pre-conceived barriers you might have about listening to the genre and forges ahead in a most original and exhilarating style.

The impetus, and sometimes the considerable power comes from the many and various keyboards and devices of **Charlie Kellie** and the hybrid drum setup of **Alex Lowe**. Unlike most bands of this type, they currently eschew the use of pre-recorded streamed media, everything is built up from scratch.



This must put an extra strain on both musicians to attain consistency but you'd never know it – these are the two coolest cucumbers on the block, quietly going about their music-making with just the occasional nod and smile between themselves and to the audience. Kellie the picture of concentration behind the rack of keys and computer hardware, often throwing out bass patterns with one hand, while providing chiming piano shapes with the other. Lowe meanwhile, one of the very few drummers I've ever seen wearing headphones on stage, provides the perfect amount of drive, both traditional and electronic, for the often rapidly shifting backdrop of the music - a performance of great subtlety.

And then on top of it all, there's this voice.

The band's profile describes themselves as an electronic/hybrid band and until vocalist **Genny Mendez** hits her stride, which she does quickly and forcefully, you're not altogether sure what this means - after you hear the trio in full flight, you're left in no doubt.

The fusion of her soaring voice, rich and soulful, with the modern, electronic sound behind her, significantly differentiates this band from others of its type. 'Air Part II' sizzles out of the speakers, while the delicious 'Saharan King' flows out like honey. 'Strange Shapes' is fascinating and complex, contrasting with the simple, cinematic balladry of 'Alive'. We are promised a new track tonight, and 'Evil People', more jagged than the rest of the set, is a fine addition to the repertoire. Dancing breaks out and the crowd are clearly having a whale of a time.



The contrast that enlivens the music is carried through to Mendez' performance, too – unlike her quietly reflective fellow band members, she's a highly animated character, long braids flailing wildly and very talkative tonight with excellent audience rapport - 'I've been drinking beer' she offers unsolicited, to huge applause.

In any other band, you'd suspect she'd be the star, but for me, above all, balance is the great strength of this outfit. A cohesive ensemble performance as good as anything I've seen this year and an emerging force as promising as I've seen in a very long while

A band in perfect equilibrium. Simply wonderful.

Bury Tomorrow + LoatheMarrs Bar, Sunday 5th Nov 2017

Surprise You're Dead Music offer up a feast of cutting-edge heavy metal tunes this evening in what could well be the quickest sell-out for a gig in Worcester ever. There's a real buzz in the Marr's Bar tonight, and for good reason given the talents involved.

Liverpool heavyweights **Loathe** are up first. With a gritty sound vaguely reminiscent of some of Deftones' heavier work, they waste no time in battering the ear canals of the capacity crowd. Bathed in an eerie red glow, frontman **Kadeem France** works the room like a pro, backed up by clever lyric visuals displayed on screens either side of him. There are plenty of sugary vocal hooks and moments of ambient fragility to punctuate Loathe's uncompromisingly heavy groove. For me though it's those digitised, razor-sharp guitars and a locked-in rhythm section which make for a delightfully claustrophobic listening experience. Expect this Adidas-clad tech-metal mob to lay waste to much larger stages than this in the coming months.

Just enough time for a quick half before the main event, as **Bury Tomorrow** finally land in Worcester - about 8 years later than originally planned! For the unfamiliar, Bury Tomorrow are one of the few British success stories in a metalcore movement which has become fairly stagnant in recent years. Their sound bears all the hallmarks of a classic metal act – euphoric choruses, infectiously catchy riffs, and some impressive virtuoso guitar work, although it's the full-throated rasp of vocalist **Dani Winter-Bates** which remains the focal point for this impeccably tight unit. His charisma gets the venue absolutely pumping tonight. Anthems like *Man On Fire* are belted out enthusiastically by anyone sober enough to remember the words, while the pummelling beatdown sections are met with a healthy dose of good old-fashioned mosh pit action.



This gig falls midway through a lengthy run of purposefully-intimate UK dates billed as the 'Stage Invasion' tour, and it

certainly lives up to its name towards the end of the night, as a sizeable chunk of the crowd ends up partying on stage! It's one of those "I was there" moments and perfectly sums up why Bury Tomorrow are such a feel-good band in the live setting. Always a breath of fresh air no matter



how many times you've seen them, Bury Tomorrow's metalcore juggernaut just seems to keep on rolling. It's been an absolute pleasure to witness them this evening, in the sweaty confines of Worcester's premier rock 'n roll venue.

