
We also look back fondly at Wychwood Festival and to the inaugural Beardy Folk festival which looks set to be a new favourite on the folk scene.

Homeland of Hope and Glory

The archives of Worcester boy made good, **Sir Edward Elgar** could leave the county as the *Elgar Foundation* decides if they should go to the **British Library** in London rather than be held locally at the **Hive**.

Thousands of items of Elgar's personal archives which were held in **Worcestershire Archives** from 1967 and then at **Elgar's Birthplace Museum** in Broadheath, could end up in London rather than being returned to the Hive despite mounting opposition from a range of people including the Bishop of Worcester, local MPs, business leaders, arts and music organisations and figureheads. An online petition is into the 000s and a crowdfunding project has been launched –all to try and keep the heritage of Worcestershire's most famous musical talent local. The Hive already contains documents of national significance such as Shakespeare's marriage certificate. Add your voice via the online petition at change.org..

Fenders Mexican wave

News in the guitar and gear world with the announcement that Fender's entry-level Mexican Standard Series will be discontinued in favour of a brand-new successor line called the Player Series - featuring all of the classic Fender guitar and bass models — Stratocaster, Telecaster, Jazzmaster and Jaguar guitars - as well as Precision, Jazz and Jaguar basses — at more affordable prices than their American-made alternatives.

Phoenix from the ashes

A new 'not-for-profit' organisation - **Severn Arts** - has been formed from the ashes of **Worcester Youth Music** to deliver music education and wider arts opportunities across the county by working with schools and other agencies. The new organisation is now separate from the county council and aims to raise revenue to operate via business partnerships and 'arts council' grants...

Brass-phyxiate

The local lad who sang 'Nessun Dorma' at a karaoke night in Worcester which attracted over 7000 views on Facebook has made an appearance on ITV's Good Morning Britain and is hoping for further opportunities. Luke Swatman's pitch-perfect performance at the Eagle Vaults pub in Friar Street has been likened to Pavarotti and has attracted national and international media attention - best of luck chap!

Hereford Tull I die...

lan Anderson - the legendary frontman of Jethro Tull - will be performing a Christmas concert at Hereford Cathedral on Tuesday 18th December with all proceeds going towards the upkeep of the cathedral and supporting its musical activities. For the last ten years lan has played Christmas events in the UK's cathedrals, raising money for their maintenance and preservation, and the concerts are aimed at both secular and more 'worshipful' audiences - more info at hereford-cathedral.org

Maida a lot of music

Musicians have responded mostly with dismay to the news that the BBC plans to shut down its **Maida Vale studios**, calling for the iconic venue to be saved. The BBC plans to move from the studio in north-west London to a new base in the east of the capital by 2022. Maida Vale has been used by the BBC for 84 years, hosting live sessions from the likes of The Beatles, Morrissey, Nirvana and more. It was also the home of John Peel's BBC Radio 1 Peel Sessions, while The Fall have released full albums of material recorded there - plus local acts such as Soeur and Peace have also recorded sessions there!

In a bit of a Flap

The future of **The Flapper** is secure for twelve months (at least) as the business discusses its future with Birmingham City Council. The popular venue, which was mooted for closure and redevelopment at the end of 2017, will now re-assess its plans and remain open for business until 30th June 2019.

A series of 'Celebration Of The Flapper' events will continue to take place and the team at The Flapper has promised to book in some great shows and organise some amazing events for the next 12 months. Follow their Facebook page for more info.

If you're in Worcester on Saturday 7th July, you won't miss the city's annual Carnival. With live music stages, street entertainment, family activites and a procession stretching the length of the High Street and beyond, organisers are promising an action-packed day for the whole family.

The Organ Grinders held a Midsummer Ceilidh (barn dance to you heathens) on Saturday 16th June, as an early taster for Worcester Music Festival (WMF) & to raise some funds for this year's chosen charity Worcestershire Association of Carers.

The event was a barnstorming (geddit?) success with the estimable folkies making over £650 for the worthy charity!

Bromsgrove Arts Cash Boost

Arts Council England has awarded a £49,000 grant to Bromsgrove District Council, the conveyor of the Bromsgrove Arts and Culture Consortium.

Artrix, Avoncroft Museum, Bromsgrove Arts Alive!, Bromsgrove Festival, Bromsgrove International Music Competition, and Severn Arts - Worcestershire's Music Education Hub also formed the bid.

The consortium is now seeking the views of the public in two workshops.

A spokesman said: "Come and tell us who are you engaging with, what's working well, who you would you like to engage with, but are struggling to connect to, and what you think is missing from Bromsgrove's cultural offer.

"The eventual recommendations will be heavily informed by these real experiences of people that are out there doing the work in the community.

All Round The World





Giraffes to stand through city for art trail

Glorious giraffe sculptures will soon tower over the streets and open spaces of Worcester for a spectacular public art trail. Worcester Stands Tall will see 30, 8ft tall, multi-coloured sculptures displayed in a free trail from July 9th to Sept 16th. The trail is by Wild in Art - the company behind events including The Big Sleuth in Birmingham - and is brought to the city by St Richard's Hospice.



The fibreglass giraffes have been hand-painted by artists from the mood for an adventure around the city – with some surprises both the local area and across the UK. Alongside the large giraffes. there will be 27 smaller calf sculptures - decorated by schools and community groups - for a display in Worcester's Crowngate Shopping Centre.

Sara Matthews, Project Manager for Worcester Stands Tall, said: "We have been blown away by the creativity of the artists, schools and groups who have decorated our sculptures. The artwork is so varied, each sculpture is interesting and eye-catching - we can't wait to see the giraffes standing proud through our fantastic city."

Each large sculpture is sponsored by organisations from across Worcestershire and will be auctioned in October to raise funds for the hospice's Build 2020 Appeal. The appeal aims to raise the final £1.4 million needed for a £5.3 million extension and redevelopment of the hospice building in Worcester - enabling it to care for more patients in the future.



There's an app (from the Google Play Store and the Apple App Store), which will allow visitors to track their progress as they walk the trail, discovering giraffes and facts about the city along the way. Trail maps will be available from points around the city, including Worcester Tourist Information Centre, Worcester Cathedral, Crowngate Shopping Centre and the Worcester Stands Tall pop-up shop – also located in Crowngate Shopping Centre.

There are other ways to get involved with the trail too, including a Safari Walk on Sunday, July 22. (see below).

There will also be a Farewell Event at Worcester Cathedral from 5th to 7th Oct – giving visitors the chance to see all the giraffes together for the last time before they are auctioned on Thursday, October 11.

Safari Walk

The St Richard's Hospice Safari Walk will take place on Sunday, July 22 starting from Worcester Racecourse in Grand Stand Road at 10am. They are calling for explorers (& walkers) to take part and also come dressed as your favourite safari animal if you wish! Covering approximately either 3 or 6 miles, the walk takes in the decorated, 8ft tall giraffe sculptures on the Worcester Stands Tall art trail and is raising money for the hospice's Build 2020 Appeal.

The full safari (6 mile) will see walkers visit each of the 30, 8ft tall giraffes - while the shorter half safari route (3 mile) takes in 15 large sculptures. There will be a warm up with the team from David Lloyd to get everyone in

along the way!



