

First 100 Acts Confirmed for Worcester Music Festival's 2019 Extravaganza

Organisers of Worcester Music Festival have announced the first 50 artists that will be playing at this year's event in Worcester City Centre from 13th-15th September.

The festival has been running since 2008 and is organised entirely by volunteers. It has seen thousands of acts from near and far flocking to the city to perform original music in dozens of venues – and has raised tens of thousands of pounds for different charities. This year's chosen charity, as voted for by the WMF committee from charities who submitted applications, is the Worcester Foodbank.

With music workshops for all ages, as well as live performances in over 20 Worcester City venues, there's sure to be something for everyone over the weekend.

This year, the first 50 announcement brings a few old favourites. including the return of Evilwitch - a well-known Worcester band who last played together in 2012, who many locals will remember fondly. The Whipjacks bring along what is best described as 'pirate punk' with their driving rhythms and 'partial nudity'. As well as the familiar old faces. Worcester will be welcoming some new and, in some cases, controversial ones,

Banned from Glastonbury for their satirical cry to 'kill a Tory' the self-styled '2-bit Punk band' Killdren are appearing for their first ever Worcester gig. WMF organisers are keen to point out they do not advocate violence towards any person or political party, of course.



Spanning all genres, ages and cultures, the 12th Worcester Music Festival will be here soon, and as Nigel Clark from Dodgy says: "This is a great festival with an amazing amount of artists giving up their time for free. It's a chance to spend the weekend exploring a wide range of music, while taking in the many splendours of the city."

Shire artist selected for residency in Japan

A Herefordshire glass artist has been selected for an important residency in Japan. **Nina Casson McGarva** from Ross on Wye has been chosen for **The Naked Craft Project/Shin-Nagata Glass Residence 2019.** She is only the fourth artist to be picked since the award was established in 2011.



Nina creates abstract glass work based on nature. "I have always admired Japanese crafts and I think going in the autumn would be the perfect time for inspiration," says Nina, whose residency takes place during the autumn.

The project curator is **Nobayasu Yoshida** a glass artist living and working in Kobe and is run in partnership with the **Contemporary Glass Society** in the UK.

"Each year one artist from the Contemporary Glass Society is selected to spend one month in Kobe creating a body of work and experiencing life in Japan," explains Sue Purser Hope, Chair of the Contemporary Glass Society. "It is a project that aims to make connections on a local and global scale via contemporary craftsmanship, and make cultural exchange through the works of artists from the UK and Japan."

Artist wellbeing

Accessible arts scheme at the Courtyard

The Courtyard have launched a new scheme to make the arts more accessible to local community groups. Recognising that there are many reasons why people might not be able to engage with the arts, whether that be financial, geographical or many other reasons. The Courtvard Community Group scheme was established this month to make sure the arts are accessible to evervone, giving local community organisations the opportunity to offer their users free theatre and cinema tickets at the venue. This month, visitors to Worcester Cathedral will have the chance to see two exhibitions featuring new work by painter Sara Hayward RCA. Worcester based artist Sara, who describes herself as a contemporary British colourist, studied fine art at the Ruskin School of Drawing & Fine Art, Oxford University, then printmaking at the Royal College of Art, London. Printmaking still influences the way she works.



Cutting corners: colour works

A series of semi abstract, meditative tondi (round paintings) will be hung in the main body of the Cathedral in an exhibition. Originally inspired by olive trees outside the Berardo museum in Lisbon the double sided tondi are an attempt to capture the pulsating rhythms and energy of nature.

Pilgrimage: an inner journey (Iona and beyond)

An exhibition of expressive paintings inspired by the Scottish island of Iona plus abstract colour works inviting meditative inner thought journeys. Hayward revisits the seascape theme in small. intimate expressive paintings. Whilst some of these were inspired by a trip to the spiritual capital of Iona, others capture the wild, windswept, natural spirit of Cape Cornwall.

Our Man in the Moone seeks performers

Herefordshire based charity, **Everybody Dance**, has a callout for local people who would like to get involved in a new performance, '**Our Man in the Moone**', with roles in aerial dance, movement, stilt walking, as a narrator and backstage support.

No prior experience is necessary, as a series of summer workshops will teach people fun new skills for the production. The performance of 'Our Man in the Moone' takes place at Whitbourne Village Hall's playing field on 31st August 2019 at 4:15pm. There are taster workshops at Longlands Farm, where people of all ages (8+) and abilities (it's open to disabled and non-disabled participants) can have a go at defying gravity in aerial dance sessions on 3rd August from 10:30am - 12pm and 10th August 3:30pm - 5pm.

Everybody Dance also needs help from those with backstage skills: project leader, **Rachel Freeman** says, "From making costumes and sets to stewarding the performance and serving the tea, anything that people can offer would be appreciated." The project has been funded by the **National Lottery Heritage Fund** as an opportunity to explore a hidden treasure of Worcestershire; an amazing piece of science fiction that was published almost 400 years ago. Written by **Francis Godwin**, Bishop of Hereford, resident and estate owner of Whitbourne village, 'The Man in the Moone' was the first - and most extraordinary - work of science fiction in English, published in 1638, after the Bishop's death and under a pseudonym. It was a daring plot for its time, featuring a Catholic protagonist called Domingo Gonsales, who creates a contraption powered by geese to journey to the moon, discovering what appears to be a utopian civilisation there. The story was mostly forgotten about until very recently, when a local brewery rediscovered it and named a beer after the strange tale!

