A Tragic Mystery

Music fans across the region were left shocked and saddened by the recent death of Kidderminster based **Steve Downing**.

A regular attendee at venues across the Midlands and huge supporter of the grass roots scene, Steve went missing in Worcester after going to a gig at The Imperial Tavern on Sunday 28th October. Tragically, his body was recovered from the River Severn three days later.

He was last sighted on CCTV exiting Worcester Shrub Hill station at around 8.15pm, but what happened after that remains a mystery. Investigating officers would like to hear from people who may have seen him on the evening.



Bell Tower Lights, Evesham

A new exciting permanent creative lighting trail has come to Evesham town centre with the launch of the new war memorial lights on Armistice Day to a big crowd. On 15th Dec the next phase of the lighting trail launches with the turning on of the new Bell Tower lights. There's a drop in event from 5.30pm-7.30pm where you can see the range of lights and colours available, plus family activities such as making a lantern, drop in projection workshop and shadow puppetry. It's an opportunity to go and see the new War Memorial lights at the same time.

The project has been funded by Wychavon District Council Planning contributions, Evesham Town Council, The Bell Tower Appeal and Worcestershire County Council. Phase 2 includes lighting the arch of the Abbey remains, lighting and projecting on to All Saints and St Lawrence's church.




Throughout December visitors will also have the opportunity to

Spoken word poetry tour of the George Marshall Medical Museum

Trying something a little different with a tour of words at one of Worcester's best-kept secrets, **The George Marshall Medical Musuem**.

Louise Price, curator at the museum worked with Tom Ball, an English and Creative Writing student at the University of Birmingham to develop a spoken word poetry tour of the Museum which could have an after-life for future visitors. George Marshall Medical Museum is located in the medical education centre on the site of Worcestershire Royal Hospital and most of their events are free, so Tom had cart blanche to create something which would work for whatever type of visitor walked through the door that day, be it hospital staff, families with children or medical students.



Tom delivered the tour on 2nd No. He said: "A lot of my poetry is inspired by the tremendous talent of the Decadent writers of the 1890s (Oscar Wilde, John Gray, Arthur Symons) and also from the Gothic period (Mary Shelley, Edgar Allen Poe, Jane Austen)."

The fantastic poems, which both delighted and shocked our varied audience (!), highlighted some of Tom's favourite pieces on display, or those that moved him most during his research time in the Museum. You can collect your free paper copy of these tours on the leaflet desk just inside the Museum's entrance doors, and now listen to a few of them at the Museum's Soundcloud account.

Tom's poem about the Museum's amputation chair from Silver Street Infirmary was a hit. This chair, dated to around 1750, would have been used at the original Worcester Infirmary on Silver Street, at a time before anaesthetics!

Once again, Christmas is on its way, and the TV breaks are flooded with ghastly Christmas adverts (apart from the Iceland ad which, being about important environmental issues rather than promoting excessive consumer consumption, has been decreed unacceptable and been banished to the internet). Christmas is a difficult time for a lot of people. We are being bombarded with media images of the perfect Christmas, of happy affluent families in spacious houses eating magnificent meals and opening mounds of expensive presents whilst enjoying one another's company. For many of us in Austerity Britain, this is an unreal fantasy. Most of us don't have the finances, and families aren't always happy and harmonious. Christmas is the time when family tensions come to the surface, when people are stuck together in the same house with no public transport to enable an escape. Old quarrels. resentments and disputes are easily fuelled with alcohol, along with bad memories of the past, and feelings of failure at not having



created a Christmas as good as the adverts told us that we should have made. This can be the most stressful and isolating time of the year – for mental health, Christmas can be absolutely toxic!

Remember, the whole purpose of all these advertisements and media images is to pressurise us to spend money and consume more resources than we can possibly need. So try not to worry about it too much, try to spend some time with the people you like rather than those you feel obliged to spend time with, don't feel embarrassed about needing to take time out or be on your own, don't feel you have to be sociable if you need solitude, and try not to dwell on arguments or things that didn't work out as you'd hoped. If you feel trapped and unhappy, message your friends, communicate on social media, do an online rant – there will always be somebody sitting up late who has also had a stressful time! And remember, it's only for one day, and after Boxing Day the supermarkets will be crammed with shelves full of cut price cake, cheese and chocolate – so at least there's something to look forward to!

"I decided to turn "Opening Time" into a full-length collection after having initially written half a dozen sonnets celebrating aspects of The Lamb and Flag." he explains.


"As in any pub, there is an eclectic mix of characters and opinion represented and it struck me that to centre a collection in a pub provides a good sounding board for these.

"Serendipitously, Ireland gave way to Italy when The Lamb and Flag changed hands in 2016. It was Italy, of course, that gave us the sonnet and this is reflected in the book. From the cricket match against Bangladesh to the arrival of spaghetti carbonara, all life is here.

Michael also tells me that local printer, **Stan Greer**, has reprinted the title poem "Opening Time" in a limited edition run of 100 beer mats by hand on his own press, as a nod to the shape and brevity of the sonnet form.

The collection will be launched at a special event on Monday 10th Dec 2018 starting at 18.30 at The Lamb and Flag, The Tything where, in the words of one of the new sonnets "the welcome word was *fáilte*, now it's *ciao*".

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They grow up so fast.