The Wurzels The Cube, Malvern. 24th November

Who can forget The Wurzels? The West Country wonders

scored a novelty No. 1 hit in 1976 and they are still touring over 40 years later. With only a couple of surviving members of the 70s Zummerzet Zider drinkers line up (Tommy Banner & Pete Budd), they are now a five piece with the inclusion of a keyboard player for the tour. At The Cube, they played favourites such as 'I Am A Cider Drinker', 'Don't Tell I. Tell 'Ee' and 'Farmer Bill's Cowman' and even a cover of the Kaiser Chiefs' 'Ruby' as the audience jigged away with cider in hand. Entertaining as it was, it was a little disappointing that they had played for less than an hour before their first 'thank you and goodnight', although, it

was fair to say that they were never going to leave before an encore or two or giving the audience their greatest hit.

I do have to say that, for me, the disappointment did not end there. Having sold millions of copies of 'I've Got A Brand New Combine Harvester' in 1976, there was a novelty twist to the

novelty hit when it was brought out as a dance mix in 2001 – and it was this drum and bass version that was played. Because this fast, dubbed version was difficult to perform live, instead of giving the audience the original multi-million selling version that everyone knows and loves, they mimed to a pre-recorded track, during which Tommy stripped to a thong! From cereal to surreal in the space of a few minutes!



The audience seemed to enjoy the evening well enough and The Cube, once again, proved to be a very suitable and accessible venue for gigs in the Malvern area and one that could prove to be very popular as they attract more bookings.

Vonhorn | online debut album

Without doubt the two finest local acts that I've seen and heard over the last dozen years or so have been Worcester's **And What Will Be Left Of Them?** - who were the very first act to be played on BBC H&W's Friday Session in 2004 - which swiftly became the template for the BBC Introducing scheme. Herefordshire's

contribution came in the form of Ross-on-Wye trio **Dandelion Killers** with both outfits producing some of the most memorable tunes it's been my absolute delight to still listen

AWWBLOT called it a day a couple of years back closely followed by DLK after their drummer Paul emigrated to New Zealand - closing the first chapter on what had been an incredible revival of H&W music talent that breathed new life into many venues



- and gave the Intro show the impetus and sheer bloody-mindedness to continue supporting our amazingly original local music scene...

Both outfits had outstanding individuals as their USP - AWWBLOT's **Pete Adams** still occasionally surfaces fronting-up **Hey You Guys!** - and *Record Deal* (check it out) is one of the finest tirades against the iniquities of the current music industry which values profitability way over musical excellence and originality shame! Dandelion Killers frontguy **Adam Daffurn** wrote, performed and produced stunning indie-rocking tunes such as 'Suburbia Falls' & 'Orphans Of The Empire' (check them out!) - but like AWWBLOT never seemed to play quite the right venues to come upon the A&R guy who'd spot an awesome talent shoved right in their face!

Times have changed though in the last few years with the juggernaut of social media and sites like YouTube, Spotify etc

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becoming the markers for what's going to be a success in the music game. So after checking them out on their debut gig at this year's Worcester Music Festival it's a pleasure to recommend Adam's new outfit **Vonhorn** comprising himself, **St John Milinczuk** of DLK (bass) and ex-Cardiacs **Dom Luckman** (drums) in their new outfit Vonhorn!

Their four-track debut album's only available online at present -

Guessing shows that this trio are quality technical musos but *Said It Before* is one almighty anthemic track that proves this supergroup have what it takes! There's a shade of Pink Floyd about *Shakes* while last track *Wishful Thinking* is a masterful production with an infectious beat...

Said It Before is already marked as one of my best tracks that I've heard this year but nowadays it's all about manageing and maximising your online profile coupled with carefully selected gigs and tours - but with a little effort it can be done and it'd be wonderful if this extremely talented outfit were to finally achieve the success they richly deserve!!




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

Cheltenham based trio. The Desperados, first joined forces at the legendary (and much missed) St Paul's Tavern open mic night. Bonding over a love of the blues rock of the likes of ZZ Top. Cream. Rory Gallagher and The Black Keys, they took their name from the most expensive free drink on offer that night and began to write their own material

Since the band's formation they've performed a number of high profile sets, taking in the likes of Frogfest, Vinestock and the first Amplified festival along the way, culminating with a decision to head to Sound Shake Studios with Greg Wilson-Copp (The Hawthornes, Roving Crows). Here, they recorded their debut, self-titled, four track EP, released as a taster for a forthcoming full length affair. hopefully to be recorded sometime next year.



finish. Opening with Salt, Teguila & Lime, the band immediately lay down a delicious, driving, barroom boogie that doesn't fail to get your feet tapping. An instantly infectious riff and a groove-laden rhythm collide in perfect harmony, prior to frontman Blake hollering to do.hollering to do. revealing an addictive, gravelly lead.

