


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SLAP MAGAZINE



The 'C' word

Dates and times have been announced for the local Christmas lights switch-ons with Worcester's event taking place at the **Guildhall** from 4pm on Thursday 22 November presented by **BBC Hereford and Worcester** with **BBC Introducing** musicians and 'special guests to be announced'. There'll be music and events throughout the day from 10am in **Malvern** town centre on Saturday 24 November and 'Snow White and the Seven Dwarfs' will switch the lights on at 6pm!

Friendly Funding for Courtyard

Three art galleries, a theatre and an orchestra in the West Midlands are sharing £1.5m of Arts Council funding - largely aimed at making them more environmentally friendly. **The Courtyard** in Hereford will redesign their front of house area, making their Box Office more accessible for disabled people. They will add a shop selling locally-made arts and crafts, and a new multi-purpose meeting room. The funding will also be used to extend the cafébar area and first floor dining space to create an outside terrace.



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Worcester Music Festival Photo Competition Winners Announced

Thousands of music fans descended upon the city for the annual **Worcester Music Festival** in September and once again organisers invited amateur photographers to capture their memories of the weekend in a bid to win the festival's Photography Competition. Hundreds of entries were received and assessed by a panel of judges, all of whom boast a wealth of experience in live music photography.

Music lovers and keen photographers attended the event on Sunday 21 October at **The Paul Pry** where the top 20 photographs were on display and the winning three photos were announced.







Competition judge, James Watkins, said: "Congratulations to all photographers who made the top 20, especially the winners. It was a very challenging decision and we argued a case for each of the top three photographs."



Fellow judge, **Andy Burton**, commented: "As always, the quality of entries was extremely high, which always makes it difficult for us to agree on the final top 20 photographs. We've noticed a growing number of talented female photographers entering the competition in the last few years who have captured some outstanding photographs of the music festival."

The judges commended all entrants and commented on how difficult a job it was to select the top 20. Judge, **Steve Johnston** said, "Simply enough, we were drawn by the vibrant colour and striking pose caught by **Adriana Vasile** for first place. Under extreme lighting conditions at The Firefly, this is a lovely frame and

worthy winner. It was impossible to ignore the strength of second place Sarah Lissemore John's image. She captured a great moment of joy and celebration at Paradiddle's Music Café Bar. Finally, Roy Jenks' third place photo immediately stood out to us for the wonderful framing of the subject and shadow. It is a superb editorial image."

Adriana won a £100 camera store voucher that was kindly donated by festival sponsors, **Child Care Bureau**, with £50 and £25 vouchers going to second and third place respectively.

The exhibition will continue at **Paradiddles Café Music Bar** on Sidbury throughout November.

Step back in time and into the dark world of 'Gin Lane': a Victorian alleyway with its debauched inhabitants, cast out of society due to their unsavoury behaviour!

Back for a fourth slice of mischief, this immersive and playful installation brings you shady characters, performances and sing-songs to provide an alternative Victorian experience.

Make your way down the Shambles and look for this precarious alleyway to hang out amongst the hawkers and flower sellers, magic and alchemy, urchins, gin addiction, singing and dancing...



Gin Lane, produced by Clik Clik Collective, combines the talents of local artists and performers. Come sing-a-long with 'Play it again Dan' (Dan Bramhall) tinkling the ivories to bring the old Music Halls back to life, and watch out for your pockets as 'Worcester Theatre Makers' are back, accompanied by mischievous urchins from their youth theatre and after school clubs. There will be a diverse and unruly gang of characters lurking over the two days so get ready to wash away those Victorian blues and bring the Worcester Victorian fair cheekily into disrepute!

You might also see the **Victorian Flower Seller** roaming the streets of the Fayre. Don't be shy; she's here to take your photograph behind her gold gilt frame capturing that festive moment so you can find your face via social media pages with this playful mobile photo-booth experience!

Quiet Revolution

Dancefest's performance Ouiet Revolution, about how the First World War fundamentally changed the lives of women, is returning for a final time this month, as part of Worcester's World War 100 Armistice Day commemorations. Two of Dancefest's performance groups, **DFA** and **Chance to Dance Company**, have been working alongside choreographer Marie Oldaker to recreate this stirring and poignant piece that looks at how the First World War brought about a guiet social revolution on the Home Front, as many women came out of domestic service to take on the traditional roles of men. Having waved goodbye to their loved ones, women endured loss, adversity and hardship, but also discovered a new sense of purpose and unity. There'll be two free performances on Sun 11th Nov. one outside The Guildhall. Worcester at 2.30pm and at Fort Royal Park at 6pm, followed by the lighting of a beacon at the park at 7pm. Dancefest are encouraging their audience at Fort Royal to bring torches (including on their phones) to help them light the performance as they mark this very important day.



Quiet Revolution was first created for Kidderminster Arts Festival in 2014 and has since been performed at Bromsgrove Festival, Artrix, Pershore Carnival, Watch Out Worcester and National Trust Croome. These are the final performances of this moving piece, much loved by both its dancers and audiences.

Mammoth Beat Organ

The **Dunning Underwood Mammoth Beat Organ** is a modular, mechanical music contraption, created by Worcestershire based **Sam Underwood** and **Graham Dunning**. Designed as a two-player, semi-autonomous musical instrument, it plays unusual, sometimes erratic compositions drawing on drone music, minimalist repetition and fairground organ techniques.

This is the first instrument built in collaboration between artists Dunning and Underwood. Its ambitious scale and scope driven by their mutual interest in creating engaging live performances and letting the machine decide some of the outcomes. Their history in pushing the boundaries of performance and sound come together in this new machine.

This is just the start of the project. With the core system in place Dunning and Underwood are keen to develop existing and new modules that exploit the unique way this contraption functions. They hope to drive this development through performing regular live shows across the world. Keep your eyes and ears peeled for this.



Broadway Museum & Art Gallery exhibitions

Broadway Museum and Art Gallery have two opportunities for you to catch both fascinating mini sculptures and Impressionist prints.

The popular micro-sculptures: In the Eye of a Needle exhibition, featuring the work of **Dr. Willard Wigan**, has been extended until 19th Dec, when the museum closes for the winter. The exhibition is a joint collaboration between the museum and **Broadway Luxury**, a neighbouring showroom. There will be a permanent display of Wigan's work at the museum when it reopens in February 2019. Broadway Luxury also has two of his works on display, including one of the Broadway Tower Willard has created since the exhibition opened at the museum.



Meanwhile the museum's special exhibition, 'Making an Impression', includes prints by Impressionists Manet, Pissario and their contemporaries including work loaned from the **Ashmolean Museum, Oxford** and was curated by the Ashmolean's **Katherine**

Wodehouse.

Manet, Pissarro, Cezanne, Renoir, Morisot and Cassatt, whose works feature in the exhibition, all created prints that provide a fascinating corollary to their famous paintings. The Impressionists' characteristic subjects; the modern life of the city, portraits, landscape, and weather are all represented in their prints which exploit and cultivate innovatory techniques and aesthetic effects.

In mid-19th century France prints were essentially a reproductive medium, for which the approved means was engraving. However, in the 1850s a revival of etching gathered momentum, signalled by the foundation of the Société des Aqua-fortistes in 1862. The exhibition also showcases the work of influential printmakers who exhibited with the Impressionists, including Félix Bracquemond (1833–1914), and those who succeeded them. such as Henri de Toulouse-Lautrec (1864–1901).