Tickets for the Safari Walk are £15 for adults, £10 for children under 16, and under 2's go free. Family tickets £40 (two adults & two children aged 2 to 15, or one adult, three children aged 2 to

Double teasers for Worcestershire Exhibition

This month you can get along to two showcases of artwork both linked with the Worcestershire Open Studios Exhibition happening this August.

The Cap 'n' Gown pub on The Upper Tything, Worcester, has a new show starting, run in conjunction with the Open Studios. showcasing work by city based potter Chris Greening, painter Rachel Kay Hall and mixed media artist Susan Birth.

Chris explained the inspiration behind his creations comes from studying marine geology; the fluidity of slipware gives him a fantastic medium to explore the nature's abstract patterns.

In contrast, Rachel's striking floral watercolours with pen and ink are painted and stylised from real life subjects. After successfully participating in Worcestershire Open Studios last year. Rachel relishes the opportunity to share her artwork in a less conventional setting.



Bold use of colour and pattern are defining features of Susan Birth's impactful semi-abstract landscape and still life images, created using using paint, ink, gouache, charcoal, pastels and collage.

Cap 'n' Gown landlord Ted Marshall came up with the idea of having an 'art wall' in the pub after seeing artwork during last August's Worcestershire Open Studios event. The display will change on a regular basis, showcasing work by artists who are participating in August bank holiday weekend open studios event.

The current exhibition is on display until the end of August and can be viewed during normal pub opening hours.

And in Malvern as a sneak preview to the event later this summer, you can see work from Worcestershire artists with both 2D and 3D artwork, as part of The Great Malvern Exhibition Walk, which runs along Church Walk and outside Waitrose.

The display features work in a variety of media including a still life painting by Worcester painter Nicola Currie, a self-portrait at 50 by Portfolio 18 member Kirstie Trobe, a stunning image entitled Luminous Ash by photographer Mark Zytynski, a couple of lino-cut prints, a ceramic goat and some vibrant abstract pieces.

The exhibition offers a glimpse of what will be on offer at the Worcestershire Open studios over the August Bank Holiday weekend 25th - 27th August.

This year 81 locations will be available to visit, giving art fans a unique opportunity to venture into normally unseen spaces and talk directly to artists about their inspiration and creative processes. There will also be pieces of original and locally made arts and crafts available to see and buy.

Sally Anne Morgan, artist and Worcestershire Open Studios coorganiser, said: "This year's Worcestershire Open Studios is our biggest yet and this exhibition is a fantastic way of whetting the public's appetite with just some of the work they will be able to experience later this summer."



Malvern Hills District Council introduced The Great Malvern Exhibition Walk in 2015, with support from Great Malvern Association of Traders, the Elmley Foundation and Pulse Great Malvern. The aim was to provide more permanent exhibition space in the town for artists and community groups to display their work.

Hannah is also a Senior **Fellow of the Higher Education Association** and is currently completing a practice-as-research based PhD at **The University of Warwick**.

Funding to secure the Director of Transformation position has come from Worcester City Council and the Elmley Foundation, and we're incredibly grateful for their support.





Calvin from Worcester's The Cabin will be presenting mounting and framing solutions showing off the best in these talented artist's work. Worcester Mayor

As part of the Archimp Pop-up Gallery Initiative, launched in February this year, it will be the first annual event of its kind and scale in Worcester. There are already plans to expand this initiative to other towns and cities throughout the UK.

It will be held alongside the River Severn and will compliment the St. Richards Hospice Duck Race and Celebration Gardens events being held on the same day at the South Quay.

Grants for the Arts & Communities Available

Arts Grants in general overall have been reduced, but Elmlev partnership with Community First - continue to support the



Arts within Herefordshire & Worcestershire. The Elmley Foundation funds the Small Grant Arts Fund Scheme and aims to support and develop the arts scene in Herefordshire and Worcestershire by focusing on community groups who wish to apply for funding for arts events and activities, or equipment. It enables these groups to apply to up to £1,000 to continue their



valuable work for the benefit of their local communities, at a time of increasingly restricted funding for the arts.

Deadline for the next round for Elmley applications is 8th October 2018. Events and Activities grant can help local groups to organise new arts and cultural activities, particularly in areas where these kinds of events rarely take place. Applicants are expected to show that people from all walks of life will be encouraged to take part, either as participants or as part of the audience. The Arts Equipment grant enables community groups to purchase equipment which will help to improve access to the arts locally and applicants will need to show that the equipment will make a long-lasting impact and will be used regularly by a range of groups in the community.

Stone Mountain Sinners Mello Festival | 26th May

An unexpected last minute invite from the **Stone**Mountain Sinners saw us once again heading for a night at Mello Festival, only this time we headed to the Severn And Country Estate in Hanley Castle, with the festival having moved from it's original location at Throckmorton Airfield.

A scoot round the new site revealed more arena space and a better layout than before, whilst still offering plenty to do for revellers of all ages. Meeting up with a few people I know, they spoke of a fantastic atmosphere despite the previous day's weather, they



were also quick to commend the festival's varied line-up.

Following on from the Stone Mountain Sinners' triumphant debut performance (two sets if you want to be pedantic) at last year's Mello, the six-piece roots rockets were understandably invited back to showcase material from their soon to be released debut album.

The band took the penultimate Melomania stage slot by storm, opening with Walk Of Shame. The 'Sinners soon saw their audience grow as their mix of Americana, blues and good old fashioned rock 'n' roll summoned people from the outside in, intrigued by the combination of **Neil Ivison's** gravelly tones and

Sarah Warren's powerful blues/soul holler. Talking of Sarah, she offered up one of her golden oldies (from the Sarah Warren Band days) in the shape of *Stronger* (and the song certainly was that with Neil clawing at his guitar), a swaggering *Going To The Roadhouse* followed before an outing for brilliant harmony drenched newbie possibly called *Elvira May*.

Roger Roberts led the band with a slab of barrel house piano on the bluesy Warren fronted swagger of Fool Like Me, before Ivison encouraged us to Give It Up For Love. The audience happily committing by adding their own voices to that of the band, and those of us in the know joined again for the sizzling country gospel of Shuffle My Feet

The 'Sinners rounded off their impressive performance with a inspired canter through *Fortunate Son*, with the band flexing their muscles with an extended jam, led by a fiery Ivison, before offering once last chance to raise the roof with their own *She Said Yeah*. Again the audience responded with a rousing group holler, drawing the

band's set to a thrilling climax.

With further live dates and festival performances in the pipeline and that aforementioned album on the horizon, you can expect to hear a great deal more from Worcester's premier roots band before the summer's out.

ian Parker Band
The Prince Of Wales, Ledbury | Sunday 17th lune

Ledbury's Prince of Wales provides a beautifully intimate atmosphere for tonight's gig, allowing locals the chance at being just an arm's length away from one of the country's finest guitarists and songwriters; Ian Parker. Back in 2015 Ian released the superb album *Politik Blues*, which still receives regular plays on my lo-fi, although the lack of new recordings has not gone unnoticed. However, Ian has recently teased at the prospect of a new album, suggesting that recording sessions are imminent. With this in mind, the evening ahead is held with even more anticipation, both at the thought of hearing old favourites and now, with the hope of hearing new material.

But lan surprises us all, and the evening opens with an ad hoc lullaby for his young son, before he is whisked away, home to bed. With dad duties done for the night, **Steve O'Maddy** sets up the bass line for the moody *Everything You Feel*, while lan teases us



with his Strat, and Chris Fenn drums up the rhythm. Now nicely warmed up, *Humanity Blues* fills the timbered confines of the Prince, definitely a standout song from lan's *Politik Blues*; its organic, almost tribal pulse is inspired by a trip to Mississippi, and is bound together by a rich caramel sound from the Fender.