Everybody Dance is working with a local historian, writer, stiltwalker, dance practitioner and storyteller to take 'The Man in the Moone' story back into the community. The project includes a book group, tours of local history and archives provision, dance and storytelling workshops with mainstream and special schools, publication of new version of the story in the parish magazine and a collection of short stories, poems and pictures about the project.

The project has been made possible through money raised by National Lottery players. **Everybody Dance** has received a National Lottery Heritage Fund grant of £10,100 to undertake this exciting heritage programme, which takes place in and around Whitbourne village in north Herefordshire.



Everybody Dance is a charity based in the village of Whitbourne that specialise in working with people of all abilities and ages and bringing them together through dance-based projects. Whitbourne Community Shop are also supporting *'Our Man in the Moone'* along with **The Herefordshire Community Foundation, The Elmley Foundation** and **Susan Bulmer**.



Bite Poetry Press book launch Paradiddles. Worcester | 20th July 2019

The summer's evening courtyard at **Paradiddles** is the perfect venue for the launch of the new poetry books "Crossing the Line" by **Holly Daffurn** and "Not Under my breath" by **Scott Cowley**. I've seen Holly and Scott before but this is something more urgent, slicker. **Bite Poetry Press** specialises in poetry that fights back, far from maudlin poems about loves lost, the poetry tonight is relentless, truthful and unstoppable.

After introductions by one of 'Bite's' founders **Gerard Hughes**, Scott and Holly start with taster sets to offer a flavour of what is to come. Scott describes himself as "dealing with my demons through word-craft" and he plunges the audience in to a world of addiction, difficulties and hope. As he states, Scott is "open and speak[s] without fork tongues." His words seem to rush towards the listener and I am transfixed by the gravity of every line. Yet, he is not too heavy as the craftsmanship of his rhymes and rhythms keep the subject matter in check.



Holly's taster set offers the beautiful "You built me a Castle" which contains the line "I always imagined love to look more like freedom" a truth, often acknowledged, that just because you live somewhere doesn't mean that it is home. This poem caught me off guard and I found myself thinking of all the places we feel we are not meant to be despite what we are told.



The break offers chance to buy books and sample Paradiddles' always delicious cakes and the second half allows the poets to really stretch their verbal legs. Scott's poetry is known for "Opening doors for conversations into difficult subjects." He offers a voice to mental illness and suffering that is so often shied away from. One of my favourite lines about a "nameless and unseen" homeless gentleman explains "he carries his life in two plastic



bags," using fantastic economy of words to show the true hardship of the situation. This is poetry that bites back.

Holly's set is split into six sections, as is her book. Her poems cross boundaries regardless of their nature and through language she wrestles with sexuality, bipolarism, cruelty and cultural difference. My personal favourite, "So your wife," focuses on other's obsessions with jealousy and what they think might happen. The witty line "she doesn't see, that the biggest threat of all, is that I've got you by the soul, and not just by the balls" makes me laugh out loud.

This is definitely not the last we'll see of **Bite Poetry Press** and I'm grateful. There are so many things that need to be said, so many truths that make others feel less alone. These poets are opening doors and squashing cliches. I cant wait to see what they'll do next.

Mirimakes Music "Ladies Night" The Barn | Tuesday 9th July

Here's a few images of a wonderful night at **The Barn** in Ledbury, scene of the **Mirimakes Music "Ladies Night"** presentation.

Five women singer/songwriters at different stages of their careers provided a steady stream of memorable moments throughout the evening at this lovely venue.





From the youngest performer, **Georgia Shephard** whose understandable initial nervousness could not detract from the beauty of her voice, right through to the most experienced, cellist **Julia Palmer-Price**, whose eclectic set closed the main performance, the standard was maintained right through the evening.

The two artists whose music I did know of duly delivered two magnificent sets. Firstly, **Lucy Rebecca Horwood** (strongly



endorsed by my esteemed editor, Mark Hogan) then Claire Boswell kept us all enthralled with beautiful melodies, incisive lyrics, crystal clear voices and wonderful arrangements. The latter's self-titled album, rich in Celtic and country influences, greatly enhanced my journey home.

The whole thing was arranged by our presenter for the night, **Miriam Baker**, who having entertained us with a set of jazz standards earlier on, finally set



the seal on the night with a glorious Irish ballad, sung acapella.



A mention too, for the three gentlemen who gave splendid accompaniment on the night – **Ben Lewis** on violin, **Ken Appleby** on guitar and particularly, the beautifully rich sound of **Ben Lee's** 19th century cello, accompanying **Lucy Horwood**, will long stay in the mind

I do urge you to check out all the artists on the bill, either on YouTube or SoundCloud - you won't be disappointed.

RISEThe Feathers Hotel | Sat13th July

There's something truly wonderful about alfresco gigs. This really was the most beautiful setting, with flower beds, shrubs, trees and a pergola covered in a massive grapevine as **RISE** previewed their upcoming album "Strangers" in the garden of **The Feathers Hotel** in Ledbury.

RISE is the performance name of **Jo Beth Young**, whose debut album "*An Abandoned Orchid House*" was released last year to much acclaim.

Not one to rest on her laurels, the new album is set for release later this year and all I can say is that if the band can reproduce on disc what we heard in that garden, the results will be mesmerising.