Many of the works are being exhibited for the first time at Broadway Both exhibitions run until 19th Dec. Broadway Museum & Art Gallery is open 10am-4pm, seven days a week.

Great Place

Four unique arts projects will soon come to life after they won funding through the **Herefordshire's a Great Place** scheme.

Hush Now, Hidden Women; DEN (Digital Engaged Nature), The Pirene Project and Creatures of the Mappa Mundi will each use arts and digital technology to raise the profile of Herefordshire's fascinating heritage.



Hereford-based **Feral Productions** has been awarded £12,000 to create 'Hush Now, Hidden Women', an ambitious countywide series of digital and live performances that will give voice to the unmarried mothers who were stigmatised and hidden away in Magdalene Homes across Herefordshire.

New Leaf Sustainable Development Ltd, based at Queenswood Country Park at Dinmore near Leominster, has been awarded £12,000 for DEN (Digital Engaged Nature), developing digital Augmented Reality artwork and an app with young people and professional artists inspired by Queenswood's trees and plant life.

CreateRoss, a membership association based in Ross-on-Wye, has been awarded £11,500 for **The Pirene Project**, working with schools and other local groups to create an Augmented Reality tour of local heritage sites, with the recreation of a dramatic 18th century fountain that once stood on the **Prospect** at the centre.

Meadow Arts, based in Ludlow, has been awarded £12,000 for a project called Creatures of the Mappa Mundi (See page 12), commissioning international artist Yinka Shonibare and working



with Herefordshire-based groups to create bold textile works inspired by the creatures depicted on Hereford's medieval map and what it means to be 'an alien' in 2018.

To secure grants through the **Hidden Gems** scheme - a brand new arts funding opportunity that's been created by **Herefordshire's a Great Place** - each project had to show that diverse and different communities would be involved.

Lauren Rogers, from the Great Place team, said: "We are really pleased to be able to support these four projects. Not only will they raise the profile of our county's history, they'll give thousands of people an opportunity to get involved in something creative and collaborative. For us that's key because we know that arts and heritage have a huge impact on people's lives in Herefordshire: culture can make us happier and healthier, it supports the local economy, and it can be a powerful tool for tackling social issues."

The **2018 Hidden Gems** applications were assessed by an independent panel of local experts who work in film, festivals, heritage, community engagement and tourism.

Co-funded by **Heritage Lottery Fund & Arts Council England** with support from **Historic England**, it is a flagship part of the *Great Place* project being delivered by **Rural Media** on behalf of the **Herefordshire Cultural Partnership**.

More grants will be on offer in 2019 and later this month (October) Great Place will launch a new website called 'The Shire' dedicated to promoting and supporting Herefordshire arts and heritage. To find out more email greatplace@ruralmedia.co.uk or call 01432 344039

What Do We Want?

Art trail starts at Worcester City Art Gallery & Museum

To coincide with its current autumn exhibition What Do We Want?, Worcester City Art Gallery & Museum is the starting

point for a trail of artworks made by Turner Prize-nominee **Mark Titchner** in collaboration with the communities of Worcester, including representatives from Worcester's homeless community.

The new artworks can be seen at **The Hive, Ping An Oriental, Tudor House** and **Worcester Arts Workshop**, as well as in and outside the **Art Gallery & Museum**. The works are inspired by Titchner's 2006 work *The Invisible Republic*; a huge twostorey high banner which can be seen in the Art Gallery & Museum. The new works bring the voices of local people to the fore in a combined public expression of What Worcester Wants. A leaflet of the art trail can be found in the Art Gallery & Museum and in all the participating venues.

Titchner worked with a number of groups to create the artworks, including Maggs Day Centre, Worcester Belles WI, Arboretum Residents' Association, Worcester Photography Open Salon and the University of Worcester Fine Art department.

The exhibition What Do We Want? brings together works from

the Museum's historic collection of satirical and political prints along with artworks Mark bv Titchner and Gillian Wearing and runs until 24 November 2018. Since opening in September the exhibition has already welcomed hundreds of visitors to explore the large-scale artworks and more intimate video booth as well as the historic collection of political prints.

What Do We Want? has been funded by the Weston Loan Programme with Art Fund and features works on loan from the Arts Council Collection. Created by the Garfield Weston Foundation and Art Fund, the Weston Loan Programme is the first ever UK-wide funding scheme to enable smaller and local authority museums to borrow works of art and artefacts from the national collections.

Deborah Fox, Senior Curator, Museums Worcestershire said: "We are really grateful to our partners in Worcester for working with us on this exhibition and to the venues for displaying the incredible artworks which are creating quite a stir in the city."



She's a great performer, and I'm looking forward to hearing more of her work. Open mic slots available on a first-come, first-served basis. They're popular, so get there early. £3 admission, 7.30pm.

Sunday 11th – Worcester Remembers This is a special event to mark the hundredth anniversary of the ending of the First World War. It will be held in Fort Royal Park, and following a parade up the hill, a beacon will be lit at 6pm. The event will also include a performance from **Dancefest**, and the lighting of the beacon will be introduced and concluded by readings of poetry. This is a free event, there's no need to book, just turn up. Everybody welcome!

Thursday 22nd – Dear Listener at Boston Tea Party, Angel Place. This is an early-evening event of eclectic poetry and spoken word, from both new and established voices. The featured performer for November is the wonderful Brenda Read-Brown, who has won poetry slams all over the country with poems that are often deeply poignant. £3 admission. 6.30 – 8.30pm.

Wednesday 28th – 42 at Drummonds Bar - Life, the Universe and Everything – prose and poetry – Gothic horror, science fiction, fantasy, storytelling, comedy, reportage, genre fiction, and a few categories that haven't yet been given a name . . . You never know what you might see and hear at 42 . . . Free entry. 7.30pm.

Enlighten | Evesham

This autumn an exciting new creative lighting trail comes to Evesham called 'Enlighten'. It opens with the 'The Hut of Silence', a contemporary sound and film installation.

The Hut of Silence conducted a drop-in interactive arts workshop at the Evesham War Memorial asking people to write a letter or short note to a person that had died. The War Memorial itself was then adorned with a sheet containing a printed letter written by someone that was in the trenches. David from Creative

Solutions has been busy filming and recording local people from the British legion and local dementia café about their memories of family in the war. Jacqui also from Creative Solutions worked with 6th formers from Prince Henrys School to help create the physical installation. The sound and film installation will be open until 28th Nov and will include four 'live edit' sessions where the public can come and contribute their thoughts and memories of family in WW1 or Evesham in WW1 and other wars. These will be uploaded to the exhibition so that it changes over its time period. These dates are 1st, 12th & 22nd, November 12-2pm at the bandstand, Abbey Park and 17th November 5.30-7.30pm at All Saints Church.

Lights Up! Is the launch event for the permanent war memorial lights in Abbey Park, Evesham and will be happening Sun 11 Nov, 6-7pm. There will be a short service from Reverend Andrew Spurr

and performances from **Deborah Rose** and the children from **Broadway School**. You can also view **The Hut of Silence** afterwards. Please bring a torch or candle.