A World Of Pretty Faces are uncovered within these swamp infested blues, with Chris' drumming his way through the heat. The slow, passionate blues of Love So Cold ease in over a punchy rhythm, and Ian paints a spectrum of colour with his wah-wah pedal shedding the tears. Next up is a quick nod to Hendrix from the Watchtower, before a soulful Misfits And Fools brings in a quick break.

Almost Cut My Hair sounds like an unlikely title, but that's to belie the soul-drenched song; I feel like I owe it to someone, the lyrics gently build, flavoured by the distinctive chords of Peter Green's appropriately Green Manalishi; a truly beautiful and enthralling sound, while lan squeezes every ounce of passion from his white Strat. It's a sound that seeps through the pores of the building and into the cobbled lane.

Chris sets a metronomic tick on the drum for *The River Runs Deep*, and the icy water floods through the crowd with its hypnotic chill. The spell is broken by a request for another of lan's landmark songs from *Politik Blues*; the wonderful *Kampuchea*. Bass and drum build the foundation while lan works hard on the strings to mesmerise, keeping up with Steve's deep bass. But the clock, as ever, is against us. As the set draws to a close, there's still time to take to the air with Hendrix' *Little Wing*, lan glides with us, soaring and floating through the heavens, with only the weight of time bringing us back to earth.

It's always a pleasure to hear **Ian Parker** perform, and the Prince of Wales draws him back each year. He may be playing to the converted, but that's fine by me. This is one gig I could not miss; a fix that will have to sustain me until his next visit in the autumn.

Another Fine MessMillion Smiles.... And A Few Smiles More

Ahh.. Another Fine Mess... local pop/punk/indie heroes of yesteryear sum up the remastered reissue of Million Smiles with the chorus of their own I Remember You 'I remember you do you remember me?, Do you remember how it used to be?, Long time ago when we used to dance, do it all again if I had the chance'.

Well I remember seeing Another Fine Mess at The Stage (or was it Gonzos then?) with the likes of Funbug or Half Term, maybe National Speed Limit or perhaps Blessed Ethel. It's hard to recall as I probably threw myself around to every local band going back in those days. Around the same time I was handed a copy of their album Million Smiles and being taken in by the likes of the aforementioned, I Remember You, Million Miles Away and lead track Smile, the disc often accompanied the stomp to work with the songs burying their way into my subconscious, the hooks still nagging and rearing their head every once in awhile. So when I was given the remastered edition (with bonus disc) of Million Smiles to write-up, I was intrigued to see if the album lived up to my rose-tinted memories.

Weighing in at ten tracks and a sprightly near thirty minutes, *Million Smiles* still manages to grab the listener by the lapels and demand attention from the off. The aforementioned *Smile* opening with a humming guitar buzz and a melodic **Simon Pitt** punk croon. The band soon set off at a thousand miles an hour driven by the galloping rhythm section of **Roland Link** (bass) and **Steve Makepeace** (drums) and the twin guitars of **Stuart Jones** and **Steve Badsey**.

Throw in an instant choral hook and a handful of group harmonies and I'm transported back to Lowesmoor and my formative years, happily hollering away with an ironic smile wedged on my face 'It's so funny that you never smile these days'. Link's bass introduces the equally potent No Way Out, as the 'Messie's bring to mind The Buzzocks at their prime. It's fast, snotty and yet accessible, much like fellow long term favourite Million Miles Away with it's chiming guitar and military drum tattoo like introduction and the once heard, forever addicted chanted group chorus.

Listening on and I feel the 'same as yesterday' as the buzzing, hook-laden punk anthems continue to pour from the speakers, reminding me just why I loved this album first time round. From the wordless harmonies of *Yesterday* to the chugging riffs and shout-a-long refrain of *I Remember You*, to the Ramones styled bubblegum pop outro of *Was It Me* and the frenzied *Apologise* with it's over driven bass and threats of feedback, there's not an ounce of fat or wasted momentum to be found on *Million Smiles*.

The fourteen track second disc (A Few More Smiles) neatly rounds up a plethora of EP, demo and compilation appearances for **Another Fine Mess**. All those rarities you didn't know you wanted but are actually almost as essential as 'Smiles itself. The disc is led off by the four most recently recorded tracks (recorded in 2013 and collectively known as Four More Smiles), suggesting the band have lost none of their original swagger. In fact rerecorded versions of both I Remember and Smile see the band replace a bit of zip with a greater production punch giving both tracks a new lease of life. Whilst the rhythm section of Link and Makepeace combine to propel the spiky indie of (newbie) July and the glorious harmony assisted powerpop of Heads Or Tails. Stand alone French compilation track Corner, is probably worth the price

of admission and could easily be lifted as a single, a pacy, infectious number complete with galloping riffs, a short, sharp solo and frontman Pitt at his absolute best, no wonder it was picked to represent the band.

Further disc two highlights include Last Demo tracks *Dreamin'* and *Harry H*, both a little rough and ready. The first is a full tilt 'Messies punk song that captures the live essence of the band, whilst the latter is something a little different, coming on as a more 60's inspired garage rocker but retaining the typical Another Fine Mess attitude. Warts and all versions of *Million Miles Away*



and Was It Me prove just how contagious both songs are. The final three tracks, taken from the rougher than a badgers arse Lollin' With Colin, show that with the likes of Spangles and Tell Me, you can't keep a good song down. And with a bit (ok a lot) of spit and polish there could be enough material for another album if the band were to revisit those vaults.

Friends and fans of **Another Fine Mess** may well have the original version of *Million Smiles*, but with an extra fourteen tracks on offer, *A Few More Smiles* is well worth a punt, whilst newcomers will discover one of Worcester's finest. Now all we need is a raft of live dates... I wonder if Black Cherry fancy revisiting the snot and sawdust days of Lowesmoor?

New Release

Artiphunk | Joyride

Artiphunk are a Worcestershire based trio comprising of guitarist/lead vocalist James Mattey and rhythmic brothers Adam and Dan Clifford on bass and drums respectively. The band first formed around five years ago and since then the band have been busy honing their sound, writing and gigging across the county (and beyond), taking in the likes of Lakefest, Mello and

Livestock and sharing stages with the likes of Scouting For Girls and Toploader among others.

In more recent times the band have been writing, recording and producing a brand new EP that should see the light of the day sometime towards the back of this year, drawing on the experience of both James and Dan's music college courses at Leeds College Of Music and a previous recording session with Tom Gittings at Monochrome Productions towards the tail end of 2017.

The aforementioned studio work with Tom sees the band deliver a brand new single in the shape of Joyride. An instantly infectious track that showcases the aptly named band's funk riddled sound, but

funk rock introduction to a more melodic and dare I say pop

infused mid-section and back again for a frenzied final third. On first outing Joyride took me a little by surprise. The opening salvo, driven by the elastic bass work of Adam and Dan's work behind the kit, sounded reminiscent of The Jimi Hendrix Experience or prime time Chilli Peppers in full flow. Mattey peels off a monstrous, chugging and ves funky as hell riff before a twang of the four string signals a new direction. Choppy guitars and a melodic lead hint at early Fishbone or fellow local funkateers, Cantaloop. Leading to an irresistible choral hook complete with addictive harmonies and

a hint of those previously mentioned infectious rock riffs. After a couple of runs through the chorus. Mattev is invited to let his six string do the talking, exploding into a short sharp solo, whilst the Clifford brothers continue to drive the song towards a fitting and powerful finale, flexing their muscles one final time.