There's definitely a sense of anticipation and a distinct buzz about the audience before the set, due I'm sure to Young's appearance at last year's event, showcasing "Orchid House" – which people are keen to tell me was a wonderful event.

The music is difficult to categorise, there are strong folk elements but the sound also draws from ambient, progressive,



psych and neo-classical influences. And if this sounds to you like a recipe for the musical equivalent of Laura Ashley wallpaper, you'd be wrong. This was a distinctly muscular set, during which the pace, the flow of original ideas and their splendid delivery never slackened.

The band were uniformly excellent, with **Helen Ross** putting in a huge shift on violin, with the instrument scarcely seeming to leave her chin for the whole set and **Matt Rochford** giving an ebow masterclass - rarely have I seen one used to such great effect. Normally a guitarist will pick one up for short passages, but tonight the small, shimmering blue box was front and centre on several tracks, both swelling the sound on the quicker tracks and providing an eerie presence when the pace dropped.

And then there's this voice, this wonderful voice... **Jo Beth Young** was using a double mic setup, the left one in the picture allowing her crystal clear vocals to drift across the evening air like smoke, while in complete contrast, the right hand one used a combination of distortion and chorus to give a jagged rasping tone and when they were used together the result was absolutely startling, pinning you back in your seat.

The time went by very quickly indeed and it's difficult, if not impossible to pick out highlights from this hour long set, but the lengthy title track from the new album, "Strangers", left the very appreciative audience breathless.

A magical evening, and I'm so glad I made the trip over.

Tone Tanner Duels Tone Tanner

Duels is Tone Tanner's third full original solo album and as a long-performing local legend there is hope that Duels will be the breakthrough he so richly and rightly deserves.

Mainly recorded in Evesham with parts exotically put down under in Sydney and all masterfully mastered by the omnipresent Dave Draper, Duels is a labour of long-standing love as Tone plays all the instruments & sings with the exceptions mentioned below: and so to the songs.

Inside Job launches the album in blistering form with an anti neocon tirade somewhat Hendrix in style as Tone tight but loosely freestyles on the frets in fine style.

Kill The Party furthers the righteous cause in fiery fashion slaying the reactionary right with the vocals coming on like an Aussie Lydon. The structure and backing vox brings to mind elements of Zappa which of course is a very good thing.

Read To The End features the husky blues tones of Rachael Medhurst who classily carries this funky number whilst TT compliments her sympathetically with his perfect plucking and picking.

The measure and breadth of *Duels* is amply illustrated by the next track War Bride, a hauntingly dark slide-resonator almostinstrumental replete with background shelling & gunfire sounds in addition to a plaintive Eastern wail. Sometimes no words are

Sort Your Life Out 1 takes us back into quasi-comic Zappa meets Beck territory ending aptly abruptly for such a strident statement. Followed unsurprisingly by Sort Your Life Out 2 which couldn't be more contrasting, featuring a gorgeously sad melody and one Jules (not Jools!) Benjamin on customary quality keyboards. The song climaxes with an almost Purple era Gillan-esque wail and Hammond duet. Very nice indeed.

Next up Condi is a Peter Miller tune featuring the man on Chapman Stick (look it up!). Another change in style as this kaleidoscopic album surprises once again as 'Condi' shapes up to be a dark funk workout with an 80's Power Station feel as Tone's guitar pyro-playing vie with semi-rapped vocals.

Pete Miller's involvement continues with the co-written Loved and Famous. Duels is an album about the human and thus political condition and 'L&F' continues the theme is it smoulders and rocks in right-on fashion.

Titfer Blues brings back the resonator raunch as TT's chameleon voice here channels Tom Waits and a grittier Clapton. Delicious licks from Tanner's digits: hat's off indeed!

The resonator remains for Fat Man Blues with lyrics by one Richard Wall. It stays firmly in Waitsian territory but is plenty original and by no means a slavish pastiche. Duels strength to surprise is sustained as Glen Gaskell provides the Northern vernacular to the ballsy & bluesy Roof Fall, bemoaning the working folk's lot at the avaricious hands of their tyrannical employers. It was ever thus.

Back then to titanically tasty powerhouse rock for penultimate track Hi Rise featuring the harp blowing talents of Mr Garrington Jones of this parish.

Duels of course finishes in typically unguessable style with Changeling, a fine-picked guitar instrumental in the time-honoured fashion of such luminaries as Davey Graham, Bert Jansch through



to Jimmy Page. Fittingly even in the last minute of 3 here there is a final musical denouement as Tone shifts style and leaves us with a questioning, reaching finale which soon fades keeping us wondering and wanting more.

Duels is a panoramic work by a master of mercurial styles and magisterial multi-instrumentalism and there is never a dull moment herein. Tone has constructed a monumental work out of honest blood, sweat, tears, heart and soul, which more than deserves your total attention.

The Strays | Drop Out Zone

Cheltenham Band **The Strays** have grown a little since I first saw them when they were tight, colourful rockabilly trio: **Stella, Gary** and **Sam**. That trio has become four, with **Krisztian Jakab** on bass,

freeing up Gary to turn to a full drum kit resulting in a rounder, more dynamic sound. **The Stray**s have gone from strength to strength, they are fast becoming the go-to rock 'n' roll, good time band.