Reflecting on the last 12 months. Rachel says: "We're really proud of what we've achieved so far. But more than anything else, we love the community we've become a part of and, we hope, have helped to enhance. Worcester's such a creative city, so from day one, we wanted to make this a space where creative people felt at home. We're really pleased with how it's going so far."

From a music perspective, alone, the venue has already played host to hundreds of bands, featuring musicians from all over the world. But, at the core of all that is Rachel and Kit's tribalistic support of local talent and events. In September, for example, Paradiddles played a part in the Worcester Music Festival, with



17 bands performing at the venue across the weekend. In addition, Paradiddles is the home of one of Worcester's newest crazes: "Bandeoke", hosted by local band Polkadot Robot.

Even when there's not a gig on, you'll find local bands' merchandise (CD's, t-shirts, and so on) on sale in the venue. And, in support of emerging talent, students from local colleges use the space for concerts as part of their college course. Paradiddles. then, is becoming a genuinely integral part of the local, creative community.

Paradiddles has also been used for charitable events and good causes, including a concert in aid of the Teenage Cancer Trust and a poetry book launch that featured several fantastic poets sharing their work regarding mental health. "We even had the Mayor of Worcester in for that one. He got up and read his own poem, which was great" says Rachel.

In addition, the venue hosted a quiz for The Women's Equality Party, which featured in a BBC Radio 4 documentary during the local council elections. Worcester Pride also organised an event at the venue called 'Out in the Shires', which was a queer-arts, festival takeover. That ended up providing the venue's first comedy monologue performances.

So, the first year has been all-go for the team of two. And yet, that's not all they've been up to. Paradiddles has been used dance classes and has become a hub for those looking learn instrument. something key to Rachel and Kit's

passion for music.

Lessons take place in the venue's rehearsal space, which is also used by many of the bands that go on to perform there later.

Rachel explains that the diversity of events at Paradiddles is a big part of what excites them about the future: "It's hard not to be motivated about what lies ahead. Our monthly music-focused quiz is more popular than ever. And the same goes for the unplugged iam sessions we host, where everyone from expert players to beginners get involved. One of the popular events we host is Behind the Music, which sees songwriters perform their songs and tell the story behind them."

Now, with their first year behind them, Rachel and Kit are focusing on the future. For the festive season, they'll be introducing new drinks, including espresso martinis and hot white Russians. Then, in January, the menu will expand to include breakfast and lunch options. And, as usual, everything will have a heavy vegan leaning.

The DIY ethos, which has worked so well in making locals feel comfortable, will remain. It's part of what Rachel and Kit believe separates Paradiddles from everywhere else. "We want customers, promoters, charities, and everyone between, to get involved. All you need to do is pop in to say hello, tell your idea and we'll do what we can to help you make it happen."

Bast | Nanoångström

Bast are an experimental three-piece metal band featuring a couple of locals who have now since moved to the capitol. Their debut album *Spectres*, released back in 2014, saw their stock grow, a number of high profile tours with the likes of Pallbearer and Conan, as well high profile appearances at the likes of Bloodstock and Roadburn (to name just two festivals). The band's

aforementioned debut received rave reviews across the world of metal, whilst even the likes of **Louder Than War** were quick to offer plaudits for their innovative clash of styles, noting elements of doom, black metal, prog and even post rock on their unique disc

Following a heavy dose of touring across Europe and the UK, **Bast** settled down to work on their follow up, *Nanoångström*. An album that explores the human conditions of loss, isolation and change, whilst continuing to see the band experiment and merge genres during a dense and often challenging affair.

Nanoångström opens with Distant Suns, a sub three minute instrumental mood setter that has a somewhat futuristic and perhaps cinematic feel. Wind whips around a barren landscape of post rock guitars and pulse like rhythmic throbs until finally segueing into the ten and half minute riff driven Far Horizons. The band step on the power as down tuned riffs clash with monstrous assaults of the drumkit and guttural, near black metal vocals. It twists once more as military drums and a melodic mid section draws the listener further in as the band continue to make unexpected, yet thrilling turns, during the track's inventive journey. By now the band have me sat bolt upright listening intently for those changes of pace and substance. The Beckoning Void doesn't disappoint, pounding kick and snare introduce the song. Psychedelic guitars swirl before Chris Naughton of Winterfylleth



Bast perhaps sum Nanoångström up with it's final twelve minute opus, A Red Line Through Black, a track that seems to somehow weld all the various elements and ideas of the three-piece into one cohesive epic. Mountainous doom fueled riffs and beats reign down, whilst guttural grunts and growls make their presence felt. A final a minute of restrained, atmospheric, post rock draws the album, and perhaps humanity itself, to a fitting close. bringing the album full circle as the

mantra and onto the mesmeric.

final credits run.

When first encountering <code>Nanoangström</code> I felt a little daunted by five out of the six tracks weighing in or around the ten minute mark, but there's so much going on within the realms of a <code>Bast</code> song that it's easy to lose yourself and get caught up with the left turns and tempo changes, that you don't notice their duration. Instead you're focusing and marveling on the subtleties, musicianship and structures that the band create, finding yourself completely engrossed in the album as a whole. With <code>Nanoangström</code>, <code>Bast</code> have delivered one of the most inventive and captivating albums of the year, regardless of genre.