Joyride has it all, rise and fall, a winning melody, an undeniable hook and a whole heap of drive, suggesting Artiphunk and indeed their forthcoming EP will be well worth keeping an eve on, in the months ahead.

Smokin' Pilchards | Into The Brine

An album boasting both coastal and West Midland's references, this jaunty nine track collection serves up a feast of joyous, chaotic splendour.

Into The Brine is the recently released debut from the pioneers of the Black Country/Cornish crossover sound, the **Smokin'** Pilchards.

The folky five piece (Johnny C, Ryan Peters, Roberto Carlucci, Ted Cartwright and the mysteriously secretive, Al) evoke a vibe and spirit similar to that of noughties favourites The Rumble Strips and Larrikin Love, which can only be a good thing.

Front man Johnny C's tales of murder and misadventure on the high seas are enhanced by an infectious rhythm section and a two pronged melodic attack. It's fair to say Ted's inventive sax probably defines the band's sound, but Roberto's meandering guitar master-class is a lesson for any aspiring player.

Personal highlights include the sing-a-long live favourites *Smoke House* and *Do Yourself a Favour*, but it's the open honesty of *I.O.U*





and the haunting Lost at Sea that probably best display the depth of song writing. Jared Bryant's fantastic production is well worthy of a mention too.

Festival bookers should be beating down the door (or should that be can?) for this nautical (but nice!) stomping, sea shanty machine.

The Model Folk Houses For Little Horses

This neatly packaged Yellow offering by North Somerset six piece **The Model Folk** rocks in at nearly 63 minutes long containing 15, mostly self penned, songs and tunes.

It is an interesting mix ranging from swirling Balkanesque sounds on clarinet, trumpet and accordion, to mandolin and ukulele driven comedy songs in the Bonzo Dog vein, through to thoughtful lyrical love songs that one would find hard to pigeon hole.

Houses for Little Horses opens with a blast of trumpet and clarinet, played by the wonderfully named Brave Sir Thomas and Lord J Raymond Mears Stallwood Esquire, respectively, on a most peculiar tale entitled Forty Days a Liar: a Bank Clerk returns from abroad with an elixir in his suitcase,....or does he? This is just one of their many thought provoking tales. Listen too to One More Daiquiri, a cautionary tale of drinking alone with its la la la's and subtle use of violin. Those of you familiar with The Eskies and The Tiger Lillies will make comparisons with songs like Of Tooth and Claw and Leona Dare, the latter being a tale of derring do about a Circus Entertainer nicknamed 'Lady Iron Jaw'.

Of the other songs, *Sick, Sick World* - bemoaning a run of bad luck, *A Crocodile, Nipples for Men* (dig the Nipple Rap in the middle!) and the very catchy Naked in the Kitchen - a vain attempt to sober up before a partner returns home with the new baby and a stark warning on the horrors of parenthood, would fall into the aforementioned Bonzo 'stable' (can you see what i've done there?).


The tune sets, 3 in total, are traditional bar one. *Finer Ties* is more Baroque than Balkan, a beautiful short piece of no more than a minute and a half featuring violin, viola and cello. Bulgar Romanische is an accordion and clarinet led Balkan Polka. *Ederlezi* is an evocative piece celebrating Spring amongst the Romani

minority in the Balkans. You can sense the gradual growth of new life as the tune builds, climaxing with a wonderful choir. Whilst on the subject of Spring, listen to their own song *Finistere*, a song of hope presumably written whilst gazing out across the Atlantic; perhaps my favourite song on the album.

An album indeed which really offers great value for money, with both quality and quantity abounding. Go buy it from all the usual online places including their very own website www.modelfolk.com.

I would love to see them live too (plenty of action down their way) as it is clear from this album that they are all very accomplished musicians with a great sense of fun....no long faces here

ULTRAMEGAOK Shaun Grant Selective, Ewan PollockMarrs bar | Friday 25th May

A trio of musical talent converged on The Marrs Bar for another evening of entertainment.

Kicking off the evening was Ewan Pollock. A young artist from Scotland who has been on my radar for a couple of vears. I first saw him at The Old Pheasant, but more recently I've caught snippets as I pass him while on my lunch break as he busks on the streets of Worcester. Ewans voice is a deep and husky growl (think Kelly Jones of The Stereophonics) and his selection of covers showcased this perfectly. Starting off with Come Together, stripped right back



and accompanied by a lazy guitar, Ewan took us on a wonderful tour of songs we love, sung in his own, unique way. Cast No Shadow led us into his only original song of the evening which is currently untitled, but arguably his best track on the night amongst the rest of the awesomeness he delivered. A song about ending a relationship, with a girl whose smile he would once run a mile to see. She used and abused him, and the story concludes that she's no good for him. "Welcome No More" would be an apt title for this beautifully penned tune. Candy by Paolo Nutini led to the set finale, a charming rendition of Linger by The Cranberries, proving that this lads voice works with any song. I would love to hear more of his own stuff, I know it's out there.

Next on the agenda was four piece band the Shaun Grant Selective. These guys proved that it's not just the younger generation that can get the room shaking as their collection of Honkey Tonk Blues mixed with good old fashioned hard rock style songs literally had the floor vibrating under my feet. I've seen a lot of passionate performers over the last year but these guys were most definitely feeling the music and it was visually obvious to everyone. Left to right across the stage, the lead vocalist would pout during the musical parts, the next guy along had his head thrown back and eyes closed as he felt the music, and then third along we had the guy grooving along, head bobbing side to side, not forgetting the drummer who was clearly loving and enjoying what he does. Not familiar with their music apart from Thin Lizzys Cowboy Song and Motorheads version of Louie Louie, and a couple of ZZ Top I believe, it was clear they were delivering "Rock-Texas Style" as a theme of America and cowboys ran through their set. Not my usual genre but it didn't stop me toe tapping and yehaa-ing along with the music.



Main act of the night was **ULTRAMEGAOK**, billed as a tribute to Grunge. I was more "indie" than grunge, so I knew I wasn't familiar with a fair few songs from the upcoming set list. Do I let that put me off? Never!

Opening song of the night was *Black Rain* by Soundgarden. Before hearing vocalist Ruben, I never before thought someone could scream lyrics in tune. The musical cacophony of the band rose up behind him and enveloped the vocalist which not only had floor vibrating like the band before, but it blew the roof off the



venue. What an opener. The set list took us through We Die Young with its dirty guitar riffs and abrupt ending, into Outshined and then On a Plain by Nirvana, which gave Rubens softer voice an outing, equally as impressive as the previous, heavier vocals.

The Fixer by Pearl Jam was well received by the crowd, followed by You Know You're Right and Nothingman. Rooster had a slower pace, with an impressive reverberating guitar solo tucked inside. A few more equally high energy songs followed but Holy Water was one that made me feel I needed to seek out some Soundgarden for my collection as it's deep grunge groove hit the right notes with me. Even Flow by Pearl Jam showcased a solo by "Chewie" on guitar accompanied by the gentle bat of drums behind him. Ruben is a musical banshee as he puts his all into every song he delivers. To keep up that level throughout such a long set was immensely impressive!