Evesham Library also houses an exhibition during November showcasing the community engagement work which has taken place throughout the project. The Enlighten team have had a great time over the last five months running drop in arts workshops at The Almonry Museum, The Valley, The River Festival and The Battle of Evesham. The work you will see includes collages based on the river, stained glass designs on acetate, coats of arms, a textile wall hanging, poetry and more.

Young people from The **De Montfort School** in Evesham have also made a short animation about Evesham's history. Entitled 'Evesham Sham Ow Best' the animation explores the various elements of the town's past. Check it out on the website

Jenny Davis, Arts Development Officer said "It's been a very busy few months engaging with the community on this amazing project . We are on track to launch the war memorial lights on 11 Nov in Abbey Park as we did 4 years ago for the beginning of the 100 years commemoration of World War One".

Permission has also been granted by the church faculty and **Historic England** to install the new lights to **The Bell Tower** including the 4th new light. These will launch on 15 December from 5.30pm.

Yinka Shonibare at Hereford Cathedral: Creatures of the Mappa Mundi Contemporary art exhibition, 21 Ian — 1 Iun 2019

Meadow Arts and Hereford Cathedral are working in partnership to commission a new artwork, inspired by the Mappa Mundi, by highly esteemed artist Yinka Shonibare MBE (RA), with funding from the Herefordshire's a Great Place scheme.



Displayed next to the Cathedral's Chained Library, the **Hereford Mappa Mundi** is the largest medieval world map to survive. One of its most remarkable features is that it is illustrated with strange people and animals, drawn by artists from the exaggerated descriptions of travellers to far off lands. **Shonibare** has been inspired by the map and its alien creatures to create a new work for Herefordshire, on show during the first half of 2019.





Illustrated on the map are various creatures, natural and supernatural, including camels, elephants and unicorns. The more human-like creatures are sometimes outrageous in form, for example the Blemmye; a warrior race of people with no heads and facial features in their chests, or the Sciapods, a race with one giant leg and foot each.

Creatures of the Mappa Mundi will explore what Shonibare refers to as, "Two of the most pressing concerns of our time, environmental protection and immigration. Inspired by the ability of the Mappa Mundi to still be reflecting our contemporary concerns of fear of the stranger or "other" which often leads to xenophobia. The depictions of extinct creatures of legend are a reminder that we may yet become extinct if we do not take care of our environment."

The exhibition will contain a series of textile works, depicting various creatures and strangers from the map. These new works will feature the vibrant Dutch-wax fabrics that have become iconic of Shonibare's work. Each piece will have been made with the help of different groups of people across the county of Herefordshire, including those linked to disabled people, the homeless and refugees.

Director of Meadow Arts, **Anne de Charmant**, says, "Meadow Arts are thrilled to be working with Yinka Shonibare, whose work is famous across the world and delighted that he has found inspiration for a new project in Hereford. It is an honour to be able to work with Studio Shonibare and even more so here in the regions, away from the more usual art 'scene'."

Hereford Cathedral Librarian, Rosemary Firman says, "The Hereford Mappa Mundi has been a source of inspiration and wonder for over 700 years. It is always exciting for us to engage with new interpretations of the Map and we feel very privileged to be able to host Shonibare's new artwork."

Creatures of the Mappa Mundi will be on display within Hereford Cathedral's Mappa Mundi & Chained Library from 21st Jan until 1st June 2019. Normal admission charges apply.

This project is part of 'Hidden Gems', supported by Herefordshire's a Great Place, a Herefordshire Cultural Partnership development project delivered by Rural Media. Great Place is co-funded by Arts Council England and Heritage Lottery, with support from Historic England.

Giraffe auction tops £210.000 for hospice

Celebrations are taking place after an auction of the amazing 31 giraffe sculptures seen in Worcester over the summer, raised £210,400 for the St Richard's Hospice Build 2020 Appeal. Worcester Stands Tall, a Wild in Art event brought to the city by St Richard's, captured the hearts of the community and attracted thousands of visitors to the city.



The auction at **DRP Group**, in Hartlebury, was a towering success - with people bidding to give their favourite giraffes a forever home.

Tricia Cavell, Fundraising Director at St Richard's Hospice. said: "Last night's auction was incredible and we are thrilled to have raised £210,400 for our hospice's Build 2020 Appeal. The funds raised will make a huge difference to our project to expand and redevelop the hospice - ultimately allowing us to extend our care to more patients and families. To all of the buyers, artists, sponsors, partners, supporters, schools, community groups and public who helped make this project possible - we would like to say a sincere thank you for your immeasurable support. Together, we have truly stood tall for Worcester and beyond."

Over the summer, the giraffes stood through the city's streets and open spaces for 10 weeks attracting visitors from all over the country. Of the 57 sculptures, 30 were giant giraffes and 27 were calves - 26 of which were decorated by schools and community groups.

All the giant giraffes and one calf, Lily the Pink, went to auction while the remaining 26 calves will return to those who decorated them as a legacy of the project.

Worcestershire businessman Dave Graesser, from Hanbury, generously added to the £1,700 raised in a fundraising appeal to bring the Snowdrop giraffe sculpture to the hospice gardens with a winning bid of £8,000.

St Richard's had earlier launched the Save Our Snowdrop campaign to buy the giraffe which was painted by Katie Hodgetts, an artist whose granddad was cared for by St Richard's Hospice before he died in 2016.





Mr Graesser, whose wife Sue is being cared for in the hospice Inpatient Unit, said the couple wanted to support St Richard's as a way of thanking them for all they have done.

"We have first-hand experience of hospice care since we were introduced over two years ago," said Mr Graesser. "Everybody involved is caring and full of love. Sue and I talked about helping to save Snowdrop for the hospice and she's delighted – it's really given her something to smile about. To us Snowdrop reflects the fact that so many people love and support St Richard's and will help people to understand they are not alone.

We hope when Snowdrop is in the hospice garden that she will bring a smile to the faces of those that see her and also act as a distraction from whatever they are dealing with at that moment."

Mr Graesser also praised the hospice for the support they have given him and the couple's son, Josh, during Sue's illness.

Snowdrop will have company at the hospice as another giraffe sculpture, Touch the Wishing Star, designed by Toyah Willcox, was donated to the hospice by its winning bidder. John Sheen

bought the sculpture in memory of his daughter Sarah Trueman, nee Sheen, who was cared for by St Richard's before she died in August, aged 31

Mr Sheen said. "Sarah died at St Richard's and I thought it was appropriate to bid for Wishing on a Star as hopefully she is up there looking at us. I hope that children will go and see the giraffe if their grandparents or parents are ill and they can wish on that star. It's also in memory of my daughter and will always be there."

The hospice's Build 2020 appeal aims to raise the funds needed to build

Blackballed

"How many miles do you want to travel"? my friend ask's as she signs me up for online dating, "3 miles" I reply. My philosophy, they would have to be worth it to fill my car up with petrol. Well, **Blackballed** is a band that has certainly got me pumping up my tyres and going the longer distance and since March, I have seen them six times!

Tonight it's at Katie Fittzgerald's, Stourbridge. This was to celebrate the landlord Eddy Morton's birthday and his band gave an excellent set. But headlining was Blackballed, based in Manchester, a blues / groove / rock hybrid fronted by Marshall Gill (vocals/guitar) who you may have seen slinging the axe for New Model Army, Tom Wibberley (bass) and Leon Gill (drums).