Emily Ewing | Wild

West Midlands based singer-songwriter **Emily Ewing** has been busy since the release of her debut self-titled EP, a few years back. There have been co-writes and recordings with the likes of Birmingham songwriter Robert Lane and numerous session recordings and column inches for *Lights Out Zine*. But in recent

months, Emily has returned to the studio with producer **Dave Draper** in tow to record a brand new three-track EP entitled *Wild*.

The title-track leads proceedings and sees Ewing behind the piano, delivering a subtle yet affecting melody. But it's her luscious soulful tones that draw the listener in. Slowly seducing as the track unwinds and sees Emily self-harmonise whilst Draper adds touches of instrumentation that bubble, rather than obstruct, further framing the gorgeous lead. Wild, is akin to stepping in for a hot soak after a long hard shift down

the mine, it's a warm welcoming caress that washes over you, enticing you to submerge completely Ewing's soul kissed pop.

Call and a swing

Now Emily has your attention she invites drummer, Craig Blundell (current sticksman for prog rock legend Steve Wilson!!) in for a brilliant, slice of autumnal acoustic driven, rootsy pop, again, Ewing's beautiful lead is at the forefront of the mix, whilst a keen melody leads us towards a big, radio friendly hook, that once again features those aforementioned, winning harmonies and an infectious refrain that's hard to ignore.

Whilst the EP's preceding songs mark out Emily Ewing's brand of pop as something special, it's the final number, Patience, that truly seals the deal. Based around a repetitive sparse piano motif, she delivers a heart wrenching slab of emotive modern day R&B, with a slight orchestral undertone and a suitable compliment of drums, the chilling instrumentation weaves evocative spell whilst Ewing pleads for 'more than words' as her patience finally runs dry, during her stunning final lament, rendering Wild as absolute must have EP from a very talented artist.

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Peter With Rosie Christmas In The Market Towns

When Pete Adams (of And What Will Be Left Of Them?, Hev You Guys! fame) and Rosie Green (Basement Orchestra/Stow-Cappella Choir) got married, they decided instead of venturing off on honeymoon they'd to do something a little different. So with producer Sam Thomas in tow, the duo retreated to Sound Terrace Studios to record a Christmas album with a twist

Pete Adams has prior history with the silly season, releasing a should have been, (anti) festive fave, Bring Me The Head Of The Man Dressed In Red under his Lost Boy Scout monicker. But whilst that was a brash, biting, slab of shouty indie pop, Christmas In The Market Towns is far removed from his more typical fair. Gone are the choppy riffs and half spoken, half sung drawls that we become accustomed with. Instead Adams delivers fragile, folky croons and sparse, strummed acoustic guitar, whilst Rosie adds stunning. clean, crystalline harmonies and her

measure during this beautifully understated nine track affair.

Personally, I struggle with most seasonal discs, I don't want to hear 'Last Christmas' or 'Santa Baby' on loop, but there are exceptions and Christmas In The Market Towns reminds of one such release, Low's Christmas in that there's no forced jollity. Instead we're faced with intimate, stark affairs, suggesting there's more going on in Market Towns than choirs and tinsel. Opening with a short prelude of sleigh bells, strums and flute, Pete and Rosie set the tone with a brief instrumental that hints at 'God Rest Ye Merry Gentlemen' before taking to the cobbled streets of the

said towns via Bethlehem on the (near) title track. Pete's restrained vocals are framed by a lonesome six string before Rosie swells the sound as the duo reach the choral hook, a shake of a tambourine and subtle keys add a delicate peppering to the hushed affair, offering some salvation to the chilling winds.

The duo's rendition of *In The Bleak Midwinter* follows and you can almost visualise an appeal by Shelter, families rushing by loaded with gifts, whilst the less fortunate are huddled on street corners as Adam's delicately brushes his guitar and the beautiful, vet haunting entwined vocals of Rosie and her husband drift down

the high street. It's a sad scene but the barely audible guitar and dual voices tug at the heartstrings, moving even the most hardened scrooge. Ten Tiny Toes offers more hope as the duo celebrate the wonderment of childbirth with a hushed, serene choral hook, gently lulling the listener. Then Rosie takes over lead duties for a breathtaking acappella take on the traditional, Basque folk carol, The Angel Gabriel From Heaven Came, really showcasing her beautiful tones in full.

Elsewhere like the aforementioned Low. (and indeed countless others) the duo tackle a becalmed, Silent Night, before hinting at prior, indie influences (only with that organic, stripped

As the band continue to deliver a damning report of 'These Days', Emilia's saxophone joins an already potent mix and the band change gear, drawing the song to a close on a ska flavoured trip, having already grabbed the listener by the lapels and urged them to listen as they move their feet.

Shelf Indulgence | Roz Bruce Infusion

With new album 'Shelf Indulgence' Roz Bruce & co adapt literary classics to song in an intriguing concept approached here like a synopsis or blurb for each work.

Lyrically: there's an obvious love for the source material; with just the right amount of depth, summarization, and nuance, shunning the idea of outright lifting passages verbatim, or watering down the powerful concepts & views found within each piece.

Musically: there's a whole lot of dynamical discipline & flexed muscles on display here, opener 'The Dice Man' has infectious immediacy, it brings to mind Skunk Anansei at their most playful awash with it's firmly honed grooves which roll this grim tale of chance, chaos and circumstance along. 'Metamorphosis' slinks along phonetically in an odd measure, with a chorus of relief, and a

middle 8 that shifts, slivers, and genre hops as if snared from none the less throughout they remain sharp and focused, a fine Kafka's own muddled subconscious. 'The Stranger' has a more return to form for the trio and a new chapter for what lies ahead, blues rock approach with nods of Zeppelin and Ani Defranco. The saturated hoedown of 'Nausea' much like Sacre's text, sonically

splits at the tail into a different hallucinatory beast entirely: Bruce at first wielding a fiddle in the musical break, then compound time breakdown & tempo shifts tease on the edge of progressive reason.