Four more songs took us up to the inevitable encore, of a duo of songs "Say Hello to Heaven" and "Spoonman", another crowd pleaser.

I can only describe the set as "electric". High energy from start to finish and I bloody loved it!

Another successful evening at the Marrs Bar supporting talent from our area.

Employing the DIY Musician

The following information could potentially terrify every musician currently engaged in education; this was disclosed to me by a former girlfriend of mine. During the closing minutes of her final lecture for a music management degree course which she'd dedicated three years of her life studying for at a University (one which shall remain anonymous); she was told along with her fellow graduates by her lecturer the following statement: "... that's everything I can teach you regarding employment; oh, one further thing; there are no jobs in the music industry unless you're self employed. Good luck" and then he stormed through the exit gracelessly and abandoned them; allowing them all to gestate and slowly comprehend the magnitude of this late knowledge whilst contemplating the predicament of their preferential choice of career and speculating the illusion of the entertainment industry.

You might foolishly be thinking "Hey; who needs employment when you can just compose original songs and become famous? That's a job isn't it?" which wouldn't explain the vast amounts of musicians trapped in the tribute and function bands that they scramble to after their demoralising day jobs. Besides, you need to self finance this career so pondering paid endeavours that you're prepared to subsequently endure is your next option; however the zenith of musicians recruitment hopes are often misguided. For example; working in a music shop is argued to be the dominant vocation and the rationale for this is purely to be surrounded by guitars all day long but can you seriously tolerate working in retail? That's what it is. Do you know the entire history of Alder wood used for the body of an acoustic instrument and the complexity of the tones? The customers you serve may question your ability to demonstrate enthusiastic responses.

An occupation at a rehearsal room studio is another popular sought after position but do you have the patience to be a glorified caretaker? More demoralising than you can possibly imagine; yes you're surrounded by the luxury of state of the art soundproofed rooms abundant with every touring bands requirements but all musicians entering identify you as non musical because your role is only to open doors, direct traffic for car parking, cater for their needs, stand behind a till collecting money, serve drinks and then tidy the mess afterwards whilst simultaneously fabricating a groundhog day time vortex for yourself because you're hearing strangers enjoying what you'd rather be doing throughout.

Working in a music environment isn't as decorated and satisfying as you'd assume. We speculate to accumulate and learn to earn whilst unemployment figures rise during a difficult musical climate. Sacrifices have to be made to successfully grow and maintain a music career; eventually you will have to address how to survive. You can ride waves and be a Rockstar but every journey

"That equates to just over one in sixty seconds" she said. "The issues of sexual violence, assault and harassment have been at the forefront of the media over the past six months in the form of campaigns such as #MeToo and a lot has been done to raise awareness, however we need to keep the momentum and the conversation going. More needs to be done to ensure that survivors of sexual abuse and violence get the support they need. Specialist services like ours are fighting each year to keep going; and while the Police and Crime Commissioner continues to support our ISVA service, our Counselling service remains grossly underfunded with increasing demand for services and little or no support from district and County Councils."

Christian Burton of Surprise Attacks said "Rape, sexual violence and harassment is such an important issue and the statistics are shocking. It's also regarded as a taboo subject and so many incidents go unreported so it's really important to raise awareness in any way we can. The 1in60 event will feature some of the very best local acts, a few of which have had nationwide critical acclaim with sell out shows both locally and up & down the UK. We are so grateful that they are playing for us at this event and it's sure to be an amazing night. All proceeds are going to WMRSASC and we hope the gig raises a lot of money, as well as the roof!"

Samantha Daly of Uncover said "we are really happy to be working with Surprise Attacks to host such a variety of amazing



local artists for such a great cause. WMRSASC do incredibly important work and we hope that everyone realises this and donates generously!"


His latest album "Open Sea" has received terrific reviews from both sides of the Atlantic with Uncut saying "brave, bold, captivating this record has many and varied charms".

Weorgoran Pavilion: Festival by the River 15th June Launch Night

Following the arrows and chalked pavement signs down to the river front at South Quay, we were greeted by an arresting sight: a blue-green structure shimmered provocatively in the distance, beckoning people closer. As we neared, we could see that this was the **Weorgoran Pavilion**, resplendent in its 100,000 sequins and shimmering in the breeze. Designed by architect design practice, **NEON** and commissioned by **The Ring**, a Canal and River Trust Arts on the Waterways project that aims to attract people to a 21 mile circuit of canals and rivers between Worcester and Droitwich, the pavilion was hosting a 10 day long free 'Festival by the River' and we were visiting its launch night celebrations.



Members of the public found a spot on the grassy banks and steps surrounding the stage, many sitting on blankets provided by The Ring for their comfort. Cellist, **Julia Palmer-Price** sat solo on the stage, beginning her set with a beautiful looped refrain, while a swathe of fabric pulsated on the stage in time to the music. Dancer, **Shelley Eva Haden** emerged from the moving material, and undertook a sensuous dance, interacting with the stage and its sequinned covering; the embodiment of a river nymph.



Shelley's dancing advanced into the heart of the audience, gathering children as she went with charm and grace. The dancer whispered to the children and they joined in the dance, moving in time around the circular flower beds, holding their arms aloft to become reeds swaying in the wind and dancing up and down the stone staircase, before returning to the stage to end the dance with Julia's cello refrain.


There was a short break before the choir of **Worcester Young Voices** took to the stage, with a melodic and entertaining set of traditional songs. The talented youngsters were melodic and joyful



in their renditions, often dancing along as they sang. International musician, **Dave Crowe**, who was originally from Ledbury, said a few words of introduction, before joining the children as their conductor, for a harmonious vocal version of his own Worcestershire-waterways inspired soundscape, 'Shire Skies'. The kids were obviously enjoying themselves, with wide smiles, dancing along as they sang. The audience really appreciated the gorgeous harmonies, encouraged by a charismatic **Dave Crowe** to join in and dance: they applauded loudly and with feeling at the end

The crescendo of the night was a set by **Stranger Faces**, comprised of beatboxer and singer, Dave Crowe and Maximo on bass guitar. The excitement in the crowd was palpable as Stranger Faces launched into their songs, with Maximo laying down a funky bass groove and Dave recording a live beatboxing loop, before singing and beatboxing over it to create a big sound that belies the fact that there were only two performers on the stage. The audience danced along in front of the Pavilion, enjoying a chance to let their hair down on a Friday night. Stranger Faces ended the gig with a brand new track, Dave Crowe telling the audience, "We're going to play a new song. You will be the first humans ever to hear this." We were very glad we did!

The Whipjacks/Tone Tanner The Chestnut, Worcester | 9th June



Saturday night, following a busy day at work and the need to blow off some steam, found me marching to town for a good old knees up with local speed folksters and personal favourites **The Whipjacks** as they took their turn treading the boards at **The Chestnut**

Deserved pint in hand I settled down for the back end of junkyard bluesman **Tone Tanner's** set. Watching with interest as his fingers glided over the strings of a perfectly beaten guitar, simultaneously using a converted trolley of tricks to add flavour to a compelling mix of covers and originals. From slide blues to the Hendrix inspired *Going Down (slight Return)* via a take on Lydon's *Public Image*, Tanner warmed the barfly's (and indeed the Whipjack boys) with a final run through his own *I'm No Slave* and a stab at *As The Crows Flies*, drawing an entertaining set to a fitting and greatly appreciated conclusion.