They always impress me with their sleek dress and hat code and tonight Marshall gave his new grey suit an outing and under the spotlight he looked like a silver bullet, ready to get loaded and make his audience pay attention.

Kicking off was 'Olde England' which is a slow rift but with Leon's drumming, your hips are mesmerised into swinging mode and then they hit you with the vocals and with a ha ha haha, you have upped a few levels and your hips go into overdrive and your feet are stomping. For any newcomer this first track certainly gets the crowd warmed up and ears pricked.

The band has a tight combination of killer rifts, explosive drumming and a bassist beyond belief. Their songs are what I can only describe as 'get up on the table tracks'.

"Tell Me I'm Wrong" is a track sounding like you are pressing on the accelerator to make a quick getaway. Leon reminds me of Animal of The Muppets, he goes for it like a mad man and Marshall and Tom have to keep up. I would like to see a drum off with Animal and Leon, if you have ever seen the You Tube drum off, Dave Grohl would be left at the starting blocks!



Then, "Fultons Point", the name of their latest album, this track has a slow start with Marshall's smooth, seductive vocals, sending you into a mood wheich I can only describe as getting into a freshly made bed (apparently that's been voted the top spot for feeling happy and relaxed), his voice makes your hairs stand on end. The track then builds up into crescendo which makes me want to kick off the quilt!

Blackballed's performance throughout the night was highly entertaining not just with their songs but spicing it up with a bit of disco mix and their banter about facial expressions of guitarists, was just hilarious. These northern lads are excellent musicians and once heard they have lured you into their net. For me, I'm well and truly captured by the authenticity of their tracks. 


The Strays | Go Go Boy

Swaktang

The Woebegone Tale Of A Procrastinating Sociopath

Back in my well-spent youth, I could usually be found staggering around the various venues of the West Midlands seeking out

crunchy punk chords or hardcore hollering, whilst sticking to sweat and beer laced floorboards, swigging the odd dubious looking beverage and spending my well earned pennies on cheap D.I.Y. records and discs. During this time I must have watched literally hundreds of half-forgotten acts in such exotic places as The Stage, Brewery Tap, The Old Railway and The Foundry, to name but a few, and I can remember seeing the name of Swaktang on various posters and flyers from my early days of gigging. In fact I'm fairly sure I caught the Midlands based trio once or twice, hey I may have even written a review but names and faces are a wee bit blurred.

What does remain is my continued love for pogo inducing punk, a snotty snarl, serrated buzzsaw guitars and that DIY ethos that first seduced this wide-eyed boy from Worcester all those years ago. Thankfully punk veterans, (well they did form back in '89), Swaktang share that same love, and despite line-up changes have never deviated from that well beaten path, giving their all, whilst having a bloody good laugh doing so. Following on from a recent stomp at Worcester Music Festival and the critically acclaimed, (EP of the month in a certain local monthly, no less), Happiness Wants Me Back, the three-piece decided to set up camp and record a brand new full length album, well twenty four minutes, (this is punk rock you know!).

Brilliantly named, The Woebegone Tales Of A Procrastinating Sociopath, opens with a quick cymbal tap before frontman, Sy attacks his guitar. Whilst the rhythm-section set off at a frantic pace, an impassioned holler of 'YEAgH Right' sets the mood as the band showcase their credentials with a frenzied three minute gallop, disillusioned punk howls and the pounded drums of Major,

compete for supremacy whilst bassist Cieran brings a few Clash like shapes, to the mix. Throw in a chanted outro and Swaktang have you standing to attention.

Having grabbed the attention with the opening salvo, the trio throw a huge curveball with the following Firebird, despite military like drums, the song sees the band step off the power and velocity

> pedal to deliver a heartfelt, punk ballad with Sv (sort of) crooning and guitars set to strum, (as opposed to stun), for the best part of the three and half minute duration. The band soon rev up the

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Leon Daye | The Gift


Leon Daye maybe something of a new name to most of us, but the Cirencester based singer-songwriter has been writing, recording and performing for over twenty years, recording a number of albums and EPs along the way both as a solo artist and as the leader of the Leon Daye Band. Taking his cues from a

number of different influences from alternative rock to acoustic pop, Leon has built a reputation for being a varied, energetic and engaging artist around his local area and bevond.

The Gift, a six-track affair is Leon's latest, a diverse affair that should appease newcomers and long standing members of Daye's fanbase in equal measure, as he effortlessly flits between stripped back folky affairs to aforementioned upbeat, pop-rocker. Darkside opens proceedings with a bang of the drums, before

strummed acoustics and choppy electric guitars combine to create an instantly infectious melody that builds to a stirring choral hook. Daye allows a once melodic almost melancholic lead to swoop and soar, grabbing at the listeners attention and remaining long after the final chords play out.

Following on, the title track motors into focus on the back of a contagious drum salvo and an urgent riff, soon complimented by Dave's acoustic and a fine slice of social commentary, that asks



a brilliant observational romp that wouldn't sound too out of place on one of Tilbrook and Difford's finest. The two tracks may differ in style but the pen still resonates in Leon's hand as both sides of the coin leave you nodding (and singing after a spin or two) along gleefully.

This six-track affair is the (and pardon the pun) gift that keeps on giving. The penultimate, Building A Life is one of those handmade for radio. Pop rock anthems (beamed in from a time when guitar, melody and hook were the the three musketeers of the airwaves). That comes complete with a sing-a-long wordless refrain and a catchier than the common cold chorus, perfect for those daytime drivers out there. If that wasn't already a reason to be

cheerful. Dave perhaps saves the best for last as Diamonds And Dreams starts as an intricately plucked acoustic folk lament, before developing into a gorgeous widescreen slice of shimmering pop (and can I detect a gospel tint) that's worth the price of admission alone.

Ian Parker | Spoonful Of Gold

Ian Parker needs no introduction. He is one of the UK's outstanding blues rock guitarists, as well as being a talented writer, whose work has taken other paths over the years, producing some wonderful music. Ian's Politik Blues, released in 2015, finds airplay regularly in my world.

Spoonful Of Gold came from an absorbing read in a Paris book store of The Willie Dixon Story, 'I Am The Blues'. Willie was a prolific writer of some of the greatest and most recognisable blues songs. Songs that have been covered by every major artist both in the blues world as well as pop and rock, often finding their way into film and television embedded in soundtracks. Ian Parker has delivered us his pick of some of Willie Dixon's finest music, and has done so with very much his own interpretation in this engaging portrait of the great man.

Joining Ian at the Rockwell Studio in Monmouth were his band of brothers, Morg Morgan, on everything keyed, Chris Finn on percussion, bassist Chris Lomas, and Chris Eaton with lap steel, electric and dobro 'guitars'. That's far too many Chris's for my head, just 1 short of a crisis!

It's extremely difficult to pull out particular tracks that stand out, as all the material is exemplary and it's impossible not to want to keep hitting the repeat. Straight off, lan's guitar sweeps in, taking a gritty vocal line. Chris E and F set up the shadowy 'Back Door Man' slipping out the back as the husband enters in the front. A

funky bass line and calypso rhythm paint the arguably lesser known 'Mighty Earthquake and Hurricane' bringing a delicious Caribbean groove to the foreboding lyrics.