Matt's long-standing fan base will love the inclusion of favourites like "Cruel Disposition" and the raucous "Black Smoke Rising", as



well as Willie Dixon's "Lil' Red Rooster", which Matt has fun with. counterbalancing those impassioned love songs that now reflect his life. "Find A Way" speaks to us all; a beautiful, sparkling bit of Americana, echoing a plea to those who love us to look beyond our faults. "One Love" showcases Matt on his acoustic guitar as he picks his way through the lead in. He opens many of the songs acoustically, before Dave brings in the rest of the band.

> The warm, almost lamenting "Love Changes' says it all, with mellowed guitar, squawking wah-wah, sweet kevs brought by the band, to superb effect.

Then we see the ever-brighter glow of "Lighthouse"; the full band produce a pulsating, living edifice, with jazz licks, piano, deep waves of bass and cymbals that crash over rocks to carry its message; a moral code to be signalled to all in sight. Matt has crafted, re-cut, and swaged this serpent of a into something fantastically song sumptuous and chilled, while Michi Ortel adds a pinch of magic dust from his keys.

For all you diehards, have no fear, Matt still has those "Same Old Blues", and they


quench the thirst nicely. Then there's "Let it Flow", more a torrent, as it washes over the rocky rhythm with honeyed guitar. Wille And The Bandits | Path

I've been following this remarkable, original band since their early days spent bumming around small festivals, living a life on the road. Just a whiff of a gig and you can be sure to see me there, so their new album 'Path' has kept me tracking, stylus like, in its groove. Path seems to shoot straight from their early roots, stirred with the rhythms of 'world music' and a touch of exotic spice.

This is, without reservation, one of the best live bands in the UK and Europe. Driven by the rhythms of percussionist **Andy Naumann**, who draws on the soundscapes of Africa and beyond, alongside **Matt Brooks** on 6 string bass, 5 string stick bass, and cello, a recent addition to his list. All that's needed to complete this recipe is the incomparable slideplaying, grit-spitting **Wille Edwards**,



Path keeps the band firmly on that road, perhaps as a guide. "One Way" expounds the ethics and dreams of the peacemakers, Mandela, Gandhi and Tutu, Wille slides in from the Delta, while Andy and Matt explode into the rhythm that chatters out like the machine guns of empire building 'modernisers'. "Make Love", not

war, rocks, poking politicians' twisted truths, with Wille's guitar that cuts the air, axing through the lies.

Matt's cello acts as a bed for Wille's acoustic notes, pulling us into "4 Million Ways", a search for disconnected parents. Matt's string arrangement finds the cello, softly interweaving with guitar, over Andy's percussion. "Chakra" gives Andy the opportunity to drag out the Djembe and Hang Drum, while Wille's Weissenborn adds a magical, ethereal tone to the song that questions human

destruction of the natural world.

Chill to the funk of "Keep It On The Down Low", rave to the dirty fuzz of the money men in "Find My Way", before we are diverted to the eastern promise of Indian scales, by Andy on Djembe and Udu. Mystical sounds of the east are tapped out in colours on the tongue drum, with Matt's bass pulsing along, Wille is counting his blessings at watching his daughter grow.

Failed policies and disenfranchised peoples call for "Retribution". A soaring slide is

underpinned once more by the rhythms of Matt and Andy, as the song makes a final accusatorial poke at the system we all live in, closing their sixth album. It's another juggernaut from this mesmeric band. If you've ever seen them live, which you most definitely should, you will know what I mean.

The recordings of this album, released on the Fat Toad label, were made using vintage valve amps and kit from the '50's, producing a lovely, warm analogue nuance; a Path brushed clear of the weed and detritus of our digital age.

Songs from Rainbow Hill | Ben Crosland

The release of composer, sound designer and pianist **Ben Crosland's** debut album has been long awaited by those of us familiar with Ben's rare live performances and reflective yet captivating compositions.

'Songs from Rainbow Hill' is a collection of contemporary classical pieces performed on solo piano with a delicious intimacy and stirring fluidity. Whether emotive, evocative or simply melodically beautiful each piece transports you to a different place, a different emotional landscape, a different era. It is all at once steeped in nostalgia, yet strangely timeless. There is an exquisite subtlety and sensitivity to Ben's playing which reels you in from the off. Delicate phrases are injected with life as bold splashes of colour and waves of heartwrenching urgency draw up from the depths of the music.

All of the pieces sit around the 3 minute mark, giving the album a captivating pace. This is not something that you'll put on in the background, every note demands to be listened to.



From the aftermath of the Battle of Worcester to summer storms and winter thaw, the themes of the album are as rich and varied and the music. This is an emotive, beautifully crafted and flawlessly performed collection of pieces. The piano sound is resonant, warm and rich.

There is a charm to the album that is achingly British yet speaks of a place we are yet to visit. For someone who shares their hometown with Ben, I can taste shades of Worcester amidst the sinuous melodies. There is a comfort to the warm tones and flickering imagery that each piece conjures, yet nothing is contrived or expected and intense passages of hammering wood on steel drive home an urgent and uneasy contrast to the delicate intricate preceding melodies.