The sub three-minute opener serves as the perfect introduction to the Desperados: it's a short, sharp, bluesy blast and a whole lot of fun to boot, perfect for spinning around the dancefloor whilst hollering the mantra like refrain.

I Ain't Scared Of Dying is shorter still, weighing in at a compact two minutes. But despite it's length, the band still manage to pack a weighty punch as Blake once again shows off his licks and weathered tones whilst the rhythm section of Robbie and Karolina

> (bass and drums respectively) pump and pound. They drive the track as their frontman lets his fingers do the talking, peeling off another contagious solo. The title track follows and serves as something of a manifesto for the band as a lone introductionary riff rings out before the rest of the join in for a slower, raunchier piece. Blake's vocals are grittier than ever as he laments a smoking hot band on stage and a drink in hand. beckoning the listener in for an enticing night of rowdy blues rock thrills. That's before Going Down Slow for one final blues swing across the floor with guitar set to stun, leaving the listener after just four tracks, baying for more (rather like their live performance I suspect).

XVII | Bow To Me


XVII are a Kidderminster five-piece who, in recent years, have been turning (and banging) heads on the UK metal scene with a series of bludgeoning performances at the likes of Bloodstock

(2015) and Hard Rock Hell Metal in 2017, having first come to prominence with their 2015 release From The Ashes.

Having spent the past couple of years regularly gigging across the Midlands, the band returned to the studio in a bid to capture the uncompromising energy and ferocity they've honed during their travels.

New three track EP. Bow To Me, is the result of all their hard work and represents a band very much on the up. From the opening few seconds of lead track Shatter The Waves, you can tell they mean business. A tap of the cymbal, a crunchy metallic riff and a guttural growl signal the bands intent as they

head off into a demonic, groove laden thrash. Double kicks, bullish Kidderminster's XVII could well gatecrash the higher echelons of charging guitars and a trio of growlers unite for a hate fueled five minutes frenzy as the band bring to mind Scandinavia's finest death metal specialists In Flames among others.



light and shade enhancing the XVII experience further. The EP is drawn to a fittingly dark conclusion with live favourite Scorned, another five minute epic. It's propelled by a deep drum thump and a down-tuned riff before a repeated strike of a cymbal introduces a glorious slice of gloom ridden death metal and galloping, melodic riffs. This is while the drummer speeds and slows at will, continuously moving the track, as the band deliver a unique finale to an impressive EP.

Fans of the aforementioned In Flames, Caliban and Lamb Of God will find mind much to admire from the three tracks of O With a continued push and a sharper, more punctuated production,


The Riverlands | Salvation

Birmingham based multi instrumentalists **Jim Kitchen** and **Jamie McCollam** have been plying their trade, performing across the country in a number of different outfits, before turning their

attention to the composition of instrumental tracks for TV and film with relative success. From 2016, however, the duo decided to turn their attention back to writing rock and pop, resulting in the formation of **The Riverlands** and the release of their debut album, *Salvation*, this year.

The twelve track affair opens with the vaguely Celtic folk-tinged rock of *Sing To Me* - the intriguing guitar intro immediately lurches for the attention, leading to an infectious choral hook and rising, wordless vocal harmonies. The compelling atmospheric introduction of *Hand Tighten Only* hints at the duo's

former film and TV past. The track opens with haunting strings and a sparse orchestral feel before the vocals, guitars and drums crash in to send the two and half minute track into a more mainstream rock direction, complete with a short sharp solo - again proving the duo's obvious musical prowess.



Calling The Shots opens with a naggingly addictive chugging riff, suggesting something of a stadium rocker, however **The Riverlands** again deliver something of a curveball; offering psych influenced retro vocals, whilst the aforementioned riff remains and drives the song along. Flying continues the album's retro vein, based around a strummed acoustic, the band weave a folky

psychedelic spell; complete with affecting harmonies and a brief electric swirl middle.