The last time I caught **The Whipjacks**, they were stomping the boards at **Worcester Music Festival**, inciting a jaded audience from three days of revelling to summon the energy for one last dance. And dance they did, bringing the final curtain down with a fun filled, frenzied set over at **The Marrs Bar**. Since then the band have continued to canter round the county (and beyond), delivering their brand of frantic folk and frolics whilst writing a host of new material.

Fresh from a winning performance (despite frontman, Dean battling with his voice) at this year's Mello Festival, the five piece stormed the confined Chestnut stage with should be festival anthem *Campfire Song*, before moving into *Farewell To The Ladies*.

An already hot and sticky Chestnut (no dancing room here) welcomes a rowdy *My Madness Molly Murphy*. Those in the know hollering back the refrain, whilst others squirmed and twitched desperate to bust a few moves, as the energetic mix of Celtic speed folk and punk swagger takes hold. A brand new song, *Ballad Of Jack Cafe* follows, a contagious, political/historical number set to become a firm favourite on the evidence of this outing. As the band continue, mandolin collides with electric guitar, the rhythm section pound and pump driving the band on, whilst a kazoo makes an appearance at one point, all the while the band continue to stomp, posture and holler to a bevvy of appreciative fans and newcomers alike. Further originals and newbies *Push* and *All My Pains (are self inflicted)* are delivered with a nod, a wink and a dose of energy, whilst Bloodhound Gang's *Bad Touch* raises the titters and voices as Dean gesticulates, to the merriment of fellow band

members and audience alike before the band poignantly dedicate Flogging Molly's What's Left Of The Flag to lost Whipjack, Tim Stamps. A rousing Shipping Up To Boston and The Whipjacks own Scoundrels And Rogues brings the band's set to a typically frenzied and not to mention sweaty set to a would be close, but The Chestnut folk weren't going to be happy unless they were treated to a few more. So an acapella Song For A Swine kickstarted a four song encore, a feat that saw bassist, Ash Curtis attempt to rouse the High Street with an impressive off-mic holler and the band somehow manage to muster the energy for one final sprint through the effervescent Wild Rover.

The Whipjacks are one of those bands that never fail to raise a smile or incite a sing-a-long, they may be Scoundrels And Rogues, but as they elegantly put it themselves, 'We're The Whipjacks And We're Just Having Fun' and so will you next time they hit your local!!

The biggest, the best, the award winning, FREE festival comes back to **Upton** over the weekend of July 20th through to the 22nd. Not only a Big Blues Bash, but its also a huge boost to the towns coffers, and I do not think you will find many landlords, tea shops, restaurants or retailers complaining when 20,000 pairs of feet fill the streets. This year sees an ambitious jump in the number of bands performing, with 140 listed, to be found on the 3 main stages, and numerous bars. Expect to see a flood of campers

spread across the riverside fields, its all part of the experience.

This year sees multiple award winning artist Jo Harman take the stage, White Trash Blues courtesy of the The Quireboys, The Stumble and fast rising stars Kris Barras and Rebecca Downes. If you like your Blues raw, look out for Dave Arcari, and from the US, Swampcandy.





Firm favourites **The Swaps** make a return, and our own **Stone Mountain Sinners** will be there. And taking us back to the prohibition years of the 1930's - **The Rumblestrutters** bring their *Speakeasy Blues* to Upton, look them out and see what a jug band has to offer. No shortage of live music, as the bars and clubs host their own 'stages' alongside the festival **Riverside, Big Top** and **Acoustic stages**.





This established, unique festival has been rightly recognised as the premier Blues festival in the UK, keeping music LIVE.



Full programmes of the **Upton Blues Festival** will soon be available, buy one and you are making a donation to the continued success of the event. Meanwhile, more information both on artists and camping options is available on the website. www.uptonbluesfestival.com

Roll the clock forward a week, and you will find more live Blues, down in Gloucester, it may not have the scale of Upton, but it has become well established now in its sixteenth year. Live music can be found throughout the week at various venues around the city centre, all culminating in the weekend on the green behind the Cafe René, which is at the heart of the event. This year sees from the US, The Reverend Robert, joining The Spike Drivers, Elles Bailey, and everybody's favourite, Vincent Flatts. Look out for Max and Veronica, European award winners from Italy with their own style of Blues.

Behind the Music Round 4 Paradiddles, Worcester | 2nd June

Behind the Music's fourth show went ahead (mostly) as planned with Jack returning to host, inviting talented songwriters to share songs, stories, and stories about songs!

First up was The Kidgloves (or 3/5 of The Kidgloves; bassist Alex was unavailable and drummer Rachel was working behind the bar!), featuring Behind the Music's own Jack, vocalist Emilie and guitarist Rich, Jack described how the band emerged from being a vehicle to perform his solo songs live (as Chip Langley), to a fully-fledged and more democratic project; a fine display of how local music scenes encourage collaboration, resulting in fresh and unexpected artistic directions! The Kidgloves performed set staples Catch and Goldilocks, both taut blues-rock numbers. before detailing the pains of nicotine withdrawals in the more downbeat Give Me a Stir. The band closed with Dallas, performed tonight for only the second time and described both as "their poppiest song" and "about the wife of possible JFK assassin Lee Harvey Oswald", an interesting mix! Even without the full band, this one sounded heavy and intense, and will hopefully become a centrepiece for future performances!



Next up was Iggy Cuthbert (aka Happy Bones), joined onstage for a couple of songs by F.F. Ivanovski (aka Alfie). Iggy described how most of his songs discuss themes of mental health, which is, for better or worse, a topic relevant to many of us. His music certainly gives off a confessional tone, from the unflinching Death Obsessed (with bleak imagery of bodies drowning in bathtubs) to Songs for Friends That I Don't Talk to Any More. Iggy's strained and emotive vocals are reminiscent of '90s alt-rock, while introspective, brutally honest lyrics and simple strummed guitar chords evoke classic indie-folk artists like Bright Eyes and Neutral Milk Hotel. If that sounds like your thing, Iggy's performances are worth checking out, as well as the regular Boneyard Sessions gigs that he puts on around Worcester!



James Chatfield took to the stage next, armed with his two trusty guitars (acoustic and bass). Anvone around Worcester will have seen James busking on the High Street with his pretty unique setup: while holding the bass normally, he rests the acoustic face-up on his lap and plucks, hits and taps



the strings with his right hand while fretting bass notes with the left. He even uses the body of the acoustic guitar as a drum, playing bass, percussion, and lead simultaneously - a real one-man-band! James kicked off with the eight-minute epic *Change*, which begins with sparse harmonics, adding layers one by one until the song explodes into a frantic crescendo. James described the ideas influencing his instrumental songs and the moods he hoped to evoke, for instance, *Running* was inspired by a desire to run "both to and from things", and this is apparent in its sense of motion. While James may be more familiar with street performance, he's clearly more than capable of performing at any venue!

Finishing the night were Malvern rock band Nuns of the Tundra. The Nuns rarely play acoustic shows - they even mentioned how some songs would sound "really heavy" with the full drum kit! Despite this, their sound was powerful as ever. Unlike most of the other acts that have played these events, their songs are inspired not by personal experience but by fantasy and sci-fi: vocalist/guitarist Troy described the fictional world of their songs: the "Nundraverse", where robots sleep with and eventually enslave humanity (Robot Love), and Vikings fight to get into Valhalla. Other lessons included using unusual time signatures in less noticeable ways, and writing on the toilet! The Nuns' songs are mostly built around heavy yet laid-back riffs with theatrical lyrics, and sound like the result of Queens of the Stone Age and Muse eating mushrooms in the desert and picking up their instruments for a jam. Songs like "Dead in the Desert" and "Mind's Eye" were more psychedelic than I've heard before at Behind the Music- not a bad thing at all!