This album is a masterpiece, it is nigh on impossible to isolate standout tracks as each piece has its own unique character and appeal. Each listen offers new insights, new favourites and fresh delight. The songs feel like they belong together, every piece sitting perfectly beside its neighbour. This album has been meticulously crafted yet the emotional charge has it streaked with personality and layers of flavour.

'A Story Untold' makes me nostalgic for a past that was never mine to claim as it trips from light to shade in a heady and intoxicating dance. When the optimistic tones of 'Love's Grove' comes in, you are transported again. Catherine Harper's cello graces this single track with a depth of feeling that is breathtaking. This piece has a delicious yearning quality that begs to be revisited.


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Nuns of the Tundra

With Pray I think the world was really getting on top of me, you know when it feels like everything's truly screwed, like the climate, the politics, the destructive mindsets of a lot of people. So it's about that feeling of impending doom really, and doing whatever we can to stop it, even though it does feel pretty late in the game. We're all guilty kind of thing. But it's more fun than that. I promise.

I'd say the track is something of a departure for the band, how do you think the song compares to your previous releases?

Yeah for us it's really left field and I can't wait to introduce it to everyone, play it at our upcoming gigs! I'd say the biggest difference between the new and the old is our approach to making the songs interesting. Our previous releases are definitely of the mindset that if we have anything that makes us excited, it's going in the song, and through that they're all full of little events throughout. 
UK Ska-punk legends [SPUNGE] are back with their second new single 'Get Out', which follows on from October's release of 'Liar', through the bands own label, Dent'All Records. The duo of singles are the bands first new material since 2014's 'Hang On?' album and come ahead of a run of UK tour dates through late November and December.



Having formed in 1994, **[SPUNGE]** have released 8 studio albums over the years, hitting the album and singles charts several times along the way. Still regularly touring, the band continue to fill venues and festival stages throughout the UK. This summer's festival season culminated with an at-capacity headline slot on 'The Skankin' Stage at **Boomtown**.




Beth RowleyThe Marrs Bar | Thursday 7th Feb

Reflecting on The Ring

Between March - October 2018 over 228 days **The Ring**, a major new arts project, sent ripples through the waterways of



Worcestershire. Inspired by the region's canals and rivers, over spring and summer, thousands of people engaged with fresh and



exciting artworks created by local and internationally recognised artists. By commissioning 7 high-profile artists, musicians and poets The Ring created a specially commissioned programme, which featured 23 arts activities, events, films and art installations, all revealing the hidden stories of the River Severn, Worcester & Birmingham Canal and Droitwich Canals.



The Ring was delivered by a passionate team in collaboration with the **Canal & River Trust** - the charity that cares for the nation's waterways – and has seen the works produced in response to the 21 miles of waterways encircling Droitwich and Worcester.

With the project increasing the number of visitors to the local waterways by 25%, The Ring also providing a huge boost for Worcestershire's cultural scene, having an impact on tourism and the local economy. Over a hundred 100 artists and performers from Worcestershire and surrounding areas were employed during



the course of the 340 days. The project also provided opportunities for more than 4500 people to take part in more than 40 public activities and workshops as well as working with over 100 local volunteers. The Ring reached a huge audience via their social media sites and website, clocking thousands of hits during the programme.



Artists and performers from Worcestershire formed part of The Ring, as well as commissions for several renowned international (and one local) artists who all created work inspired by the waterways. These included:

Rich White: Occupation, (Mar - Sept) Bristol-based sculptor Rich White took up residence on the famous Diglis Island, Worcester.

Heather Wastie: The Muck and Shovel Brigade, Droitwich Canals and Online. (April) Former Worcestershire Poet Laureate, Heather Wastie produced a limited edition book.

Katy Beinart: Saltways, Gloucester Docks, Vines Park and Heritage Centre, Droitwich (May - Sept) Brighton-based interdisciplinary artist Katy Beinart lead a symbolic salt journey from Gloucester to Droitwich

NEON: Weogoran Pavilion, South Quay, Worcester (June). NEON (award-winning art, architecture and design practice) created a sequinned stage which brought together performances from renowned musicians and local performers.

Emily Speed: Hollowware, Museum of Royal Worcester and Diglis Canal Basin (Aug). Emily presented an intriguing, interactive performance drawn from her research at the museum.

Lucy McLauchlan: Opening the Floodgates, Oil Basin, Diglis, Worcester (Oct). Lucy, one of the UK's leading female street artists created a major 80-metre mural.

The Ring was a huge creative success for the county and hopefully 'opened the floodgates' for more vibrant and cutting edge projects to be delivered.

Annie, who runs the venue, has a strong musical background. She's previously been involved in the music scene in Nottingham for the last 20 years alongside running Annie's Burger Shack in both Nottingham and Derby.

Now that the venue has a full PA system in place, they'll be looking to put on more frequent gigs in the New Year, with some exciting plans already in the pipeline.

Rockin' and Rollin' Back The Years At New Redditch Music Venue

Originating from Bromsgrove

in Worcestershire, Led Hendrix are the UK's only band to pay tribute to the music of two of rock music's greatest artists, the mighty Led Zeppelin and Jimi Hendrix.