Elsewhere, the band continue to mix and match influences suggesting an affinity for the infamous Nuggets box set on the 60's garage intro to *That's All This Is*; whilst *Living Free* (Mistakes Of History) offers both a Townshend like guitar windmill and a wheezing Dylan harmonica during a thrilling three minute duration.

Like most albums, not every track works for me. Despite the nice orchestral opening I could have happily skipped the twee ballad *She's Always There*, for example, but all is forgiven when they follow up with a number as strong as

And Now You See. Most tracks have a subtle twist - a hook or a winning harmony that will prompt subsequent investigation - as Salvation reveals more each spin. Head to **The Riverlands** for a richly rewarding journey through rock's back pages.

Chip Langley | Line 'em up

After becoming a fixture of the Worcester music scene for a while now, from busking on the High Street to playing open mic nights and headline gigs, **Chip Langley** has released his muchanticipated debut EP Line 'em up.

Chip's brand of introspective blues-rock translates brilliantly to record here, each of the five tracks showcasing his distinct, now-recognisable sound, yet providing enough variation to display the range of his songwriting and performing talents. Many blues-rock acts fall into the trap of predictability, the songs failing to stray from a well-trodden template. This is no concern here: Chip balances his influences with enough inventive tricks to stand out from the rest of the pack.

Opening track *Hard to Please* sets the scene with a helicopter-whirr of distortion which lands at a tight bass-led groove. The steadily-creeping rhythm is relaxed yet sinister and the spacey sound

effects, jazzy piano chords and pistol-shot drums evoke '90s triphop: this track sounds as much Portishead as The Black Keys. Chip's voice is typically emotive here, balancing bluesy grit with vulnerability. The song builds gradually to a crescendo of layered guitars, some smooth and soulful, others abrasive stabs. Chip's impressive musicianship and producer Alex Knight's skills behind the desk are both on full display here.



Hard to Please transitions seamlessly into the heavy desert-rock riffs of You've Got a Drop, with Chip's crystal clear vocals at the forefront. Gold takes a surprising yet successful left-turn and slows the pace. On this pensive acoustic ballad, graceful, melodic piano accompanies confessional lyrics ("now I've got you I ain't letting go/ if just friends, well, so be it"). Poppy WS provides the perfect counterpoint to Chip's falsetto with her captivating vocals, and

both performances sound outstanding.

Haunted is simple and restrained, ghostly keyboard chords matched by bluesy. reverb-soaked guitar, moment of calm before the ramshackle, fuzz-drenched Sweet Escape. which contains some of the most memorable lyrics of this EP ("let's turn water into wine/ drink until we're dead or 'til I'm blind") and concludes with a blistering assault of frenetic drums and wild guitar, an explosive end to this collection.

Not only are the songs on Line 'em up impressive, but the collection flows together

in such a way that each track is different from the last, yet everything remains cohesive. *Line 'em up* doesn't disappoint: Chip Langley's remarkable songwriting and performing abilities are demonstrated and brought to life with imaginative production. This is a stellar debut, and both captures Chip's current sound and shows immense future potential.

Sari Schorr & The Engine Room St George's Hall, Bewdley | 10th Nov

Sari Schorr brought her Force Of Nature to the well supported

musical hub that is St George's Hall in Bewdley. The rock blues album has received universal praise from around the world and this evening Sari and her Engine Room - Innis Sibun, Kevin O'Rourke, Kevin Jefferies and Anders Olinder - were destined to be supported by local musician Tom Callinswood. Tom is arguably best known for his presence with Arcadia Roots but was in solo form for the show.

Tom looked ready to 'Meditate' as he opened with a brightly strung acoustic guitar, whilst building up a backing rhythm. An excellent, bluesy 'Walking Blind' found everybody lives by selling something. Sticking with a blues line we were taken back to the early '50s with the gospel 'In My Fathers House'. Tom had plenty of his own material to showcase - using a mix of looping effects to build slapping percussion and multi layered vocals but the balance was good and there is no mistaking the quality of his writing and musicianship.