Etta James will forever be associated with the sultry, 'I Just Wanna Make Love To You', but it's a Willie song, and here, lan makes his offer with a fabulous honeyed guitar you'll not find on

> Etta's recording. Finn and Lomas set up another lovely intoxicating rhythm for, 'I Can't Understand It', beautifully decorated by a complex weave of guitar strings, and touches of Hammond, superb throughout. This is followed by a hauntingly soulful, 'My Love Will Never Die', Ian's imploring vocals, lead the way. Sparse but sweet guitar notes are picked out, it's a massive track, full of undying passion, an undying epitaph to a lost love (warning it will burn deeply into your soul)

'The Seventh Son' and a 'Weak Brain' will inevitably lead to overdosing on the glorious 'Spoonful' which you could argue is probably the most ripped song in the Willie Dixon

collection. Every blues band throughout the sixties and seventies covered it, and many of the great old bluesmen of the fifties. Today, it continues to be offered up, an everlasting medication that can lift you from the realities of this weird world we have created.

If you're familiar with Willie Dixon, and you probably are, even unknowingly, you'll want this. If you appreciate subtle guitar and fine musicianship, you'll want this. If you're a fan of lan Parker, you will pick up a copy. I highly recommend getting yourself a Spoonful Of Gold to be taken regularly, and whenever you feel like a dose.

RHR | Mahogany Drift

Seems **Troy Redfern** is popping up all over the place lately, his own band back on the road, solo excursions, part of the Babajack project, and now one of the trio that is RHR.

Jack Hutchinson, on vocals and guitar is based in London and renowned for his Southern smokey blues rock, audible in the sample track. Troy adds vocals, guitar, bass and banjo and brings savage dirty slide, cutting guitar riffs and a voice

that's formed in a cement mixer full of ballast. **Mike Ross** on vocals, guitar, bass and harmonium has his own take on blues and roots, smoked over a soul drenched charcoal burner. **Darren Lee** sits at drums.

The album opens with *She Painted The Moon*, written by Ross, with a heavy rock opening taking you back into the 60/70's era, firmly nailing the colours to the mast. Hutchinson takes up the mantle with a pulsating, fast rolling rock anthem, *'Rapture'*, his hard, gritty vocals cutting through the track. It's time for a Redfern fusion, bringing an exotic flavour to the opening bars, with banjo adding to the mix, that brings the taste of North Africa, and surf rock.

Needless to say, vocals are scattered through like granite chippings. 'Mahogany' is an involving instrumental that draws you in, a jam you'd happily spread on thick, but it steps aside for Mike Ross' 'Ghost Town Riders', his falsetto voice riding high above the energetic gallop.

A fully charged, triple celled accumulator of rock riffs, 'Satisfied' is helped along by heavy bass and Darren hammering out the

rhythm, Troy's, hard edged, song, implodes, leaving a lighter residue of more soulful country blues from Jack.

'Drift' takes us into another RHR instrumental jam, with sweet plummy guitar riffs and driving percussion, drifting away to reveal the final songs, to complete an incredibly tasty cocktail, three spiky spirits, served on the percussive rocks, each leaving their distinctive imprints. Mike Ross's contribution is a superb 'Leviathan' with the distinctive sound of a resonator, adding colour to the song.

Blink and in the shadows, you may think you have triple vision, all favour the shaggy, bearded and hatted look. But the album speaks for itself, *Mahogany Drift* is an impressive start to a band so freshly forged from a bedrock of blues.

Kings Of The Quarter Mile | Only Dark Horses

Kings Of The Quarter Mile may well be something of a new name on the local music scene, but the four-piece are seasoned musicians and long term natives having honed their craft in

various different bands for over fifteen years. The rhythm section, **Brian Richards** (bass) and **Dave Smaylen** (drums) have performed together for a number of years in the likes of local heroes, **The Cohen Brothers** and **When It Rains**. Frontman and guitarist, **Steve Counsell** has been treading the boards with the likes of **Marina Del Ray**, **Badge** and **Geneva**, whilst lead guitarist **Pete Juzl** has moved up from London, having played in the likes of **Loretta & The Elevations** and **Lucy's Discipline**, before co-writing and performing on an album by **Gods Of Stream**.

With a wealth of experience and a love of bluesy Americana, the newly named quartet, **Kings Of The Quarter Mile** headed to **Rhythm Studios** in Bidford-on-Avon to commit their formative songs to disk, in the shape of a seven track EP entitled *Only Dark Horses*, as an introduction to the band.

The EP aptly opens with a track entitled *Ain't Wasting Time*, and like the title, the band take little time to set their stall. An instantly compelling dusty riff is joined by a second twanging country-esque six-string as we lurch down desert highways and past trees dripping in *Spanish Moss*, KOTQM drum up visions of brokenhearted drifters and shattered dreams. Counsell delivers a gravelly croon, drawing the listener further into the song, much in the

same vein as Willy Vlautin (of Richmond Fontaine) or Jason Isbell. *Dreamsville* follows and proves that the opener was no mere fluke as a dreamy acoustic jangle is quickly complimented by a gorgeous electric twang and slide, as the band straddle the divide between Americana and 60's inspired pop. As the EP continues,

Mexico sees the band change tact again, as the rhythm section lay down a thick infectious groove, whilst Juzl and Counsell bend blues shapes with the former allowed off the leash to prove his chops. The latter delivers a ballsy, contagious lead, proving his vocal versatility at covering the entire roots spectrum.

Continuing the EPs diversity, the near five and half minuteb *Another Nail* smolders and burns, suggesting a soulful southern rock influence as Counsell broods and Juzl delivers a solo that simply soars. *It Ain't No*

Use continues the impressive, more muscular rock vibe, with Steve delivering an addictive and muscular choral hook that sticks around long after the final chords ring out. The band close the EP out with another impressive slab of rootsy Americana in the shape of What Have You Done? before leaving us with the glorious, sub three-minute rock 'n' roll buzz of Flashback Lightning, crowning an already impressive debut with a guaranteed floor filling finale.

I'm not sure that **Kings Of The Quarter Mile** are *Dark Horses*, more like roots thoroughbreds as this EP has it all, from Americana heart wrenchers to thrill-seeking rockers. Catch them burning up a saloon near you at your first opportunity.

Spaztic Robot & The Epileptic Moth

A couple of years back **Spaztic Robot** unleashed his gloriously deranged debut album *Skip Rope Rhymes* to an unsuspecting nation, an album that garnered attention from the likes of Vive Le Rock Magazine and The Ringmaster, who respectively described the disc as 'pleasantly unpleasant' and 'invasive yet solemnly beauteous darkness' whilst I myself stated it was an album 'for those unafraid to embrace the unknown'. Following a two year

absence Robbie Sparks, who you'll remember from Rebel City Radio returns to Spaztic Robot for another bout of dark tales, aptly released on Halloween.