With two Eps in the last two years, an album was inevitable and here it is. 'Drop Out Zone' has hit the streets so get ready to jump, jive, and dance your way to taking home a copy. It is a force of energy - do not think for one second you're going to be able to sit still with this playing in the background.



'Hey Little Lady' bursts into life like a ruptured water main. Gary sets up the rhythm on the drums before Sam adds dirty guitar and Jakab gets rumbling. Stella is irrepressible and leads the way for a sizzling starter. 'Fives and Two's' is brought to life by Sam's guitar chords. Probably a bit quick for my old legs but I'd give it a go. This is rockabilly and the pace is unforgiving but there's relief on the

way with the lovely, sultry 'Oh Baby No' which is definitely more my pace. Sam adds a very nice guitar bridge and I'm pleased to say, this beaut is stretched out for a sweet sounding 5 ½ minutes - Oh Baby Yes!

The respite is all too brief, as the pace lifts on 'Get Out Of This Town' but Sam is resisting with a dirty, defensive guitar as Gary and Jakab keep the thunderous rhythm firing - nice one. The title track eases in at a gentle pace, lifting and dipping with its syncopated rhythm and the beat builds as Stella spells it out, sassy as ever.

Building on their previous EPs, this full album is a little cracker: just light the touch paper and stand back. The next best thing to having **The Strays** live in your living

.

Wyrewood | Last Leaves

Deep in the Malvern Hills is a little hideaway abode where the second offering and first full album from the multitalented **Wyrewood** was recorded.

Last Leaves is the title and the band comprise Robert Powell on keys guitar percussion and vocals, Peter Hodge on more guitars harmonica mandolin and vocals and Lorna Joy Davies delighting us with cello and flute. The band are augmented by Lez Shed and Paul Michael Boyce both bassists on a couple of tracks.

Always too Much kicks us off in fine style with a catchy melody which brings to mind the best of the 70's song writers. It's a timeless tune with nice proggy touches and sets the scene well for the album. The songs alternate between song writers Powell and Hodge compositions the first being the

former's and second track *The Boy on the Moon (Like Superman)* is a Hodge offering. Beginning with mandolin and flute, piano and acoustic guitar then take centre stage as Hodge leads us through what appears to be a tale of growing up, in turns cautious and adventurous in tone, finishing with a beautiful minute long Elizabethan madrigal coda.

Running away from Myself returns us to more perhaps straightforward classic singer-songwriter material but is none the worst for it as Powell echoes the likes of messrs Ayers and Gabriel whilst retaining originality a-plenty. Overtones of melancholy cello (is there any other kind?) plus flute help the Gabriel connection further.

It's fair to say that Hodge's songs are more off-the-wall affairs as *Mixing Bowl* channels the lively likes of dear Dylan and the mighty Incredible String Band, especially Robin Williamson.

This titanic group keep coming back to me maybe because like them **Wyrewood** split songwriting duties half & half, never the

twain?

The mystical and wyrd vein continues with the lovely Hodge composition *Lords and Masters*. The playing is exemplary throughout and stamps the whole enterprise with polished quality without losing a free & creative feel.

Powell's material is definitely on that loner stoner doomy vibe, think Hardin, Drake plus the likes of Blunstone. We are indeed in exalted company. His last effort on the album and penultimate number Heads will Roll underlines the diversity herein as an organ enters the fray for a once only appearance.

Fittingly *Last Leaf* leads us to the close with another hauntingly lovely


and mysterious melody from Hodge complete with trademark obscure and impressionistic words.

Last Leaves is a work full of variety and invention beautifully executed and produced in the bosom of their Malvern HQ. Hopefully **Wyrewood** will be tempted down from the hills to treat us to some rare live appearances in support of this excellent album.

"Smile" has a very strong message to share, in a world where women still often get seen as the weaker sex with a stereotypical



The King Dukes | Numb Tongues

The debut album, Numb Tongues by nine-piece, original soul band The King Dukes is something of a revelation. One of those albums you sit back in awe, listening and re-listening as the music grabs you, inviting you to dance, to sing, to punch the air in celebration. That there are still band's out there who know there way around a hook and a recording studio well enough to truly deliver something special.

Guitarist and lead vocalist Marc Griffiths formed the band gathering like-minded musicians from a hotbed of local talent in a bid to create a sound that's raw and organic, yet simultaneously soulful and inviting. Combining a love of contemporary British RnB and Memphis Soul to form a strong starting block. The band add a dash of blues, a twist of jazz and a rock 'n' roll twang to create a deliciously addictive eleven track affair.

Opening with the recent single, a brush of electric and an instantly affecting lead by Griffith's. I Gotta Go grabs the attention from the off. The

rhythm section, piano and horn section soon join the mix, leading towards an instant choral pay-off that comes complete with cooed harmonies, counter-balancing Marc's magical blend of raw yet soulful lead. The three and a quarter minute track is a perfect introduction to the 'Kings, infectiously blending those R&B and soul influences into an addictive statement of intent.

Dying Man follows and soon proves The King Dukes are no one trick pony. A slow burning number sees a bruised Griffiths emote over a long sustained keyboard note. The rhythm section combine to create an aching rhythm, further peppered by an expressive

burst from the horn section, further enhanced by a gorgeous, muted trumpet solo courtesy of Joss Murray.