The Engine Room took to the stage and fired up as Sari stepped in asking, 'Where's The Money Gone'? It's Brexited but Sari's voice is good currency. 'Demolition Man' was hammered out, dragging us all to the riverside as Innis wielded the axe. Lead Belly had a makeover as Sari took us into the haunting darkness of The Pines to ask, 'Where Did You Sleep Last Night', Kevin O'Rourkes drums signalled Sari's dramatic interrogation of this classic. A sharp intake of breath to pump out an adrenalin fed 'Been A Long Time'. a high octane, turbo driven sizzler, with Led'd additive,

'The Stumble' gave Sari a vocal break as the band followed Anders on keys for this jazz fused instrumental; Innis and the Kevins taking their turns to trip their way through. Anders turned to piano to bring on the dark skies

of 'Stormy Monday', etched forever into our minds as Sari's vocal range mesmerised all. Innis took over. He is a phenomenon with an almost tantrum of intensive, energetic play - his long hair plastered across his face - as he squeezed every nuance out of his Gibson. A Monday, for once, to look forward to repeating over and over - brilliant. Sari only has eyes for her pit bull as she rocks out a dynamic 'Kiss Me' before a dedication to iconic producer Mike Vernon, in a soulful 'Let Him Go' with Innis's crying strings closing out.

I am thankful that the stage is of moderate size as I knew Sari would be wheeling and whirling around, as Innis zips back and forth on the end of an invisible bungy, while the rhythm and keys hold their cards closer to their chest. 'I Just Wanna Make Love To You' rocks out. Sari style, but an 'Ordinary Life' brings slow-burning



soul, with Kevin O on brushes for this most personal of songs. A raunchy 'Aunt Hazel' is looking on and soon explodes onto stage as Innis ramps up the opening chords, Sari punches out the euphoric lyrics. I love this hard hitting song but fear the withdrawal as we are nearing the close - Sari and The Engine Room have broken through the riverside barriers and lifted the roof of St Georges Hall. A Blistering 'Black Betty', distilled in unique Sari Schorr style ("bam-ba-lam"), brings the curtain down on a stupendous evening.

Alice Cooper Arena, Birmingham | 14th November

A few months away from celebrating his seventieth birthday and with the recent release of his twenty-seventh studio album 'Paranormal', there is no slowing down Alice Cooper.

Dressed in black, wielding a cane and displaying the energy of a man half his age, the legendary shock rocker steps out under a waterfall of sparkling pyro, to receive an ovation from an audience made up from every decade of his existence.

'Brutal Planet' and 'Under My Wheels' see Alice undertake his first minor costume changes, with his cloakroom attendant appearing from a box at the back of the stage. However, it's the lady taking centre stage who's grabbing all the attention. **Nita Strauss**, ranked #1 on Guitar World's list of '10 Female Guitar Players', is one hot player, with added wow-factor, as she pulls all the shapes you could wish to see from any iconic guitarist.

Early on, Alice delves way back into his forty-seven-year archive for numbers such as 'Pain' and 'Department of Youth', before 'Woman of Mass Distraction' leads to Ms. Strauss being given the floor to prove she is exactly that, with a great solo prior to the 1989 hit 'Poison'.

Fan favourite 'Feed My Frankenstein' includes a giant electric chair for Alice to sit in before reappearing as a giant monster lumbering around the stage. A less showy 'Cold Ethyl' sees him physically abusing a life size doll – all done in the best possible taste of course.



The 1975 ballad 'Only Women Bleed', during which Alice murders his clockwork sweetheart, makes way for the one and only new song of the night – 'Paranoiac Personality', before he is forced into a straight-jacket by a couple of masked hoodlums for 'Ballad Of Dwight Fry'.


Approaching the climax of the show, the giant guillotine appears for 'I Love The Dead'. Perhaps not so "shocking" in 2017, the blade falls and chops off Alice's head. As his severed noddle is paraded around the stage by the band, the crowd cheer with appreciation. OK, it might be the same stuff seen time and time again, but it makes it no less entertaining.

Alice and his present-day cohorts leave the stage and within a few short moments the crowd find themselves treated to something rarely seen since 1973. The Alice Cooper Band featuring original members, bassist Dennis Dunaway, guitarist Michael Bruce and drummer Neal Smith, reunited to perform a five-song mini-set of their classic hits with Alice.

With current band member **Ryan Roxie** filling in for the late **Glen Buxton** on guitar, the original line-up – with Alice in a gold, snakeskin suit – storm through a bunch of classics which they

made famous nearly half a century ago. Raw versions of 'I'm Eighteen', 'Billion Dollar Babies', 'No More Mr. Nice Guy' and 'Muscle of Love' leave the crowd eager for more.

In top-hat and tails, Alice re-emerges to orchestrate a grand finale. In amongst the pyro, confetti, bubbles and giant balloons, both bands hit the stage to finish with 'Schools Out', including a couple of verses of Pink Floyd's 'Another Brick In The Wall'.