Always respectful to the "classics", Led Hendrix captures the sounds and style of the original artist with a modern twist, using period instruments to further enhance the sound and visual



experience. The band, who have been working musicians for many years, formed in 2015, and have built up a strong following around the West Midlands. 2019 will see the band touring venues around the UK. In September 2018, Led Hendrix performed in front of an international audience at the **John Bonham - A Celebration**

event in Redditch town centre, and went down a storm.

Stephen K. Amos Cheltenham Town Hall | 27the Nov

Against a regency backdrop of marbled pillars, ornate coving & elaborate cornices the evening erupted through the speakers... "ladies and gentlemen, many thanks for coming out on a school night and let's be honest it's 'king cold out there tonight!"

Stephen K. Amos needed extra support this evening. Firstly, from Kacey, a young comedian, who made much of his Christian beliefs, articulating that he is constantly questioned about his admission he doesn't believe in sex before marriage. (sic) Kacey was keen to explore the subject of a young man denying himself sex and at times his observations were virgin on the ridiculous...ta, dah!

Ridiculous, is the only way to describe **Stephen Amos** limping out on to the stage as a result of a sprained ankle – a willing audience, however, was keen to support him. I forget who wrote that "writers give the reader a context to think"

and Amos is a veteran of both the stand-up circuit and allowing his audience to think: challenging stereotypes, ignorance, casual racism and bigotry. With an honesty that would shame a precocious four-year old. Accordingly, I felt the startled gent to the

right of me stiffen on more than one occasion and fold his arms like a tetchy teacher waiting for silence. Or was he just bored of the black man's perspective I wonder? Amos is, as ever, keen to explore all perspectives...who else would highlight that Prince Harry, "although, an honorary member of the black brotherhood by default, is from a broken and dysfunctional family living off the state?"

A sign of a good stand-up comedian is I think is gauged by your willingness to see the comedian again and again.

The first time I witnessed Amos was in a small pub in Stroud – where he worked the audience and room like his career depended on it. He did the same on a gravity defying stage in Evesham. And once again in the Cheltenham Town Hall... and still, after 26 years, we find is still plying his trade: "making shit up." Encouraging his audience to laugh, stifle knowing chuckles, cover their open mouths in horror and stare back in uncomfortable silence...

Alarmingly, we caught our shuffling jester unflinchingly opening up about the last 18 months of his life. 18 months, where not only did his Mother pass away but he also buried his twin sister. As the silence descended, the gent next to me stiffened, his elbows at right angles, as we all involuntarily held our collective breathe. Amos of course, injected humour into this the most harrowing of plights..."as a child I cried for attention from my

Mother and now I am still crying for her attention, look she's failed me..." I also forget who wrote: "For those that think about life it is a comedy, for those that feel, it is a tragedy."

Robert Newman - Total Eclipse of Descartes Huntingdon Hall. Worcester | Weds 17th Oct

I've always been a fan of **Rob**, now **Robert**, **Newman**, from his time as part of the **Mary Whitehouse Experience** to the ground breaking comedy is the new pop of **Newman and Baddiel**. Add to this my love of philosophy and I'm surely in for a great night!

Tonight's show is billed as; "In a world gone crazy can philosophy help?" Newman loosely touches upon this, but in the main the show is delivered as a quasi-lecture, interspersed with gags about pseudo-science, philosophers and twentieth century popular references, such as Morrissey, Paul Weller and Oasis.

Although Newman retains a youthful sense of mischief and uses his well-honed comedy talents to great affect this is not an out and out standup performance. There are some far deeper more ethereal subjects to be considered, looking at philosophical mind stretchers such as the tree in the forest and his warm and kind telling of the plight of Pavlov's dogs after being the subjects of the famous experiments. He also does some half decent impressions, portraying Pythagoras as James Cagney and has some very funny digs at Jean-Paul Sartre for living with his Mother until he was in his forties!

Newman has something of the highly likeable Professor about him, at times seeming older and wiser that his years. He tells us a little about himself, that he is adopted, a Cambridge University graduate, a London dweller without a car or television and father to a daughter whose school he is a Governor of. He considers our education system and discusses state versus private schooling giving us his take on the produce of both systems, preferring of



course the state provided free to all offering of which he is a product. We hear of the academic pranks he plays on his daughter by willfully misinforming her and convincing the poor girl to believe complete fallacies. Whether these tales are true we may never know but they are fine story telling that draw you in to a punch line that is delivered much later in the show with great skill.

One line which had a profound effect on me and will stay with me from the show is where Newman is considering how our civilization will be viewed in many years from now, he says, "They thought they could have capitalism and a planet!"

Robert Newman is a writer, broadcaster, comedian, actor and political activist who is warm, funny and charming in equal measure. The cozy yet authoritarian, it's a thing I have about churches, surroundings of Huntingdon hall make an excellent venue for this excellent show, brought to us by a real talent. The audience applause brings Robert forth for an encore that is sung and played on ukulele! Oh well you can't have it all. Catch him if you can.

Deborah Bonham Band Huntingdon Hall, Worcester 3rd Nov

The Bonham name conjures up memories of John, and more latterly Jason, who have followed doggedly in those big footsteps. However, all the avid followers of Blues will be well aware of sister Deborah's, maybe, smaller footprint, its down to nature! She has toured extensively with her band in the UK, Europe, and the US. Indeed they are just back from supporting Paul Rogers and Jeff Beck in the US. Her band are **Pete Bullick** - guitar, **Ian Rowley** on bass, **Gerard Louis** on keyboards, and **Richard Newman** on drums.