Big thanks to Jack for organising (and playing tonight), Emilie, Rich, Iggy, Alfie, James, Troy, Arran, Jim, and Melos, to Kit and Rachel at Paradiddles for the space and refreshments, and to everyone who came along! Behind the Music will return to Paradiddles on the 7th July at 8pm.

Beardy Folk gather at Cleobury Mortimer

Come on you soccers! While many of you watched as England cut a path through the Panamanian jungle, a little way away at **Hopton Court, Beardy Folk** held its inaugural festival under a quietly setting sun. With such a lovely location, a brilliant main stage, as well as an acoustic stage with full bar, all beautifully organised and a line-up of stupendous bands, it's easy to see this little festy becoming a summer favourite. For me, live music gives more vibe than a pneumatic drill and, when combined with basking in the sun, I know where I would rather be.

Unfortunately, I was housebound on homework duty and only made it to Beardy Folk for Sunday evening. Even so, it was a Sunday in the sunshine, and I didn't miss out on my annual dose of **3 Daft Monkeys**, and even managed to catch a few of the bands preceding them as well!

I had arrived in time to catch a delightful set from **Gary Stewart's Graceland**; an exceptionally good tribute to Paul Simon from an impressive 7-piece band, which proves perfect for building the party atmosphere.



Filling the gap before 3DM took the stage was **Grace Petrie**, a protest singer with the presence of an early Dylan. Passionate and powerful, she might have been alone with her guitar on stage, but the fans on the floor were completely enthralled, taken in by her strong messages of anti-Thatcherism and Blair-bashing. *Farewell to Welfare* would convert the bluest conservative... maybe, and Grace's acapella rendition of *Young Womans Tale* is outstanding. Next up is an anti-fascist song inspired by a Spanish Civil War banner of the defenders of Madrid; *You Shall Not Pass*. I will certainly be looking to hear Grace again if the opportunity arises.

And now for the band I'd come to see! **3 Daft Monkeys** first captured my interest some years ago, and I've been regularly redosing ever since. Tim, Athene, Rich and Jamie are genuinely warm-hearted folk, and together they produce a lovely mix of Celtic, Baltic, Cornish inspired, quirky and totally mad-assed rhythms. This is music that never fails to mesmerise a crowd, inducing wild dancing in all those who listen.





Sunday brought about a suitably rocky start for the 3 Daft Monkeys who, after the unfortunate demise of their transport, were forced to hire a van and leave much of their bulkier gear behind. Percussionist Rich had to beg, steel and borrow drums and toms, rebuilding a borrowed kit for the show.

But this is a band made of tougher stuff, and the stresses of the day did nothing to dampen the hedonistic, whirling, intoxicating performance played out before a rewardingly enthusiastic crowd, eagerly awaiting tunes from across the band's back catalogue of albums.

Year Of The Clown evokes a strong desire to waltz bare-foot across the grass, before unveiling a much more arcane rhythm, luring those who had remained seated to their feet. The music is infectious, the sun glorious, and the setting perfect.

Days Of The Dance eases into life, urging strangers to embrace one another, three-stepping across the turf, before the song explodes in a whirling dervish of maelstrom mania. Athene spins about the stage, bow busy on her fiddle, and Jamie's tall silhouette bounces while Tim plays ringmaster to the madness. Doing a headstand for 15 seconds would earn you a CD; World On Its Head sees some impressive, if dizzying efforts from some of the younger revellers. The gloves are off as Rich slaps the cobbled together drum set into shape for a humdinger of a Hubbadillia. The set is all too short and, with the crowd almost floating high above the grass, **Nick Heyward** closes the evening.



As for **Beardy Folk**, first festivals are always going to be tough, and it's all about establishing a following. Coinciding with the World Cup, and with England seemingly doing well in Russia, made for unfortunate timing this year. This is definitely one to look out for next year though, as organisers and crew, as well as the beautiful site, made for a great weekend. Everything is on site; entertainment for the youngsters, good foodie stalls, a decent bar, great stages, and plenty of parking/"camping". Okay, the weather has been perfect, but that never stopped Glastonbury anyway! The roots are there for this lovely, unshaven festival to become a firm favourite.

Review

Love Lies Bleeding Tewkesbury Library | 6th June

To be honest, there really aren't too many World Premieres in Tewkesbury, so I approached this new play with considerable fascination and great anticipation.

It did not disappoint.

The one act play, written by **Jamila Gavin** and directed by **Jenny Wicks**, was presented by Jenny Wren Productions, a well-established theatre company based in Cheltenham and supported by the **Everyman Theatre**.

The play, set at the outbreak of the Second World War centres around the lives of two school friends and now flatmates, Gwen (Hannah Churchill) and Dodo (Caitlin Gallagher) - a budding actor. At the start of war, they enlist but there's a problem. Gwen is accepted for the WRAC (Women's Royal Army Corps) but to her dismay, Dodo's application is turned down because her parents are both Fascist sympathisers, based abroad and denied entry back into Britain. She is mortified by the rejection but throws herself into her theatrical work, entertaining troops and factory workers.



A letter from her parents, now fled to Switzerland, brings her into more danger than she realises when it introduces her to Max (Rosie Mason), her parents' friend and her rather shadowy and absent husband and also to a potential suitor, Roger (Sebastian Parker) for whom she soon falls. The social whirl into which she is drawn is simply a front for a significant band of Nazi supporters, waiting in eager anticipation for Hitler's invasion. Beguiled by her new life and her new love, she is oblivious to the casual anti-Semetism and treasonous plotting going on all around her.

To anyone who hasn't studied the influence of Fascism in Britain in the 1930s and 40s, some of the revelations in the play regarding the infiltration of the movement into the ruling elite and as far as the lower levels of Government may come as an uncomfortable surprise.

The directing of the play is breathless and brilliant. The scene changes are achieved swiftly and seamlessly with minimal prop movement - the audience's attention being distracted by BBC announcers, giving updates on the state of the war and at one point, a nutritious recipe; newspaper sellers barking out headlines,



while passing secret messages and also various public Tannoy announcements - the sound and light engineer, Mike is kept on his toes throughout by the speed of change and plays a blinder.

The pace drops only once and masterfully provides the outstanding and pivotal scene of the play.

Dodo's sinister circle of friends has attracted the attention of the security services and she is summoned to the Home Office. The scene where she is interrogated by the mysterious "Mr Brown" (Murray Andrews) is long and extremely tense as Brown reveals the extent and the seriousness of the trouble in which she finds herself. You'd better believe that when Brown shouts, the whole audience jumps. He succeeds in turning her, but her desperate wish not to be thought a traitor leads to tragic consequences as the full horror of Dunkirk unfolds on the other side of the Channel and the conflicts of interest, friendship, betrayal and divided loyalties are finally resolved.