"School's Out Birmingham!" screams Alice. "The nightmare is on us. Thank you!" With that, he and both bands disappear, and the crowd return their thanks.

After a triple bill of entertainment which included **The Tubes** and **The Mission**, it's a rocking end to a thoroughly superb show. The godfather of shock rock still knows how to turn on the night and I can't see that anybody would suggest that they've not had their money's worth. Brilliant.

Mytacism Music Presents Four Dead Crows, Saint Alto, Random Name Generator, Happy Bones Firefly, Worcester, Thurs 20th October

Now. This is obviously a live review. But bear with me. As this all goes somewhere interesting. The pre-Socratic Ancient Greek philosopher Heraclitus wrote – sometime around 500BC - that "everything must flow". That: "you cannot step into the same river twice". Ergo: "the new must wash away the old". Or more poetically: "the young must wash away the old".

It's easy to argue that this applies to art and music waaay more than anything else. But, there are those that say that the young in these, our seemingly fading years of stultifying, robot-manipulated social media, of cryptocurrencies and Snapchat, the young just don't seem to be able to wash away the old any more.

And, as a result, there's far too many crusty Generation X bands (that should have unplugged their amps for good years ago) still plying their trade, unchallenged and unmolested, on stages that rightfully belong to those half their age. (But, who knows. It's complicated. And no-one has a single wet clue what is going on in the world anymore, anyway).

This all said, there are those who would raise the tide. Change the river. Those who will find and amplify and broadcast the voice of those who must come next. Those whose moment is now. And this little soiree, courtesy of **Mytacism Music** up above the 'Fly on a fresh autumn evening, was a showcase of just and precisely that. And in order, the actual bands, all young as hell, were as follows

Happy Bones. A deliciously maudlin and yet utterly uplifting patchwork of post-everything indie-folk vignettes of the mundane - and the sublime. All delivered with heart and a lyrical flourish that would sit well on any solo singer songwriter of any generation (from Phil Ochs through to Conor Oberst) – and cut straight through with a black, self-deprecating humour that raised a wry smile.

Random Name Generator. The product of an apparently spontaneous marriage of local "non-poet" Joe Norris and Britpop revivalist Ben Dallow, this was a free-form set of irreverent, sometimes scatological, sometimes retro, all-times crisp and straight-from-the-heart, vocals and guitar only numbers that evoked the long form, lo-fi storytelling of Enablers – and the millennial, soaring immediacy of Kate (goddam) Tempest, no less. This kind of hairs-raised-on-the-back-of-the neck stuff is to be treasured, people. And much more to come from this pair. Fact.





Saint Alto. With BBC Introducing props to their name, this four piece electro-acoustic outfit work up and deliver an accomplished and complete package of poignant, pitch-perfect stories of love, loss, and upland landscapes of the soul, drawn in soaring vocal harmonics and sound. With a look that is snap-tight for the centennial festival circuit, the likes of Ben Howard should look over their shoulder.

Four Dead Crows. A Gloucester alt-heavy rock four piece doing the black-clad, high intensity Royal Blood thing (hut who wouldn't?) with their sparking personality stamped firmly on the template. The kids in the room loved them. The love and the sweat was dripping from the low, coved ceilings. And sweat and love are good. Sweat and love will save us all. And long may the sweat rise - and flow down the river like a tidal fucking bore - and wash away the old. For everything. Must flow. Yes?

Arcadia Roots Album Launch St George's Hall, Bewdley | Friday 3rd Nov

There is little I can say to add to the already substantial presence of an **Arcadia Roots** gig except, in this case, it was the hometown launch of their excellent EP.

The 'warm up' slot went to another local band who are building their own following. **The Drakelow May - Ben Webb, Will Hudd** and **Jez Thomas -** played some spell binding stuff with a folk/rock electro vibe. Named after the Drakelow Tunnels near Kinver, the music is as deep - questioning lyrics and a fascinating balance between voice, guitar, synth, and Will pounding out the 'bombs' on percussion. Check out their website for songs and gigs at www.thedrakelowmay.com.

Needless to say, you would expect a good crowd of arcadian acolytes so close to home (no disappointment there) and the sparks soon kindled as **Dave**, **Dan**, **Josh** and **Tom** fired up '*Keep Burning*', in front of a backwash of fractal psychedelia. Where you going to run to - nowhere as a bout of '*Amnesia*' washes over.