Spaztic Robot & The Epileptic Moth opens with Assholes and an eerie, other worldly moan before Robbie adds his own knowing laugh as electronic pulses and brooding beats join the mix. Sparks asks the listener directly 'Hey mister do I have your attention?' before delivering a devilish lead vocal where he compares politicians to two dogs sniffing each others assholes. A sinister clash of cinematic, industrial rock where waves of guitar and hard hitting electronica collide, creating a dense and impactful

soundscape. Half whispers and buried harmonies add to the tracks claustrophobic nature, bringing to mind the early days of Marilyn Manson among others. The self-titled (and recent single) *Spaztic Robot* ups the ante with hard hitting, machine gun like techno beats that assault the senses, triggered samples and driving riffs join Sparks' cackled lead as he delivers a darkly delicious slab of infectious electro-rock.

From here on in, the album takes something of a more surreal, nightmarish turn. We CU! has the feel of a twisted lullaby, as a simplistic, melody plays over throbbing beats whilst Robbie

delivers a sinister spoken-word monologue before delivering a mantra like chant of 'we see you hide'. Blasphemous Rumours reign things in with shimmering guitars and a straight vocal, but Sparks still can't help throwing in barbed one liner such as 'I don't want to start blasphemous rumours but I think god's got a sick sense of humour' as he gives listeners a clever and welcome respite from the opening and subsequent industrial onslaught. As the album continues, Robbie unloads sonic barrages of noise on the likes of Pond Scum and Back To Inferior Ways, whilst the likes

of the seven minute *Shark Attack* and *Windmill* linger and sneak in the dark, weaving seemingly harmless melodies with creepy rhymes, samples of children and unsettling beats to create something all the more disturbingly compelling.

Among the various chilling soundscapes and foreboding vocals, Sparks also showcases a great deal of musicality and imaginative arrangements. *Blisters* for example is based around a soothing piano led melody, *Demons* has an unusual, deep seated dub styled groove bubbling away beneath the surface, whilst Nirvana's *Heart Shaped Box* is

completely reworked, barely hinting at the original as Robbie twists unimaginable shapes from the source to create something new and fitting within the world of ...the epileptic moth.

Much like the debut, Spaztic Robot's second is not for the faint of heart. It's a dark and creepy affair that burrows beneath the skin and gnaws at the senses, beckoning the listener deep into the shadows. But as you become more accustomed to the dark you come to embrace it and before you know it, you're waiting with baited breath for the next thrill.

The debut solo album "Choices," from the Lickey Hills based guitarist, opens with 'Disgrace,' a fast paced lament of the human race and its part in the mass extinction taking place on the Earth. James' stance for the album is clear and with 20% of streaming

profits going to save planet Earth, James seems on a one man mission to save the planet with as much funk as possible.

'Sugar,' the album's second track hits the listener with a jumped up funky riff which seems intriguingly juxtaposed to the song's message about the country's woeful sugary diet choices: "you are wonderful in moderation, our abuse of you is what's killing the nation." The bouncy guitar and percussion blend well with the iovial tone James uses to convince the listener of the dire state of the nation's health. He proclaims the public "whales" and states they "better watch out for the Japanese." A humorous take on the serious issue of obesity.



The soft and syncopated 'Save Our World' feels like it should be accompanied by an obligatory disco ball. The song has a serious message for the world's youth that, as adults, "we will save our world for you so you can know the life that we knew" and that it is our responsibility to "stop the poisoning of all generations." James' positivity that the human race will turn its assault on ecology around for the sake of the younger generation is uplifting

and heart-warming. We can only hope that he's correct.

'Kind Once Again' is a guitareffect dream stating that we can still "save the human race." James believes that, as a society, we can change and use the information and science available to educate ourselves. James' confidence in mankind and our capabilities to transform and save the planet is infectious and I hope his vision comes true in all its funky disco glory. The album ends with several remixes of its previous songs which display James' ability to change the mood of a piece and allow the listener to see a different side to his music.

An Evening with Rick Kemp The Old Rectifying House, Worcester **Thursday November 8th**





Elles Bailey Band The Marrs Bar | 27th Sept

Elles' relentless progress continues, recording sessions in America, European tours, UK tours, new songs, impending album and single releases, her star firmly in the ascendency. A number of firsts unwrapped at The Marrs Bar in Worcester, new songs for her next album, performed for the first time live, a new, albeit temporary, line up, and her first ticketed gig in Worcester. The band for this stage of her tour included James Graham on keys, and Craig Prior on percussion, both making their presence felt throughout.

Joe fired up the guitar, as the band powered in, before Elles stepped up, ready to 'Scream'. The house needed no encouragement to join in from this electric start followed closely by the first airing of a song fresh from Nashville, 'Woman Like Me'. Destined for the new album, Joe attacked his guitar, Elles exploring her vocal range for this rocking song, it's going to become a firm favourite for her followers.

This is followed by 'What's The Matter With You' a powerful soulful blues which Etta James would have been proud of, with James working the keys hard as Elles delivered with power and passion. Time to slip in a rare cover, wonderfully structured with a multi layered chorus from the band, 'When I Go Away', a beautifully presented, Carolina, gospel hymn.

'When The Devil Comes Knocking' is ripped open across Joe's strings, a punchy song, Elles prowling the stage, James testing the keys, and always the relentless rhythm from Zac's bass and Craig's drums, devil's work indeed. 'Medicine Man' injects a dose of sharp



biting blues, raw and edgy as a surgeons saw. Elles sings it from the heart, with Joe's dirty slide, cutting through to the bone.

You can't have an Elles gig without a bit of *Howling*. It may be one of her earliest songs, but it still has the right moves (what is it with these girls from Bristol, they're all howling mad, Elles still wolfing it up, and a week or so back, Beth Rowley, is howling at the moon, there's a connection there, wolves and full moons, don't go to Bristol after dark).

The gig races on, there's no shortage of material, but I cannot sidestep the heartfelt, spiritual song, written for a dear friend, but also dedicated to a lost fan, who found peace in the lyrics of, 'There's A Light Ahead In The Distance'.

Given the new material aired this evening, I cannot wait to get my paws on the next recording, an excellent gig by an artist who is truly on fire.

The Globe at Hay-on-Wye | 20th October

RHR - Ross, Hutchinson & Redfern - three blues rock guitarist with their own bands and projects, drawn together on a tour to promote their album *Mahogany Drift* to be released in November (see album review on page 21). The Globe Arts Cafe in Hay set the scene for RHR, along with drummer, Darren Lee, and bassist, Jack 'Ulysses' Browning. The event flew under the banner of The Mid Wales R and B Club, with Chris Rogers sporting his Jack Hutchinson T shirt, filling the role well.

The band burst into life with, 'She Painted The Moon', a Mike Ross song, but the effect of being driven by three guitars is incredible, Darren and Ulysses grounded a triple edged attack that could anchor a battle cruiser.

Hutchinson's 'Rapture' lifted the weight off with its rock 'n roll, foot tapping, hip swinging, head nodding, groove. By the time Troy took the lead for 'Home On Judgement Day', this superband were truly settled, interaction between the three honed to its sharpest edge. These are early days for the band, I can only imagine how the gig will develop further into the tour run.

'Mahogany', is phenomenal, a sweet jam, that bubbles in the pot, full of beautifully balanced flavours, spicy fruit mixing with blueberries, stunning the gathered crowd in The Globe. 'Drift' came downstream a little later, another intoxicating, intense flavoured, well structured jam, with all 3 leads making their mark. Jack Hutchinson's 'Sorrow Song' brought weeping guitar and a soulful, slow blues with its easy rhythm to chill out to. Mike's 'Leviathon' bubbled brightly, with a lovely Southern, swampy edge, as Darren's bass drum pumped along.