At this point, I'd normally pick out an outstanding actor from the troupe and describe their performance, but the quality of the acting on show is such that it would be an impossible task - this is a proper ensemble presentation and that is one of the great strengths of this play, as is the actors' ability to give equal weight to whatever character they're playing at different times in the action. One of the other strengths is the unusual setting - the intimacy and crowded nature of the library adds much to the claustrophobic atmosphere of some key parts of the play.

If this play does achieve a run, and it fully deserves to, do go and see it - its power, sense of period and immaculate presentation will be fully worth your attention.

I saw some perfectly obvious picks; Ziggy Stardust, Never Mind the Bollocks, Thriller, Sgt Pepper but also some more arcane selections such as the above mentioned MC5, Little Feat, Exile on Main Street, the Velvet Underground, Can, even some Zappa and Beefheart.

Everyone has their own taste in music. It's what makes it special. We find some track that means something to us at a specific time in our lives and forever after it evokes an emotional response. Even more so if there was a degree of effort involved, such as walking to Upton on Severn to buy the Sex Pistol's 'God Save the Queen' because the record shop there was the only place that would stock it.

That emotional effort is the power and the beauty of music and why we can't help but come back for more.


Friends of Festival Evening Mercure Bewdley Heath Hotel | 4th July


After debuting together in 2015 for Deborah's second album, Wilde Wood, the



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Wychwood FestivalCheltenham | 31st May-2nd June

The main stage was kicked off with Bristol based fivepiece Iota laving down a combination of thunderous drums and thick grungy riffs. fronted by Jodie Robinson impressive set bombastic alternative rock. Equally as impressive and energetic were Big Top openers. Cheltenham's very own ICYMI who delivered an attention grabbing set of poppunk and even managed to incite an early sing-a-long with a race through Fallout



Boy's *Sugar*. The band's own melodic masterpiece, *Resolve This* and recent single *Mind Games* left the greatest impression.

Better Than Never continued Wychwood's lively opening salvo delivering crunchy riffs and pogo inducing hooks to the delight of the festive faithful. Following a recent tip off, Casey Lowry was high on my list must sees and the young singer-songwriter (along with his band) did not disappoint with a breezy and contagious set of tropical indie pop.

With the festival in full swing, **Kasai Masai** encouraged a busy main stage area to shake their booty, bringing euphoric song and dance direct from Africa. **Jazzy Heath** was busy warming up for a full band set later, with a spot of beautiful, piano based busking over at The Wheelbarrow. The legendary **Jah Wobble** regaled tales of the studio, whilst his band simultaneously built contagious dub



soundscapes laced with horns, guitar workouts and of course Jah's customary thick bass throb. Over at the Big Top, **Gizmo Varrilas** bewitched with a blend of soulful folk, accompanied only by his own plucked acoustic. Over at the Hobgoblin Stage **Thrill Collins** (and friends) and their mash-up party, dicing and slicing pop, hip-hop, dance, garage and rock in their own unique and unmissable manner. Continuing the party vibe **The Beat** had us all skanking before a sensational and seductive **Nina Nesbitt** closed The Big Top and sent us home with the likes of *Chewing Gum*, *Nose Rings & Shoestrings* and the rather aptly named *Somebody Special's* hook reverberating round as we made the journey home.

AK Patterson opened the second stage on day 2 and delivered perhaps one of the most compelling sets of the weekend merging guitar, swooping strings and an occasional clarinet, Patterson sounding like a woman possessed delivering a fiercely unique and emotive vocal. Mainstage merriment was provided by the comedic folk styling of The Bar-Steward Sons Of Val **Doonican**, and the portion of the set I caught saw the band deliver the chucklesome Lady In Greggs and a rather unique Jump Around, adorned in obligatory dodgy sweaters their set culminated in a stage dive and crowd surf to the bar and back to the amusement and cheer of the masses. Aussie singer-songwriter Harrison Storm provided soulful, gravelly tones and intricate picking on the likes of the evocative Falling Down and Change It All, during a captivating Big Top set, whilst punk warrior Toyah offered the likes of Telepathic Lover, It's A Mystery and oddly Sweet Child Of Mine on the mainstage.





Day Two saw me ricochet from stage to stage catching as many sets as humanly possible in a bid to capture the eclectic nature and essence of Wychwood; from the stunning post punk indie of **Lucia** to New Orleans styled, brass led, tartan wearing **New York Brass Band**. Continuing the genre soundclash I lurched from Glasgow based, adrenaline fuelled indie punks **Rascalton** to the no less impressive Americana based band **The Shapes**, before catching all-girl angular indie rock 'n' rollers **Yassassin** tear


through a fabulously frantic set of yelps and riffs. Talking of mixing and matching styles, The Go! Team threw everything from hip-hop, indie. electro Bollywood into the blender creating an engaging stew. Having suitably whetted my appetite for something a little different I finished the night over at The Hobgoblin, for a melting pot of reggae, Balkan folk, Latin flavoured swing and a touch of



beatbox in the hands of **The Bomo Swing**, a group that offered and delivered a '*Wild Time*' with tales of cheating pirates (the theatrical shanty Ahoy) and setting the dancefloor alight.

The third and final day of Wychwood begins with something of a Hereford/Worcester invasion (thanks to BBC H&W Introducing). The Americas open the second stage with the swagger of The Stones or Black Rebel Motorcycle Club, as they suggest that 'Something's Gonna Happen' and if they keep waking and winning over festival crowds it might just happen for the Worcester threepiece. Adam Daffurn's Vonhorn follow, offering a rather unique and off-kilter take on indie, weaving somewhere between the cracks of Cardiacs and lo-fi, local heroes And What Will Be Left Of Them, the band yelp, croon and holler through a thrilling set of outsider pop, gripping and dragging in the intrigued passer-by with a sound quite like no other. Over at Speakers Corner, Cheltenham Literary Festival took over proceedings to offer Vinny Peculiar. Despite battling a nearby samba band, he still enamoured with a short set of choice cuts from his new album, Return Of The Native, before finishing with long term favourite Jesus Stole My Girlfriend. Staying with the Lit Fest, Cheltenham native, Reuben Lovett took the mic and showcased a punk and anti-folk inspired sound on Spaceman before telling us to 'Work It All Out' proving there's more to Cheltenham Lit than just poetry and book readings.

Memorable sets came thick and fast, during a hazy afternoon, over in the Hobgoblin, **Heavy Beat Brass Band** delivered first line renditions of *Rock Around The Clock, Wasn't Me, Under The Sea* and *Killing In The Name Of* during an eclectic set of horn and beat driven funk. **Queen Zee** exploded onto The Big Top with a frantic





run through *Gay Bar*, coming on like a collision between The Stooges and Pansy Division. **Sea Girls** are currently busy clocking up the festival miles and on the evidence of their Wychwood set, it's not hard to see why, as they produced a set of full contagious, hook-laden indie earworms. Back at the main stage **Hollie Cook** delivered a gorgeous set of sun-kissed tropical reggae to the masses before **Feeder** took Wychwood to another level with a storming set of Brit-rock. With **Shed Seven** closing the main, I decided to bow out of Wychwood 2018 with **Ten Tonnes** and a set of good time garage rock and insatiable indie, somehow mustering the energy for one last dance before finally heading home, simultaneously feeling exhausted, exhilarated and, above all, satisfied.



I've said it a number of times before but **Wychwood** is always the first festival inked in the diary, safe in the knowledge the organisers will always offer something for everyone. It was a blast from start to finish and already has me longing for next year and Wychwood's 15th Anniversary!!