'Big Man' Dave is on deep toms and snare, Tom is on er.... toms - herein djembe, to avoid further confusion! The rhythm is beating out, mesmerizing as ever, with Dan layering his guitar over the primal rhythms of drum and Josh's bass. A quick swap around and Tom is on sticks, Dave on djembe, Dan strung out as ever, for a simply called 'new song'. I'm sure it will find a label soon enough; I seem to recall "freedom" comes into the lyrics, so I'm advocating Mandelal

Maddie steps forward into the tangled web to add her siren like voice to the hypnotic drug of powdered arcadian root; chill out, just keep 'Searching' finding a path Bob Marley's reggae rhythms of 'Fussin'n' Fighting'. Josh sets up a throbbing bass as the sound builds into a haunting 'Primal Rhythm'; Dave is well into his groove; Maddie stands next to Dan adding her call; Tom is constantly moving; Josh stands in the shadows, his presence ever felt. The



floor is alive with writhing bodies - an ever moving morass of dancing hedonists, lost in the music.

Maddie steps down and Jack steps up, tenor sax to mouth and a small synth/keyboard at hand. The guitar notes from Dan and Tom pick out the opening bars of 'Lose My Mind', run baby run drives out, filling the air with its heady mix. Another 'new song' - maybe this was the freedom thing, what the hell, I'm high on the rhythmic pulses of this music - then Dave's beating out the message on African drum, determined to 'Take You Higher'.

The atmosphere is phenomenal - completely intoxicating - as the night moves towards its conclusion, but not before we cross back over to the Caribbean spirit of 'Exodus', movement of the people. No argument - the floor is still heaving, an ocean of waves, full of uncontrolled energy; 'Save Me' before I drown in the depths of undercurrents.

A fabulous evening with **Arcadia Roots**. **St George's Hall** has just about contained the flood of glorious sounds. If you haven't already found a copy of their EP, you've done yourself a disservice - just grab one at their next gig. Don't forget to listen out for **Drakelow May** too.

So anyway. WORCESTER. Statistically Britain's most average place. A place judged by **Rough Trade** records - only this very month - to be not cool enough to have its own proper record shop anymore.

But. The queer and wonderful thing is this. That nominally uncool places often sprout by far the most interesting art. And the most entertaining noise. For those places that think themselves cool are (if you have lived in them) usually crushingly dull and predictable places where every band sounds... the same. Artistic monocultures where no-one ever takes any real risks in the crave effort to build up page likes and followers - and maybe, juuust maybe - attract the prey attention of what remains of the (*ahem*) mainstream music industry. And just possibly be the next Royal (shitting) Blood or Ed (bleeding) Sheeran. Or something.

In the other places, such as those without a Rough Trade record shop, diversity flourishes. Bills are diverse. Risks get taken. The whole thing is done - much like this entire magazine - for love and not for money. (Because there is no actual money. And getting over ten likes for a witty social media post is enough to make a band or a promoter feel proper loved).

And so this was a highly diverse bill. With risks taken. And it felt all the more lovely for it.

Opening proceedings were the local beat-poetry meets The Verve combo now known as **Random Name Generator**. A deceptively simple guitars and voices two-piece, telling grainy, semi-improvised twenty-first century Bukowskian tales of



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ascendant humanity in the face of despair, of love and fleeting tenderness in the pitiless teeth of the post-crash, gig-economy, zero-hours contract world. With heart and grit - and humour. Sadly, this pair will never get to play in-store at a Rough Trade record shop in their home town. And that fact, alone, is what really brings a tear to the eye.

Next up: Worcester's **Navajo Ace**, four pieces of alt-rock crispness known for their finely-crafted yet full-bodied college rock sound. In what I understood was a total, punt in the dark experiment, this was a full Nirvana unplugged in New York style, seated semi-acoustic set, with their spectacular beast of a drummer restrained to just a tambourine and a floor tom. And the result was something extraordinary. A sparse, immediate slice of reflective Americana that made this goldfish bowl of a provincial wine bar feel more like upstate Washington State. Like the bar in Twin Peaks, no less. Which is a very, very good thing.



For their part, this band will never now get to see their beautifully packaged and entirely self-released EP sold at a local Rough Trade record shop. But all those stellar bands signed to Rough Trade will. The tragedy. It is never-ending.

And, down from the only marginally less uncool - and also undeserving of a Rough Trade record shop - city that is Birmingham, headliners **Lycio** switched gear entirely. To such a degree that it almost took the breath clean away. A slick, tight and totally personable hybrid live electronica neo-soul trio that dropped in, did their thing - note, beat and style perfect – and went home. Knowing it was a job very well fucking done indeed.