RHR worked their way through their groundbreaking album to the delight of those gathered, a mix of locals, fans of the three guitarists and acolytes of The Mid Wales Blues Club before the obligatory encore, took a whole different direction. It's Hay on Wye, so why not take us, 'Down By The River' with a Neil Young cover. Ross, Hutchinson and Redfern baited their hooks, each leading, then weaving there weapons of choice, closing to an emphatic ovation

The Mahogany Drift album, surprises with its maturity and depth, for a first release from this project band. Live, they have matched, and indeed, exceeded expectations, early in the tour, and with little time to play together as RHR, they have completely won over their audience, 3 shaggy, hatted, waistcoated outlaws, more Ned Kelly than Jesse James, dragging hard, slide driven, dirty blues and rock, out of the swamp, to an appreciative gang of followers. A brilliant evening.



The Jericho Racks Wisenheimer, Effigy for Sleep Paradiddles Worcester | Friday 19th Oct

The **Paradiddles** side room was packed for a night of sweat and noise from three young rock bands.

Birmingham trio Effigy for Sleep kicked things off with some proggy metal riffs and mathrock rhythms, which were the backdrop for unexpectedly smooth



and soulful vocals- a distinctive sound indeed and a great opener!



Next up, Herefordshire's Wisenheimer brought some playful, ramshackle garage punk to the table and kept the room moving. With memorable melodies and the odd skainspired break, these boys set themselves apart from the rest of the retro garage-rock scene!

The Jericho Racks have played plenty gigs in Worcester in their short lifespan, at least a few of them at Paradiddles- in fact most of their songs were born in the rehearsal room at the back of the venue!



Tearing out of the gate with *Caroline*, the duo's gritty blues-rock makes you want to drink neat bourbon and ride a Harley into the sunset (not necessarily in that order)! Like the best guitar riffs, *Caroline's* riff feels familiar, like it has existed forever in some form, lying dormant until its discovery earlier this year during a routine practice session.

Deleltor's scuzzy, fuzzed-out swagger and staccato vocals continue the energy. The band's sound is what I would describe as "blues-punk"- rougher and more animated than most of the blues-rock genre. It's also tailor-made for live performance, with drummer Rich pounding the skins like they owe him money, and Jack's vocals alternating between yelps and growls, like a beaten dog lashing out at anyone who's around. Newer songs, like Crazy City Sex and Ground (which offers a change of pace from the sleazy late-night rock riffs, with a folk-inspired melody and surprisingly heartfelt vocal) go down just as well as the older ones, played with an unrestrained intensity that The Jericho Racks get even better at with each gig!

After bringing the roof down with retro, loud-quiet-loud closer *Round and Round*, Jack managed (with a little encouragement!) to successfully pull off Paradiddles' first ever crowd surf - not something I expected to see in such a small room!

Jack White / Demob Happy 02 Academy, Birmingham | 17th October

Entering a venue with no expectations is the best way to go into a gig. I literally walked in completely blind for the support act. I had heard a few of their tracks online the previous night and thought they were good. Once **Demob Happy** came on stage, they dominated their whole set. For a trio, their sound was loud and everything you'd want a support act for **Jack White** to be like. Think melodic, chunky guitar riffs similar to Queens of the Stone Age but with The Beatles harmonies thrown in. A band you definitely do not want to miss when they're in your neck of the woods.

As for **Jack White**, well, he literally blew my mind. My inner teenager came out once again (haven't seen her in a few years!) and the night was purely emotional. Playing hits old and new, he stretched to songs even off **The White Stripes'** debut album. Bouncing off each of the other 4 band members, the band gelled in a way that even the slightest mistakes were extraordinary. What made the gig that extra special is that it was strictly no phones allowed, so seeing an audience with no handhelds was shocking but so mesmerising. As an audience, we *Connected by Love* and made the night memorable.

Before we knew it, the night was coming towards an end, the band went off stage and that was that. Or so we thought... The band then returned for a killer, 5 song encore. "Icky Thump" had to be a favourite of mine for the night because of it being such a personal special song. "Seven Nation Army" concluded the night on Jack's famous 1950s Kay Hollowbody Guitar and my goodness, it tore the roof off the 02 academy. In a nutshell, the night was

everything you could imagine a Jack White gig to be like... noisy, adrenaline pumped and creative.

Following the installation of a permanent bronze memorial statue in his hometown of Redditch, Worcestershire, a very special music event occurred in Redditch town centre on Saturday to celebrate the legendary Led Zeppelin drummer's 70th Birthday, life and legacy.

Organised by **The John Bonham Memorial Friends** and in partnership with **Heart of Worcestershire College**, the



celebration festival took place at Peakman Street, Redditch on Saturday 22nd September, with live music from 1pm till 11pm.

A stellar line-up of rock/blues artists and special guests, all with a connection to John and the Bonham family, took to the stage as part of a full day of live music. This included an epic performance from John's sister Debbie, a famous blues and rock vocalist, fresh back from a US tour with Paul Rogers.

with Debbie also showing video messages sent in support of the event from **Robert Plant, Roger Daltrey, Paul Rogers, Mick Fleetwood** and son of John Bonham, **Jason Bonham**, who is currently on tour.

This memorable event hosted a mix of well-known stars, including ELO drummer Bev Bevan, Chicken Shack's Andy Sylvester, Honeydripper's bass guitarist Wayne Terry, and Little Acre vocalist Johnnie Bryant, who joined various members of the Bonham family on stage for an emotional rendition of the Beatles classic 'With a Little Help from My Friends'.

Everyone involved donated their time to remember John Bonham and to raise vital funds totalling £21,000 for Teenage Cancer Trust and their outreach nurse programme across the West Midlands.

Worcestershire based **Arcadia Roots** delivered an exciting hypnotic blend of trance, dance, reggae and roots music followed by **Steve Gibbons**, a founder and mainstay of the Brum rock and pop scene, with a career spanning over 50 years.

Vincent Flatts Easily Led featuring legendary frontman Steve Burton came to provide a set of 'take no prisoners' blues boogie. Next came Led Hendrix paying tribute to Led Zeppelin and Jimi Hendrix - possibly the two most influential acts on music, ever.



Rock blues powerhouse **Big Wolf Band** followed backed by the talents of **Mick Jeynes** (bass), **Tim Jones** (drums) and **Paul Brambani** (keys). Birmingham-based **Rebecca Downes** and her band gave a powerful performance with her co-writer **Steve Birkett** alongside her.,



John's younger sister **Deborah Bonham** performed with her band and some special guests, including **ELO** drummer **Bev Bevan**, **Chicken Shack's Andy Sylvester**, **Honeydripper's** bass guitarist **Wayne Terry**, and **Little Acre** vocalist **Johnnie Bryant**.

British hard rock/heavy metal band **Quartz** performed next showing just why they were cited as forerunners in the developing new wave of British heavy metal movement.

Letz Zep closed the event showing why they're cited as the official number one, 'The Most Popular' and 'The Most Highly Rated' tribute to Led Zeppelin in the UK today.