The gravelly lead vocal of Kid Gloves reminds me of the latter day bluesy swagger of Jim Morrison. And sure enough we're served up a short, sharp rock 'n' roll guitar solo during a thrilling, muscular three and half minutes. Continuing the album's diversity and rich balance, Rub You The Right is a glorious strutting slab of R&B, featuring Henry Slim's wailing blues harmonica. Alongside is

> the swaggering rhythm section of Mandrake Fanastico and Dan Clibery (bass and drums respectively). In direct comparison. the opening of I Guess Monday's (Aren't Going To Be The Same Anymore strips the 'Dukes all the way back, leaving a passionate and captivating Griffiths accompaniment until the band subtley embellish, with those aching vocals very much front and

> Elsewhere, Keep On Living has something of a skiffle blues feel. Again featuring the aforementioned contagious harmonica of Slim alongside a howling lead vocal to close leaving one practically punching the air in celebration. True True Love sees Griffiths duet

with a bewitching April Jackson and the Hammond-esque keys of Lowe. The penultimate Coming Right Back For Your Heart is one of those slow-burning ballads that soar and simply ooze with emotion.

Numb Tongues weighs in at eleven tracks and nearly forty minutes long and I can honestly say there's not a single wasted moment. The King Dukes have delivered an absolute gem. Raw, bruised soul at it's absolute best. I highly recommend you take a look at The King Dukes and one of the debut's of the year.

Craigus Barry's Stained Glass Whispers Orchestra Thieves Of Joy

Following on from last year's intriguing *Temptations OfThe Jaded Saints* ep (see review Slap Issue 85) *Thieves of Joy* distils & extrapolates ideas from that work whilst bringing new ones to fruition all adding up to what will eventually become the full soundtrack to **Tom Lee Rutter's** much anticipated acid western *Day OfThe Stranger*.

From these titles one could expect a Leone meets Jodorowsky at Morricone's sound studio approach and you wouldn't be too far wrong. However that would do **Craigus B** some injustice as though he is clearly influenced by spaghetti specialists such as Alessandroni, de Masi, Cipriani & the like, being the renaissance man he undoubtedly is, there is no lack of originality here within these 5 tasty tracks.

Yes it's a Western soundtrack so we get twangy guitar, frenetically strummed string instruments of various kinds, atmospheric percussion flourishes and even requisite echoed whistling but it's all done to superb effect on tracks such as Snake In Grass and One Card Left and Fools Rock Closed On a Sunday. Such excellent evocative titles & as ever with Mr Barry (a musical relation to John surely) the devil is in the detail.

And details there are a-plenty as Craigus is indeed a one man orchestra turning his hand to everything from harmonium to saw synth(?!) and in typical fashion a covertly sampled playing of the resident harp at Portmeirion. Also you have to love a man who plays a Cornflakes packet! CB is not alone here though and is joined by Brummie legends Ilias Lintzos on a myriad of percussion and Roots Wilson playing Hammered Dulcimer on a track.

The music progresses through the dusty desert til we reach perhaps a long-forgotten cobwebbed room with a creaky musical box and that harp, being utilised to gorgeous effect together with romantic swelling strings and acoustic piano all fed through a

warped fairground wurlitzer. Classic Craigus indeed. The final piece *Despair*

Meets With Fuzz Ballet (these titles!) is one of sinister dread as the film reaches its climax and a doubtless doomy denouement - who knows will we ever see this film and does that matter? Will it become Rutter's Don Ouixote? Let's hope not as there is so much to look forward to if this is the soundtrack. The ocean enters the piece transports us to a monasterial choral thunderstorm chamber and there we climax fittingly with a pitch dark undertow drone. The End??

Laurence Jones Band

Laurence has been the 'new face of blues' in the UK since emerging on the scene back in 2012. Four albums have been

testimony to his maturing talent. His latest offering, simply labelled **Laurence Jones Band**, was recorded at Miami's **Top Stop Music** following two years of hard work. His well established band (**Bennett Holland** on keys, **Phil Wilson** on drums and bassist **Greg Smith**) are rightly acknowledged in the self-titled release.

Bennett's boogie piano opens the door to a rock 'n' roll ripper. 'Everything's Gonna Be Alright' gets you up and moving from the off. Flicking forward into a bluesy 'Wipe Those Tears Dry', Laurence takes lead vocals with soul-filled lyrics as his honeyed guitar adds colouration. A cluster of superb blues songs make up the core of this release - dive in and unearth.

He wants you to 'Stay' with a rocking

Beatles/Stones inspired rhythm and then we tumble into the superb voodoo blues of 'Mistreated' with its rich deep bass and the guitar tells the tale before soaring away. This is a barnstorming track that, alone, is sufficient reason to get this album.

A much more traditional 'Long Lonely Ride' is sparse with the lyrics telling the story. As Phil clicks away on the drum rims, Bennett adds piano - simple straight cut bloody good blues. Jones adds a very personal song in 'Beautiful Place', a soulful, heartfelt

dedication to his mother and her difficult passage through parts of her life. 'Day Tripper' (yes that one) came from an idea of producer Greg Ellias, combining Stevie Ray Vaughan's 'Crossroads' with the Beatles' pop classic. The lyrics are, of course Lennon's, the underlying vibe fused with Texas' best.

Laurence has delivered an album of diverse rock, soul, and of course blues. He continues to build on his previous work with growing maturity and many of the songs are from his own life experiences. For me, that core of songs in the heart of the album make this an album worthy of

anyone's library. If you are an avid fan, having watched Laurence Jones 'grow' into his music, it's a no-brainer and you have probably already ordered it.