And that, ladies and gentlemen, is what happens when you don't get a Rough Trade record shop in your town.

Dreadful, isn't it. Goodnight. And God bless.

Meg Hayden + Russ Poole

Smokev loe's Coffee Bar. Cheltenham | Sat 11th Nov

There's a lovely, nostalgic atmosphere pervading the quirky interior of Smokey Joe's in Cheltenham, with pinball machines. pull-handle slots and an abundance of neon signs adding to the impression you just stepped back in time. But make no mistake, the increasingly impressive music they're putting on here is bang up to date.

First up tonight is Gloucester singer/songwriter Russ Poole. who's several EPs into his career and has built up a very solid local



And that reputation is well justified, too - he has an excellent voice, rich and flexible, with a deft guitar technique. The songs are music for grown-ups, there is much reflection here and one particularly fine example, about alcoholism, is both poignant and hard-hitting. He jokes, when coming to play his upbeat final song, that he's finally got round to a happy one!

As well as his own compositions, he also throws a very unusual cover into the mix, a reworking of Vanessa Carlton's "1000 Miles" - stripped of its high tone piano work, the interpretation is so different, it's a good couple of minutes before I realise what I'm listening to. Very bold indeed and completely successful.

A fine set.

This is the fifth time I've seen Meg Hayden play and it's not for want of enthusiasm on my part that I haven't reviewed her before, more a question of finding the right words to properly convey her have easily listened to the whole performance again. talent and enormous potential.

She's a highly versatile performer, somewhat of a musical chameleon, because not only does she have her solo singer/songwriter act, she is also a notable rapper. In addition, she



fronts the excellent Vajazzle Dynamite, who despite their dodgy 80's glam-rock moniker, play a thunderous and exhilarating mixture of hard rock, post-hardcore and heavy ska. Well worth a look if they're playing near you.

You're left in little doubt, even after a few minutes of music, that she's the possessor of a most extraordinary voice. The Jazz, Soul and Blues inflections flood though every song, and the apparent ease with which she slides, or sometimes rushes up the power scale without disturbing clarity or pitch is mighty impressive. And, unlike a lot of singers, she makes it clearly evident that she's having a great time performing, a smile is never far away from breaking out on her face.

There's a very wide variety of material in her long set tonight, the whole thing being topped by her own tremendous composition "Ten to Zero", which is one of the finest things I've heard this year. But it's the way that she incorporates unusual and heavily restructured covers into the set that keeps your attention piqued throughout the performance.

There's a suitably acerbic delivery of "Don't Call Me Baby", a stately and immensely powerful version of Avicii's "Wake Me Up", which is close to being the song of the set and then she launches into astonishing and highly mobile take on The Jungle Book's "I Wanna Be Like You" - you're still wide-eyed with amazement that she'd tackle this one when you realise that all the time she's bouncing around, the scat sections are being delivered with absolute precision and impeccable timing.

She plays for around an hour tonight, and to be honest, I could

Venues like The Firefly, The Iron Road and of course the Marrs Bar are doing their bit with regular events but of course in the end it's down to the promoters to make these gigs a success - and Tollywood Productions had obviously done a very fine job in the lead-up to this unique bash!

The support slot came from Malvern's no-frills heavy rockers Grizzleroot with their crowdwarming set of cracking original and frequently tongue-in-cheek numbers like 'Head To The Bar' and 'Stellatron' - I've seen these guys a couple of times before and they've got a great presence and riffs a-plenty to keep your foot tapping - well recommended!!

This was a double album launch from Worcester's very own Massive Head Trauma - and by that I mean two separate albums 'Punching The Clown' and 'Waiting For Death' - that's



different! Frontman Gary Lewis AKA the Reverend Genghis Memphis is the original manic street preacher and delivers a sermon of hellfire, brimstone and eternal damnation to the assembled sinners - probably quite rightly so! There's ditties about carnivals, cosmology catastrophic warfare sprinkled in their set but the RGM makes sure that the humour isn't too far away. Credit to MHT as well for their efforts in the make-up department with Gary sporting an incredible scaley 'snakeshead' persona for the evening!!



Only a slight touch of uncertainty towards the end as the Good Reverend introduced the band - Evil Dave on guitar, Phil Karnage on bass and of course the unkillable Death on drums - before confessing that he didn't know who the fuck he was - a very fair point!! 