In The Studio With... The Whipjacks

Local speedfolk merchants, **The Whipjacks** are long term local faves. The five-piece band have become renowned for their high energetic frollicks, infectious hooks and shout-a-long anthems. A winning combination that has seen the band perform throughout the county and beyond, taking in numerous festivals along the way, including the likes of Lakefest, Nozsdtock, Mello and Ragged Bear (to name but a few). Having continued to write new material and hone their sound, the band have decided that it's high time to commit a collection of their finest to disk, as they head to **Old Smithy** in Kempsey to record their long awaited debut album. We decided to follow them in, to ask a few questions...



So you guys have been together for a number of years and have just decided to record your debut album, why now? Is it a case of having a collection of songs that you thing deserve capturing, or is there growing demand for a Whipjacks full length affair?

Tim P. - There's been changes to the line up over the years for a number of reasons and the way we are working together now has resulted in a wave of new material and a more unified sound we can call The Whipjacks. It's time to capture what we have and keep moving forward with writing and gigging. It's a milestone that's been needed for a while and now is the time we are presenting ourselves how we want to go forward.

Arran - we are always asked for an album but we wanted the first album to be full of 'Bangers' so we have waited until that Whipjacks sound Tim mentioned really came together. We're already working on new material for a second album.

Dean - There are a number of songs we're putting on the album that have been with us from the start and a lot of new stuff that's sounding great too! This will be the album we always wanted to record and until now haven't felt it was the right time.

Can you reveal what the album's going to be called yet?

Tim P. - Everything we seem to do is constantly changing and developing so no surprise this has been one of them. Over the first few days of recording it has been talked about a lot and seems we have decided now. It will be announced soon with a few sneak peeks of what's been happening.

Arran - The Album title is still secret... even to us.

Dean - Yeah, I guess we've talked about it, bounced ideas about, agreed and then changed our minds about a million times. We may have decided, but that could change when we're done.

Why did you decide to record at Old Smithy? And what can you tell us about the production?

Tim P. - We recorded the EP here and love the atmosphere. There's a lot of history and Woody is just awesome at what he does and keeping it moving smoothly. We have no doubt the finished product will be what we are hoping for (as long as we can do our bit!) and the process of getting there will be as much a part of it all, hopefully the enjoyment we've had getting it done will come across.

Arran - Definately, as Tim said the Old Smithy has loads of history and Richard the engineer has worked with bands like Judas Priest. We needed someone experienced with all the different acoustic instruments we play.

Obviously you're only just started recording, but how are the early sessions going?

Arran - Early sessions have gone better than we could've hoped!

Dean - We've done two full days so far, laid down the drums and bass for most of the tracks. It's all starting to sound really good. The Ghost tracks we're working to sounded awesome as well, I think we're just feeling really excited and working really hard to produce something special.

What songs have you got earmarked for the sessions? And will you be revisiting any of the tracks from your previous EP?

Dean - We're recording 10 tracks in total. Most of which we get asked about at gigs. All Whipjacks original material and previously unrecorded. Songs like "Forever Free" and "Farewell to the Ladies" which are older songs we've reworked over the last year or so and some of the new material such as "Sundown Devil" will also be on there.

Arran - We may include the EP songs as bonus material but the whole album is previously unrecorded material.

How do you guys go about writing, is it a collaborative effort, is it lyrics or melody first?





Tim P. - Things normally start with a bit of a jam with a riff or chord structure then things develop normally with the musical talents of Arran taking the basics to a chorus or alike. After that, it's anyone's guess. It can be a done deal in 10 minutes as was the case with Sundown Devil as this just worked from day one, or LSD which has been re-written several times and is now a song which deserves to be on the album. Lyrics, rhythm, even entire choruses can change until we are happy with it. Recording has really focussed us on a lot of the older tracks too, not only individual parts but song orders too, such as Forever Free being re-jigged to fit in more with the sound we are aiming for now.

Arran - We all come up with the ideas and write together. Often starting as Tim says with a riff or chord progression but occasionally lyrics first.

Dean - I have reams of lyrics I have jotted down over the years and whilst the guys with talent are jamming through something I tend to flick through them and sometimes I'll just dive in with one and it works. Sometimes this develops into a full track, sometimes it sits on the cutting room floor. But we always come back to it in the end and give it another lease of life.

As we've improved with our ability we can add ingredients to a 'dead' track and suddenly that was what was missing and it becomes something great.

Where do you get the influence for a song such as *The Ballad Of Jack Cade* from? And what other tales will hear on the album?

Arran - Jack Cade is an interesting tale about over throwing the establishment, which in these troubled times is something we can all get behind. Plenty of other tales about love, life and lost opportunity. All done with a rowdy Whipjack spin.

Dean - Jack Cade was a real person. Quick history lesson... in 1450 Henry VI was on the throne and not well liked. Cade ran a rebellion that ultimately led to his demise but for a short time he succeeded in cowing the Throne and making a difference. It's our only, to date, solid attempt at a traditional(ish) folk number, although all of our songs tend to tell a tale or follow a story. Jack Cade was written, in part, with input from Arran's dad Richard.

What are the plans with the album, when do you think it should become available? And after the release will it be a case of promoting and pushing towards next year's festival season?


Dean - Really, we just want to get it out there, in people's hands and see what they think. Hopefully it'll be something people enjoy listening to as much as we enjoy writing it.

We're aiming at getting it out by the end of the year, or at least a track or two and maybe even a video?

We're hoping next year will bring as much to us as this one, we played loads of great festivals and with a tonne of amazing bands. It's been a privilege to get the opportunities and meet some great people. We're hoping the album will open a load of new doors and allow us to play even bigger and better shows.

As I patrolled the side door of a theatre for the first time in my life. The friendly merchandise seller assured me he would not be long. With a seeming effortless charm, despite his heroic four hours on stage, the ever engaging **Danny Baker**, signed my biographies, posed for photos, apologised profusely to me for keeping me waiting and simply made everybody around him feel good about themselves. When security want a selfie with you, I guess you have made it? Big time Charlie was most definitely back in town...

It is without doubt a cliché to employ the phrase ..."he bounded onstage"...however, Danny Baker bounded on stage with all the verve and inextinguishable confidence of a barrow boy at the top of his game. Baker is no confidence trickster though, he is no "cock's egg", in boxing parlance he is the real McCoy. A natural raconteur, our host relishes the anecdotes as much as his audience. An audience that filled, to capacity, the salubrious Regal cinema for the second time on this tour. Just to hear a man speak and oh boy can he speak...impressive.



Armed with a powerpoint presentation, an enviable lexicon and, eh, a snooker cue – you had to have been there – Danny amused, amazed and astonished us with such alacrity , it was difficult to keep up, at times, it was like "trying to get to Jupiter on a strip of carpet." But what a magic carpet ride the evening was! From the hysterical Gazza and Twizzle story, to the lost two-tone trousers saga, to the elucidating Wacko Jacko vignette...a night of tales that like the "explosion of punk" will never be forgotten.

He has never forgotten that he was always cast as the "professional cockney" and the clichéd moniker clearly grates. And it is easy writing to pander to generalisations but when Danny Baker shouted out my nickname and thanked me for coming, well "my old china plate," I strode to my car feeling like a king...