Alt-rock duo **Hipflask Virgins**, compriseing of guitarist/vocalist Jay and drummer/backing vocalist Will, have been playing frequent shows around the Worcester area (and recently in Manchester)

for a couple of years now. Their frenetic gigs have honed their sound into something tight, yet unrestrained enough to provide thrills for even the most iaded of rock Their debut fans. single. Unintentional. different, nο combining the Pixies' quiet verse, loud chorus trick with



fuzzed-out, muscular riffs akin to Royal Blood or QOTSA.

Will's drumming here is a relentless march behind Jay's sludgy riffs and disaffected vocals. "I guess I've come to enjoy your misery" sounds as self-deprecating as it does sneering, and the track is a brilliantly-observed capturing slice of adolescent angst.

The bridge takes it down with guitar arpeggios and a more pleading, vulnerable repetition of the previously brash hook "I didn't mean this at all". before exploding again into punishing noise and concluding in the vocals rising to a ragged scream.

Unintentional, accompanied by an intense, strobe-lit video, is a very strong debut from **Hipflask Virgins**, and proof that the band has a bright future! *Unintentional* is out now on all major streaming services.

West Fest West Malvern | 29th June

Against odds of over 133,000 to one against. West Malvern's West Fest was held on the hottest day of the year for two years running. As before everyone worked for free other than the necessary hire of infrastructure such as tents, generator, portable loos, PA systems and so forth with all profits to be distributed amongst local worthy causes. The festival might run for just a single day but planning starts in January with a lot to cover including food vendors, stall holders, bouncy castles, children' events and the musicians. Christian Finn supplied the Turbosound PA systems for both main stages and handled the mixing on one of them while myself and John Hewitt looked after the other. Both sound systems used wireless remote mixing so there were no cables trailing across the field.

This year two newly designed identical stages were used alternately to handle the main acts so there was no waiting between sets for bands to set up while a smaller third stage, the Dakin Diversity Stage, at the far end of the field catered for everything from bands, duos and solo artists to poetry readings with some exceptional talent on display.



The quality of music on offer wouldn't have disgraced a major festival despite the majority of the acts being fairly local. Malvern's own Ya Ya Logic kicked off the festival in great style playing their own material followed by the current incarnation of the Truckstop Trixies featuring Tyler Massey and Vo Fletcher with a mainly Americana style set. Sadly, virtuoso guitarist Gordon Giltrap couldn't play this year as he was scheduled to have an operation

just before West Fest but his friend Carrie Martin, who came all the way from Hull, played a wonderfully evocative acoustic set as did film composer Nick Hooper and his wife Judith, also good friends of Gordon, Gordon says he hopes to be able to play again next vear.



A contemporary set of original material was played by Food for the Famine, a London band with Malvern roots and there was also an excellent set from Worcester's own Flames. The threepiece Ray Mytton band played a crowd-pleasing set of rock






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The Wedding Present, Vinny Peculiar The Marrs Bar | Thurs 25th July

1989 is universally recognised as a seminal year for alternative music on both sides of the Atlantic. The influence of acid house was permeating its way through over here with the likes of The Stone Roses' debut album and Technique by New Order leading

the way for what was to come the following year from Happy Mondays, Primal Scream et al. Meanwhile the Sub Pop label and bands such as Pixies were forging a path that lead to alternative rock breaking through in the shape Nirvana stateside.

The Wedding Present, however, were to take this new found major label interest down their own path. While quintessentially English in the kitchen sink drama tradition, musically they owed as much to their American counterparts, particularly on *Bizzaro*, the album celebrating its 30th anniversary in the shape of this tour.

Opening tonight's gig at the **Marrs Bar** in front of a sell out crowd was our own *Vinny Peculiar*. Showcasing his own brand of poetic, personal folk tales, he was a very fitting support act and went down very well with what was an attentive and sympathetic audience.

Awaiting the main act, the crowd swelled and grew in as much anticipation as I can remember for a gig at Worcester's premier venue. We were not to be disappointed. The latest incarnation of **The Wedding Present** sounded as lean and hungry as ever,

playing a high energy set on the hottest day of the year. Bizarro was played in full, interspersed with tracks from throughout their career which was a refreshing approach to the ever-growing trend of album anniversary gigs that I thought really worked. The singles, *Brassneck* and *Kennedy* became crowd sing-alongs while the epic, breakneck instrumentation of *Take Me!*, *Bewitched* and *What Have I Said Now?* were quite breathtaking at times, the emotional intensity matching **David Gedge's** lyrics of love and heartbreak.



Uncompromising and unique as ever, they held the audience captivated for the entire gig and I for one will be looking forward to their next move as much as I have for the last thirty years.

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Kyla Brox Iron Road, Bar 57, Pershore | 11th July

Clutching empty pint glasses to herself, mouth slightly open with an unblinking stare focused on the stage, it is clear that **Kyla Brox** has entranced our young barmaid. The band are coming to a juddering climax as the final bars of Hallelujah are played out, eyes shut, legs splayed and in unison mouthing the words. The greying gentleman to my side has fallen asleep at several points leading up to this performance but he is now wide awake. The comfortable couple in front lean in to each other and the male warmly slips a complicit arm around his partner. The voice of Brox, that voice, rises and circles the room like a celestial drug...and we are all entranced.