The hall was comfortably full of Deborah's fans and the band sharing a bit of banter with them as they took stage, 'Shit Happens' warms the air as Pete's chopping style, on his Les Paul, over accompanying keys, Deborah delivers in her wizard drapery.

The throbbing bass and drum rhythm bring in the country rock of 'Feel So Alive', Pete slides abou whilst in the shadows and Gerard is working those ivories, but its the bass that drives it forward, as Deborah twists and twirls using the stage.

There's still plenty of rapport with the crowd in their boxed pews, before the country groove is ploughed a little deeper with 'Take Me Down' with Pete on mandolin, as Deb goes looking for the water. The mandolin passes to bassist Ian for a rock fuelled, 'Fly', Pete's dirty guitar filling the air, as Deborah takes off for scorcher. She releases her vocal power for the slow bluesy soul of 'Hold On', with Pete switching to the semi acoustic resonator and slide. A stupendous power ballad to bring a break.

The searing, slow-burning 'How Do You Feel' burnt into the halls devotees, Deborah at her best and Pete adding a scorching solo, over, crunching drums. The influences comes to the surface, with Bad Company's, 'Ready For Love', Pete is torturing the Gibson and Richard is structuring the rhythm scaffold beautifully.



The second set builds on the nights work, the whole hall moving with the music, feet tap, heads bob, all galvanised to the groove, as the band seem to strengthen with each song. Another scorching, slow burning blues, and its a cracker, as Deborah gives her soul to 'No Angel', wringing out every essence of passion as the band do the biz, and open up with a guitar driven underscore, that breaks to the surface, before Pete ebbs away, then erupts into a solo, falling back for Deborah to pour her heart out, 'No Angel' is a stunning centre piece in a gallery, full of colourful songs.

Close to the end and Deborah pleads and entices a man from the shadows of the audience, one **Julian Speroni**, a goalkeeper at Crystal Palace and it would appear, a fan of the rock guitar. He eased into the shaded side of the stage, accepting one of Pete's guitar's, all set for a nod to Led Zeppelin and 'Rock And Roll', been a long time, closed out an evening of blues rock, with the **Deborah Bonham Band**, Julian saving the metaphorical penalty, all to a standing ovation for a band with a strong following that is growing stronger with each chord change...

Triple Header Mark Morriss, Chris Helme & Nigel Clark The Masrrs Bar, Worcester | 18th Nov

Opening the evening was **Nigel Clark**, front man of band **Dodgy**, a relatively local gig for the former chart icon, who has continued to perform as an established solo artist.

The night was off to a brilliant start. Nigel took us on historical, lyrical tour. "So Let Me Go Far" from the 1994 Homegrown album



was first up, easing the gathered crowd into an evening of nostalgic, melodic memories. "What are we fighting for", a tune from 2016 still held all the charm of the early Dodgy songs we know and love. Nigels vocals throughout his set came across with rustic and husky tones, showing an evolution of talent from years of performing. At ease with a guitar, Nigel drew interaction from the crowd involving us in a sing song about Willie Nelson. A more delicate performance with "Only a Heartbeat" led into a cover of a song by The Jam- In the City, which drew an exclamation of "Amazing" from the person stood behind me. Encouraging the crowd to move forward by joking it was in case of a fire, the dance floor in front of the stage filled up. "Staying out for the Summer" was an inevitable inclusion on the set list and got everyone on their feet and singing along. A Tom Waits cover and a funky song with a hip hop backing track took us up to the set finale of top ten hit "Good Enough" which was warmly received and sang along to, until the tempo was changed up and the crowds vocal performance was compared to a Christmas Carol service as Nigel let us sing out the chorus without him. A true entertainer with a warm personality, Nigels set was a winner.

Next on the set list, and describing himself as the meat in a Britpop sandwich that night, was **Mark Morriss**, lead singer and song writer in **The Bluetones**. Opening his set with a solo song, "Low Company", Mark seduced us with his silky vocals. proving that the indie years certainly did produce some extremely talented vocalists. In between songs, Mark also proved to be quite the comedian, with witty comments about the sales of The Bluetones



songs he'd thrown into his set. First of those was Never Nowhere which he jested was a hit record 15 years ago, reaching number 40! Following a couple more songs, and a broken guitar string, Mark had to switch to Nigels guitar to complete his set, which become a running joke throughout the evening. True professional, he'd carried on through Cut Some Rug and proved he wasn't one to take himself too seriously which made him a huge hit with the crowd, especially with the references to his questionable moustache! His performance of "Bluetonic" was a highlight of mine that evening and the audience were singing along the melody behind the chorus which was wonderful to hear, a song that has stood the test of time and remained firmly etched on the hearts of the fans in the room. We were teased with Slight Return, arguably the most famous song by the band, before Mark went into an hilarious version of "Stay Another Day" by East 17 which told the tale of the comical demise of Brian Harvey and Daniella Westbrook, Mark ended his 10 track set with "If", another one that seemed to still be enjoyed as much as when our younger ears first heard it back in the 90s. Marks music is story telling with hints of sarcasm and irony, songs that resonated in my teenage years, but have stuck with me into my adult years as each song takes on a new meaning with lifes experiences.