Brox's band are tight. And I mean tight, tighter than a drug dealer owed money. The guitarist's (**Paul Farr**) precision with the chord changes and the experimental notes taken for a walk are smooth and complementary – no wonder his CV is so impressive. The bass (Blomeley) and drums (Warburton) lock in and offer up what Nick Kent refers to as "the churn of sedition." The rumbling blues backdrop is at times reminiscent of planets colliding.

One has a sense that the planets are aligning as **Kyla Brox** takes to the stage, her heavenly voice is disarming and explosive with equal measure. She is no angel though as she teases, flirts and seduces an all too willing audience. At times coquettish, at times Manc sassy, our blues curator is an excellent songbird with a musical heritage to match her deservedly won contemporary awards and plaudits. Kyla Brox was the recipient of another award on the night, one that I am sure she will be unaware of: pouring my



pint, our barmaid leaned in and gushed with a conspiratorial stage whisper..."she is amazing, this is the best shift ever."

The shift started with our avuncular troubadour, with a voice borrowed from the Delta and a pleasing line in barroom narratives to accompany his highly personal songs, **Trevor "Babajack" Steger** was a fitting entrée to a night of soul infused blues. With tales of personal longing, broken hearts, "Wells" and passionate hobbies, Steger opened up for what was a night of memorable blues that like the audience and the music, reflected the full spectrum of humanity.

The great tragedy of life is not losing but almost winning – the "Pain and Glory" if you will, to name check Brox's new album – the night was glorious but like all blues it was tinged with personal pain.

C-JamPrince of Wales, Ledbury | Sun 30th June

C-Jam are a collection of seasoned musicians who play in other bands but combine to bring a blend of jazz, funk and blues to sate our appetites.

For this session, the four horsemen of the apocalypse, were **Brian Badhams** on keys and vocals (Elkie Brooks, Steve Gibbons), **Bob Wilson** on guitar (Steve Gibbons, **Buby Turner**), **Brendan Day** on drums (Steve Gibbons) and **Frank Walker**, a go-to bass player with numerous bands over the years.

They started the ball rolling with a tasty Herbie Hancock instrumental before turning to a jazz edged 'Moondance' where they are in their

element and have everyone tracking the groove. The blues box is ticked with songs from BB King and John Mayall with Bob taking the opportunity to show off his riffing as Brendan and Frank set up the rhythm, providing the foundations for Brian to caress and provoke those ivories.

The Lennon/McCartney funk kicks in heavily from the rhythm boys as we 'Come Together' and heads are nodding, feet are

tapping and hips are swaying in unison. 'Summertime' has breached the old walls of the Prince and it would have brought a smile to Gershwin's face as he tried out the ales here.

C-Jam dig out one of their own with 'My Love', which grows into a funk feast, first with Brian's keys leading the way over the delicious rhythm before easing back for Bob to bend and pick at

his strings, the brass slide having a bit of a polish up in the process.

I'm on a tight time schedule and know I cannot see the gig through, but they lock me into an extended jazz funk that I can't resist. The race to the train gets faster as the funk unfolds and I'm hanging on in there. Lead is swapped again between Brian and Bob, Brian going from piano to organ and back. It is absolutely riveting and

I'm in trouble: I've no idea what the instrumental is, nor have time to find out, but I'm not leaving until it's finished. C-Jam call a halt and I start running (too old for that), making the station road as the train is pulling in. I take a short cut from the end of the platform with no time for the footbridge and leap on as the guard flags to leave. Phew! What you do for live music! My pulse eases, my ears stop pounding, alive and funked out on C-Jam.

Music in the Hall **Bennett Wilson Poole**St Georges Hall, Bewdley | 6th September

Friday September 6th brings a return visit to Music in the Hall at **St Georges Hall, Bewdley** with a real coup for Worcestershire because we have the 2nd appearance of Americana super-group **Bennett Wilson Poole**.

Danny Wilson (Danny And The Champions Of The World, Grand Drive), and **Robin Bennett** (The Dreaming Spires, Saint Etienne) have joined forces with **Tony Poole** (Starry Eyed and Laughing), producer extraordinaire, and king of the electric twelve-string

Rickenbacker to form the UK supergroup. Anyone who attended last year's show will know that their range of musicianship allied to a lively presentation skills set results in a fantastically enjoyable night of live music.

Bennett Wilson Poole is the collaboration made for destiny and one set to make a significant mark in the recording annals. Jangle rocking revivalists gets the clichés out the way early, but the two thoughts never stray far from your mind as their self-titled album washes over you. Rampant guitars, wispy harmonies and luxurious tunes combine to place the record in the set position pending the proverbial smash. Wholesomely British and vividly retrospective, the forty-eight minutes music on the album parade in a flash with little effect of strain, but plenty of endless uncomplicated ease.

They combine their voices, guitars, and song-writing to marvellous effect in their new collection of songs that began as uplifting acoustic music and just grew into something far more wide-ranging and transcendent, providing balm, inspiration and succour for these troubled times.

Their album, the recently released titled "Bennett, Wilson and Poole", is testament to Tony's particular production and musical talents. All three speak in the rosiest of terms of the collaboration and their excitement at its release is palpable.

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Review

Upton Blues Festival 19-21st July '19

At this year's festival a carefully selected panel and a lively room of the public tried to define 'What Is the Blues?' Now I'll come back to that question later, but what I can say is that the UK's biggest free blues festival, covers every subgenre that falls in to the 'blues' category over its fantastic three days.

Day One.

Where to start? As I hit Upton around four, the festival is already in full swing and the small town is engulfed by revellers looking for their annual fix. A little deliberation and I head to church for the newly relocated acoustic stage featuring Matt Woosey. An already busy congregation watches intently as Matt delivers a breath-taking rendition of Kashmir. He later offers snippets of 'John the Revelator' and 'Backdoor Man' during his sensational finale. No time to stop and praise the bewitching Woosey, as The Achievers are ready to rock the Riverside with their unique blend of 'dancefloor gospel' and 'alternative blues.' The Stroud based five-piece draw a large crowd and the first dancers of the day.



Heading towards seven o'clock, I decide to introduce my intrigued nine year old to the sounds of **Big Boy Bloater**. The 'naturally charming' rhythm and blues don't disappoint as he tears through 'That Ain't My Name' and 'Toasting the town with Sweet and Brown.'

The Sports Field stage on day one belonged to **Danny Bryant** who threatened to tear down the big top with a series of searing solos. Bryant



twisted and tortured new shapes from his guitar as a packed tent roared their approval. Having been happily battered into submission by the blues rock of Bryant, I finished day one with the sounds of soulful siren **Kyla Brox**. Kyla offers seemingly effortless vocals and a tight band as she entices the entire river side with a bit of call and response and a mesmeric flute solo.

Day Two. and Kicking off proceedings with a new look, **Stone Mountain Sinners** are on the Sports Field. The band have proved that despite a line-up reshuffle they are getting 'Stronger' every day. The audience show themselves in fine voice during the set, joining the band for a rousing finale of 'She Said Yeah.'







Staying on the field **Troy Redfern** and his band offered to take us to '*The Other Side*' with a scintillating set of smouldering blues rock. Troy's guitar swoops whilst flights of cello add to an evocative mix. A massive roar approval greets the frontman's young son on second guitar for a run at '*John the Revelator*.'

In the church people are worshipping the Boss, not the one up above but Bruce Springsteen with the Sounds of Springsteen on stage. **Stephen Steinhaus** and cohorts take the congregation to the 'Streets Of Philadelphia' and 'Golden Days' via 'Lucky Town.' Blues fans lay down their guard as the Upton Musical director and Weekend Compare shuffle down the aisles for the inevitable singalong to 'Born In The USA.'



Next, 'The Girls Are Back In Town.' **Never the Bride** open with 'Sympathy of the Devil' and a lung-busting 'Living Tree' before they launch into an acapella rendition of 'Mercedes Benz' which moves effortlessly into 'Me And Bobby McGee.'



At a young age music teachers told **Keith Xander**, that he would never play a two-handed instrument with a prosthetic hand. They should try telling that to the scores of people that lined the streets of Upton as **Xander and The Peace Pirates** proved just why they are now one of the most highly regarded live bands in the country. The band's unique take on soulful blues rock had the town rocking to its core

Last act for day two: **Wille and The Bandits**. Are there any superlatives that have yet to be uttered about the Cornwall based trio? There's a reason why the band drew arguably one of the biggest crowds of the festival and why the Daily Telegraph describe the band as 'one of the best bands in the country.' Wille's gravelly vocals and virtuosic guitar work, the expressive six string bass of Matthew Brooks and the inventive rhythms of Andrew Naumann had the field captivated from the off.



Day Three. And what better way to start a Sunday off than a hearty debate, no I'm not talking about Andrew Marr discussing how the country is going to ruin, in Upton there are more pressing concerns: What are the blues? A hand-picked panel attempt to find and answer and field questions from a busy room.

The next obvious next port of call on a Sunday is the church, but there are few services like the one delivered by **Ruben Dobbs** and **Joey Mitchelk** aka **Swampcandy**. Opening their sermon with 'Aberdeen,' the band soon encourage the packed out congregation to join in for a little gospel call and response during 'Roll, Jordan, Roll.'



Boffo's Wake provide a break from the blues, delivering an energetic set of what only can be only be described as high octane, Balkan inspired, gypsy punk meets ska-cabaret. They even give us a bedraggled canter through Haddaway's 'What Is Love,' much to the delight of the Sunday mass.

As the day draws on, the well-oiled Upton machine cranks towards the final curtain call. Back in the always crammed church, the acoustic stage's host, **Trever Steger**, takes the final slot of the day to showcase the recently released *'Sawdust Man.'* Over at **The Riverside Dino Baptiste** sends people home happy with a bit of boogie-woogie.

I finish up with Shrewsbury based blues rockers the **Rainbreakers**. They never disappoint, taking influences from the late sixties and early seventies and adding a contemporary twist. The band serve huge slices of infectious rock infused with melodic blues. Frontman **Ben Edwards**, puts the final exclamation point on Upton Blues 2019 with a scintillating performance that no one wants to end.



As ever, the organisers, artists, stage hands and volunteers that help deliver such an incredible and popular event, year in year out deserve all the credit I'm sure will flood their way.

To answer my own original question: What is the blues? Well I'm still not sure I can describe the widening sound of the genre, but surely 'the blues' is that feeling when you have to return to the mundane after a brilliant weekend in (mostly) sunny Upton-upon-Severn. Long live **Upton Blues Festival**!