Mark introduced the nights final artist, **Chris Helme** of **The Seahorses**, saying he had the whole Poldark thing going on with the dark flowing hair.



The Seahorses, for me, were one of the Britpop/indie revolutions most underrated bands. With only one album, Do It Yourself, in their discography, dating back to 1997, I feel they didn't have the chance to shine as much as they deserved to. However, with singer Chris now carrying the torch for the band with a series of triple header tour dates with Nigel and Mark, I've had the chance to fall in love with the music all over again. Opening with "Hello", Chris delivered 12 lyrically beautiful songs to tie the evening up wonderfully. A cover of "Ooh La La" by The Faces, sat perfectly amongst the songs we were being treated to, and "Boy in the Picture" was adored by the enthralled audience. The vocals we were hearing were warm and familiar, hardly varying from the original tracks from back in the day. Chris mentioned Paul Weller as a musical influence and this was clear to hear in "Moving On" which reminded me heavily of "Wild Wood". "Love is the Law" and "Blinded by the Sun" encouraged energetic singing from all in the venue before Chris ended with a solo jamming session which had us all joining in with "Eye of the Tiger" amongst other jems he

All three performers thoroughly entertained the Sunday crowd with music and comedy, more than we bargained for, but greatly appreciated and received. The three sets complimented each other, and one sat along side the next comfortably, offering a magical trio of musical pleasures.

How to be a Stand-up Comic!

If you've always had a hankering for the stand-up comedy stage, but never quite had the bottle to do it, you're not alone! I hope when you've read what follows, it'll give you the extra push to give it a go, because there is simply no better feeling than making an audience laugh.

Stand-up is no longer about telling jokes (especially not other people's jokes!), it's a broad art form which is more about the individual personality of each act and their take on the world.

In this article, we'll look at the basics of gathering ideas together and writing a short set, next month's will contain tips on taking your material to the stage.

Remember, the audience wants to see what is unique about you, your take on the world around you. For this reason, it's often a good idea to avoid the obvious; everyone, even top comics, are bound to be doing stuff on the state of the world today and it's hard to find a fresh angle on some of the political shenanigans which have been going on.

Instead, start by thinking about the who you are, what's different about you, how others see you (geek, posh, camp, grumpy, whatever!). Next list your loves and hates; good comedy often comes from things we feel an emotional connection with, though to be honest it's the 'hates' that usually get the biggest laughs!

Write all this down and then start to exaggerate it, so if you're a bit OCD tidy, think what the extreme of that would be like, what would drive you mad if you shared a house, similarly what effect would it have on your housemates?

In a ten minute set, it's a good idea to think about 3 or 4 'chunks' of material on different topics, which can be developed into a few minutes each, if they link together that's fine, but it's not compulsory.

I never try to deconstruct comedy too much, but there are a few fundamentals that are worth considering. At this stage, let's look at the structure of a joke. Essentially you are leading the audience down a particular path (the set-up), but before you get to the end, you take a quick left turn (the punch line) and it is the surprise of their expectations not being met which is funny.

Stephen Dale Petit Huntingdon Hall, Worcester | 22nd Nov

Stephen Dale Petit is not a name that pops up in the local music scene regularly, yet he is a force to be reckoned with in contemporary, guitar fuelled blues today. A Californian, he is influenced by King's, BB and Freddie. He has 4 albums available

and currently has another one on the way. Accordingly, he is currently touring, backed ably with his young, talented band: drummer Casper Miles, and bassist, Sophie Lord, aka 'Cat Woman'. Dressed in her trademark black cat-suit and spangly ankle boots - she has yet to adopt the velvet eared half mask - but you never know...

The 'Tinderbox' is struck, sparking a fire of wild rock from Stephen's semi-acoustic Gibson that was set to loud. All the while, the killer boots sparkle in the spotlights and sticks crashed into

cymbal and drum. 'Soul Survivor' pumps out like a Remington shotgun, armed with hard punching lyrics and scattergun dirty guitar licks. Sophie thumps on her bass and Casper takes on a convincing impression of Ginger Baker, crossed with Keith Moon: hair flicking and bouncing as he pounds those skins and hats.

Stephen recounts seeing BBK as a young pretender, and asking to play with him on stage. 'Ending The End'- dedicated to BB King,

brought much string bending and a resultant tortured and weeping guitar. Changing to a beautiful red, special edition Gibson he brought the Mayall, McVie and Clapton classic—"Stepping Out" - to life, simply sublime.

We're soon engulfed in the maelstrom of the second set, with fingers working the fret board like a pool typist. I recall the rumbling, thunderously heavy: 'Fall Of America,' which shook the building - dark satanic stuff for sure - you've gotta feel it inside.



The gold plated fittings and pick-ups of the Gibson caught the lights, as the band showcased some of the up-coming album. 'Sputnik Days' took off on a more mellow, ethereal flight of fancy, finding its way towards 'Zombie Train', a rocking blues number that bubbled like two teaspoons of Andrews Liver Salts.

Stephen Dale Petit and his brilliant young band, hark back to the days when a rock track would

take half a side of an album. Put it simply, the man can play a seriously mean guitar, at times making Uriah Heep sound like a Dickensian character. Thankfully, there was still time for an encore - the band basked in the options offered; oddly, 'Summertime Blues' hit the right note for this chilly evening, with its thumping rhythms and cutting guitar; Stephen, stretched and moulded the song, before bringing a sunny closure to a storming evening.


